

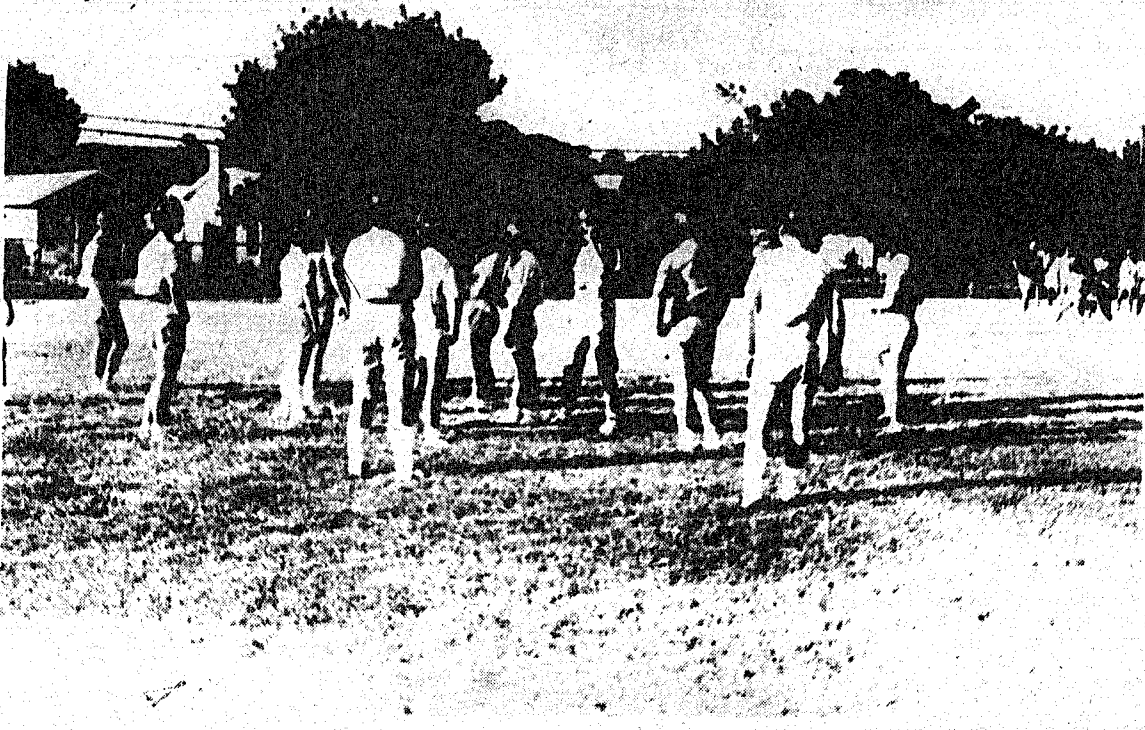

September 1 First Day Of School

High School Registration August 28th

Seems as if summer has barely started and its almost time for school to begin again. Students may or may not be ready, but preparations are being made for that event to take place on September 1.

Teachers will report for in-service at Early August 26 and 27. They will have work days on the 28th and 31st.

High School registration will be held Friday August 28. Seniors will register from 9:00 to 10:30 a.m. Juniors will register from 10:30 to 12:00 noon. From 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. will be registration time for Sophomores and Freshman will register from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m.

Students will report for classes on September 1 and the first holiday will be Labor Day, September 7.

The end of the first six weeks will be October 9. The 2nd six weeks will close on November 20. Thanksgiving holidays will be observed November 26 and 27. Christmas holidays will start December 21 and the students will return to classes on January 4.

The first semester and 3rd six weeks period ends January 15, 1988. February 26 is the day for the 4th six weeks to end.

Spring break is planned for March 21 through 25. The 5th six weeks will end April 15. The end of the 6th six weeks period and the end of the second semester will fall on May 27.

Santa Anna High School graduation will be held May 27.

A teacher workday is planned for May 28.

Old Fiddlers Contest August 22

A citywide promotion that has involved the Lions Club, the Chamber of Commerce and City Officials will be bringing an "Old Fiddlers Contest" to town on August 22, in what is hoped will be an annual affair. Bring your lawn chairs and be there to hear some great fiddling and guitar picking. The event is free of charge to the public. Sponsors emphasize that this will be family type entertainment.

