## Library Program Not Hindered By Rain

Another drizzly morning for a library program this past Thursday, June 18, but this week there were 50 children, fifteen more than the previous meeting. A little rain won't stop those readers!

Mr. William Hightower, local Ag teacher, along with Paul Anderson and one of his lambs were the feature attraction this week. These two men set up their shearing table in the Fire Station and showed the groups how sheep are sheared. The shears were loud, but the children were fascinated by the change brought about in the sheep, from full of wool to skinny in a matter of minutes! The little ones were reassured by Mrs. Betty Key that it did not hurt the sheep and was similar to getting a hair cut.

The children were shown wool blankets belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Jim Spillman that were made at the Brownwood Woolen Mills to get a "feel" of wool and see a finished product. Cards belonging to the Gustavus' were used to card some

shorn wool. The children enjoyed taking their turn with the cards and rubbing the wool between their fingers to feel the lanolin.

Again, the children met at the Telephone Co-op building and were taken in their groups of "ducks", "dingos" and "Garfields" to see the sheep sheared, have stories read and check out books.

All children are encouraged to mark their calendars for the July 9th program. Quail Dobbs, nationally known clown who has worked the Coleman Rodeo for several years, will be special guest speaker that day. This is an extraordinary opportunity to meet a REAL clown close up and find out what it is like to be in an arena with those BIG, WILD bulls and horses.

