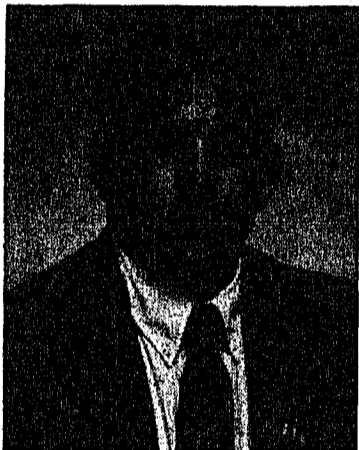
Aaron LeMond Appointed Santa Anna Postmaster

SAHS cheerleader Kristen Keeney was close behind Tucker with eleven correct guesses.

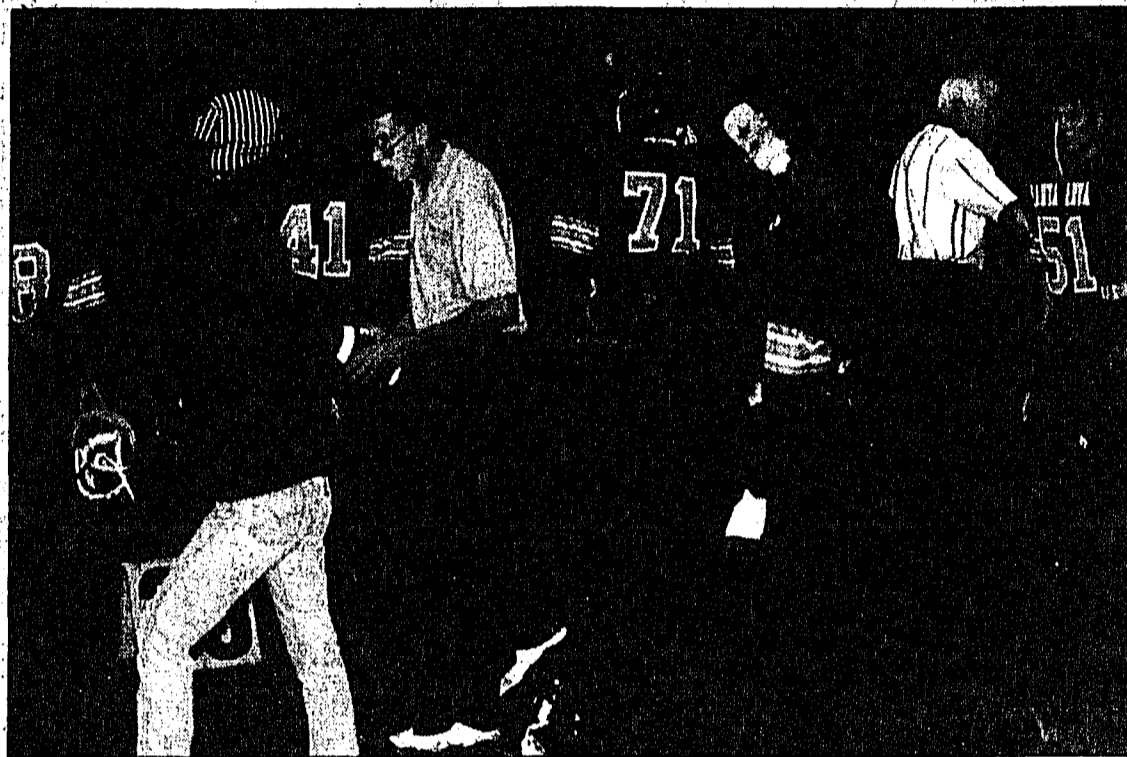

City Council Approves Slight Tax Increase

The Santa Anna City Council met for the regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, September 13 with council members Karen Morris, Jim Spillman, Robert Noriega and Bobby Morgan present.

