Vasquez-Hartman To Go To State

The Santa Anna Tennis Doubles Team of Greg Vasquez and James Hartman were defeated by Brandon Mikeška and Clayton Taylor from Eden in the championship match at regionals, 6-3, 6-4, to finish 2nd in regionals and secure a trip to Austin.

Vasquez and Hartman, No. 3 seed of tournament, defeated Stringer and Lopez from Garden City, No. 1 seed of tournament, in the semifinals, 5-7, 6-3, 6-3; they defeated Lewis and Lesoya of Knox City, 6-0, 6-0 in the quarterfinals.

State championships will be played May 15 and 16 in Austin. The first day of play will be held at the Intramural Courts (51st St. and Guadalupe). Match time for Greg and James will be at 9:00 a.m. and

2:00 p.m. Friday, May 15th. Finals will be held at the Penick Courts (1700 Trinity) Saturday, beginning at 9:00 a.m.

Irma Castillo and Stacie Gunter defeated Garden City's Schroder and Blalock, 6-0, 6-2 to advance to the quarterfinals. They beat Keith and Wade from Byers, 6-3, 6-3 to advance to the semifinals, where they were defeated by Fry and Bateman from Knox City, 1-6, 3-6. Castillo and Gunter finished 3rd at regionals by defeating Tole and Lankford from Chillicothe, 6-1, 6-4.

Dennis Absher and Bradley Wise also earned a trip to regionals by finishing 2nd in district. Castillo and Gruber beat Absher and Wise 6-4, 6-4 in the first round of play.

Fire Call Early Tuesday Morning

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department received a fire call early Tuesday morning at approximately 3:45 a.m. The firemen answered the call to 8th and Parker Streets to a home belonging to Richard Diaz. The home was totally engulfed in flames when firemen arrived and was soon extinguished.

The fire is still under investigation by the Coleman Sheriff's Department and the local fire marshal with the assistance of the local volunteer fire department.

Stabbing Under Investigation

Jimmy Watson of 406 Avenue B was attacked Saturday night, May 2 while asleep in his home.

According to a report from the Coleman County Sheriff's office, a single male intruder entered the house at approximately 11:30 p.m. and attacked the 80 years old man, who was in bed asleep at the time.

Watson was stabbed two times in the shoulder area and received several wounds on the hands as he tried to defend himself from his attacker.

He was transported to Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital in Coleman, where he was treated. He was released the following day and is spending some time now out of town with a daughter.

At press time, the incident was still under investigation.

County Baptist Association To Meet Tuesday

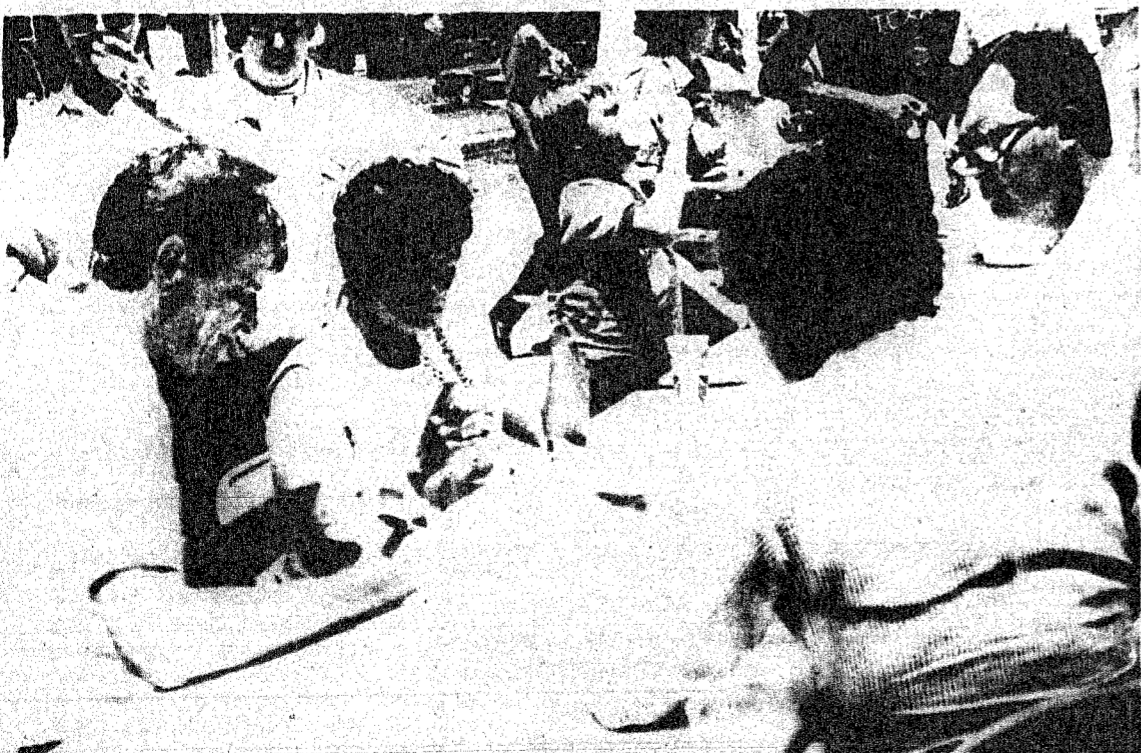
The regular meeting of the Coleman County Association will be held Tuesday, May 12 at the First Baptist Church, Santa Anna.

