The Santa Anna Ex-Student Association has named Rosalie Niell Strickland the Ex-Student of the year for the 1987 Homecoming. Mrs. Strickland is a 1937 graduate of Santa Anna High School.

She attended Howard Payne College, Southwest Baptist Theological Seminary, and South West Texas University, where she graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree. She did post graduate work at the University of Texas.

She was married to the late, Rev. Cecile D. Strickland.

Mrs. Strickland is the mother of 5 sons; Niell of Houston, who is Senior Chemical Engineer of the Houston District for Chevron, U.S.A.; James, also of Houston, is Supt. Of Gas Buyers for Valero Energy Corp, for the City of Houston; Danny of San Antonio, who is employed by the San Antonio Express and News; Tim of Houston, is a fireman for the City of Houston; and Lynn of Corpus Christi, who is a builder.

She has 5 grandsons and one granddaughter.

Rosalie Niell Strickland taught school for 24 years. 21 of those years were spent with the San Antonio Public School System. City Passes Hotel Occupancy Tax Ordinance

The City Council meeting in regular session last Thursday night passed on first reading, an ordinance which establishes a tax on hotel occupancy for the City Of Santa Anna. The vote was 3-2 on the ordinance. Jim Keeney and Jim Spillman voted against passage of the ordinance. The ordinance may be read in its entirety in the legal notices elsewhere in the News.

A discussion was held on the disposal of a 1978 Chrysler police car. It was decided to place the vehicle up for bids.

A discussion was held on the cost of purchasing filters for the water plant. The discussion will continue at the next meeting when more information is available.

It was brought to the attention of the council that young people on three wheeled bikes were riding on the spillways and dams at the city lakes. The council voted to have the city attorney to make provisions in an existing ordinance to prohibit the riding of off road vehicles on the spillways and dams.

The Council accepted the bid of Central Life Insurance Company for employee insurance.

Pearl Wilson was to have appeared before the council to request a bus stop at the Opera House Restaurant but was unable to attend and the matter was tabled until more information could be obtained.

After an executive session the council voted to have a contract

drawn up by city attorney Donnie Lappe concerning an agreement with Dr. Jones on the lease at the sewer farm.

The council adjourned after taking care of routine matters that included paying bills.

In an earlier called meeting on Sept. 22, the council gave authority to the Mayor to sell any surplus equipment valued at less than \$500.

Another called meeting was held October 5 to vote on getting permits for hauling water to inject in wells or put into tanks and to file for a grant to pay for sewer improvements.

The motion was made by Councilman Stanley Hartman, seconded by Jim Keeney and carried unanimously.

There is to be a public hearing at the Armory Wednesday, Oct. 21 for the purpose of providing the citizens with information about project available, all eligible activities, use of past TDCA funds and to receive public comment.

Another hearing will take place Thursday, October 29 at the Armory for the purpose of providing citizens with information about project selection and grant application development for the selected projects.

Both hearings will take place at 3:00 p.m. on the dates scheduled. Public notices for both meetings may be seen in the public notices published elsewhere in this edition of the News.

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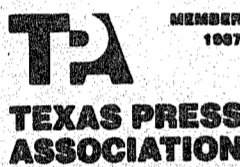

Historically Speaking

Santa Anna

Santa Anna Is More Than Just a Mountain (The logo of the Chamber of Commerce since the early 1940's).

On Austin's map of 1835 it was noted as "High Peak". It is not known when the twin hills were named Santa Anna Peaks. The name was honoring a Comanche Chief, Santana, who was in power in the 1840's and was friendly to the Texans.

In 1846 the Chief visited President James Polk in Washington D.C., during the United States negotiations to annex Texas, and signed a Peace Treaty which he kept until his death in 1849.

Santa Anna Peaks have been used by early explorers, the United States Cavalry, frontier Rangers and the Military.

