Council Discusses Possible Purchase Of Computers, Patrol Car

The Santa Anna City Council met on Tuesday evening, February 17 for their regular monthly meeting.

Council members present were Bobby Morgan, Jim Spillman, David Powell, Jean Findley and Mayor Karen Morris.

Others attending were Carmen Donham, Rose Bass, Evelyn Cliett, Joe Wallace, Raymond and Lodema Jones, Richard Watson, Rusty Wells, Thomas Watson, Municipal Court Judge Bill Worley, Police Officers Carlos Torres and Wayne Robbins, Director of Public Works Doug Watson, and City Secretary Alys Pelton.

The Police Report was reviewed by the council. Municipal Court Report was given by Judge Bill Worley. A new fine schedule was presented to the council.

The Senior Citizens Nutrition Center has several options to keep the program operating. Options include continuing with Coleman and moving to an approved site; get meals only from Coleman at a cost of \$3.00 per meal; transport persons to the Coleman Center; or separate from Coleman and operate the nutrition center. After some discussion between the council and representatives of the Senior Citizen's program, more investigation will take place on finding a new site and possibly a different food source. A called meeting may be held to finalize the findings of the investigation.

The City Council reviewed the following bids for computers and updates:

Excellerated Technologies: \$1,100 each for computers and \$550 for upgrade on current computer;

Gammon Technologies: \$1,235 each on new computers;

BCI: \$1,125 each new computers and \$463 for upgrade;

Computex: \$1,125 each on new computers and no cost on bid for upgrade;

COMPUSA: \$1,163 each on new computers with upgrade and networking on total system for a total of \$3,290;

R&B Computers: \$1,250 each on new systems and \$545 for upgrade

Judge Bill Worley told the council there is a possibility he can get a quote from someone local for an "at cost" price direct from the factory. The matter was tabled until Worley can get the information.

The City Election was set for May 2 with Henri Gilbreath appointed as the election judge.

Director of Public Works Doug Watson reported two small water leaks for the month but there is still a 33% water loss. City crews will continue changing out old meters that are not registering right and finding and killing out "hot" taps (illegal unmetered taps).

The Council considered changing the dates of meetings in an attempt to get all council members at the meetings. After some discussion, it was agreed to leave the meeting on the second Tuesday of each month.

A motion was made and carried to implement the Simple IRA retirement plan at the request of current employees as discussed at the January meeting. All retirees on the current Texas Municipal Retirement Plan will continue on that plan at this time.

Officer Carlos Torres discussed the junk car ordinance. A few citizens have expressed concern and are not happy about the enforcement. The police department was given full support in getting compliance of the ordinance.

Both police officers have gotten cellular phones and are using them mostly for police department calls. They asked if the City could assist with the phone bill. The City will pay \$25.00 per month on the phone bills plus any additional costs related to the police department.

Officer Torres also reported to the council of an opportunity to purchase another police car. The auto is a 1994 Mercury with striping. All that would be necessary would be to change sheriff to police and put in a radio and lights. The council agreed to purchase the car for up to \$5,000.

Students in the Santa Anna ISD will have holidays next Monday, March 2 and again on Monday, March 9.

Teachers will be observed in-service days.

Possible Rabid Cat Found In Santa Anna

According to an official of the City of Santa Anna, a cat found at Rainbow Signs one day last week was suspected to be rabid.

Due to the large number of possibly rabies cases at the present, the only time an animal is sent to be tested is if human contact has been made.

Citizens are reminded to be on the alert for stray animals.

Time Running Out For "Citizen Of Year" Nominations

The deadline for nomination for the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce Citizen of the Year is nearing. All nominations must be received by Tuesday, March 10 to be considered for the honor.

The Citizen of the Year will be named at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet on Saturday, March 21.

Automotive Shop Opening Soon

Darrel Cavanah will soon be opening DC's Automotive here giving Santa Anna a complete automotive repair shop equipped with computer analysis. Another service will be turning rotors and drums.

DC's will also be doing vehicle cleaning and detailing and will have a flat machine.

Fire Department Associate Membership Drive Underway

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department has begun their annual Associate Membership Drive. The drive provides vital funding needed to maintain and update fire fighting equipment used by the department.

In the Spring of 1997, the department applied for a 2-1/2 ton GI truck from the Texas Forest Service. The truck was delivered on February 4 of this year and will be outfitted with 1,000 gallon water tank and new pump unit. It is planned to have this unit in operation by the beginning of summer.

The new building is approximately 80% completed. It is planned to be completed between now and the first of May.

Everyone is encouraged to support the local fire department in

order to help them better serve the community, the surrounding rural area and provide fire fighting support for other fire departments in the area.

Santa Anna Cemetery Gets New Water Lines

In past months some roads were paved in the Santa Anna Cemetery and now in a project just completed new water lines were been laid and faucets installed.

