Senator Teel Bivins talks about livestock, water management Regional meeting held in Muleshoe

Livestock producers and area officials from Texas and New Mexico attended a meeting on Confined Livestock and Waste Water Management on Tuesday at the Bailey County Coliseum.

The meeting was conducted by the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation in an effort to attract people and businesses interested in relocating to the area.

State Sen. Teel Bivins answering questions from area residents concerning current permitting processes and anticipated changes for the feedlot and dairy industries in Texas.

During his talk Bivins said, "Goals we need to work towards are protecting our natural resources, saving paper work and reducing the cost of the permit process."

He added, "We needs to regionalize our Legislative

goals and come up with a new program, a new process. Our system needs to encourage innovative ideas. Too many times, the system relies on the past, tending to stick with what worked in the past and discourages economic development."

"We also have to have a good system so we can compete with New Mexico and Oklahoma and we have to make the process more userfriendly," Bivins said.

Jay Messenger of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation said, "The main reason we held this meeting was to promote our area."

Messenger said the meeting was termed a success. He said that the industrial foundation has received several inquiries from dairies about moving to the area as a result of the meeting Tuesday.

Companies may claim they have inside or secret information about low-priced items; however, after paying for the information, many consumers find that the bargains are misleading or non-existent. 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

The latest scam reported to AT& Tinvolves the fraudulent use of the AT & T name and logo.

Faxes bearing the logo as well as the name "AT&T Corporate Security" are sent to businesses, but no name or return telephone number is on the fax.

The fax demands that the owners not contact any AT&T employee, local telephone company employee, PBX vendor or any other carrier for security reasons.

The fax promises to protect the businesses from 800 calls to adult entertainment centers that convert the call to a 900 toll call. The fax looks "official."

Dry weather problem for cotton crops

"Yield potential is below 100 pounds in many fields," explains Krieg. "Most of the acreage is so far gone that in areas recently receiving an inch or more of rainfall, plants have failed to recover to a point that they could make additional

Krieg says he has similar problems in a few row-irrigated fields that did not get watered until it was too late for the plant to recover.

In general the High Plains will have a significantly smaller crop in 1994. Estimates of the crops eventual size range from around 2 million to just over 2.5 million bales.