Climbing to the top of the 2000 feet high peaks, the view is clear as far as the Colorado River, no trees obscuring the view.

As pioneers went West and the Military going Northeastward from San Antonio to Fort Belknap, the traffic went from Fort Mason crossing the San Saba River at Camp San Saba, crossing the Colorado River at the Military Crossing south of Whon. It was natural for the traffic to go through the Gap of the Hills, on to Camp Colorado, on the Jim Ned; causing a settlement to be built up, called the Gap, with several stores to take care of the needs of the travelers.

When they applied for a post office in 1879, the name was changed to Santa Anna. Jacob C. Walton, as first Postmaster, followed by W.C. Brooks.

In 1957 the nearby United States Cavalry at Camp Colorado kept lookouts on the mountains.

When the Santa Fe Railroad was extended from Temple to San Angelo in 1886, it was routed by the

Thoughts From Our Pastors

We all have questions that we would like to ask the preacher. Today I want to just take a moment and share a few of the questions that a lot of people ask.

1. Why would a good, loving God let people go to an eternal Hell? Why would a pure, holy God let sinners into His pure, holy heaven to ruin it as sin ruined the original perfection He created on earth. Really, the amazing thing isn't that some aren't going to heaven, but that so many are. God says in Matthew 25:41 that the "everlasting fire was prepared for the devil and his angels," not for any man unless they insist!

2. Why doesn't God just make all men be saved if He is all powerful? If God could make all men be saved, He certainly would. But though God is all-powerful, He can't call sin righteousness, nor can He make a lie the truth. The Bible tells us in Genesis 1:26 that God made man in His own image. God isn't a puppet, and thus neither is man. For God to "pull the strings" as if we were His little Marionettes would prove that the Bible isn't true: another impossibility! God has done all He could in sending Christ to die on the Cross for me and you. He's done His part, now will you do yours and receive Him as your Lord?

3. What's wrong with marijuana? Genesis 1:29 says God gave man every herb bearing seed, and marijuana is an herb.

Well, that was before Adam and Eve fell; with their sin came a curse on the ground to bring forth thorns and poison plants (Genesis 3:17) In short, there's a snake in the grass: satan! The Bible classifies drugs (consciousness-changers like marijuana) under sorcery (Pharmakeia, Greek for drugs) and in both Isaiah 47 and Revelation 21:8 it is condemned. Drugs are a counterfeit for God's Spirit Who is "the real thing".

4. What's wrong with astrology? It was an ancient Babylonian art, science, and religion. God condemns it in Deuteronomy 18:10 and Romans 1:25 as an abomination, a type of magical enchantment and sorcery. Stars don't control; anything: but the God who made them does and He is worthy of all our worship, love and obedience (Deuteronomy 6:5)

5. What's wrong with evolution, anyway? Evolution is a scientific theory that Charles Darwin thought up. He renounced it on his death bed and called for the Bible. Evolution denies Genesis 1:1 which says, "In the beginning, God created the heaven and the earth." Evolution makes man a descendent of the apes, which I think which I think offends every monkey on this planet. The Bible teaches man fell in sin and didn't evolve up but down.

6. Do you believe in reincarnation? No, the Bible teaches resurrection, not reincarnation. Jesus said in John 5:28, "All in their graves shall come forth for judgement, the saved and the lost." town, placing the depot in the valley nestled on the south of the twin mountains, and the Gap moved to the railroad.

A DR. A. Standlee, grandparents of Mr. Tom Hays came out and bought a large acreage before the roads came through and gave the right-of-way for the railroad. He came later and built the house known as the Hays House on the West side of town.

According to the Handbook of Texas, Duke Jackson, who had built the first cabin in the 1860, in the community called the Gap.

The late U.S. Brannon told me W.C. Thames drove the first stake for a tent in Santa Anna.

The first Rock building in Santa Anna was built by L.V. Stockard, first depot agent, about 1886, as soon as the railroad came through.

