It has been said, there are more skunks this year than for any former year in the history of the county.

The fur-bearing animals mostly trapped in the Santa Anna territory are skunks, coons, ring-tails mink, oppossum and the minimum prices on the local market in Santa Anna usually run as follows, depending of course on the quality: Coons from \$3 to \$5, minks \$10 to \$12, possums \$1 to \$1.75, skunk \$1 to \$4 and rin tails \$1.50 round. FEBRUARY WILL BE VERY PECULIAR MONTH

By International News Service. February, 1920, will be a peculiar month.

February 1 falls on a Sunday, as does February 29th, the last day of the month.

There will be seven holidays in February—that is, for bankers and others, but for the common workman but five.

There are five Sundays in February and the custom, two legal holidays — Abraham Lincoln's Birthday and the anniversary of George Washington's birth.

Such a February has not been experienced since 1880, and there will not be a similar one until 1948, statistical fiends declare.

560 WELLS IN DECEMBER.

Texas had a total of 560 completions in December, of this number 462 being producing wells. The total initial or flush production of the good wells completed in Texas reached an aggregate of 224,135 barrels. The Texas total production for December was 9,013,669 barrels.— Comanche Enterprise.

TEXAS COTTON BUSINESS.

Galveston has an out put of one-third of all the cetton that is sent out of the U.S. The cotton receipts at that port passed the 1,500 000 bale mark last week, according to the Galveston Cotton Exchange. Local receipts at all the ports in the U. S. are shown to be 4,732,706 bales. Therefore Galveston total is almost one-third of the entire aggregate.




