

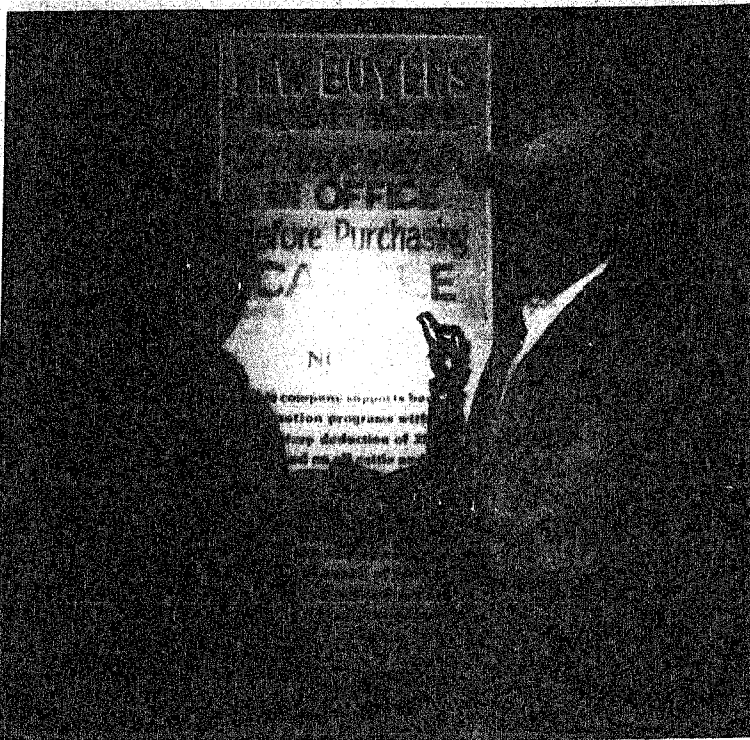

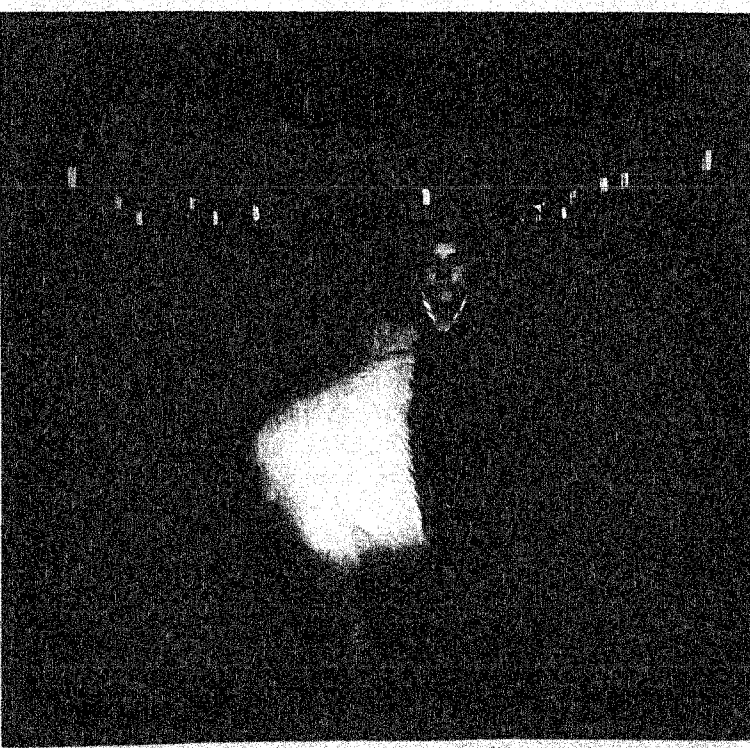

His choice was the finewool trophy with the stipulation that it be two inches taller than any other. Bradley has received this trophy three years out of the past four.

BROWNWOOD--The world-renowned Budweiser Clydesdales will march in a parade to kick off "Scouting for Food" Friday, February 8, at 2:00 p.m. The parade will start at Fisk Street and end at the Brownwood Coliseum.

Before their parade appearance, the horses will visit Richards Park in Brady, Tuesday, February 3, from 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Coleman City Park, Wednesday, February 4, from 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