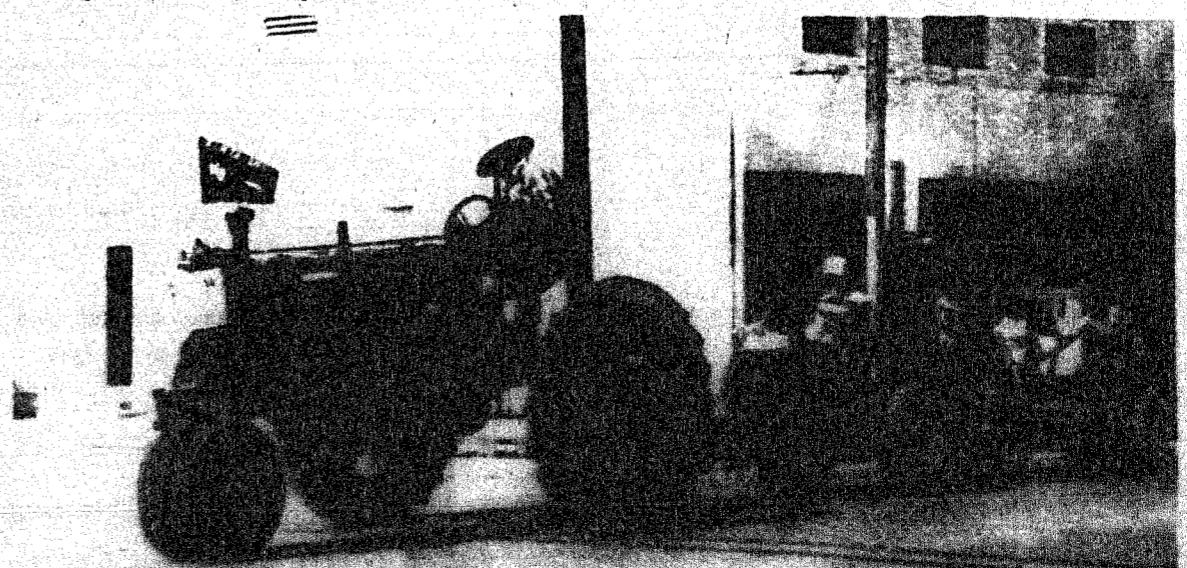

As I See It.....

Life is made of words and their meanings to us. How we use them and how they are used on us is important. In the next few weeks I would like to share with you some "A" words. These words will be achievement, appreciation, attitude, and ambition.

Last week we were in Greenville, Ill., to look over a job situation. Thank you for letting me miss.

As I began to think about achievement I wondered how to approach the idea. This is what I came up with. A list of achievements and a question to answer would be the best way to approach the subject.

So to the list and the question. I am a college graduate. I have been graduated three times at Southwestern Seminary, with a Masters degree in Theology, a Masters degree in Education, and a Masters degree in Administration. I have been a pastor of four churches.

I am a writer for the Brotherhood Commission as well as the writer for this column. I am a regional Director for the Texas Baptist Men in the Pioneer program. I teach a Seminary Sunday School class. I have a Monday night Bible Study for Senior Adults. And have developed a weekend retreat on "The Good Life."

Now if you have not thrown down the paper and said "What a braggard!" then let the next few lines on achievement sink into your mind.

There is a question to be answered. What is achievement? Cliff Cole, noted author, once said, "Not by self seeking, but by self sacrifice; not by dodging difficulties, but by overcoming them; by not giving supreme attention to outer things, but giving attention to

the inner worth, do men achieve." I have listed all the "things" I have done or am doing, but if I have not come to the place of inner worth then all the "things" are of no value.

Jesus said it, "If you want to be great then you must become a servant." He would tell us that the greatest achievement is to lose ourselves for the sake of others, which by the way is just the opposite of our world's standard of success.

