## City Council Meets

The Santa Anna City Council met on Thursday, April 9, 1987 at $7: 00$
p.m. at the Mountain City Communip.m. at Center with all members present except for Mayor Joe Guerrero. Stanley Hartman, mayor pro-tem presided over the meeting. Minutes
of last month's meetings were read and approved. Rusty Wells, City Superintendent,
gave a report to the council about gave a report to the council about
the purchase of a water tank to the purchase of a water tank to
make a water truck to wet down the streets as requested by Mayor Joe meeting. The eost of just a water tank would be \$750. The cost of a tank ( 100 gal.) with 50 foot of hose
and boones on a trailer with a six month guarantee would cost the city $\$ 1250$. The discussion to purchase a tank was pastponed until the next council meeting.

Included in the gospel of Crisist there are FACTS TO BE BELIEVED-the apostle Paul wrote, I Corinthians 15:1-4, "I declare unto you gospel which I preached unto you, which also ye have received, and wherein ye stand; By which also ye are saved, if ye keep in memory what I preached unto you,... delivered unto you....how that Christ died for our sins according to the scrip
tures; And that he was buried, and that he arose again the third day accor ding to the scriptures." Now some seem to think this is all there is to the gospel, but there is more. AUSTIN - The availability of
toilets for both men and women; an toilets for both men and women; an
adequate supply of clean water for drinking, for first aid, and for washing up; and a place to have
lunch out of the sun are hardly luxuries to most working people. But to farm workers in some states, these
basic amenities are sometimes nonbasic am
existent.
In Texas, though the Texas Department of Health has established minimum sanitation standards to
protect farm workers from the .protect farm workers from the spread of disease and infections.
These comprehensive standards much the same as federal regula-
tions for industry and other businesses employing large work
forces, are under consideration at forces, are under consideration at
the U.S. Department of Labor for application nationwide.
A federal court recently ruled that
the U.S. Occupational Safed the U.S. Occuppational Saledy and
Health Administration, or OSHA, Health Administration, or OSHA,
should guarantee farm workers should guarantee farm workers
sanitary protections similar to those
for workers in other ind for workers in other industries. The
court cited court cited OSHA 's failure to extend
such standards to farm workers such standards to farm workers na-
tionwide as "a disgraceful chapter tionwide as "a disgraceful chapter
in legal neglect."
The Texas standards have been ef-
fective since 1933 and are enforced fective since 1983 and are enforced
through on-site inspections of farm through on-site inspections of farm
field facilities by local health deratfield facilities by local health depart-
ments and TDH regional personnel. According to Troy Lowry of TDH's According to Troy Lowry of TDH's
General Sanitation Division, inspectors investigate an average of six or
seven complaints by workers seven complaints by workers each
month, primarily in the Rio Grande month, primarily in the Rio Grande
Valley, where agriculture is concentrated.
Briefly, the