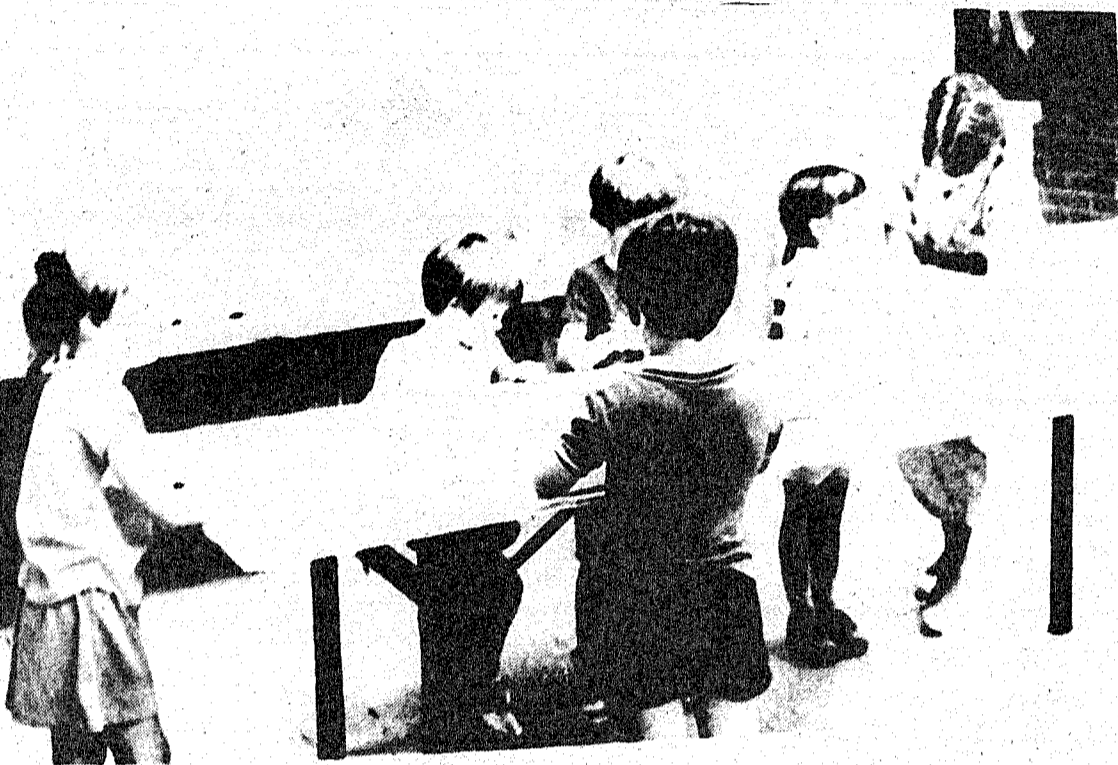

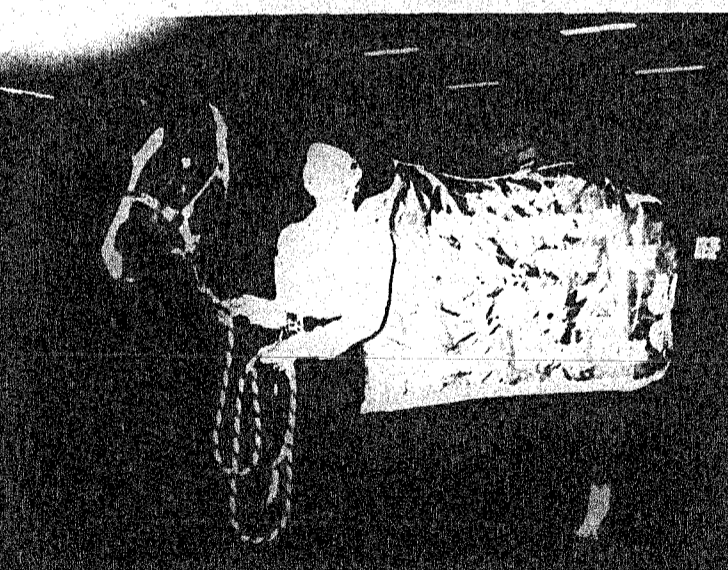

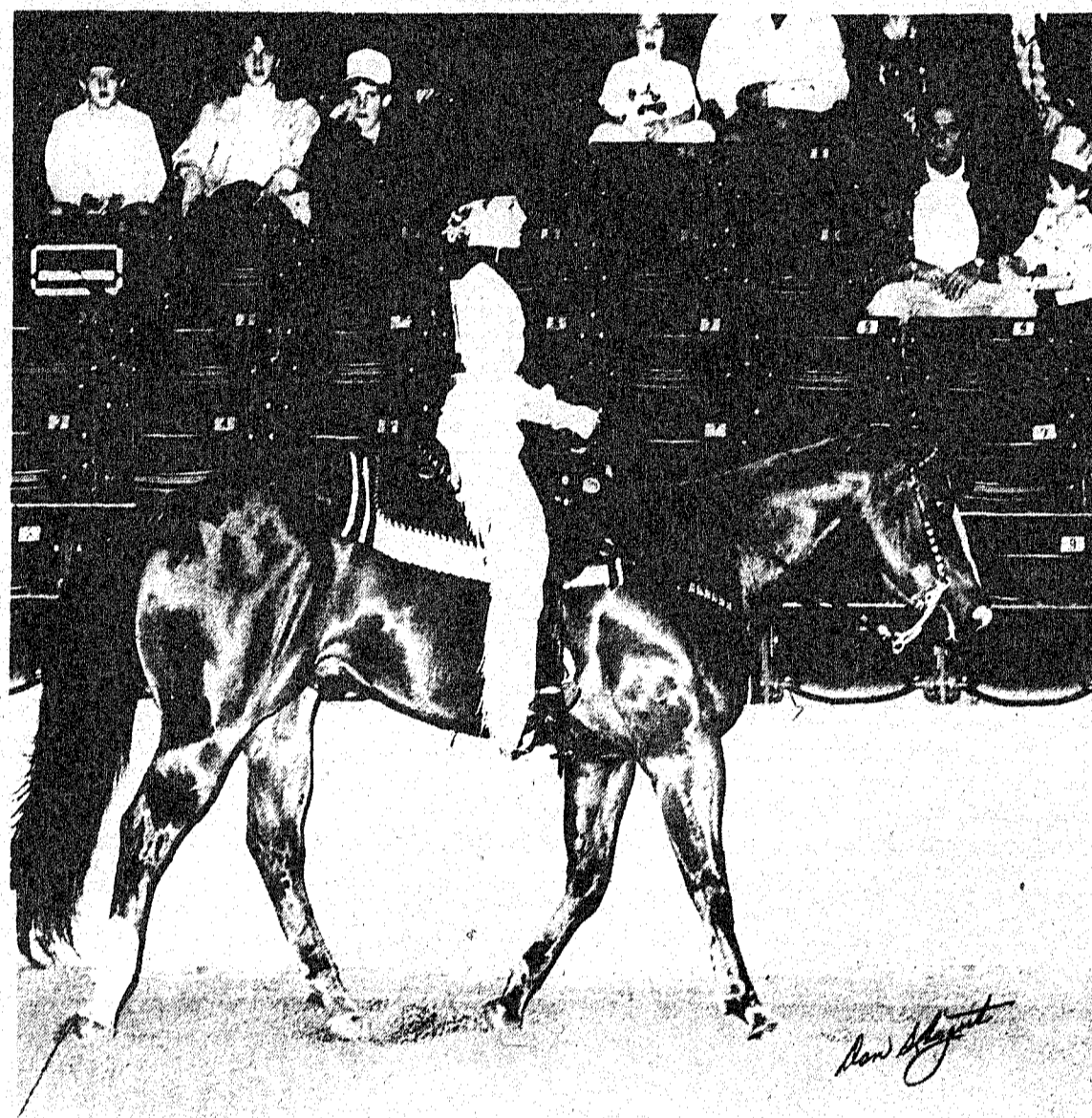
### Savings Bonds Sales Up 23 Percent

Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds for the first half of fiscal year 1987 in Texas amounted to \$232,781,413, an increase of \$44 million or 23.3 percent over the same period of 1986, T. J. Morrow, District Director for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, announced recently. These sales represent 60 percent of the state's 1987 assigned dollar goal of \$388 million.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$3,237 during March 1987 in Coleman County, Larry D. Willard Volunteer County Chairman, said. The October 1986-March 1987 total for the County was \$147,535, which represents 173.6 percent of the county's 1987 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, March 1987 sales of Series EE Bonds totaled \$703 million, an increase of 17 percent over last year and the highest sales for any March since 1978. Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds for the first six months of fiscal year 1987 increased 129 percent and redemptions decreased nine percent compared to the same period for 1986. Savings Bonds held by the American public has reached an all-time high of \$94.7 billion. The increase in amount outstanding during March 1987 alone was \$883 million, the highest for any March since 1943.

Much of the sales growth can be attributed to the new market-based rate which was effective November 1, 1982. The current rate in effect