Reminiscing with Tom Hays, Sr., he still remembers all of the rock buildings were on the south side of the street and dwellings were few and far between.

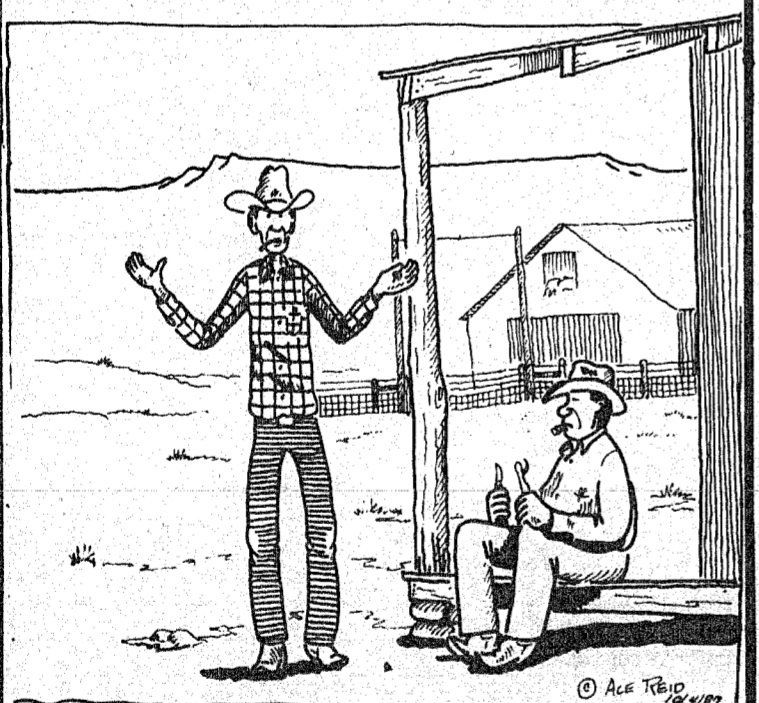

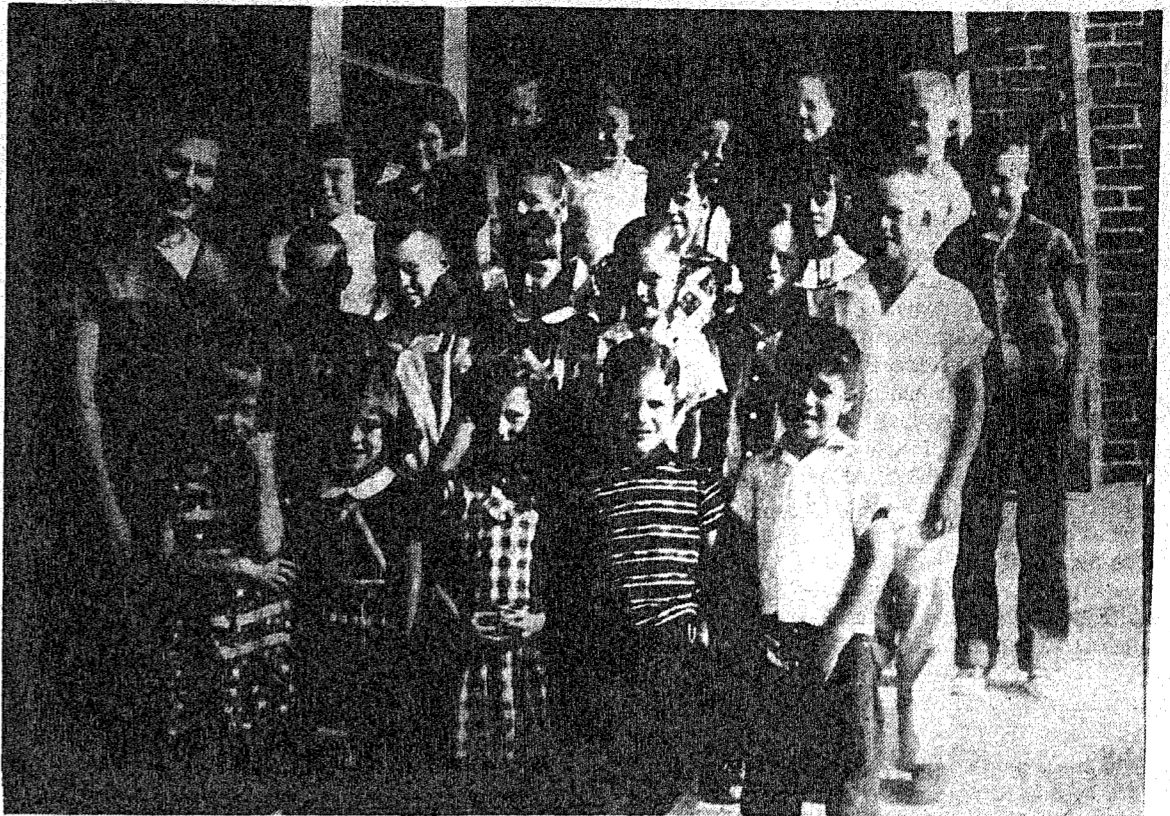

 • **Move with Energy Rhythms.** Get to know your daily highs and lows and learn to accommodate them. Most people experience an "afternoon slump" sometime between 1 and 4 p.m. Do less demanding tasks during your low periods.
 • **Choose the Right Foods.** Proteins are "wake up" foods, while carbohydrates are "relaxers".

High-fat meals are FATiguing. Design meals according to your needs—fish for dinner on a night you're in the spotlight and spaghetti when you want to relax. And, DON'T fad diet, it's exhausting.
