City Council approves increase in service charges for Energas

The Muleshoe City Council on Tuesday approved a request by Energas for a rate increase on monthly service charges. Beginning next month, Energas will increase its minimum rate charge by \$.54. Energas had originally proposed a \$.89 cent increase to a West Texas Steering Committee but the Energas Steering Committee settled for a \$.54 cent increase before it was presented to the Muleshoe City Council.

The rate increase must be approved by each city individually.

The increase was approved by three of the city council members present on Tuesday. If the city council had not approved the rate increase, Energas would then have had to appeal it to the Railroad Commission.

The increase will make the monthly minimum charge of \$4.75 now \$5.29.

Energas will not be eligible to request another rate increase until April 1, 1996.

In other business on Tuesday, the city council approved an agreement with

City Attorney Michael Caldwell to improve his retainer fee and an increase in his hourly rate from \$75 to \$125.

"I think that this is line and that it is reasonable," City Manager Dave Marr said.

The council heard an update on the repairing of the million gallon reservoir which has a leak.

Marr reported to the council that he has received estimates for the costs of repairs from an engineer, however the estimates could change substantially if different material has to be used.

He said that the leak has been fixed twice in the past by heat welding and it may be time to get a new reservoir. The city will take bids for the repairs.

Marr said the reservoir is fine at the present time because the water level has been lowered to prevent leaks.

The reservoir will be emptied though when it is time to fix it, but the city will still have the backup of the city's other reservoir to rely on while it is being fixed.

Seven Mules honored by District 2-3A

The Muleshoe Mules had seven players selected to the All-District 2-3A football team, released this week.

Junior-wide receiver Daniel Garbarino and senior running back Rashad Kirven were first-team selections, while lineman Chad Johnson and quarterback Jimmy Gauna were second-team offensive picks.

Linebacker Edward Rodriguez was a second-team defensive choice, while lineman John Mesa and cornerback Mike Villarreal received honorable mention.

District champion Friona led the list with nine first team selections and seven second-team picks. Shallowater, which was the district runner-up in its

first year after moving up from Class 2A, was next with eight first-team picks and seven second-team selections.

Littlefield had four first-team choices and three second teamers, while Dimmitt had two first-team choices and five second-team picks. Floydada had two first-team choices and four on the second team.

Garbarino was one of four offensive players to be selected unanimously. He caught 32 passes for 655 yards and nine touchdowns, averaging 20.5 yards per catch. He also led the Mules in scoring and was the third-leading tackler on the team while doubling as a safety.

City begins discussing landfill options

The Muleshoe City Landfill has been licensed to remain open through October of 1995. This means the Muleshoe City Council only has a little less than a year to decide what to do with the city's trash and to decide who and how it will be paid for.

During a preliminary discussion on Tuesday, City Councilman Rex Harris said, "I would like to see us go through the costs of a (new) landfill."

Tom Bonds, another city councilman, said that he has

been hearing complaints from residents about trash not getting picked up in the city. The city currently utilizes a private company to pickup the trash and take to the city's landfill.

The councilors on Tuesday also talked about recycling to maximize a new landfill's lifetime and use in Muleshoe.

Marr said that the city should also look at composting options.

"This will reduce the amount of trash," he said, but he also raised the question on what kind of composting could be

done. Marr said another thing the city will have to look at, as far as reduction goals, is if things such as recycling and composting will be mandatory or just targets.

"Right now they are targets," he said.

Muleshoe Mayor Robert Montgomery said, "This (the landfill) is a big item and it will take awhile to solve. We need to spend time on this."

Marr said that the city will hold a series of meetings to further discuss landfill options.

It was his second-straight year to be selected to the All-District offensive team.

Kriven made the first team at running back with 950 yards and six touchdowns on 127 attempts. He enjoyed the success despite not moving into the backfield until the fourth game. He began the year at tight end, but was moved to running back after injuries to Robert Toscano and Jake Adair. He also caught eight passes for 98 yards and one touchdown and added 18 tackles on the defensive side of the ball.