The members only competition will begin at 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning, August 22 at a site located on North 2nd street between the Bank and the highrise apartments. The street will be blocked off for the event. Entries will be limited to members of The Old Fiddlers Association.

There will be four divisions of fiddlers. Prizes will be awarded to the best in the four and trophies will be awarded for the overall best fiddler and overall best guitar picker.

New Events Slated For Fiesta de la Paloma

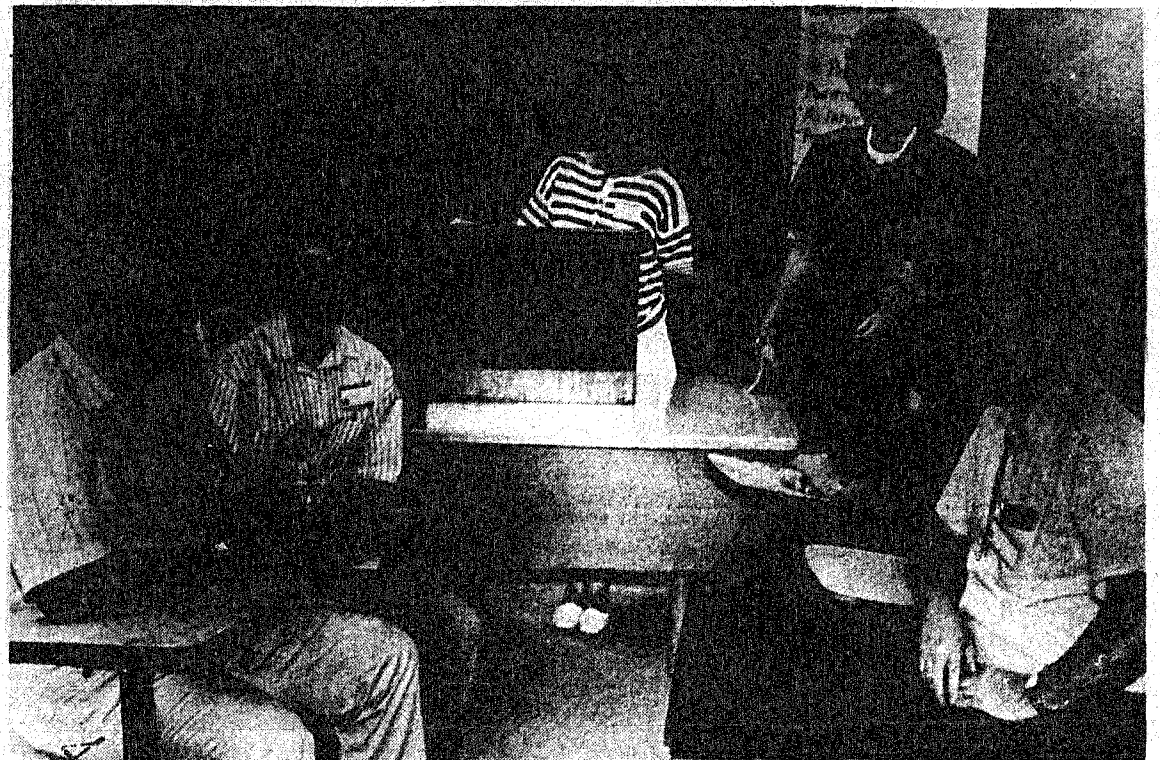

Council Discusses Varied Items

The City Council met on Thursday, August 6 at the Mountain City Community Center at 7:00 p.m. All members of the council were present along with 18 to 20 citizens. Mayor Thelma Brooker presided.

Dr. J.P. Jones of Coleman and Fred Teagarden met with the city to discuss changes they felt were needed at the city sewer farm, especially the problem with the latest pond that was constructed in an emergency.

Dr. Jones stated the pond was in-sightly and that the slopes were not constructed correctly. He also expressed a desire to have a reservoir built to store considerable water for irrigation purposes. Mr. Teagarden stated that we do not need to store lots of water and should have only one pond to irrigate out of. The pond should hold about 30 days supply of water, when needed. The state requires 60 acres of land to irrigate on. Whatever is done, a plane needs to be drawn up and sent to the state for approval and permit.