 • **Get Plenty of Exercise.** A regular program of aerobic exercise is one, if not the best, energy booster. Pick an activity you enjoy and schedule it into your calendar.
 • **Improve Your Sleep.** Set up a regular schedule. Get up at the same time every morning, even on weekends to prevent Monday morning "jet lag". Beware of sleeping pills. They often make matters worse.
 • **Discuss Problems and Feelings.** Keeping feelings and conflicts buried is exhausting. Studies show that people who confide in others are healthier than people who don't express their feelings.
 • **Don't Try to Do It All.** Learn to say "no" and set limits.

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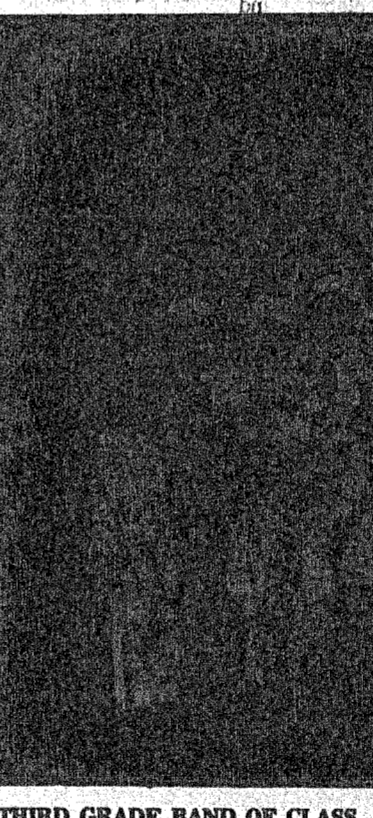