The accompanying drawing you can see how involved the water pipe work was. It shows the main lines circling through the cemetery and the feeder lines branching off. The small circles indicate the placement

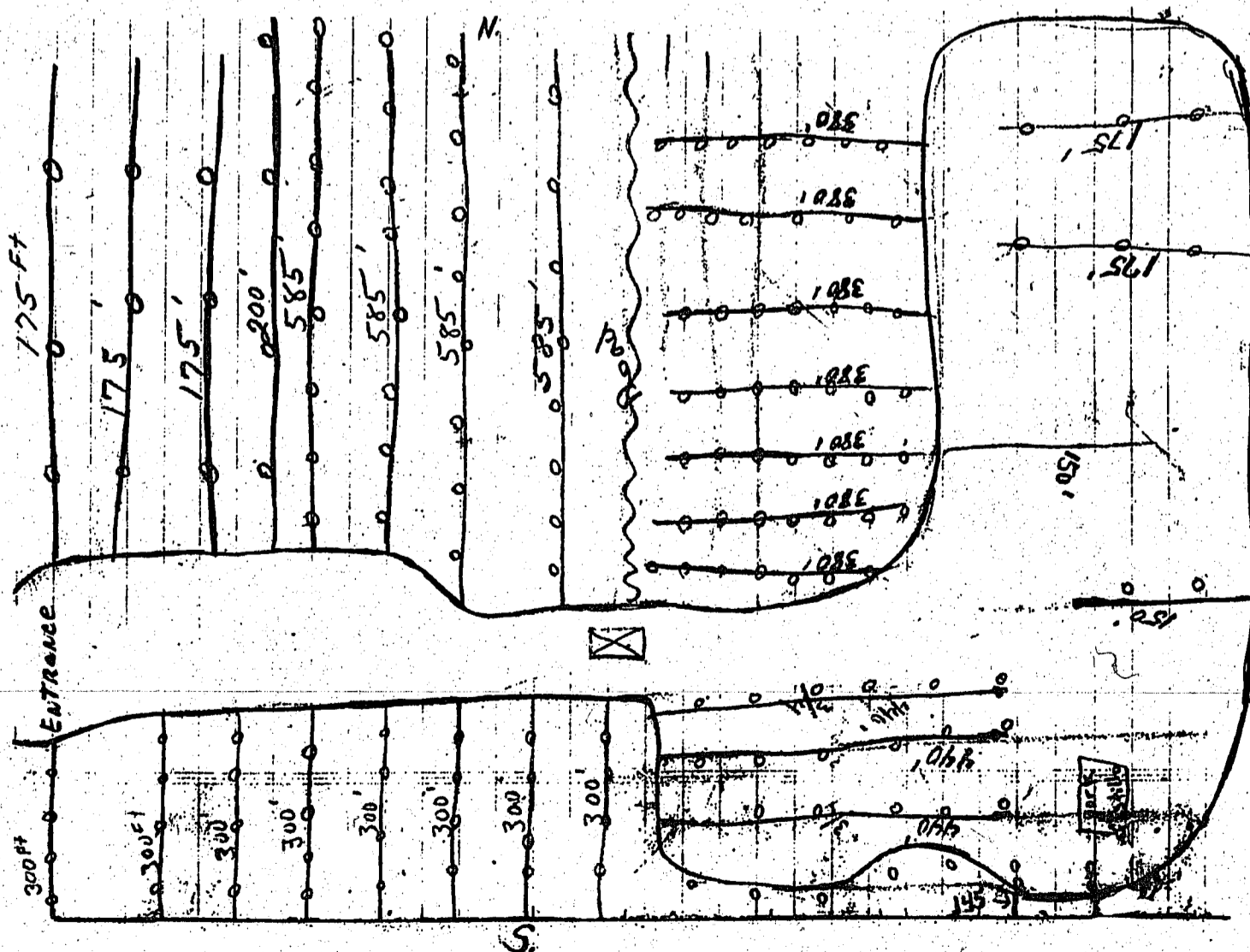
of water spickets throughout the cemetery.

Even though Cemetery caretaker Mike Pritchard did much of the work, he had to hire help. That along with all the supplies were an expensive outlay for the Cemetery Association which has to shoulder all the costs of the project.

To add to the cost of the project some of the pipe and some of

Pritchard's digging tools were taken one day while the work was going on. Mike and other workers looked up in time to see a vehicle leaving the site where the pipe and tools were. Upon checking they found the items missing. Pritchard was able to give local law officials information on the vehicle but the officials have been unable to come up with anything on the alleged theft.

All that coupled with the fact that the City of Santa Anna no longer supplies water without cost to the cemetery, those with loved ones buried there will probably want to help out the Cemetery Association. Outright donations are always welcome and memorial gifts are also greatly appreciated.

Self Culture Club met Wednesday, February 11 at 1 p.m. in the Home Economics Rooms at Coleman High School. Home Economics Teachers, Mrs. Bonnie

Brown, presented the program. She talked about home economics education of the present times and where they are headed in the future.