As I see it the great value of achievement is that sense of inner worth. To come to the place that we can say I am worth something, to myself, to others, and to God, is going in the right direction of achieving something of value.

To be a "thing" or to do a list is not so important as to know that you are worth to God. Of so much worth He sent His Son to die that each of us might find peace and value through Him.

Do we ever stop achieving? I think the answer would be no. We may have to achieve in different ways but we never stop doing things of value. Roy L. Smith said, "Every man is capable of being something better than he is now."

As I see it there are some real essentials in achievement. To achieve there has to be a challenge to excellence; a great deal of faith; a commitment to make a difference; an overabundance of love; an endurance to the end and prayer as the lifeline to heaven.

To achieve is so important, to be of worth to yourself is much more important.

As I see it, to BE is better than to DO.
P.S. Desire plus discipline plus determination determines destiny.

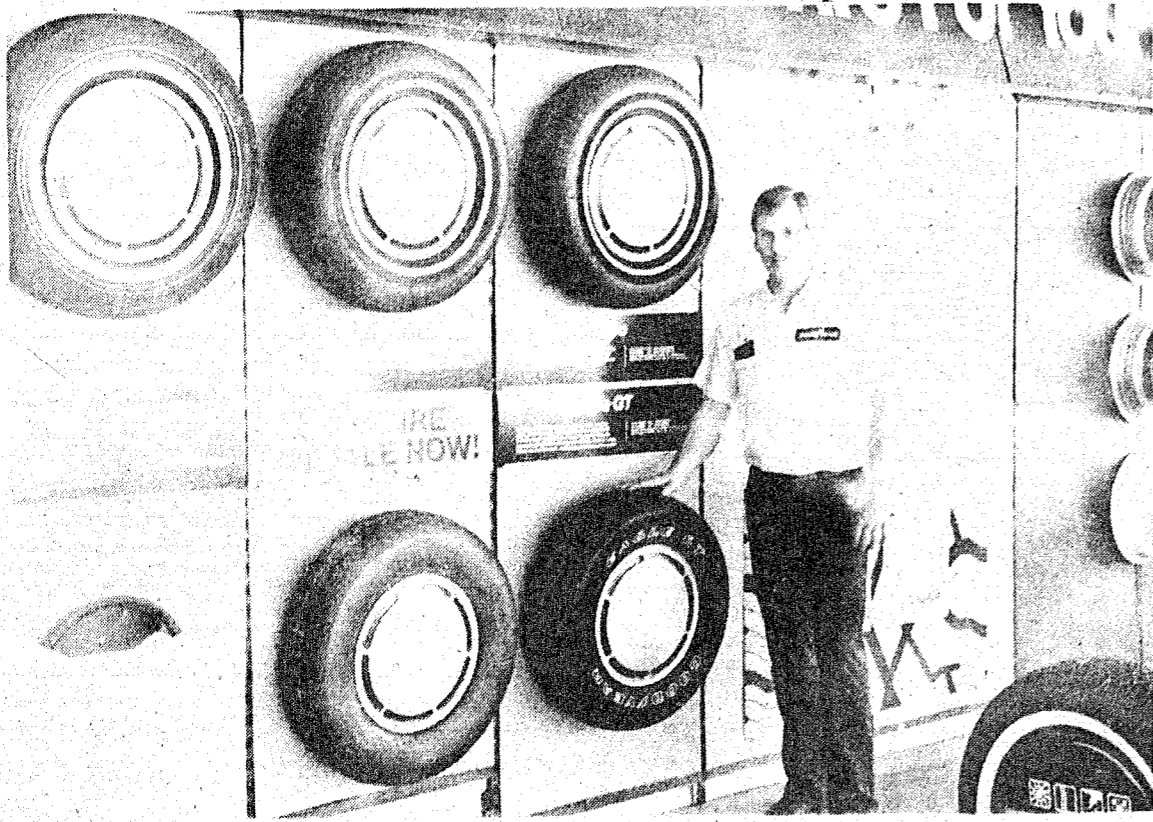

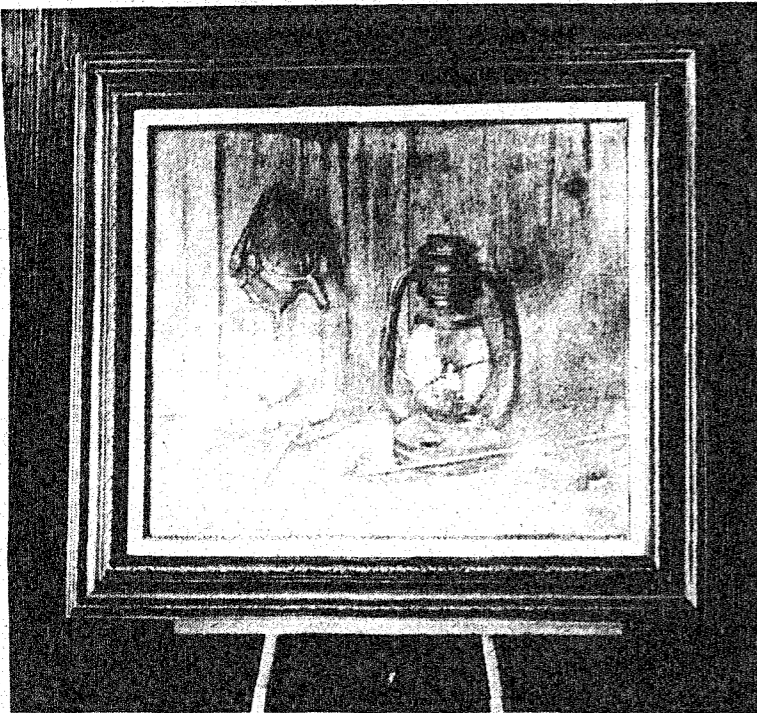

VA News

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.)

Q—I receive VA compensation benefits. I am now retired and living on a limited income, can I also receive a VA pension?

