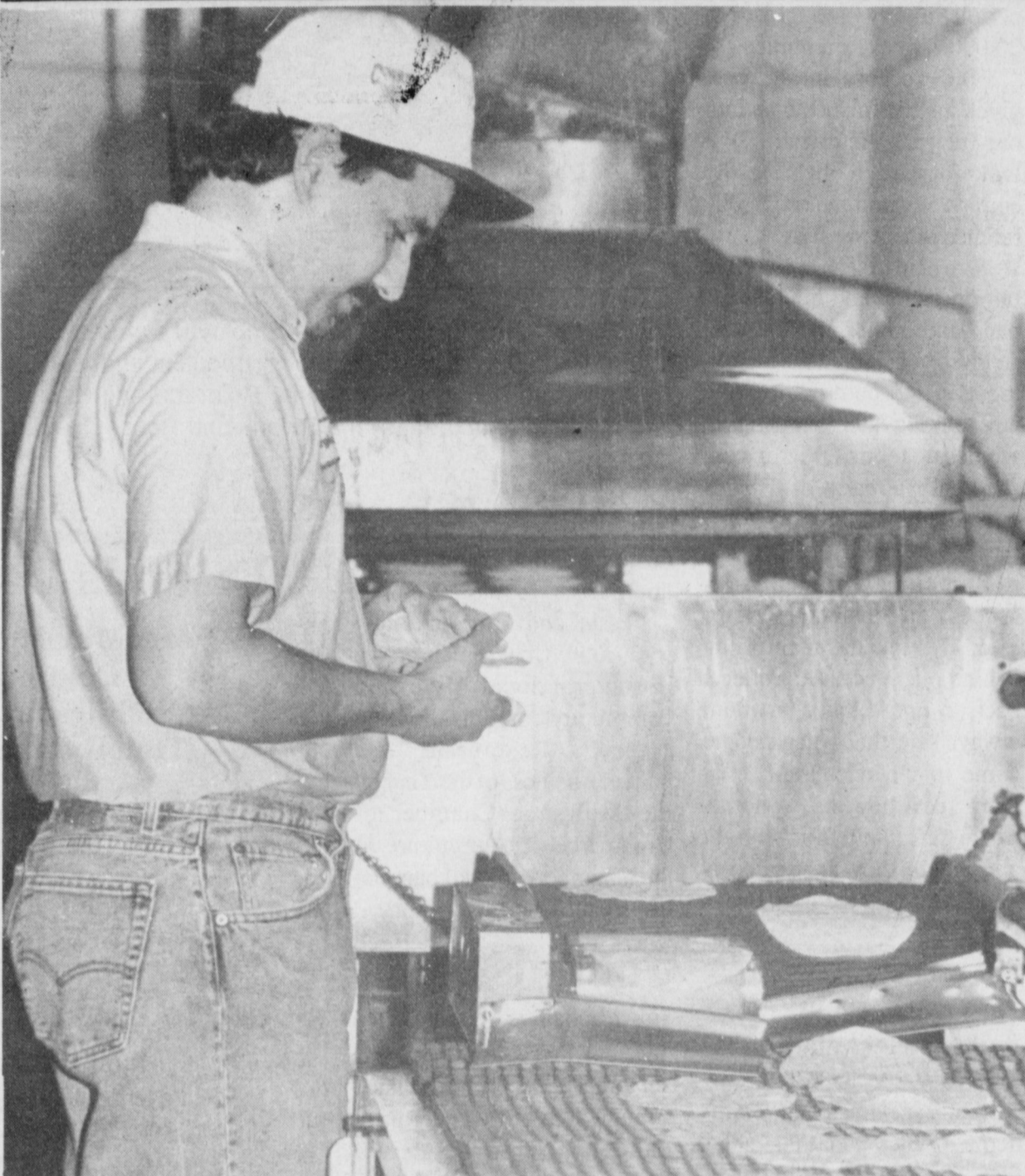
County attorney expected to resign at meeting Monday

Leal's business grows with family

When Jessie and Irma Leal of Muleshoe purchased a tortilla machine in 1957, little did they know that it was only the beginning of a successful business that would grow along with their six children.

What started as a small business venture, has grown into a chain of nine restaurants and a tortilla factory where thousands of tortillas are distributed each week in four states. The Leal's business is all based in Muleshoe.

"It all happened in such a way that the kids grew up and began to open their own businesses (restaurants)," Jessie said, reflecting how it all started.

"We opened a small tortilla factory and branched out," he said. "We started selling food and then started the restaurant business in small ways."