She will compete her registered American Quarter Horse, Be Red Chick, a 1976 Sorrel Gelding in the Trail, Showmanship and Horsemanship classes at the show. As an invitational show, participants have qualified in one of two ways. First, the top ten youth competitors in terms of points earned in an event between May 1, 1986 and April 30,

1987 were invited to compete; and second, each affiliated state junior Quarter Horse Association may send two contestants per event. As only the top exhibitors participate, competition promises to be tough and exciting.

Approximately 40 teams are expected to participate in Friday's judging contest which is open to 4-H, FFA and AJQHA judging teams. Additionally, a variety of social activities are scheduled for the eight days, including a clinic, barbecue and dance, and an evening at a water recreation park.

### All Terrain Vehicles (ATVs) Dangerous

All Terrain Vehicles (ATVs) are dangerous according to two separate studies conducted in California and Minnesota. The estimated injury rate is 10 injuries per 1,000 ATV rider days. In comparison, downhill skiing reportedly produces 6 injuries per 1,000 skier days. The Consumer Product Safety Commission is considering a staff recommendation that ATVs designed for children under the age of 12 be banned. Since 1982, at least 415 peo-

ple are known to have died, with 174 dying in 1985. In addition to these tragedies, it was estimated that 85,900 ATV-related injuries were treated in hospital emergency rooms. Many involved severe injuries including a disproportionately large number of spinal cord injuries resulting in victims becoming paraplegics and quadriplegics. "...46 percent of the victims were under the age 16; and 22 percent were under the 12 years of age."