A—You cannot receive both VA compensation benefits and a VA pension. You may elect to receive a pension, if you qualify, and the pension would in fact be greater than the compensation benefit.

Q—I am a veteran with a service-connected disability rated at 50 percent. I have received an injury which is not service-connected, but which will require a prosthetic appliance. Will the VA supply this needed appliance?

A—Yes. Any veteran with a service-connected disability of 50 percent or more may be provided with necessary prosthetic appliances for any medical condition.

AUSTIN—Texans over the age of 60 and the senior centers that sponsor many programs and activities in their behalf have been honored by Governor Clements in proclamations designating May as Older Texans Month and May 10-16 as Senior Center Week.

"We who have benefitted so richly from the wisdom, love and hard work of older Texans can find no better way to express our appreciation that continued support of the Texas senior center network."

Many communities, area agencies on aging and senior centers have planned special activities to commemorate Older Texans Month and Senior Center Week. Group and individual visits to senior centers are also being suggested as a way to celebrate Senior Center Week.

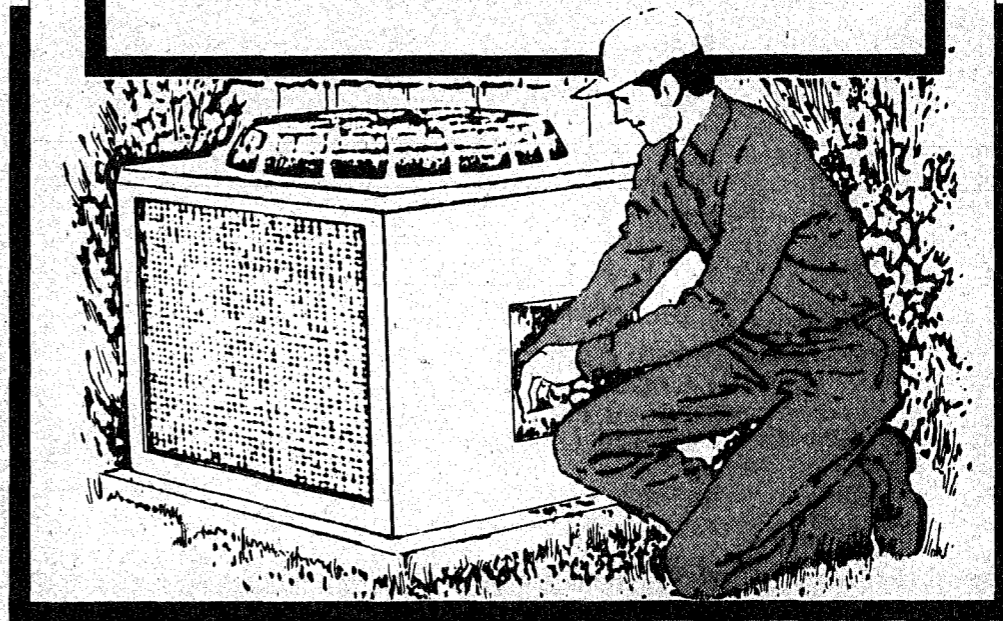