The basic cooking and sewing classes that club members remember are a thing of the past. The classes now have names like Family and Consumer Science and the content of the courses have changed to keep up with the times. Cooking and sewing taking up only a few weeks and more time is spent on the science technology of food and clothing and preparing the students for independent living. Interior Design and Parenting and Child Development are also classes in the Home Economics Department.

Mrs. Brown has a banking project in almost all of her classes. Students are paid (on paper only) for the hours they spend in school. Each month they write checks to pay rent, utilities, a teacher's fee and other expenses. They are required to put some money into savings. They pay fines for breaking rules and can buy privileges such as leaving the room during class. Money left at the end of the year can be used to pay for not taking parts of the final exam. Students learn to think about where their money comes from and how to use it wisely.

After the program a short business meeting was held. The nominating committee gave its report. Proposed officers for the next term are Suzie Bass, president; Cathy Ellis, vice president; and Oma Dean Horner, secretary-treasurer. Elections will be held at a later meeting.



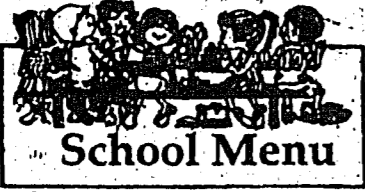
READING READINESS

Teaching Your Child The Alphabet Can Build Reading Skills

Long before children are officially "taught to read," parents teach them lots of things that help with reading. One of them is how to use the alphabet. Here are some good ways to do it:

- **Make an alphabet book.** On each page, draw a letter and let your child find pictures to represent it. He can take them from magazines or even draw them himself. Read the book together.
- **Play with magnetic letters.** Keep them on the refrigerator and spell fun words. For example, spell your child's name or ask, "What would you like to spell?"
- **Look for letters.** Point them out wherever you go. Sometimes pick one letter to look for. See how many places you can find it.
- **Sing about the alphabet.** Teach your child the alphabet song and other songs about letters. *Sesame Street* is a good place to hear them.
- **Talk about the alphabet.** Say "Jane's name starts with the same sound as yours, Jason. They both start with J."

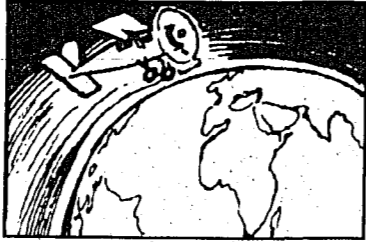

After lunch we left the pavilion and sat in some lawn chairs under the overhanging trees. We asked Abigail how she had met Kevin. She told that she had spent a few years in Tanzania, studying volcanoes. Shortly before their wedding, Abigail was awarded her Ph.D in "VOLCANO?" We asked her what that meant but she didn't give us much of an answer except that it was in the field of geology. Also during the course of the conversation; she stated that she was a geologist. She asked Kevin to get her case out of her luggage. When Kevin retrieved the case, Abigail opened it and displayed a large number of precious and semi-precious stones. Among the stones was a matched pair of tanzanite about the size that Margaret was looking for. Kevin once again was sent to get the charge card machine so Margaret could complete her purchases. We also mentioned that several people in our group were looking at tanzanite but unfortunately Abigail was unable to meet with them.

We bade good-bye to our new-found friends from North Carolina and were told that we could tour their zop anytime we were in town. When we mentioned that we were members of the Fort Worth Zoo Association, the invitation became more insistent. They were a lovely group to travel with.

Kevin turned the plane around and in a short time we were airborne again. Kevin flew slow and low zigzagging across the Mara showing us even more animals than we had seen before. We were sorry that we didn't have a camera sufficient to take pictures from the plane. Margaret's camera did not have enough power to focus at this distance and the small plane was too bumpy for the camcorder. All too soon we made a low pass over our runway to clear the stray animals away and then came into a nice landing. Jonathan and Jeannie were waiting there with the land rover for our return. Bidding Kevin good-bye, we carefully placed our Nile perch in the cooler and the four of us set out on our third or fourth game run of the day but the first on the land. We did not see near as many animals from this vantage point but they were a lot closer and made better photographic subjects.

That night the balloon riders and everyone else except Jeannie asked how the fishing expedition was.

We described the day including the tour of the spacious accommodations that were available. We said that if we returned to Kenya we would like to spend a night on the island. It seemed as though there were not enough people willing to pay for a ride the next day to stabilize the balloon, but enough to make it financially viable. At least four people from our crew had their second balloon ride gratis the next morning, but one of them wasn't the "almost balloonist".

That night for dinner Sammie, our matre'd, served fresh caught Nile perch to all fifteen of us as an appetizer. He made much ado about David's prowess in supplying the fish. By this time many of our group had grown weary of Nile perch as it had been on the menu many times (David and Margaret had it prepared at least three ways at lunch). However, all agreed that it was the best that they had eaten and certainly the freshest! Considering the cost of the flight, it certainly should be the best they had ever tasted. David thanked everyone for their compliments and used this moment to explain Margaret's prowess at bartering. Even in a fish camp miles from the nearest store, she was able to buy tanzanite using her credit card.