The first Leal's Restaurant was opened in Muleshoe in 1957. The restaurant outgrew

its former location and was moved to 1600 American Blvd. last December. The tortilla factory is located on West Ash Street.

The decision to buy the tortilla machine in the late 1950's was not easy. Jessie said it took he and his wife a year to save \$1,200, and they were split between buying a house or using the money as a down payment for the tortilla machine.

At the time, they lived in a small apartment with the one child they had then. They chose to buy the tortilla machine.

Texas farmers warned about Russian wheat aphids

The 1994 crop year is just under way and already Texas wheat farmers are reporting infestations of the Russian wheat aphid (RWA), one of the costliest pests they face. Wheat farmers in Texas and other states are now on watch for this pest.

While it didn't reach the U.S.

until 1986, by 1991 this aphid had caused economic losses totalling over \$670 million across 16 states. That statistic, from a RWA task force of the Great Plains Agricultural Council, reflects an analysis of yield losses, control costs, and the ripple effect when farmers had less money to spend.

Infestations significantly decreased after 1990. But the pest looms as a threat because of its hardy nature and ability to quickly spread and multiply. With yield reductions of up to 50 percent in some areas, RWA is a significant pest problem.

As with any insect problem, a comprehensive approach to

control is important, according to Ralph Gantz, DowElanco field development scientist in Lubbock, Texas.

Scouting is critical because of the aphid's ability to quickly spread. "During sluggish crop growth periods, scouting once every two weeks should be sufficient," he said. "But once

warmer weather arrives, and particularly if aphids are identified, weekly scouting is recommended."

The key period for protection is when the plant's flag leaf develops during early boot stage. RWA attacks wheat by

Victor Leal and his wife Debbie now own the original Leal's Restaurant in Muleshoe after purchasing it from his parents in 1992. Victor said, "My grandfather on my mom's side used to make tortillas and had an established route in a small neighborhood in the valley (south Texas)."

"My parents bought the tortilla machine in the valley and moved to Muleshoe," he said.

When they moved to Muleshoe in 1955, Jessie worked for Barrett Produce and Irma worked at Sears. Jessie has also worked for the railroad.

Jessie and Irma began to sell tortillas to migrant farm workers in the Bracero Program in Muleshoe. Soon, they began to make menudo and barbecue and started getting requests for dishes like enchiladas. So they began a full-scale restaurant. At the time, it was the only restaurant between Clovis and Lubbock, Victor said.

The Leal's six children - Hector, Alma, Victor, Laura, Sergio and Abel - all worked at the family restaurant in Muleshoe, from the time they

were old enough to clean tables.

Today, the Leals have five family-operated restaurants and four company-owned restaurants, as well as the tortilla factory.

Family owned restaurants are located in Hobbs, NM, Plainview, Muleshoe, Clovis, NM, and Brownfield. Company-owned restaurants, which are called Leal's but are not operated by the family, are located in Andrews, Monahans and two in Lubbock.

Hector runs the restaurant in Plainview; Alma runs the restaurant in Brownfield; Victor runs the restaurant in Muleshoe; Laura runs the restaurant in Clovis, N.M.; and Sergio and Jessie operate the tortilla factory. Another brother, Abel, is currently a student at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, majoring in pre-law.

According to Sergio, Leal's Tortilla Factory distributes about 70,000-80,000 corn tortillas a week in Texas, New Mexico Colorado and Kansas. The factory has six employees.

About 60 percent of the

tortillas are distributed to the Leal's restaurants. The remaining 40 percent are distributed to other restaurants and wholesalers.