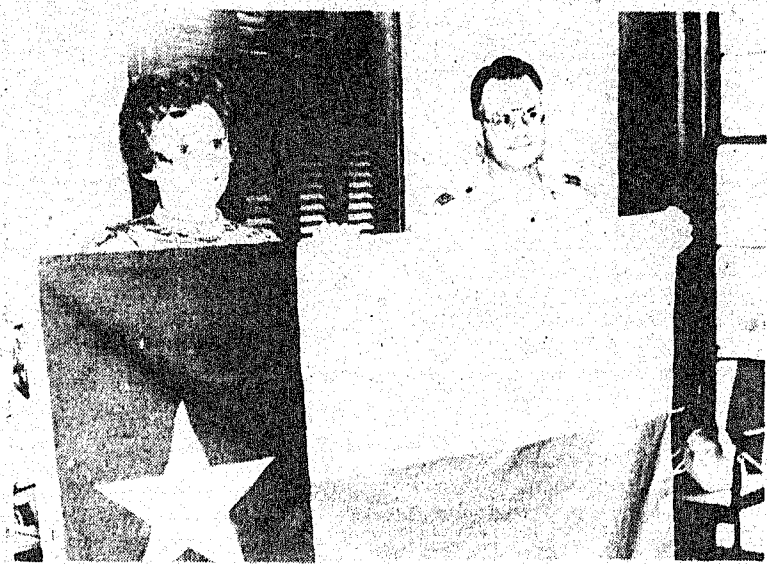

## TEXAS BUSINESS TODAY

Dear Commissioner: Last week I fired my receptionist. She had been working for me for almost a year, but I never was pleased with the way she handled the job.

Her typing was awful. She often forgot to write down the appointments she scheduled and as a result I was overbooked much of the time. She stayed on the phone a lot talking to friends and I finally just told her I did not need her any more.

Today she filed for unemployment benefits. What can I expect?

Dear Doctor: The Bad News is that it sounds like you have done everything wrong! You can probably expect the worst.

If you were never pleased with the employee's work, it will be hard to explain why you kept her on your payroll so long and then terminated her at your convenience.

Was she aware that you were displeased? Did you counsel her about the problems you mention? Is there any documentation in her personnel file to support your complaints and/or attempts to correct the situation? Was she ever told that her job was in jeopardy?

You will be asked all of these questions and more because TEC must now rule on whether the termination was justified or not.

Keep in mind that this particular law was not written for employers. It was written to protect unemployed workers and the burden of proving misconduct falls squarely on an employer.

P.S. Inability is NOT misconduct.

## 21 Drinking Age

Laws raising the minimum alcohol purchase age to 21 have had "a direct effect on reducing alcohol-related traffic accidents among youths affected by the laws, on average, across the states," said the General Accounting Office (GAO). The Insurance Institute of Highway Safety filed a "friend of the court" brief with the U.S. Supreme Court in support of the national 21 drinking age law. The Institute's brief showed a 13 to 16 percent decrease in fatal alcohol-related crashes among 18-20 year-olds in states with a 21 purchase age.

## Lives Saved With Belts

The first full year of mandatory safety belt use has shown a 7 percent reduction in front-seat fatalities and a 12 percent reduction in visible front-seat injuries, according to a final report from the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Although the number of miles driven on Texas roads increased by 6 percent, and the increase in vehicles on the roads increased the risk of accidents, the reduction can be attributed to four major factors:

- +The Safety Belt Law;
- +Enforcement of the Law;
- +Increased DWI Enforcement and Arrests;
- +And, a greater public awareness of the dangers of drinking and driving.

## The Bad News Is...

Dear Mr. Daniels: You certainly have the right to fire an employee who is drunk on the job. Be sure you know from PERSONAL OBSERVATION that the employee is drunk, or failing that, that you have some witness to the employee's actions. Most people are familiar with the behavioral effects of alcohol intoxication — alcohol smell, slurred speech, unsteady walk, etc. — and could testify to their observation of these effects.

Being drunk on the job is misconduct connected with the work, BUT THE EMPLOYER MUST BE PREPARED TO PROVE SUCH ALLEGATIONS.

Dear Commissioner Nabers: Under the new immigration law, do I have to check the status on everyone who works for me or just those people I hire in the future?

Dear Ms. Lien: You must verify status on any employee you have hired SINCE NOVEMBER 6, 1986. You DO NOT have to verify status on anyone hired PRIOR to that date.

You must complete an I-9 form on all employees hired since November 6, 1986 as well as EACH AND EVERY employee you hire from now on.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) is mailing informational manuals as well as I-9 forms to all employer. You are free to photocopy these forms for your use. There is also a toll free number you can call to get information: 1-800-777-7000.

## VA News

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.)

Q—Do the VA eligibility assessment procedures apply to veterans age 65 and older?