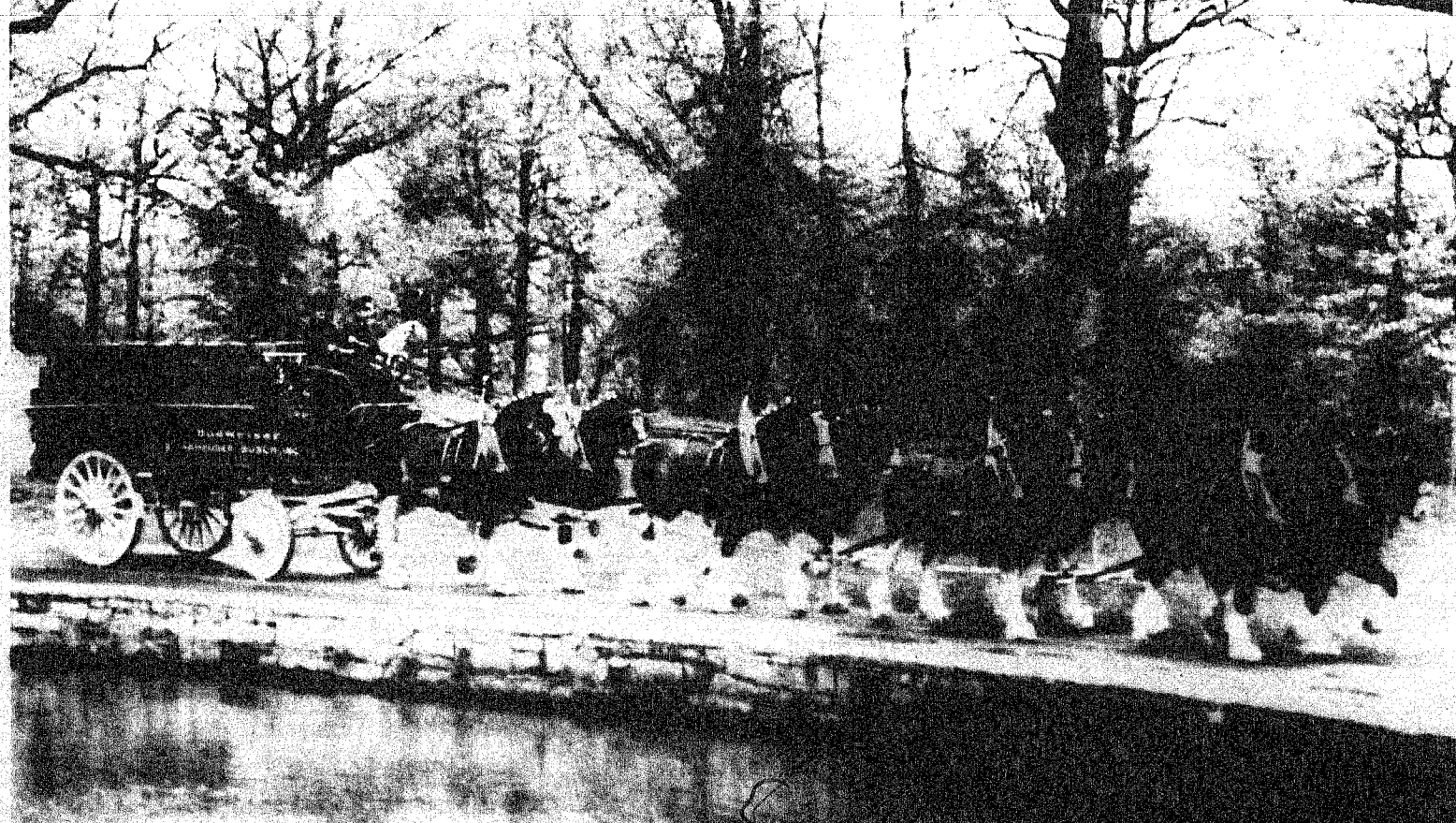
The Clydesdales' visit is courtesy of Mitchell Beverage Co., Inc., the local Anheuser-Busch wholesaler.

Mitchell Beverage is sponsoring the food drive with the city's chapter of Boy Scouts. The scouts will distribute bags to area residents on

Saturday, Feb. 7. Residents are asked to fill the bags with nonperishable goods and hang them on their front door knobs for the scouts to pick up Saturday morning, Feb. 14. The American Red Cross will distribute the food to the needy.

Although the Clydesdales will kickoff a new program for Brownwood, the horses have been synonymous with the traditional Anheuser-Busch brewery for decades. Originally from Scotland, the breed was used in North America to pull delivery wagons in the late 1800s before the introduction of motorized vehicles.

The Clydesdales were known then, as they are today, for their grace and agility, a notable fact since they are nearly twice the size of

Some IRS Tips For Preparing Tax Returns

Follow these tips when you prepare your federal income tax return and speed any tax refund due to you. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) says: -Have all your necessary records and forms available. -Get an early start to allow plenty of time. -Make sure you have a Form W-2 from each of your employers. -Read your tax instruction booklet carefully. -If you need additional information, check with the IRS—they may have a free publication that will answer your questions. Double-check the following before you mail your return: -Attach all W-2 forms and related schedules. -Verify all arithmetic. -If you rounded off numbers, did you round consistently? -Make sure you used the correct tax figure from the correct tax table. -Sign and date the return, both spouses sign if it is a joint return. -Use the peel-off label and pre-addressed envelope that was supplied with your tax package. Write any needed corrections on the label. -Use the correct amount of postage on the envelope. -Keep a photocopy of the return for your own records. -Make sure social security numbers are entered correctly at the top of the return.