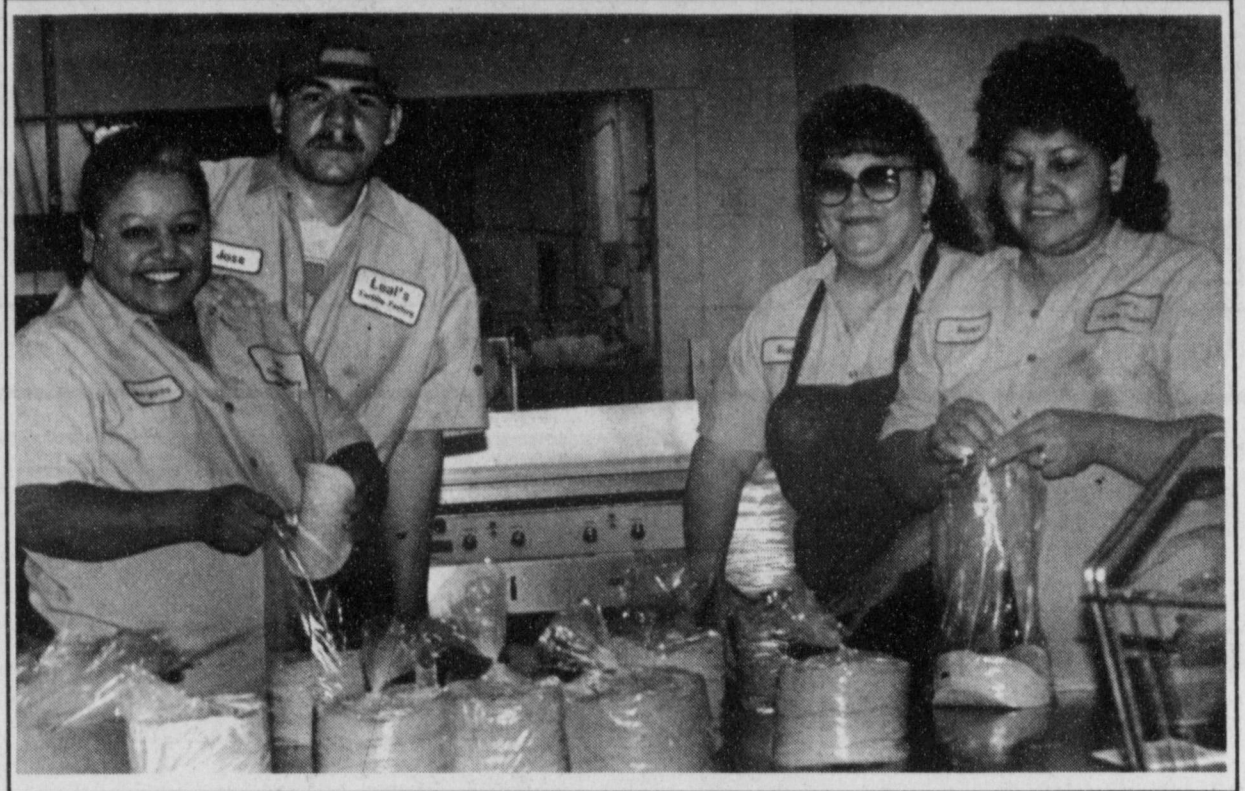
Leal's Restaurant in Muleshoe has 30 employees at present. According to Victor, Leal's serves about 3,500 people a day and close to 20,000 a week, combined.

"Our success in the past gives an optimistic look into our future," Victor said. "We look forward to helping the community and making a difference where we live."

"We plan to seek to improve our operation and hope to expand into other food-related fields to help increase employment in the community. We are looking at expanding in wholesale foods," Victor said.

Leal's already distributes tamales, in addition to tortillas.

Summing up the Leal's success in business, Victor said, "I think the main thing behind our success all reflects back to one thing. Our mom always said that when people come to the restaurant, treat them like they are at home. Make sure their food is right and where they are seated is good. Her philosophy always

Jessie and Irma are now semi-retired, but remain active in several local civic and community organizations.

attaching to young, growing leaves seeking nourishment from the plant's sugary sap, or its "plumbing system". As it takes this food, the aphid introduces a toxin from its salivary juices that interferes with plant photosynthesis.

One symptom is leaf streaking, caused by reduced chlorophyll production. Another sign is leaves rolled up tightly around the pests; this actually protects the aphids from

predators and inclement weather.

Until now, Gantz said, most farmers have treated after 10 percent to 15 percent of the crop's tillers are infested. Work is under way by a group of university entomologists from five Western States to develop a more precise procedure for determining an economic threshold.

It will include variables such as projected crop value (based

on grain prices), weather conditions and application costs.

"The Russian wheat aphid thrives during dry weather," said Gantz. "However, many insecticides rely on systemic action to control insects like aphids, and control from those products can be limited by dry conditions. When a drought-stressed plant's juices aren't readily flowing, a systemic insecticide can't easily move throughout the plant to protect it."

In boy's doubles, Isaac Miramontes and Colby Latham placed 3rd. On girl's singles, Stephanie Quintana placed 3rd.