Councilwoman Sate Voss asked Jones how many acres there were to irrigate on and if they wanted the city to buy the pipe, dig the holes, etc. He

replied that there were approximately 40 to 45 acres for the irrigation. Jones said the city would need to put in a four inch line and sprinklers every 40 ft. The cost would be approximately 20 cents a foot. However, Jones said he thought that figure might be in error and he might be able to help with the cost. He feels it would be the city's place to take care of the dams or levy around the pond. He also suggested 6 inch pipe to be put in between the remaining tanks that do not have pipes in between.

Mr. Teagarden asked to meet with the water superintendent to draw up plans that could be discussed with Dr. Jones and then work out a plan of cost estimates, engineering, construction, etc.

Scott Patterson informed the council that the information he needs to make a presentation on general liability was incomplete and he would try to have it all together for a called meeting to be held sometime this week. Patterson also discussed the need for another fire truck. He explained that one company had brought a new truck that was smaller to the 1978 truck and the cost

would be \$65,000. He told the council that they did not need such a truck with all the extras and suggested they have a truck made up to meet their needs.

Patterson also informed the Council about the Old Fiddlers Contest to be held August 22 and that they would like to block off 2nd Street. Approval for blocking the street will be considered at the called meeting.

Jerry Harris presented 5 quotes from 3 companies for the group insurance, and gave the council an overview of the quotes. At the request of Councilman Spillman, the item was tabled to be discussed during the executive session.

A discussion was held on the Coleman County Phase 6 Easement in which the Coleman County Water District has requested an easement on the easement which the city holds. This was also tabled.

In a discussion of warning sirens, it was stated that Tom Darley still has one siren available for the cost of \$1000 with controls. It was suggested that Rusty Walls check with Texas Surplus Supply and this item was also tabled till more information is available.

Mrs. E.E. McClintock asked the council if there was any way to control the obstruction of visibility at the intersection of Brady Highway and Highway 67. Police Officer Brixey observed that the parking of the vehicles on the property next to Mrs. McClintock was legal. The council asked Brixey to see what he could do to alleviate the problem.

Eddie Paul Voss with the Council concerning the county ambulance subsidy. Mr. Voss feels that we have need for subsidized ambulance service in Santa Anna and asked that the Council send a representative to the Commissioners Court meeting on the 10th of August, to talk to them about the problem. Mayor Brooker was asked to go along with other concerned citizens to inform the court of their feelings.

The Council then adjourned to executive session and upon returning to regular session, Councilman Hartman made a motion that the girls in the city hall offices will read notices. The motion carried after a second by Councilman Henry.

Accounts and bills were reviewed and approved for payment before the council adjourned.

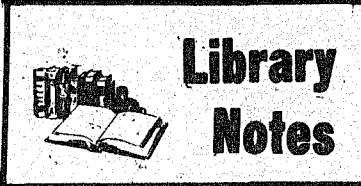
John Walker Taylor

Sales Tax Figures Up

Friday August 7, State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$99.7 million in local sales tax payments to 1034 cities that levy the one percent city tax.

Bullock said the monthly allocations were down 7.4 percent in August compared to August 1986 allocations.

The August checks represent taxes collected on sales in June and during the second quarter and reported to the Comptroller by July 20.

The payment to the City of Santa Anna was \$3,058.87 an increase over the payment received at this time last year which was \$2,935.89 and an increase over the previous payment for the current year which amounted to \$962.80.

However the total amount received to date for the current year shows a decrease from last year. At this time in 1986 the city had received a total of \$18,657.21 as compared to the \$12,961.46 total to date for this year's sales tax receipts.

50,000 Miles And Only Halfway Through

Texas Traveler Noted Regional Difference During Year-Long Trip

"West Texas is dry when it comes to rainfall but wet when it comes to liquor. East Texas is wet with rain but dry of alcohol. And while West Texans eat their barbecue dry, East Texans smother it in sauce."

Such are the observations of TEXAS MONTHLY senior editor Dick J. Reavis concerning some of the differences between east and west in Texas. Reavis has driven more than 50,000 miles of state highways that have taken him from Brownsville to El Paso to Texarkana. His wanderings are all a part of the National Tour of Texas, a journey that began at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas on New Year's Day 1987 and will eventually cover every inch of highway in the state before returning to the Cotton Bowl on January 1, 1988.