Others present were Crew Chief Doug Watson, City Secretary Alys Pelton, Chief of Police Carlos Torres, Rusty Wells, Rick and Lillian Grissam, Nell Hipp, Peggy Gordon, Michelle Morgan, Collier Watson, Jane Patrick and Emmitt Payne.

Following approval of the minutes and review of the police report, Emmitt Payne with Central Texas Opportunities updated the council on the possibility of starting a Headstart program at the armory. He is currently working on grant applications, with most of the grants requiring 20% in-kind where

in monies, labor or materials.

Collier Watson present the audit for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1996. Utility Fund Revenues were reported at \$429,735.88 with operating expenditures at \$388,885.68 and non-operating expenditures of \$42,514.56 leaving the Utility Fund with a loss of \$1,664.36. The depreciation expense for the utility fund was reported at \$74,854.00.

The General Fund revenues were reported at \$178,528.19 and expenditures at \$177,079.97 with an income of \$1,448.22.

Watson stated that the overall operations of the city had improved from the previous year's audit.

The Fair Housing Ordinance was passed.

Michelle Morgan, president of the Santa Anna Chamber of

Commerce, appeared before the council to request permission to move Frontier Days back to the downtown area. Council gave their approval to hold the event on North 2nd Street north of the red light.

The PTO Option of TML Group Benefit Risk Pool for employee medical coverage at a cost of \$222.64 per employee was adopted.

The 1996-97 Property Tax Rate was set with an increase of 3% less the sales tax adjustment rate (.65807 per \$100 valuation).

Peggy Gordon was appointed as the new Nutrition Center Director. She will be assuming the duties of Thelma Beloit.

The City Maintenance report involved a question and answer discussion with new City Crew Chief Doug Watson. He has assumed the duties of Tommy Jackson.

250 Million Years Old

This cylindrical coral rock with objects that look like rice grains built up on it was picked up by Anna Pucket on her property here in Santa Anna. Most of us around here have seen similar rocks but never took the trouble that Anna did to find out about it. Anna sent the rock, which is about the size you see here, to the Department of Anthropology at Texas A&M University for analysis. In a letter received from D. Gentry Steele she was told that "the 'rice grains' are the shells of very small marine animals called Fusulinids. They would have been like a giant amoeba with a shell (the 'rice grain') to protect their body. They lived during a time called the Pennsylvania and Permian periods and are more than 250 million years old." We thank Mrs. Pucket for sharing her find with us and our readers.

Dear Editor

I would like to share with you and your readers for consideration, an article appearing in the *West Texas Angelus*, Sept. 16, 1996. This is the official newspaper of the Catholic Diocese of San Angelo.

The name of the article is "No Presidential Veto Can Make This Right" and it reads as follows:

"Partial-birth abortion is a procedure more akin to infanticide than abortion. It is the killing of a tiny infant just seconds before taking his or her first breath outside the womb. Unless Congress overturns President Clinton's veto of the Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act, this inhumane procedure - that no baby should have to endure - will continue.

The claimed medical basis for the veto has been definitively refuted. Experts in fetal and maternal medicine agree that partial-birth abortion is never medically necessary to protect a mother's health or to preserve her ability to have children in the future. It is procedure 'no obstetrician needs to do,' according to the director of obstetrics at Vanderbilt University Medical Center.

It is particularly unconscionable that the victims of partial-birth abortion are some of the weakest among us - children completely unable to defend themselves, who depend on us for survival itself. Special care and protection is owed these children and their others and fathers who are vulnerable to medical misinformation. *Whatever you did for one of these least, you did for me.* (Mt. 25:40).

Partial-birth abortion is beyond comprehension for those who hold life sacred. As Catholic Bishops and as citizens of the United States, we urge members of Congress to override the President's veto."

"(T)he surgeon then forces the scissors into the base of the skull...(H)e spreads the scissors to enlarge the opening. The surgeon removes the scissors and introduces a suction catheter into this hole and evacuates the skull contents. With the catheter still in place, he applies traction to the fetus, removing it completely from the patient."

