Health Officer Writes Of Diseased Teeth

Austin, Aug. 27.—A fact that is not generally understood, according to Dr. John W. Rowen, is that diseased teeth may frequently be associated with disease manifestations in other parts of the body.

This diseased teeth or gums may directly develop an infection of the nose, eyes, head sinuses, the stomach, and even the intestinal tract. Again germs from a diseased mouth may be transported by the blood stream to the kidneys or heart, thus causing serious trouble, frequently ending fatally.

The man or woman who respects health as the greatest of all earthly assets will do well to heed the ordinary principles of mouth hygiene; being conscientiously adhered to, they can be relied upon to protect against the conditions that take such a tremendous and unnecessary toll.

To cleanse the teeth thoroughly daily with tooth brush and dental floss, and to seek a periodic dental examination at least semi-annually and oftener if required, is merely practicing a common sense procedure which returns incalculable dividends.

NOTICE OF WATER SYSTEM REVENUE BOND ELECTION

TO THE RESIDENT, QUALIFIED, PROPERTY TAXPAYING VOTERS OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS: TAKE NOTICE, that an election will be held in the City of Santa Anna, Texas, on the 25th day of September, 1934, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the election order adopted by the City Commission on the 30th day of July, 1934, which is as follows:

"RESOLUTION AND ORDER BY THE CITY COMMISSION of the City of SANTA ANNA, Texas, calling an election on the question of the Issuance of Twenty Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars REVENUE BONDS for the purpose of making certain repairs, extensions and improvements to the WATER SYSTEM of said City, and the pledging of the Revenues of the Water System to the payment thereof.

WHEREAS, there is necessity for making certain repairs, extensions and improvements to the Water System of the City of Santa Anna, Texas; and WHEREAS, it is considered to be to the best interest of the City that such repairs, extensions and improvements be financed by the issuance of Revenue Bonds, payable solely from and secured by an exclusive first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the water system of said City, after deduction of

reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, all in accordance with the provisions of Articles 1111-1118 both inclusive, of the 1825 Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended, and in no wise supported by an ad valorem or other tax on property in said City; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission deems it necessary and proper that the question of the issuance of such revenue bonds be substituted to the qualified electors of said City.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held on the 25 day of September, 1934, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Commission of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, be authorized to issue twenty five thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars, revenue Bonds of said City, maturing serially over a period of years not to exceed twenty-five (25) bearing interest at the rate of four (4) per cent) per annum per annum payable semi-annually for the purpose of financing certain repairs, extensions and improvements to the Water System of said City; and to provide for the payment of and interest on said bonds by pledging the net revenues from the operation of said Water System."

2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall within said city, and the following named persons are hereby appointed Managers thereof, to-wit:

C. B. Verner, presiding Judge Mrs. W. L. Mitchell, Clerk J. T. Garrett, Clerk

3. That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified electors, who own taxable property in the city and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

All voters, who favor the proposition to issue the said bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR THE ISSURANCE OF WATER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS AND THE PLEDGING OF THE REVENUES OF THE WATER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

And those opposed to the proposition to issue the said bonds shall have written or printed on their ballot the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSURANCE OF WATER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS AND THE PLEDGING OF THE REVENUES OF THE WATER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

4. That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor, of said city and attested by the City Clerk, shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause this notice of the election to be posted at three public places within said city, for at least thirty full days prior to the said election.

5. The Mayor is further authorized and directed to cause this notice of election to be published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city once each week for four consecutive weeks. The date of the first publication shall be not less than thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

FORMER SHIELD CITIZEN KILLED IN ACCIDENT NEAR ALBANY SUNDAY

John Dillingham, aged 86, was brought here from Albany Sunday, suffering from a fractured skull and other bruises on his body, received in an automobile accident near Albany Sunday morning.

Mr. Dillingham lived with his children near Albany, and was walking on the highway near his home when run down by a car, said to have been driven by an aged man from Amarillo. Injuries were inflicted which resulted in his death a few hours later.

The remains were prepared by C. P. Petty, of the Mead Undertaking Company, and carried to Shield for interment this afternoon. The funeral services were held at the home of Mrs. John, in the Shield community, conducted by Rev. G. A. Morgan, pastor of the Methodist church in Santa Anna, and interment was made in the Shield cemetery.

John Dillingham was born on March 3, 1848, in Alcorn county, Mississippi. He came to Coleman county in 1907, and lived here ten years before moving to Shackelford county, where he has lived since. His companion preceded him in death three years ago.

CATTLE, HOG SALFS GREATLY INCREASED OVER LAST YEAR

Austin, Aug. 27.—The efforts of stock raisers in co-operation with the government to salvage as much as possible from the ravages of the drouth, and to conserve the limited feed and pasturage for coming months, were reflected in livestock shipments in Texas during July, according to Dr. F. A. Buechel, assistant director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

"The unprecedented total of 8,381 cars was shipped to Fort Worth and interstate points in the month, as against 3,366 cars during the corresponding month a year ago," he said. "These figures do not include shipments to markets within the state other than Fort Worth, or the cattle purchased by the government and processed by canning plants for emergency relief. Contributing further to the disappearance of livestock from Texas ranges are unusually high death losses, and the destruction of diseased and emaciated animals by the government."

"Cattle and calf shipments accounted for practically all of the increase, although there was a slight increase in the number of sheep, while shipments of hogs were only half as large."

"The hog statistics for the month deserve special notice. During July of this year the receipts of hogs into Texas from outside states exceeded shipments to other states by 112 cars, whereas in July, 1933, the shipments from Texas to outside states exceeded receipts from out-of-state points by almost exactly the same number of cars. Moreover, this disparity is likely to increase in future months as the government program of hog reduction last year did not get well under way until about August. The sharp rise in hog prices, which promises to reach a still higher level in coming months, intensifies the outflow of money from Texas for live hogs, to say nothing of the added amounts for dressed pork, of which there is at present no record."