Reavis is driving a Chevrolet Suburban, which was dubbed the

National Car of Texas by TEXAS MONTHLY last year, and he is writing monthly columns for the magazine describing the people and places he sees along the way. Now halfway through his trek, Reavis stopped for a while in a northeast Texas La Quinta Inn to share his firsthand observations of Texans on either side of the state.

"The economy is a topic of discussion everywhere," says Reavis, "but for varying reasons. In the west it's the decline of the oil industry and the devaluation of the Mexican peso. But in the forests of East Texas, where the lumber business is so important, the decline in the home-building industry is what's hurt the region."

The most amusing differences Reavis has recorded have to do with the people. Having talked with hundreds of Texans over the last six months, this TEXAS MONTHLY

writer has developed some well-researched opinions about the people of the Lone Star State.

"Concerning religion, West Texans are either Baptist or Catholic. But East Texans are either Baptist or Baptist or Baptist. Overall, West Texans are more matter-of-fact and very blunt. They don't waste words. But East Texans will talk your ear off on just about any subject. They're more conscious of social mores too."

Reavis sees these differences as quite natural considering the disparities in population between East and West Texas. You can drive a hundred miles through West Texas and count the number of human beings you see on one hand. But you can't go a hundred yards in most East Texas towns without seeing at least as many people, and even the region's rural areas are heavily settled.

We should all exercise great care during this dry season to avoid the disaster of fire.

New Stain-Resistant Carpet Has Advantages And Limits

The days of crying over spilled juice on the carpet are over. Major carpeting manufacturers have introduced their latest innovation-stain resistant carpeting.

"Stain resistant carpeting is a great break for the homeowner," says Dr. Peggy Owens, a housing specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "It frees homeowners from the worry of most permanent stains, may reduce cleaning costs and allows them to decorate with light colored carpeting anywhere in the house."

According to Owens, the stain resistance is added during processing, when the chemical resistant agents are locked into the filaments of the carpet fibers.

"You should be able to clean up nearly every household spill or pet accident on this carpeting without a problem," she says. "Stains from foods, dirt or beverages-including red wine and fruit flavored drinks-should come out."

However, stain resistant carpeting also has some limitations, cautions the specialist. "Acidic products such as bleach, iodine,

mustard, and acne medicine can destroy the stain resistant agents and leave spots on the carpeting," she says. "Extremely hot foods or beverages may also stain the carpeting, and high traffic areas will show dirt over time."

The billion-dollar carpeting industry has mounted an extensive advertising campaign to inform consumers about stain resistant carpeting.

Owens adds, "Stain resistant carpeting costs about 10 percent

more than other types of carpeting, but the investment may be worth the convenience of easy clean carpeting."

Making Funeral Arrangements

The task of arranging a funeral for a loved one is not a typical consumer transaction, but it is an area in which consumers need protection. A grieving widow or child is often pushed into buying services the deceased would not have wanted and the survivors can ill afford. For this reason, both the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and the Texas legislature have enacted laws to protect consumers buying funeral services.

CHARGES MUST BE ITEMIZED

In many instances, funeral homes have sold "package deals" to consumers without explaining the cost of each item. Under FTC regulations funeral providers must disclose the specific price for each of these services: embalming, transportation of remains, use of facilities, caskets, outer burial containers, immediate burials and direct cremations. State law requires many of the same disclosures. Funeral directors must present consumers inquiring about funeral costs with an itemized retail price list for most services.

DISCLOSURES REQUIRED BY LAW

In some cases, funeral homes have failed to disclose to consumers that embalming is not generally required by state law. My consumer protection attorneys have sued funeral homes failing to make this disclosure, and failing to inform consumers about lower-priced caskets.

Federal law requires disclosure of retail prices of all outer burial containers offered. In addition, funeral directors must make the following disclosure concerning cremations: "If you want to arrange a direct cremation, you can use an unfinished wood box or an alternative container. Alternative containers can be made of

materials like heavy cardboard or composition materials (with or without an outside covering) or pouches of canvas."

SEALER CASKETS A CONCERN

Sealer caskets, which are designed, when used properly, to prevent rapid deterioration of the body, present another area of concern. Texas consumers have complained that they were sold sealer caskets but not informed that the particular cemetery or mausoleum would not provide an opportunity for sealing. It is a deceptive trade practice for the funeral provider to fail to disclose that the sealer will not be used, if he knows that fact, before the sale.