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
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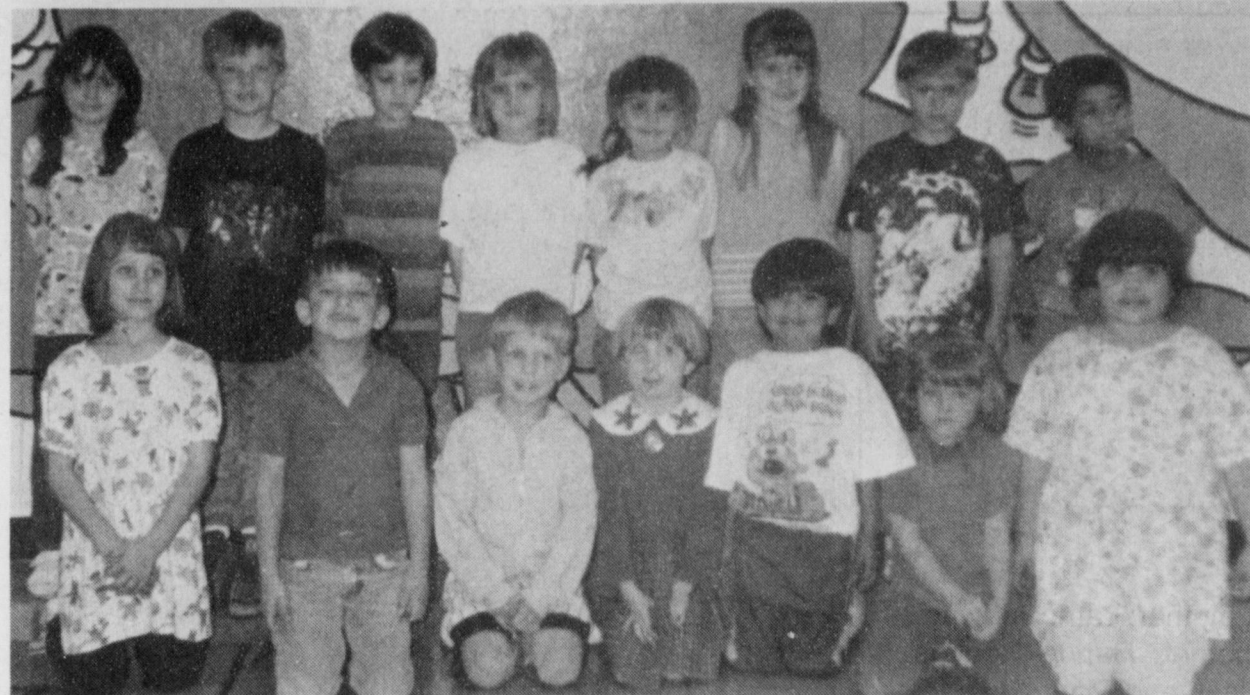

SCS gives tips on wildlife enhancement

Lesser Prairie Chickens are making a come back in Bailey County. They are being seen more since there has been so much acreage planted to grass.

Prairie chickens prefer rangeland where buffalo grass and a slight rise in the ground is located for their courtship area.

Prairie chicken cocks will drum in the same area year after year for hens.

Prairie chickens feed largely on grasshoppers and on corn (maize) in the winter.

Bob white quail like brushey range areas, hollows, fence rows and corners near fields.

Blue quail like more open

range, old farmsteads a well as corners and fence rows. Insects make up about 40 percent of a quail's diet, Weed seeds and small grains make up the rest.

A pheasant's diet is similar to quail and prairie chicken, but have a preference for cultivated land.

Land owners interested in attracting or increasing the number of birds on their place need to remember food, cover and water are essential.

Do not burn off playas and tailwater pits. Leave two to four rows of grain unharvested for a food plot and brush piles undisturbed.

No laws declared to govern repair shops

Texas does not have comprehensive laws specifically governing auto repair shops. But the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act and Consumer Protection Act make the following practices illegal:

*Representing that used or reconditioned parts are original or new;

*Basing a charge for repair on a warranty instead of on the value of the actual repairs. A written statement must list separate charges for the value of the work and the value of the warranty;

*Representing that parts have been replaced or work has been done when nothing has been replaced or done;

*Knowingly making a false or misleading statement of fact concerning the need for repairs, parts, or replacements.

If you have an auto repair problem that the shop will not

correct, our Consumer Protection Division offers a mediation service. It seeks a resolution between the consumer and business by acting as an inter-

mediary.

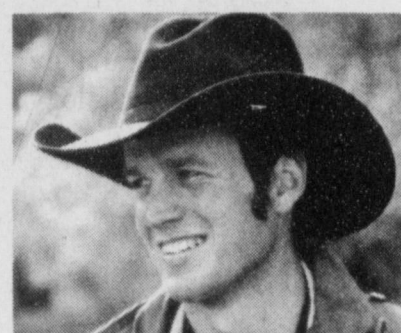
In 1987, Cox attended a sculpture workshop at the Cowboy Artists of America

Now that spring is here, the con artist comes out and preys on homeowners' concerns for safety and upkeep of their houses. These thieves typically use scare tactics, such as dire warnings that the chimney is about to crumble, the furnace is about to explode or the driveway needs to be sealed.

