Tragic Deaths in County During 1937 Total 16

Coleman County had an average of more than one tragic death per month during 1937, a review of the tragedies of the past year reveals.

Of the 16 tragic deaths to occur in the county during the past year, seven of the persons died from wounds received from a gun or pistol while five died in automobile accidents, and one each died in the following: Auto-train crash, knife wounds, fall, lightning, and affray.

The tragic deaths, in chronological order, are as follows:

February 3, Glen Cude, 5, died in an automobile-train crash at Valera.

February 7, I. C. Clements, negro, slain by negro woman, who used a knife.

March 18, Sidney Smith, negro, shot at a local negro gambling house.

March 23, "Shorty" Wilson, negro, died from gunshot wounds received at the same time Sidney Smith was slain.

March 31, John R. Brandon, 43, laborer, was found shot to death with a shotgun at his home, 201 E. Tenth Street.

April 11, Willie Walter Hunter, 38, Whon, farmer, died at the local hospital as a result of injuries received in a fall from the Santa Fe underpass on Park Street.

May 2, John Leonard Hardcastle, 27, died of gunshot wounds while visiting a friend near Coleman.

May 3, Jim Mack Jones, 18, Fisk, killed by lightning.

June 9, Douglas Rhodes, 30, farmer, was killed by pistol shot by Santa Anna youth.

August 19, Jack N. McClure, 38, Coleman, accidentally slain when the shotgun he was cleaning discharged.

September 4, Robert Gray, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Gray of Coleman, died in the Overall Memorial Hospital following an accident on Commercial Avenue, Coleman.

September 23, Claby Felton, of Gouldbusk, died in San Angelo following an automobile accident on the Coleman-San Angelo highway.

November 4, Al Varnell, employee of a carnival company, killed in automobile accident.

November 13, Rufus T. Smith, Gouldbusk, hit in auto crash. Died in local hospital next day.

December 22, Antonio Rojas, of Anson, killed in automobile accident near Silver Lake.

December 26, Ben Aston Oath, died in the local hospital as the result of a rifle shot received just below the heart. The gun was accidentally discharged by a camp.

City Library Has Over 1100 Books But More Needed

Miss Josie Baxter Making
Envelopes and Cards For
Volumes

With recent additions to the library books donated by interested citizens, the City Library now has 1130 volumes, according to Miss Josie Baxter, librarian.

The most recent contributor was Pat Gilmore of Fort Stockton, who gave several children's books.

Approximately 100 books are in circulation each week and the library has recently acquired many more readers. Miss Baxter is busy now making envelopes and library cards to place in each book. Cards will be used to keep records on the date the book was taken and returned. No charge is made for the use of the library by city or rural readers, but a small fine is charged when the book is kept after the return date.

New books are needed for the library, however, since many of the present books have been read so often that they need replacing. Books that citizens have in their homes that they no longer care to keep will be gladly accepted at the library, Miss Baxter states.

The local library was started about 1928, but for several years did not have a full time librarian. Up until several months ago, ladies of the various clubs took turns about keeping the library during the afternoons. Several months ago, however, the WPA projects made it possible for the city to have a regular librarian and Miss Baxter was chosen. Now the library has almost as many rural readers as it does from Santa Anna.

The library board which sponsors the library is composed of Mrs. J. R. Banister, chairman; Mrs. Ollie Pearce Weaver, vice chairman; Mrs. Allison Weaver, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. A. L. Oder, Mrs. Jodie Mathews, Mrs. Arthur Turner and Mrs. C. B. Verner.

Hours for the library are from 12 noon to 5 p. m. every day except Saturday. Saturday hours are in the morning from 8:30 to 12:30.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing will be held by the undersigned in the City Hall, at Brady, Texas, beginning at 10:00 A. M., January 27, 1938, for the purpose of enabling all interested parties to present their views concerning flood control from the standpoint of run-off and water flow retardation, and soil erosion prevention on the watershed of the COLORADO RIVER, TEXAS.

The hearing will be held in connection with the preparation of a report on a preliminary examination of this river and will cover the east-central portion of the watershed, including the counties of Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Edwards, Kimble, Kerr, Lampasas, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Mills and San Saba. The preliminary examination will be made under the authorization of the Act of Congress approved June 22, 1936, entitled "An Act authorizing and providing for the construction of certain public works on rivers and harbors for flood control, and for other purposes." The pertinent sections of the Act are as follows:

SEC. 6. The Secretary of War is hereby authorized and directed to cause preliminary examinations and surveys for flood control at the following-named localities, and the Secretary of Agriculture is authorized and directed to cause preliminary examinations and surveys for run-off and water flow retardation and soil erosion prevention on the watersheds of such localities; the cost thereof to be paid from appropriations heretofore or hereafter made for such purposes: PROVIDED, that no preliminary examination, survey, project, or estimate for new works other than those designated in this or some prior Act or joint resolution shall be made: PROVIDED FURTHER, that after the regular or formal reports made as hereby authorized on any examination, survey, project, or work under way or proposed are submitted to Congress, no supplemental

Why You Should Pay Your Poll Tax

Having entered the new year, the thinking citizen will now give thought, if he has not already done so, to how he may best serve his country, his state, his city and his family. One of the very first things he should do is to go to the county tax collector and pay for a voting certificate, at a cost of \$1.75.