DON'T GO ALONE

One of my employees who has investigated the funeral home industry has this advice for those faced with arranging a funeral: "Don't go alone. Take along a friend who is not so emotionally involved with your deceased loved one. He or she will be able to help you make decisions. If you know that a loved one is terminally ill, ask him what type of funeral he would like to have. Chances are, he won't want you to spend a lot of money on the funeral."

Selling Your Own Home

If you're planning to sell your own home during peak home sales times this fall, now is the time to start getting it in good condition. Your investment in repair and small improvements now, could pay off later in profit.

"Selling your home involves a lot of marketing strategies, just like selling any other product," says Dr. Susan Quiring, a housing specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

"The more appealing you make your home appear, the better impression it will have on prospective buyers."

"First impressions are important," the specialist says. "People may decide not to buy your house before they even look inside if the outside isn't attractive. Concentrate on improving the front of your house

by mowing and trimming the grass, trimming trees and shrubbery, planting flowers, and repainting if necessary to make your house look more inviting."

"Inside the house, try to make it look clean, and uncluttered. You may want to put away some knick-knacks and small appliances to emphasize counter space. Clean and organize closets and cupboards to make the most of your storage areas. Polish the furniture and the woodwork, wash the windows, and maybe invest in a new shower curtain if it's needed."

"It's important to make any necessary repairs and complete those unfinished remodeling jobs before showing your house. Prospective buyers may lose confidence in your and your home if they encounter any strange noises such as leaky faucets or whining toilets," says Quiring. The specialist maintains that ade-

Antlerless Deer Permit Changes Announced

None Needed In Coleman County

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announces significant changes in the procedures for landowners to obtain antlerless deer permits for the 1987-88 deer season in the Possum Kingdom Regulatory District. In an effort to reduce expenses associated with the issuance of antlerless deer permits, an automated system will be implemented this year.

About the second week of August, landowners and land operators who were issued antlerless deer permits last year will receive a self-addressed renewal notice which must be signed, stamped, and returned by September 1, 1987, if they wish to receive antlerless deer permits for the 1987 deer season. Any correction of information listed on the application card should be made at this time. Following annual deer surveys, recommended issuance rates for antlerless deer will be formulated by compartments and antlerless deer permits will be issued by mail in early October.

Counties in the Possum Kingdom Regulatory District that will be involved in automated issuance of antlerless deer permits includes Wise, Jack, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Parker, Callahan, Eastland, Erath, Hood, Somervell, Comanche, McLennan, Glasscock, and Reagan. Landowners that qualify for

antlerless deer permits but did not receive them last year will be able to make application for antlerless deer permits. Procedures for making application for antlerless deer permits will be announced at a later time.

No antlerless deer permits will be issued or required for the 1987-88 fall gun season in Bosque, Hamilton, Mills, Brown, Coleman, Concho, Runnels, Tom Green, Irion, Coke, Sterling or south of IH 20 in Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, and Taylor Counties. Antlerless deer taken during the hunting season need only to be tagged with the appropriate tag from the hunting license in these counties. Please refer to the 1987-88 Hunting Guide for information concerning seasons, bag limits and means and methods for taking wildlife in various counties.

The general season for deer and turkey will open November 14 and continue to January 3. Archery season for deer and turkey opens October 3 and continues to November 1.

Quail Season, statewide, opens November 7 and continues to February 28. On squirrel there is no closed season and no bag limit.

In general, it appears that hunting prospects in Coleman County will be excellent for the upcoming season. This county has for years has an abundance of deer and turkey, and the quail seem to be making a comeback.