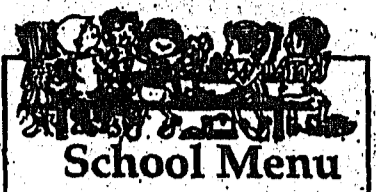

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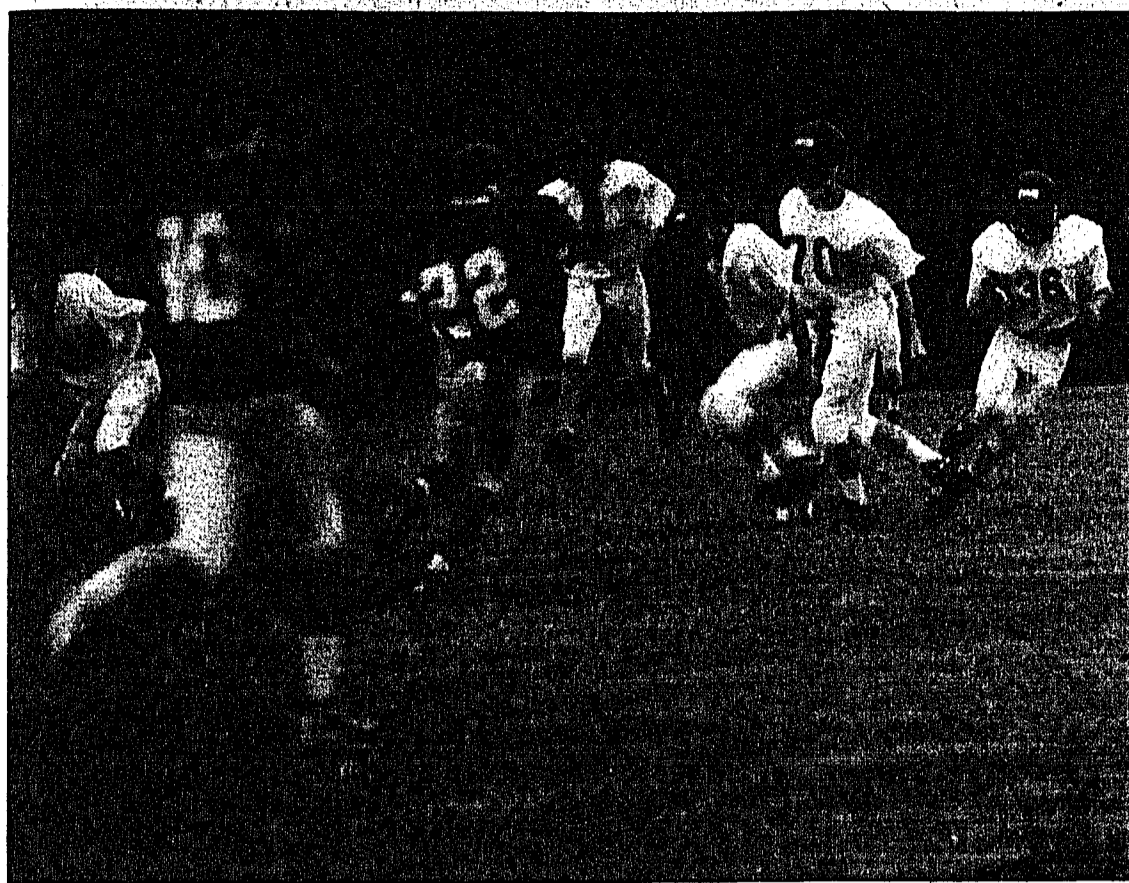

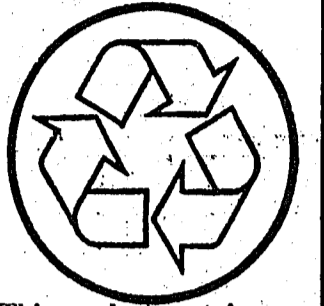