Junior Mountaineers Defeat Gorman

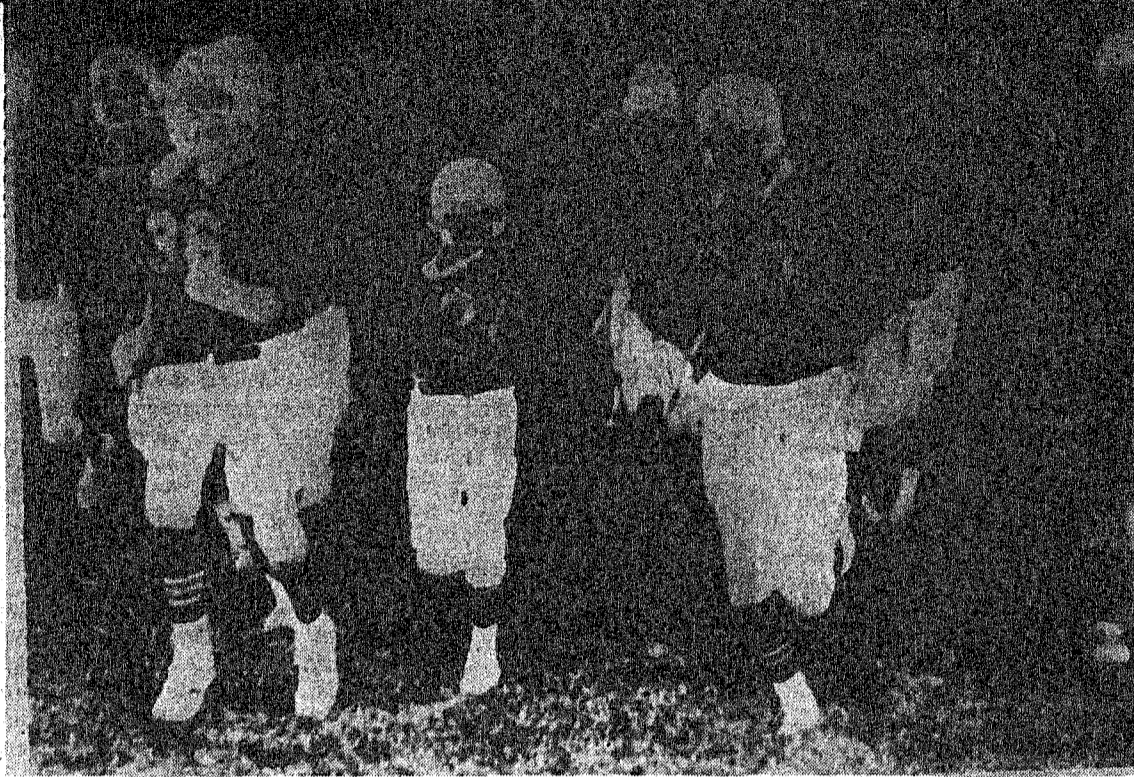

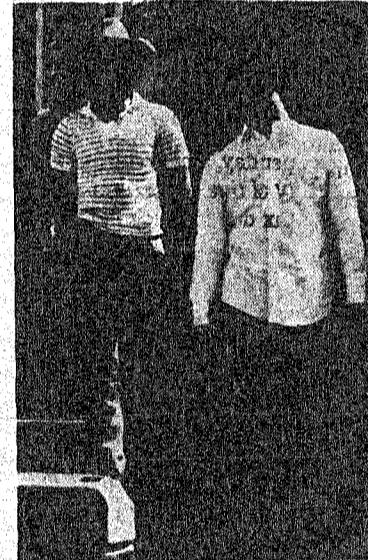

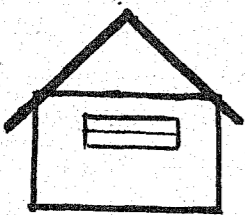

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION OF A HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND PROVIDING A PENALTY IN AN AMOUNT NOT EXCEEDING \$200.00 FOR VIOLATION.

