Judge for the livestock show will be Jeff York, Robert Lee, Agriculture Science teacher.

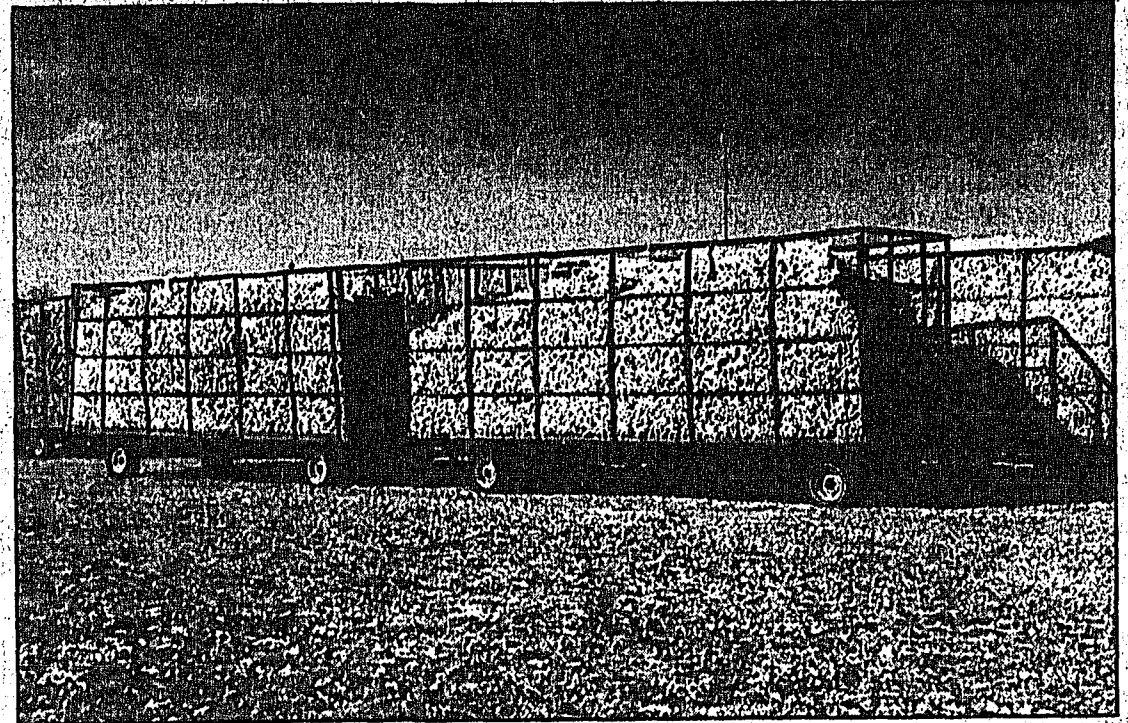
Home Economics Project Show Postponed Until Later

Cotton Ginning Under Way Locally

The Santa Anna Co-op Gin has been a busy place during the last two weeks, processing cotton from a wide area. The first bale of cotton was from the John Geer place south of Bangs, ginned on November 19. Mr. Geer had defoliated his crop for the earlier harvest.

The majority of the cotton has been brought in since the hard frost two weeks ago, with over 200 bales ginned last week. A dozen or more bales have been waiting for ginning at different times during the last week.

Gin Manager G. W. Loyd of Mozelle, said that the quality of area cotton is

graded above average and the price is approximately the same as last year, running just under 70 cents per pound.

Loyd also said he expects at least another 200 bales to be processed at Santa Anna, which has the only gin in this area. The nearest is near Lohm in McCulloch County.

AUSTIN - State Comptroller John Sharp last week proposed that "career" students pay up to four

times their current tuition. "What we want to do is target those students who just can't seem to graduate," said Andy Welch, a spokesman for Sharp's office. Sharp's proposal - aimed at cutting our undergraduate students who have amassed at least 170 hours of credit - would increase those students' tuition from \$2,150 a year up to \$7,910 a year. The proposal, if approved by the Legislature, could save the state about \$5 million a year, beginning in 1999. Statistics maintained by the comptroller's office show that about 18 percent of students enrolled in state universities have more than 170 credits. Most majors

need about 120 total credit hours to receive an undergraduate degree. Complaint backlog to '89 Nearly 1,100 complaints against teachers and school administrators are being investigated by the State Board of Educator Certification and the oldest cases date to 1989. The board has the authority to revoke or suspend an individual's certification. Board officials said the large number of cases is caused by limited resources - only three investigators are on the job - and the need to proceed carefully in cases that could damage reputations. But educators say the backlog creates a dangerous situation for students and is unfair to school personnel who have to wait a long time for their case to be resolved. Allegations that indicate a potential danger for students - such as sexual misconduct - have the highest priority; allegations of violence are priority two; and drug violations are assigned priority three. Nursing Home Reforms OK'd Nursing home administrators will be held accountable for all problems in a nursing home, under a set of tough new standards adopted last week by the Texas Board of Nursing Facility Administrators. In adopting 25 standards of conduct that hold administrators accountable, the board sided with advocates for the more than 98,000 nursing home residents in Texas. The vote came after a four-month study by the board to overcome public outrage generated by an Austin American-Statesman investigation that found none of the state's 2,700 administrators had been disciplined since 1993, despite questionable deaths, injuries and other problems in Texas nursing homes. The new standards require administrators:

Your Rights As A Member Of Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Inc.

