

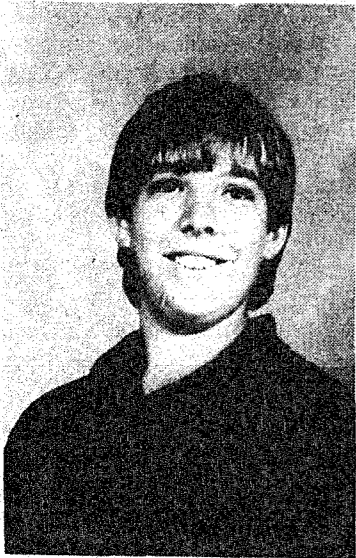

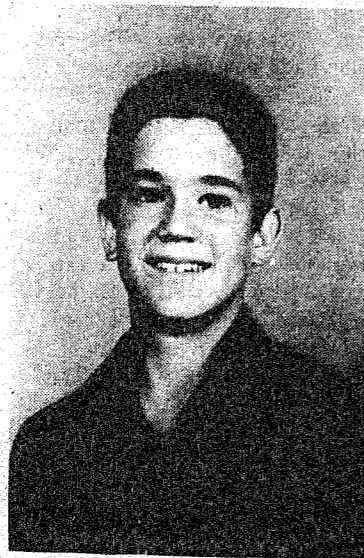

## Courthouse To Have Lift

The Coleman County Commissioners approved specifications and bid letting for an elevator in the courthouse at their meeting on Monday, May 11. All commissioners were present, as were County Judge W. W. "Pete" Skelton and County Clerk Glenn Thomas.

The date set for opening bids for the elevator is June 30. The specifications state that the elevator shaft is to be installed in space of the Veterans Service office on the first floor and the Extension Service office on the second floor. The elevator door will open on the south side of the east-west corridor just east from the main entrance to the building. The bid request seeks a "turn key job" except for painting, specifying that the elevator is to meet all governmental regulations for the lifting of handicapped persons.

Also, approved for bid is the painting of the interior of the courthouse. The same painting had been approved nearly a year ago but bids were never sought. The painting bid will also be opened on June 30. Commissioners asked Skelton and Thomas to work up the details on the painting bid, instructing them to make it clear that painting in the elevator construction area was not to be done until that contractor had completed work.

Bill Sneed was appointed as Coleman County Representative to the Executive Board of the Pecan Valley Economic Development Board. This is a Brownwood centered group whose functions include area industrial development activities.

## Sheriff Encourages Public To Support Law Enforcement

"Public support and involvement is one of the most important crime-fighting tools of today's law enforcement," Sheriff H. F. Fenton said in a recent interview. "In Coleman County and throughout our state, the public must be on our side in the fight for effective law enforcement."

# As I See It.....

I would like to share these words with the 1987 Seniors and with anyone who would have the ambition to become a leader.

There is a dramatic deathbed scene in the movie "Viva Zapata." The elderly Zapata is speaking his last words to his son: "Trouble is coming. Find a leader. If you cannot find a leader, be a leader!" That challenge motivated the son to become one of Mexico's greatest and most colorful leaders.

To be a leader in one's chosen vocation is a high and noble calling. To become a leader is a road laden with responsibility and risk.

It has been said there are three types of people: people who make things happen; people who watch things happen; and people who didn't know anything happened.

As I see it a leader is one who sees the responsibility of leadership, is willing to take the risks of leadership and one who is rewarded because of his or her ambition.

I believe there are at least three responsibilities of leadership. Number one is to serve. To serve was Jesus' definition of leadership and that is true in the realm of the secular or the sacred. Lord Montgomery said that his war experience led him to believe that the staff must be a servant to the troops and that a good staff officer must serve his commander and troop but himself by anonymous. The true leader regards the welfare of others rather than his own comfort and prestige. It is noteworthy that when God chose a leader to follow the great Moses, He chose Joshua, the man who had proven himself as a faithful servant. (Exodus 33:11).

To guide is another responsibility. The leader must know where he is going and just like the Eastern shepherd go ahead of his flock. It is not easy to guide people but it is a responsibility.

To undertake is a mark of a leader. If he is not prepared to take the heat then he must get out of the kitchen. An old baseball saying characterizes a good leader "Stopping on third adds nothing to the score." A leader knows that only a finished product or project is productive. He not only wraps the package, he ties the bow on it.

There are risks in being a leader. Scars are the authentic marks of faithful discipleship and true leadership. One scar is criticism. No leader is exempt from criticism. Anytime you want to lead or show ambition you will be criticized. The croaking critic is common and

sometimes exaggerated. A story is told of a farmer bothered by croaking frogs. He felt the noise of their croaking was unbearable. Upon draining the pond he found only two old croakers. The valley had amplified their effectiveness. A leader must not be preoccupied with his or her critics.

Rejection is sometimes a scar. Dr. A. B. Simpson was driven from his pastorate by some ungodly church members. He found his answers one day while sitting on a park bench. He saw a piece of torn newspaper with these words "No man is fully accepted until he has first been utterly rejected." Dr. Simpson had been rejected by his church but he was accepted by God to do a greater work. At the time of his death, Dr. Simpson could see five schools for training missionaries with his name on them.

But there are rewards as well. "The Jaycee Journal" of the Mississippi Junior Chamber of Commerce lists within its covers "The Beatitudes of a Leader:" Blessed is he who guides instead of dictates, for he shall have cooperation;

Blessed is he who is humble, for he shall receive praise.

Blessed is he who saves another's pride for he shall have friends.

Blessed is he who believes in the cause he serves, for he shall be happy.

Blessed is he in controversy seeks out truth for he shall judge justly.

Blessed is he who wins his point fully and arouse no enmity for he shall succeed.

Blessed is he who forgives his enemies and is loyal to his friends for he shall be loved.

Blessed is he who ignores gossip and searches out the facts for he shall be respected.

Blessed is he who has faith in his fellow man for it shall be justified.

As I see it: Congratulations Seniors of 1987!!! May God bless each of you.

P.S. We can only stimulate a person to education—we cannot stuff it into him.

**65 MPH Limit**

Although Congress has passed legislation allowing states to raise rural Interstate speed limits to 65 MPH, the speed limit in Texas is still 55 MPH. Rural Interstate highways are highways outside urbanized areas with populations over 50,000.

The Highway Commission has approved, and the Governor has signed, the proclamation raising the speed limit to 65 MPH outside of urban areas. Cities and areas with populations over 50,000 still have the 55 MPH speed limit.

Texas, in compliance with federal directives, still has a mandatory maximum 55 MPH speed limit, except in those areas where a higher or lower speed limit is authorized.