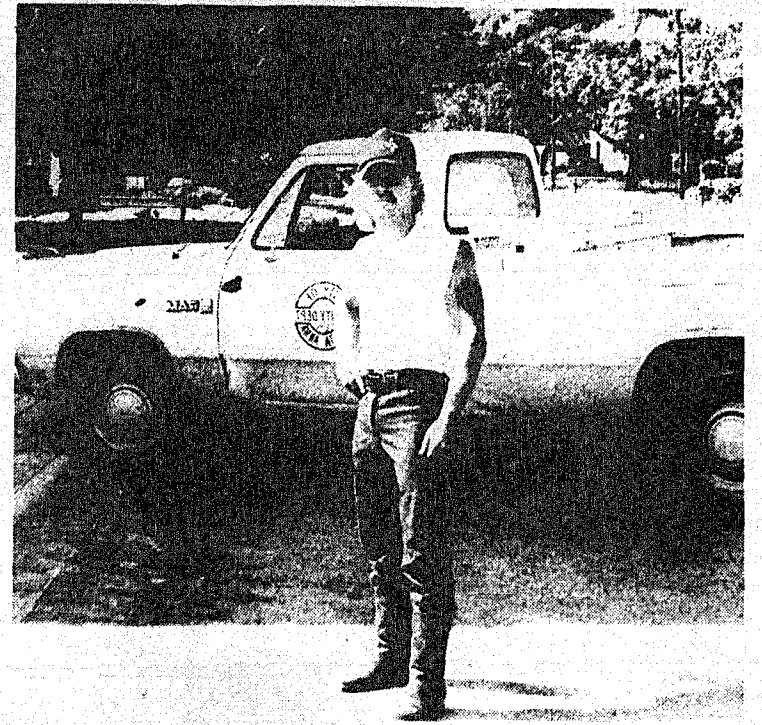

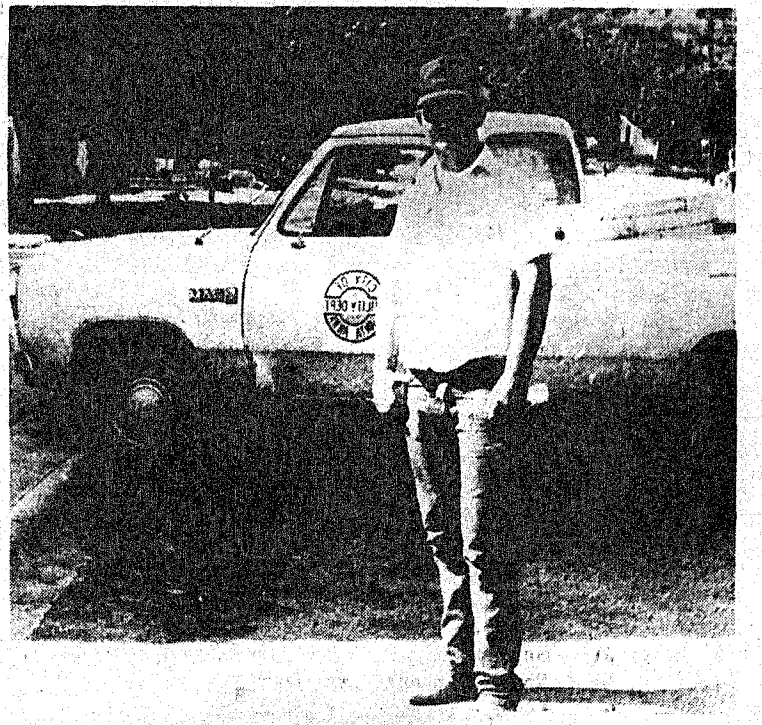

Make Mexican Food "Light"

If you love Mexican food—but not the extra calories—try making "light" Mexican dishes at home, suggests a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service Nutritionist.

"Mexican foods served in restaurants and the prepared foods sold in grocery stores often contain a generous amount of fat," says Dr. Alice Hunt. "But by using lower-fat ingredients and alternate cooking methods you can make similar dishes with fewer calories."

She gives the following suggestions for adapting Mexican food recipes:

+For tamales or chile, use lean cuts of meat, or trim off all fat before cooking. Also remove the skin from chicken and trim fat before cooking for chicken tacos and chilaquiles or chicken with squash.

+When using ground beef, cook it the day before, refrigerate and then drain off the fat before reheating. Make your own chiles with ground beef and spices, since the store-bought variety contains a great deal of fat.

"The meat, beans and cheese in many Mexican foods are a good source of protein," Hunt says. "However, the meal may lack nutrients from fruits and vegetables."

Unemployment benefits would probably provide you with less than half of your current salary.