I. Rate and Service Information - You may, either by phoning (915) 625-2128 or 1-800-560-2128 or by personal visit to the Cooperative's business office at 3300 North Highway 84, Coleman, Texas, request copies of any portion of the Cooperative's rate and service tariffs and rules as filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. A nominal reproduction charge will be made for each copy and postage will be added if the copies are mailed. II. Meter Testing - As provided by the Rules of the Public Utility Commission, you may request a test of your electric meter if you believe that the meter is not accurately reflecting your actual electric consumption. This test will be made at no charge to you provided that the meter has not been tested during the previous four years. In the event that you request a test more often than once in four years and the meter is not defective, you will be required to pay a charge of not more than \$15.00 for the test. III. Outstanding Bills - Under the tariff of this Cooperative as filed with the Public Utility Commission Of Texas, you have twenty-six (26) days from the date of the bill to pay an outstanding bill. IV. Termination - Your electric service may be discontinued after proper notice for the following reasons: A. Failure to pay an outstanding bill within twenty-six days of issuance. B. Failure to pay a delinquent account or meet the terms of a deferred payment plan. C. Violation of the Cooperative's rules for the use of service in such a manner that interferes with the service of other or the operation of non-standard equipment, provided that the Cooperative will make every attempt to notify you of the problem and allow you to remedy the situation. D. Failure to comply with the Cooperative's deposit and guarantee requirements. The Cooperative may also disconnect service at once and without notice where a dangerous condition exists and such disconnection shall remain in effect so long as the condition exists. Disconnection without notice may also be made when service is connected without authority by a person who has not made application for service or who has reconnected service without authority following termination of service for non-payment. In instances of tampering with the Cooperative's meter or equipment, bypassing same, or other instances of diversion, service may be terminated immediately. The Cooperative will either mail or personally deliver a written notice of termination at least (10) days prior to the date of disconnection. Disconnection will occur only on those days when Cooperative personnel are available to receive payment to prevent disconnection. If you are seriously ill or will become more seriously ill as a result of termination of service you may have your physician call or contact the Cooperative within sixteen (16) days of the issuance of the bill to report your condition. The physician must provide a confirmation letter to the Cooperative; within twenty-six (26) days of the issuance of the bill and the Cooperative will then refrain from terminating service for sixty-three (63) days from the issuance of the bill unless a lesser period is agreed upon. If you make a request to avoid termination under this provision you must enter into a deferred payment arrangement. V. Service and Bill Disputes - If you disagree with the Cooperative regarding any aspect of the Cooperative's service you may request a supervisory review. If you make such a request, you have five (5) days to participate in the review before the Cooperative may terminate service if the dispute is one in which the issues may result in such termination, provided that notice has been given under standard disconnection procedures. If the billing dispute is not resolved by such review, you may appeal to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757 (512) 458-0100. While such appeal or other resolution of a dispute is pending, you may avoid termination of service by paying the average of your monthly bill for the past twelve (12) months as determined by the Cooperative. In the event the dispute is not resolved within sixty (60) days, you must keep all subsequent bills current. VI. Alternate Payment Plans - As a member of the Cooperative, you have a right to request alternate payment plans. Deferred Payment: If you have not been delinquent in paying your bill more than two times in the last twelve (12) months and are unable to pay any or all of your bill, you are qualified for a deferred payment plan. Such plan requires that you keep all subsequent bills current and pay monthly an amount not to exceed one-third of the outstanding amount. You may, but are not required to, sign this agreement and if you do not fulfill the terms of the agreement your service may be terminated under standard termination procedures. Such breach of the agreement voids your right to a deferred payment plan or re-negotiation to avoid termination. The Cooperative is not required to offer this arrangement if you have had service for less than three months. VII. Service Reconnection - If your service is interrupted for any reasons listed under Section IV of the information sheet, you may re-establish service when all out-standing and delinquent bills are paid and when a deposit or other evidence of payment guarantee is provided to the Cooperative. VIII. Cooperative Office and Business Hours - 3300 North Highway 84, Coleman, Texas 76834; phone (915) 625-2126 or 1-800-560-2128. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. IX. Meter Reading - If you would like information regarding the proper method for reading your electric meter, the Cooperative will provide, on request, the necessary instructions. X. Deposit Policy - New members of the Cooperative will be required to pay a cash meter deposit based on the type of service required. Cash deposits will be limited to a specified amount equal to or less than one sixth of your estimated annual electric bill. In lieu of a cash deposit a new member may present a satisfactory letter of credit history from his or her previous power supplier, a letter of credit references with names of references that can be quickly and easily checked by the Cooperative, or proof of other satisfactory credit responsibility. All cash deposits accrue interest, at the current interest rate, but no less than 6 percent, as set by the Texas Public Utility Commission at the beginning of each year. Accrued interest will be paid directly to you or credited to your electric bill. If you have not been disconnected for nonpayment or are not delinquent more than two (2) times after twelve (12) consecutive billings, the cooperative will refund your deposit plus interest accrued, provided your account is current. XI. Financial Assistance - The following governmental or social service agencies may be able to assist you if you are having trouble making your payment for electric service to the Cooperative: Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., P.O. Box 820, Coleman, Texas 76834. XII. Nondiscrimination - Your Cooperative provides electric service without discrimination as to a member's race, nationality, color, religion, sex, or marital status. XIII. Special Services - If you or any member of your household utilizes life-support equipment or if you or any member of your family has a physical handicap warranting special consideration, please notify the Cooperative. 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