A—VA's eligibility assessment procedures apply to all nonservice-connected veterans regardless of age. Public Law 99-272 repealed a provision in The Veterans Omnibus Health Care Act of 1970 that allowed veterans 65 years of age or older to receive care in VA facilities regardless of income.

Q—Is there a penalty if a VA guaranteed home loan is partially or fully paid before it becomes due?

A—There is no penalty if a VA loan is partially or fully paid in advance.

Q—Do veterans with service-connected disabilities have to pay a funding fee for VA guaranteed home loans?

A—No.

Q—I am a Vietnam veteran, and I am concerned about the possibility that I may have been exposed to Agent Orange. What does the VA offer in the way of examinations and health care?

A—Since 1978, the VA has operated the Agent Orange Registry Program for Vietnam veterans who are concerned about possible health effects of Agent Orange. Veterans who participate in this program receive a comprehensive physical examination and complete a questionnaire about their service in Vietnam. The veteran is advised of the results which are entered into the Agent Orange Registry. The examination can help to detect any illness or injury the veteran may have, regardless of origin, and may provide a basis for follow-up. Vietnam veterans are encouraged to request an Agent Orange examination at their nearest VA health-care facility.

**Wet Weather Aggravates Insect Problems**

AUSTIN - Recent heavy rains and violent weather which caused deaths, injuries, flooding and property damage have left almost no part of Texas unscathed. But even after the sun returns, the state may have in store more misery of another sort.

According to entomologists at the Texas Department of Health, a dramatic increase in the state's mosquito population is imminent.

As early as April, TDH predicted the insect problem. The unusually mild winter had allowed the pests to continue breeding through the cool part of the year, and now, the already strong concentrations of mosquitoes have additional breeding places created by standing water throughout the countryside.

"Ordinarily, we warn everyone to keep window screens in good repair, to empty standing water out of any receptacles in their yards, and to report any extremely infested areas to their local health departments," said Bobby Davis, director of the TDH General Sanitation Division. "And of course we recommend the same things this year. But even with everyone's best efforts this year, it looks as if mosquito swarms may be inevitable."

Davis said he answers about 20 calls each day from local health officials, the Red Cross, and the news media about whether TDH recommends spraying large areas to control the pests. "I have to explain that spraying, at least for now, would be ineffective, since the continuing rains would wash away any pesticide we would authorize using."

## ON THE LIGHT SIDE

This whole meal salad starts with tangy, marinated pasta shells stuffed with a rich tasting, but low calorie cottage cheese and almond mixture. It's high in flavor but low in calories—only 561 calories for 6 large stuffed shells, bursting with flavor.

So, when you are in the mood for pasta, indulge yourself, but keep it light with this crunchy almond and cheese-filled pasta shell salad.

**Stuffed Pasta Shell Salad**  
1/2 cup chopped natural almonds  
1/4 cup olive oil  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
1/4 cup parsley sprigs  
1 clove garlic  
2 tablespoons dried basil  
2 dozen jumbo pasta shells, cooked  
1 cup low fat ricotta cheese  
1 cup low fat cottage cheese  
1/2 cup sliced green onions  
2 teaspoons grated lemon peel  
Lettuce leaves  
Chopped parsley, for garnish  
Cherry tomatoes, for garnish

Spread almonds on an ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 350°F for 5 to 8 minutes until golden. Remove from sheet