Johnson, a 5-10, 230-pound junior, helped propel a Mule offense that averaged 305.9 yards per game. Guiding that offense was Gauna, a 5-6, 142-pound senior who rushed 113 times for 447 yards and seven TDs and completed 73 of 165

passes for 1,155 yards and 11 touchdowns. He was the Mules' second-leading scorer with 44 points and had 34 tackles on defense.

Rodriguez, a 6-2, 175-pound senior, was the Mules' leading tackler with 104 stops. He blocked one kick and one punt and recovered two fumbles. Offensively, Rodriguez caught 17 passes for 210 yards and one touchdown. He also kicked 14 PATs, one field goal and ran for a two-point conversion. As the Mules' punter, he averaged 31.8 yards on 36 attempts.

Mesa, a 5-10, 230-pound junior, was the second-leading Mule tackler with 62 stops and led the team with six quarterback sacks and five hurries. He blocked one punt, recovered three fumbles, caused three fumbles and recorded the team's only safety.

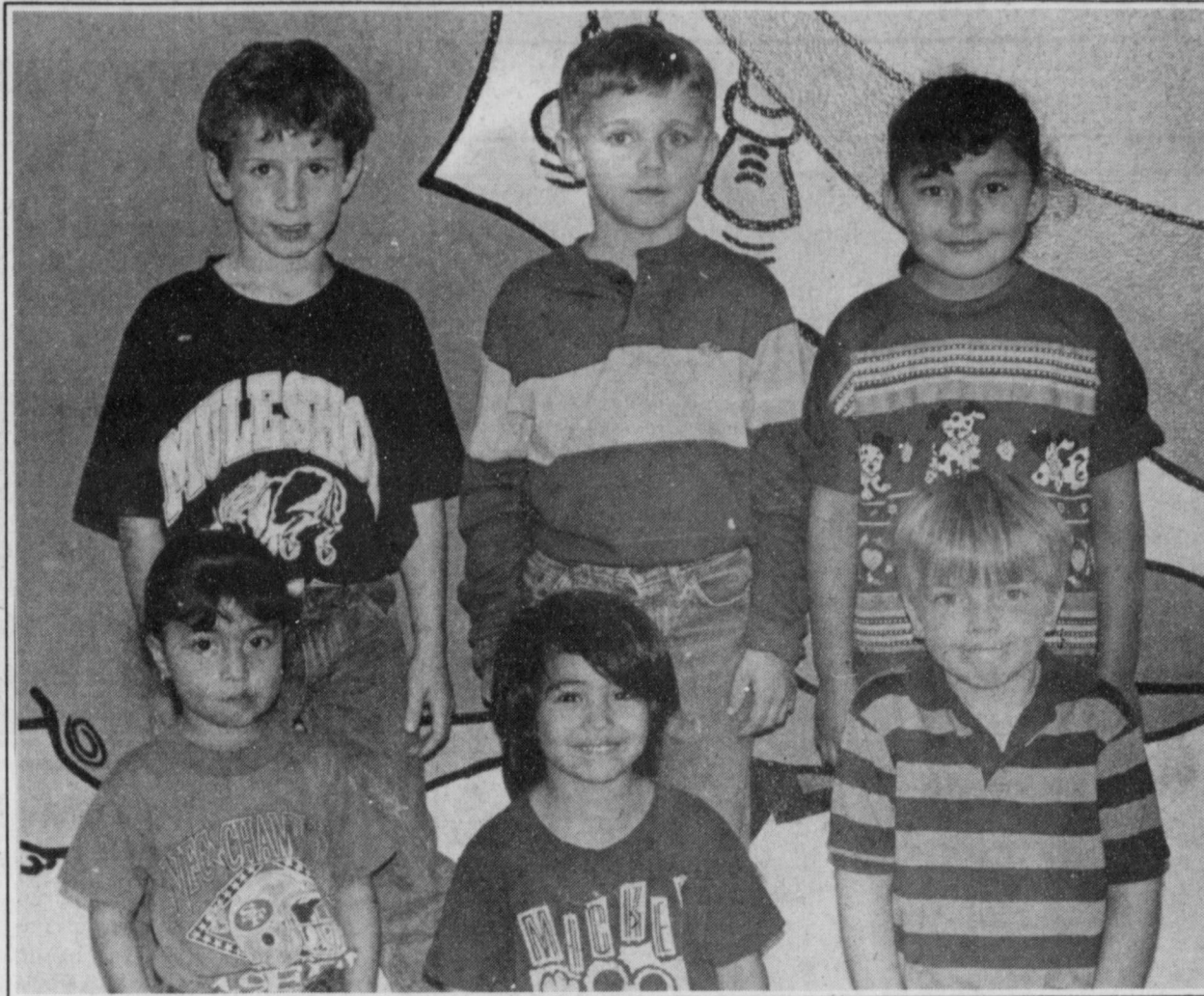

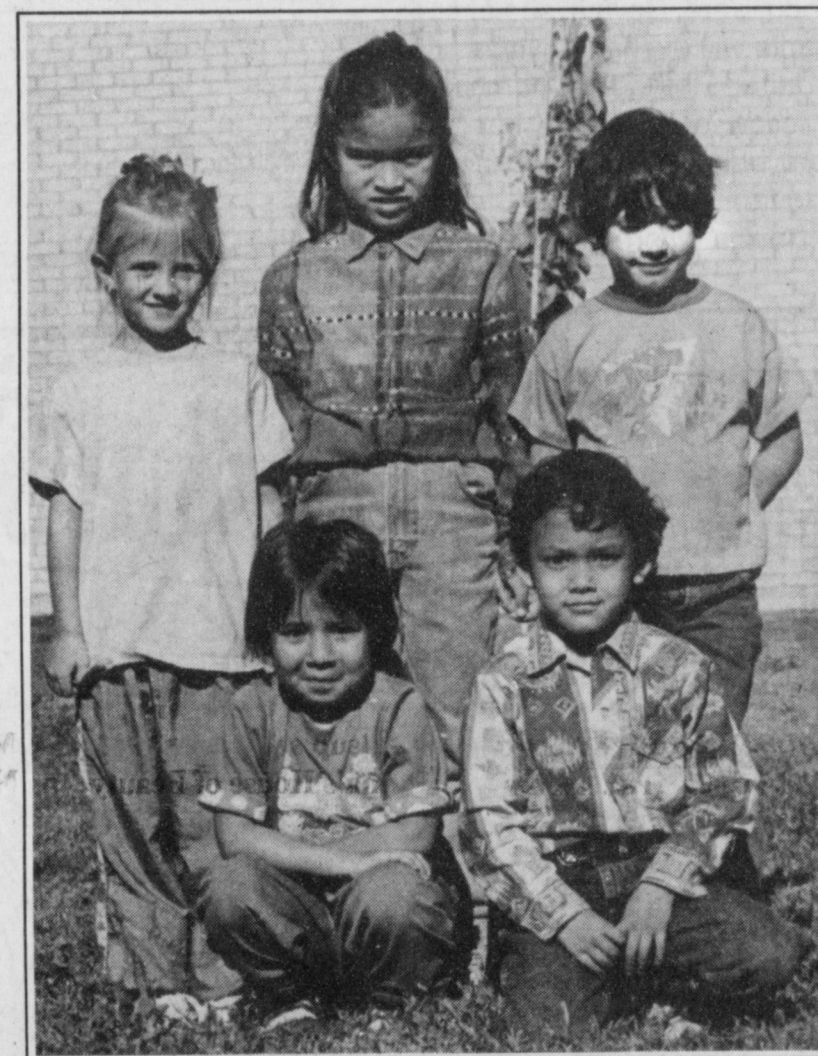

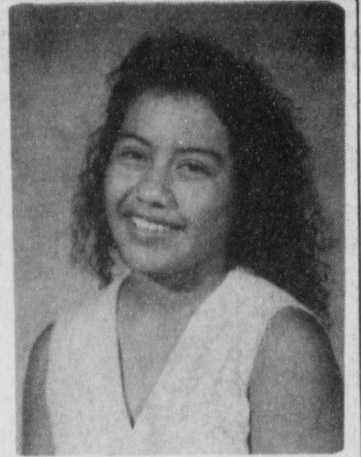