WHEREAS Article 12871-4.1 of Vernons Texas Civil Statutes allows a City to tax hotel occupancy; and WHEREAS THE CITY OF Santa Anna, Texas, in the best interests of its citizens, desires to do so, NOW, THEREFORE, be it ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Santa Anna, Texas:

SECTION 1. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases are for the purposes of this article except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning, defined as follows:

(a) "Hotel" shall mean any building or buildings, trailer, railroad pullman car not being utilized for the transportation of travelers, or other facilities in which the public may, for the consideration, obtain sleeping accommodations. The term shall include hotels, motels, tourist homes, houses or courts, lodging houses, inns, rooming houses, trailer houses, trailer motels, railroad pullman cars parked on a siding or other area and used for sleeping accommodations not involving the transportation of travelers, dormitory space where bed space is rented to individuals or groups, apartments not occupied by "permanent residents", as that term is hereafter defined, and all other facilities where rooms or sleeping facilities or space are furnished for a consideration, but "Hotel" shall not be defined so as to include hospitals, sanitariums or nursing homes.

(b) "Consideration" shall mean the room, sleeping space, bed or dormitory space or the facility in such hotel and shall not include the cost of food served or personal services rendered to the occupant not related to sleeping and residing such as room or space for occupancy, and shall not in-

clude any tax assessed for occupancy thereof by any other governmental agency.

(c) "Occupancy" shall mean the use or possession, or right to the use or possession of any room, space or sleeping facility in a hotel for any purpose.

(d) "Occupant" shall mean anyone, who, for a consideration, uses, possesses, or has a right to use or possess any room, or rooms of sleeping space of facility in a hotel under any lease, concession, permit, right of access, license, contract or agreement.

(e) "Person" shall mean any individual, company, corporation, or association owning, operating, managing or controlling any hotel.

(f) "Tax-Assessor-Collector" shall mean the Tax Assessor-Collector of the City of Santa Anna, Texas.

(g) "Quarterly Period" shall mean regular quarterly period corresponding to that period which tax reports are filed with the State Comptroller.

(h) "Permanent Resident" shall mean any occupant who has or shall have the right to occupy any room or rooms or sleeping space or facility in a hotel for at least thirty (30) consecutive days.

SECTION 2. Levy of Tax; Rate; Exception.

(a) There is hereby levied a tax upon the cost of occupancy of any room or space furnished by any hotel where such cost of occupancy is at the rate of Two Dollars (\$2.00) or more per day, such tax to be equal to seven percent (7 percent) of the consideration paid by the occupancy of the room, space or facility to such hotel, exclusive of other occupancy taxes imposed by other governmental agencies.

(b) No tax shall be imposed hereunder upon a permanent resident.

(c) No tax shall be imposed hereunder upon a corporation or association organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable or educational purposes, no part of the net earnings of which inures to benefit of any private shareholder or individual.

(d) No more than one percent (1 percent) of the consideration paid by an occupant of the sleeping room to the hotel may be used for the purpose specified in subdivision (4) of subsection (a) of Section 7.

SECTION 3. Collection.

Every person owing, operating, managing or controlling any hotel shall collect the tax imposed in Section 2 hereof for the City of Santa Anna.

SECTION 4. Reports.

On the last day of the month following each quarter, every person required in Section 3 hereof to collect the tax imposed herein shall file a report with the Tax Assessor-Collector showing the con-

sideration paid for all room or sleeping space occupancies in the preceding quarter, the amount of tax collected on such occupancies, and any other information as the Tax-Assessor Collector may reasonably require. Such person shall pay the tax due on such occupancies at the time of filing such report.

SECTION 5. Rules and Regulations

The Tax Assessor-Collector shall have the power to make such rules and regulations as are necessary to effectively collect the tax levied herein, and shall upon reasonable notice have access to books and records necessary to enable him to determine the correctness of any report filed as required by this Ordinance and the amount of taxes due under provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 6. Penalties

If any person required by the provisions of this Ordinance to collect the tax imposed herein, or make reports as required herein, and pay to the Tax Assessor-Collector the tax imposed herein, shall fail to collect such tax, file such report or pay such tax, or if any such person shall file a false report, such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor on upon conviction be punished by a fine not to exceed \$200.00, and shall pay to the Tax Assessor-Collector the tax due, together with a penalty of five percent (5 percent) of the tax due for each thirty (30) days that the same is not timely filed.

