SPRING CLEANING URGED BY MARSHAL TO PREVENT FIRES

State Fire Marshal S. W. English is insisting that every Texas city be thoroughly cleaned before the hot Summer winds come to make the fire hazard so great. City Fire Marshal E. E. Polk will co-operate in this work and is asking the aid of the people.

"There is no telling what time fire will cause here a conflagration similar to that at Grandview," he said. "We have the same cases of defective electric wiring to cause the fire and the same shingle roofs to spread it over the city and the same high winds."

"But we have the example of Grandview and other Texas cities to warn us to prepare for fire—to fight it before the match is struck, and if the people of this city will co-operate in the work we can make Santa Anna reasonably safe from such dangers. It is necessary that we have a Spring clean-up campaign at once and prepare for Summer and its fire dangers. No rubbish should be allowed to collect in alleys and back yards; nor should old boxes and barrels add to the dangers in the business parts of town.

"I am going to ask the women's clubs to co-operate with the city in the work for in other Texas cities the women are the ones who accomplish most at cleaning up. But the business men must do their part and even the children in the schools can aid. A clean city means a healthy city, too, and we have two reasons for this Spring clean-up.

"The State fire marshal's office in co-operation with the women's clubs, will endeavor to reduce the fire loss in Texas by 50 per cent per capita within the next ten years, and the people of Santa Anna must do their share."

Gladys Belle Oil Co. Ship 10 Cars Oil; Other News

The Gladys Belle Oil Company shipped 10 cars of oil this week to a Ft. Worth refinery. They are having some hard luck on the deep test well. Trying to set casing by a cave.

Garner Brothers report a fine showing of oil at 1380 ft. This well extends the field south two and one half miles. The well has been bailed out and is in good shape. They have set casing and are changing the water line while waiting for shooter. This well promises to be the best in the field. Many oil men have their eyes on this well.

The Prairie well is down to 1410, with a light showing of gas. They are trying to set casing thru a cave.

Jeff Myers Oil Company in the north eastern part of Concho county was showing gas at 400 feet, at 650 a showing of gas and oil, at 811 feet

they have set casing to drill in to sand. Geologists think this field will be equal to the Ranger or Parkburnett. They claim to have one of the largest structures in the state. It is a cross structure 7 miles wide and 14 miles long.

Woodward No. 1, derrick burned Monday evening about 6 p. m. Cause unknown. New derrick on way.

The Phippen well is drilling at 2000. This is one of the deep test wells and is being watched with much interest every where. They are reaching the depth that may bring something big.

The Texas Best Oil Company's attorney and agents are here this week, from the city of Houston, and are planning on some big things for Santa Anna. Mr. Johnson the attorney for the Company will make this his headquarters.

Mrs. S. D. Connor Has Gross Income \$1,506 From Hens and Cows

Mrs. S. D. Connor who lives two miles south of Coleman, keeps books on annual sales from her poultry yard and dairy barn. For the year just closed she has sold the products of 200 white leghorn hens for \$666.35; from 5 cows she sold dairy products to the amount of \$840.20. Total gross sales, \$1,506.55.

The gross income reported does not take into account the value of products consumed at home, which would be a considerable item in itself. The year's returns show what may be expected by efficient management and direction of the side-lines of the farm. It may be said, however, that the year just closed has been exceptionally favorable for the sale of poultry and dairy products. Practically all of Mrs. Connor's by-products of the farm were sold and consumed in the local market. One day's sale of eggs from Mrs. Connor's poultry yard, one day last week, to a local restaurant, totalled fifty-seven dozen.

The above news story is important, also, in its object lesson. It demonstrates the relation and co-dependency of the farm and the city, one upon the other.—Coleman-Democrat Voice.