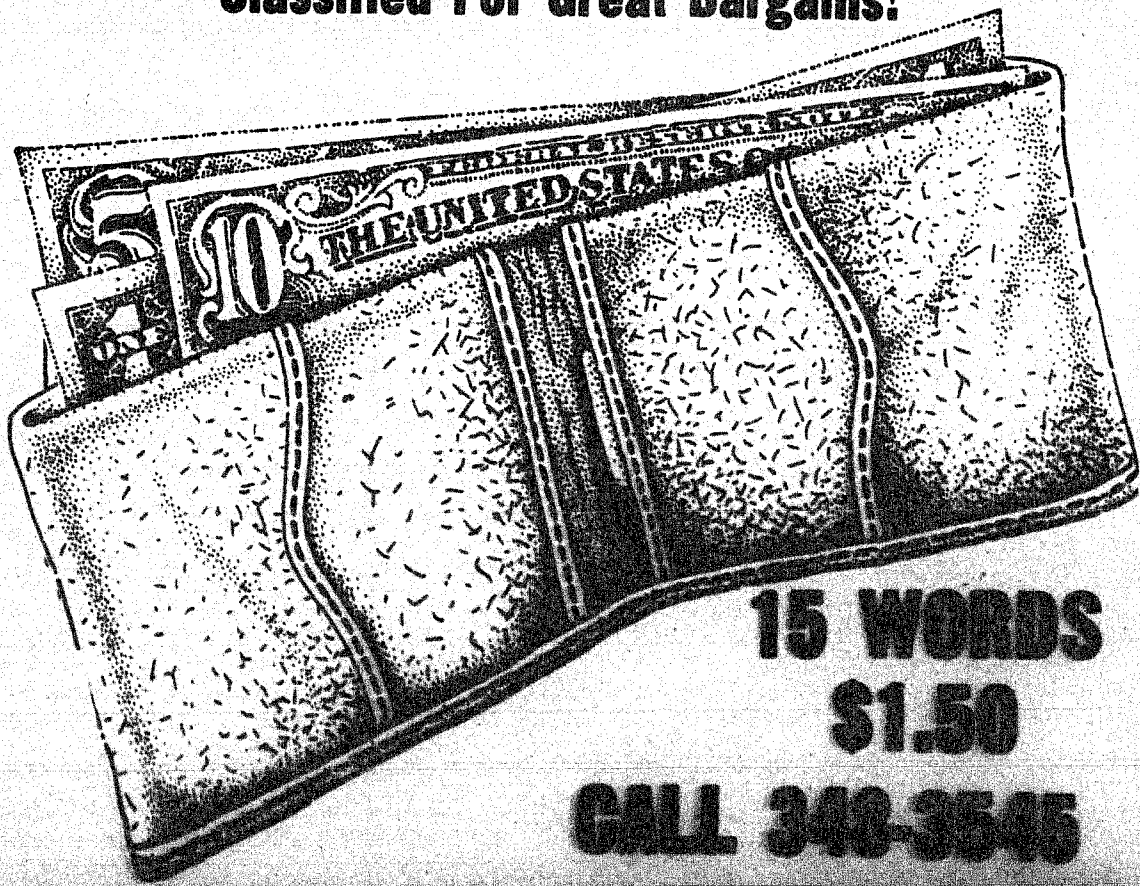

Caring For Dementia Victim - A Safer Home Environment

Taking a bath, cooking a meal and walking around the block—these are just some of the things taken for granted in every day life. But for the victims of dementia, even ordinary activities can cause increased agitation and eventually become dangerous.

According to the National Institutes of Mental Health, dementia is a brain disorder which affects about one out of seven older families. Fifty percent of the cases are probably Alzheimer's Disease. This incurable disorder results in a progressive memory loss which eventually leaves the victim unable to function normally.

"Managing a loved one with progressive dementia isn't easy. It involves understanding the disease, patience and skill," says Dr. Judith Warren, a gerontologist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

She explains that impaired people must be monitored constantly, because of the problems their memory loss invites, so it's important for family members to inventory possible sources of danger in the home. These dangers include high windows, stairs, power tools, appliances, knives, hot water, poisons, firearms, matches, medications, small objects, loose rugs, and improper lighting.

To make the dementia victim's environment safer, the specialist advises taking the following steps:

- +Secure high windows and install gates at stair entrances.
- +If the victim is still functioning enough to use appliances such as a hair dryer or electric razor, supervise the activity.
- +To prevent burns, ask the utility company to alter the stove so the dementia victim cannot easily turn it on. Lower the setting on the water heater to 120 degrees or lower, and check the temperature and depth of bath water.
- +Lock medications, power tools, knives, poisons, liquors, firearms and matches out of the victim's reach.