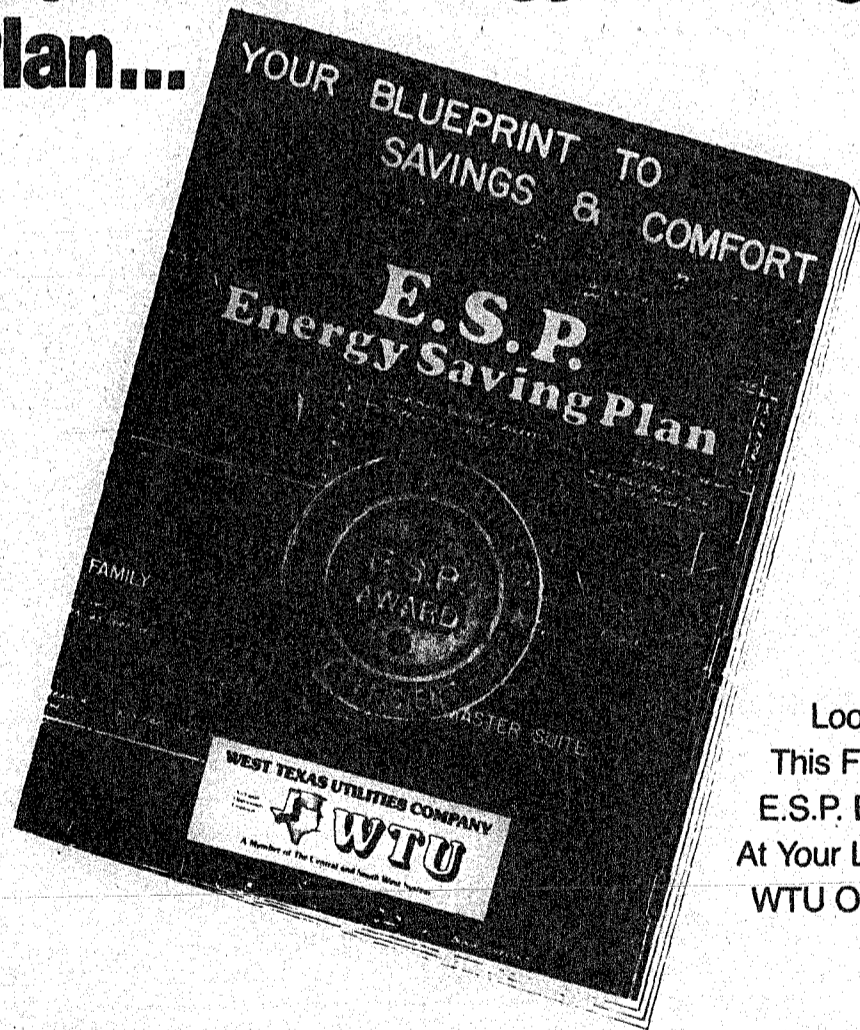


and cool. In blender or food processor blend oil, lemon juice, parsley sprigs, garlic and basil. Pour over hot drained pasta shells, tossing gently to coat; set aside. In mixing bowl or food processor blend cheeses, onions and peel. Stir in 1/3 cup of the almonds. Stuff shells with cheese mixture, allowing about 2 tablespoons filling per shell. Serve on lettuce-lined plate, sprinkled with remaining almonds. Garnish with parsley and cherry tomatoes. Makes 4 servings.

**Mixed Vegetable Mold**  
2 packages unflavored gelatin  
3 1/2 cups "V-8" no salt added vegetable juice  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1/4 teaspoon fennel seed  
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder  
1/2 cup cooked peas  
1/2 cup chopped cooked asparagus  
1/2 cup shredded carrot  
1/2 cup chopped cucumber  
Mayonnaise or plain yogurt

In 2-quart saucepan sprinkle gelatin over 2 cups "V-8" juice to soften. Over low heat, heat until gelatin dissolves, stirring occasionally. Add remaining "V-8" juice, lemon juice, fennel and garlic powder. Refrigerate until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon. In 5-cup mold, for garnish place 2 tablespoons peas in decorative design in bottom of mold. Meanwhile, gently fold remaining peas, asparagus, carrot and cucumber into gelatin mixture. Pour into mold. Cover; refrigerate until set, about 2 hours. Unmold gelatin onto chilled platter. Serve with mayonnaise or plain yogurt. Makes 4 1/2 cups or 9 servings.

## Broiled Scrod

Scrod is young cod. It is most delicious when very fresh, split down the back and broiled quickly with a crusty topping to contrast with the tender flesh.

Four 1/2-pound (225-g) pieces split scrod  
6 tablespoons butter, melted  
Salt

Freshly ground pepper  
1/2 cup (1 dL) fresh bread crumbs  
1/4 cup (1/2 dL) grated Swiss cheese  
Lemon Wedges

Preheat the broiler. Oil the broiler pan, and place the scrod on it. Sprinkle with half the melted butter, salt, and pepper, and place beneath the broiling element. Cook 6 minutes on one side. Turn, cook 4 minutes, and then sprinkle on the bread crumbs mixed with cheese. Top with the remaining butter and broil another minute or two until nicely browned. Garnish with lemon wedges.