SECTION 7. Disposition of Revenue

(a) The revenue derived from any occupancy tax authorized by this Ordinance may be used for:

- (1) the acquisition of sites for the construction, improvement, enlarging, equipping, repairing, operation and maintenance of convention center facilities, including, but not limited to, civic center convention buildings, coliseums, and parking areas or facilities for the parking and storage motor vehicles or other conveyances located at or in the immediate vicinity of the convention center facilities;
- (2) the furnishing of facilities, personnel and materials for the registration of convention delegates or registrants;
- (3) for general promotion and tourist advertising of the City and its vicinity and conducting a solicitation and operating program to attract conventions and visitors, whether by the City or through contracts with persons or organizations selected by the City;
- (4) the encouragement, promotion, improvement, and application of the arts, including music (instrumental and vocal) dance, drama, folk art, creative writing, architecture, design and allied fields, painting, sculpture, photography, graphic and craft arts, motion pictures, television, radio, tape and sound

recording, and the arts related to the presentation, performance, execution and exhibition of these major art forms;

(5) historical preservation and restoration.

(b) The city, upon levying and collecting an occupancy tax, which is authorized by this Ordinance, may pledge a portion of the revenue derived therefrom to the payment of the bonds which the City may issue pursuant to the provisions of section 3 of Article 12891-4.1 V.A.C.S., if such bonds are issued solely for one or more of the purposes set forth in the preceding subsection; provided that the City, upon levying and collecting such tax, shall reserve a portion of the tax revenue equal to at least one-half (1/2) of one (1) percent of the cost of occupancy and may reserve all of the tax revenue from the cost of the occupancy of hotel rooms for the purpose of advertising and conducting solicitation programs to acquaint potential users with public meeting and convention facilities and for promotion of tourism and advertising of the City and its vicinity, either by the City or through contract with persons or organizations selected by the City.

(C) The Tax Assessor-Collector or the Mayor may require records of occupancy at any time to establish the amount of consideration on which the tax is levied or to verify the amount, and a failure to furnish such records ten (10) days after written notice shall be a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$200.00 per day, along with a penalty of five (5) percent of the tax due for each thirty (30) days of failure.

SECTION 8. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall be and become effective on or after the publication of necessary notices.

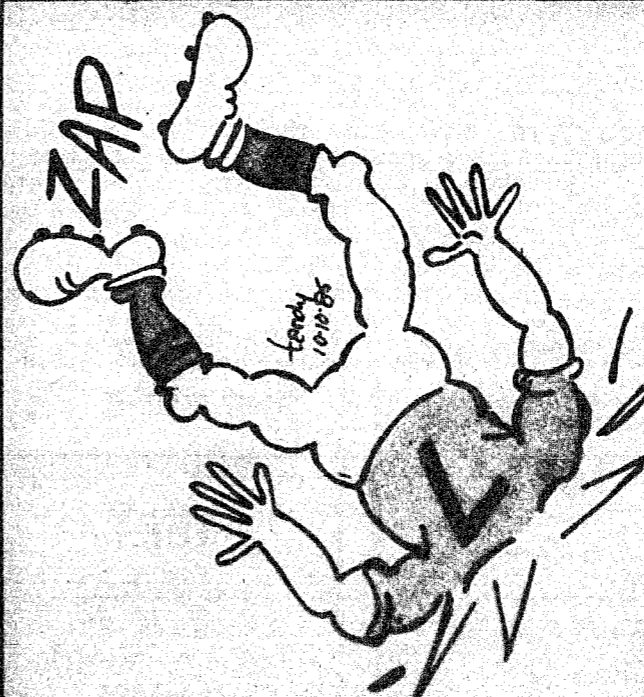