Older folks are especially vulnerable to slick-talking peddlers. The con artist befriends lonely consumers, preys on their fears of eminent danger and then pressures them into signing away large sums of money before they can check

out the offer.

Some of the tactics used are offering an unbelievable low price for a repair job because the company claims it has leftover materials from another job or using old motor oil as a driveway sealant which looks good going on, but creates a harmful mess. Consumers can protect themselves by calling us at 763-0459 and checking the company out before doing business with them.

Older citizens living alone are likely targets of fraudulent prize and sweepstakes promoters who prey on older folks'

hopes of winning big prizes or large amounts of money.

The con artist's spiel is tailored to befriend lonely senior citizens, convince them they've won a prize, then use high-pressure tactics and false promises to dupe them into sending upfront money and fees. In the end, their free prize could end up being quite costly - if there is a prize to be had at all.

The Better Business Bureau has received reports that past victims of fraudulent prize and sweepstakes promotions were asked to give upfront money to a courier the promoter sent to

the house. Or, they were urged to send cash through an overnight delivery service, thereby avoiding the U.S. mail.

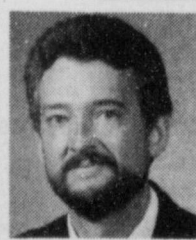

In an issue of *Leadership* journal, Peter Alwinson describes a photo he saw in *National Geographic*. The picture was of the fossil remains of two saber-toothed tigers who had obviously been "locked in combat." The accompanying article explained, "One had bitten deep into the leg bone of the other, a thrust that trapped both in a common fate. The cause of death of the two cats is as clear as the causes of the extinction of their species are obvious."

As is so often the case, nature can serve as a wise teacher for God's people. "When Christians fight each other," Alwinson observes, "everybody loses." And he alludes to Paul's somber words in Galatians 5:15: "If

you keep on biting and devouring each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other." The Revised Standard Version renders, "... take heed that you are consumed by each other."

Do you see the progression? If Christians follow their own proud and sinful natures rather than God's Spirit, first they begin snapping and biting at one another. Then, having developed a morbid appetite for their own kind, they proceed to devour each other until the feeding frenzy finally ends with all concerned being completely consumed. There are never any winners in an all-you-can-eat contest with a cannibal!

The New English Bible sums it all up: "If you go on fighting one another, tooth and nail, all you can expect is mutual destruction."

Jesus prayed for his disciples "that they may be one." Obviously, he did not mean that they should scrap and claw until only one was left! When the Christians in a single congregation or in an entire communion become addicted to strife, they do not end up being one. They end up being none.

Williamson lecture series set for April 14 at ENMU

The Eastern New Mexico University Williamson Lectureship Committee invites the community to attend the lectureship luncheon and panel presentation on Thursday, April 14.

Dr. Jack Williamson and special guest authors Fredrick Pohl, Connie Willis, and Roger Zelazny will appear in the panel presentation of "A Century of Science Fiction, 1926-2026." Dr. Williamson has published over 65 works of fiction, more than 125 stories, a critical study of H.G. Wells, an anthology

on the teaching of science fiction, as well as more than 150 pieces of essays and other pieces of non-fiction.

He began studying science at West Texas State in Canyon, Texas, then earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at ENMU, and later received his PhD at the University of Colorado.

His novel, *The Humanoids*, is considered a science fiction classic. Recipient of the Grand Master award for achievement, the Hugo, numerous recognitions of his contributions to his

field, and two-time president of the Science Fiction Writers of America, Williamson's career spans the life of the science fiction genre--from the pulps to its late-won respectability.

A professor at ENMU, Dr. Williamson taught one of the first science fiction courses offered in the United States. His career as an educator began at New Mexico Military Institute and later moved to Eastern.

Williamson retired in 1977, however, he continues to pub-

lish regularly, including *Beachhead* in 1992, *Demon Moon*, forthcoming in May, and another novel--working title *Black Sun*--in progress. Dr. Williamson is teaching a science fiction and fantasy course this semester and serves as a faculty advisor to the student creative writing organization, *The Round Table Writers Group*.

Fredrick Pohl, a long-time friend of Jack Williamson, is an author, editor, and literary agent. He has

Disaster loans available from SBA

A recent disaster declaration for businesses in Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Lamb and Parmer Counties has been expanded. Businesses depending on farmers and ranchers affected by drought, hail, high winds, and a tornado which occurred January 1 through July 14, 1994, can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA).

These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply.

To obtain an application, interested business owners may call the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired. The deadline for filing an application is June 8, 1994.