There will be several times this year when the certificate will be useful. No man should allow himself to be disfranchised because of not having the poll tax receipt that qualified him to vote, on the exemption certificate, if over age. Voting is one of the great privileges—and duties—of the citizens of this country. There is no compulsion on him as to how he shall cast his ballot—no dictatorship such as marks so-called elections in Russia and Germany and Italy and other misgoverned countries. The voter in this country is free to cast a ballot just as he chooses.

Besides qualifying the holder to vote the poll tax payment serves good purposes. Something like a million dollars should be added to the school fund if all who should pay do so, and the county funds will benefit to half that amount. The poll tax money is "earmarked" by law and can be used for no other purpose, so that the payment of this comparatively small levy does more real good than many other taxes.

In order to be valid for voting the tax must be paid before the first day of February. It might be well to not wait, or if money is not handy at the moment, it would be advisable to begin to set aside in small amounts so that before January ends the necessary receipt may be in hand. (San Angelo Morning Times)

DELINQUENT PARENTS

The fruits of parental delinquency of a decade ago are shown in the report of the Texas Public Safety Department, which shows that during the last three months 3,000 persons under the age of 25 years were responsible for 52 per cent of the murders, criminal attacks, robberies, burglaries and felony thefts. The charge against parents is more specific in the figures that 27 per cent of the crime was charged to youths under 20.

The nature of crimes laid to young persons evidences the lack of control upon them in the home and the failure to instill in the children the cardinal principles of honorable and decent living. The offenses of murder and assault are founded upon the ascendancy of the passions over the intellect and reason, and the idea underlying offenses of property is that a person may steal what might presently be more difficult for him to obtain honestly.

The inescapable parental obligation must be viewed from the position that the child is not here on his own choice and that the burden falls entirely upon the parents until he reached the point of maturity where he can be held responsible for his own acts. The 3,000 offenders under the age of 25 means there are 6,000 parents who actually were delinquent before the children who were caught by the law. The cure of crime by the young lies in eradicating the source in the home.

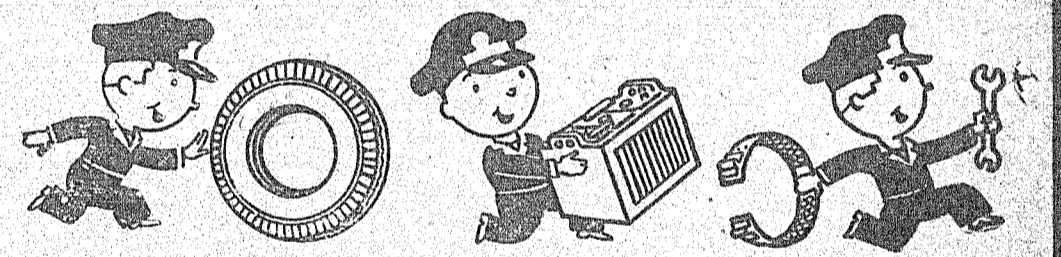

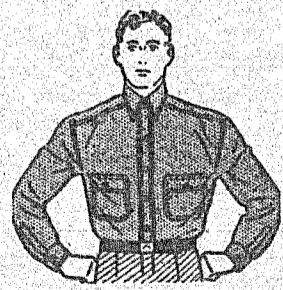

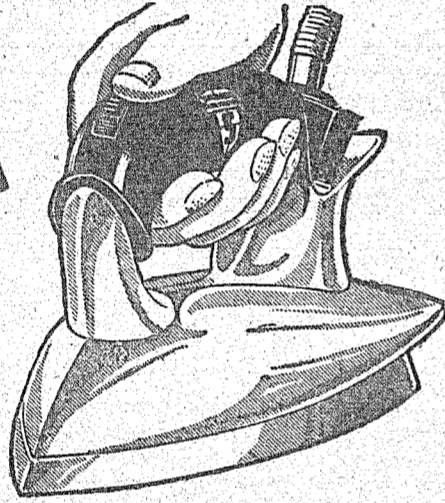

 or additional report or estimate shall be made unless authorized by law or by resolution of the Committee on Flood Control of the House of Representatives or the Committee on Commerce of the Senate: AND PROVIDED FURTHER, That the Government shall not be deemed to have entered upon any project for the improvement of any waterway mentioned in this Act until the project for the proposed work shall have been adopted by law.

Oral statements will be heard, but for accuracy of record all important facts and arguments should be submitted in writing.
