BAILEY OIL WELL AT-TRACTS THE PUBLIC

The shooting of D. R. Bailey's Low well has been delayed indefinitely by the wet weather, which made it impossible for a man to come here by automobile from Cisco to superintend the shooting of the well. Mr. Bailey said as soon as the roads become passable so that the work can be done, the well will be given a big shot to test its value.

The Low well has been attracting considerable attention during the past few days as a result of a very good showing of oil beneath a very wet gas. The gas sand was eighteen feet above the oil showing, and is yielding million feet daily of the wettest kind of gas. Mr. Bailey says that a 2370 feet a porous lime was entered with a good showing of oil, and that eight feet of this has been drilled.

The well has been one of the driest which has ever been drilled in the county, only two strata yielding any water at all before the lower gas sand was reached.

At this time it is impossible to ascertain the value of the Low well. It is believed, however, that a well-placed shot will develop it into a splendid paying producer, although it may not make big production. The topography of the country, together with the logs of wells drilled in that part of the county, show this well to be on a splendid structure and if present showing of oil proves to be not worth further development after the test of a shot is given, the well will be continued for several hundred feet before reaching Ellenberger lime.

The Bailey well is about 12 miles northeast of here and has been attracting considerable attention from the big oil men.

The Bailey well out on the Lowe farm about two miles above Thrifty and five miles south of the Jim Ned well was reported in this week. Early in the week the report was three thousand cubic feet of gas and a wonderful spray of oil. They intend to shoot this well immediately and already it promises to be one of the best. This well is only about two and one-half miles from Coleman and Brown county line and hope she puts out the oil. Now, it is as good Gilliam No. 1 or better.

Also a gas well was brought in late Saturday afternoon but full particulars could not be obtained.

NORTHERN MAGAZINE BOOSTS SANTA ANNA

According to a report by H. J. Parker, manager of the Parker Sand Co., Santa Anna, Texas, that city lies in a very rich deposit of material suitable for the development of almost any kind of a rock products industry.

The top of Santa Anna mountains are covered with a layer of limestone, from 14 to 20 ft. thick which is suitable for the production of building stone, crushed stone, lime, or the manufacturing of cement. This deposit is near the surface and it is said that it would be easy to work.

A bed of brick shale several acres in extent and 20 ft. in depth makes a very high quality of brick by either the stiff mud or dry press processes.

The Parker Sand Co., owns some 200 acres with two strata of a good grade of silica sand each 40 ft. deep. At present their output is being shipped to Wichita Falls to be used in the manufacturing of window glass.

It is believed, however, that the town of Santa Anna would make a good site for a glass factory because of the closeness of high-grade material, the suitability for shipment in either the direction of New Orleans or San Francisco, and the abundance of natural gas fuel and soft water supply.

Since the raw material for the production of glass, lime, crushed stone, cement and brick are all contained on one piece of property, Mr. Parker is anxious to correspond with some one interested in a location for their production.—Rock Products.

COUNTRY HEALTH TOPICS.

Doctor Elizabeth Allison, a widely known lecturer on health subjects, says that the greatest health necessities for women and girls are health education and physical examinations. Writing in the official Y. W. C. A. journal, Doctor Allison says:

"From memory's notebook I can say that the most pronounced physical defect of health of country girls and women has been the result of neglecting the teeth, both through lack of cleanliness and by delay in having work done by the dentist.

"Faulty posture, I think, ranks second. We have noted with pleasure the good carriage of our country boys as they returned from war.

"Probably no people have more colds than the country women and girls. They are often overheated in the house because they wear too much clothing. Cold sponge baths are a fine preventative.

"Have we, as country women, permitted the programs at farmers' institutes and similar gatherings to be a discussion of animal and vegetable well-being without a section for human well-being? Let me suggest some subjects for individual study or group discussion:

"What should be the height and weight of a girl or boy, each year of age?"

"What constitutes a balanced ration?"

"Clothing, its uses and abuses.

"Drugs, their limited use.

"Individual and community recreation.

"Social relationships; boy and girl standards.

"Have demonstrations of good posture, good feet, good shoes. Write to the Bureau of Social Education, Division of Health, National Board, Y. W. C. A., 600 Lexington-avenue, New York, for literature covering the above and other related subjects."

If you believe that a county superintendent should be selected with reference to his ability to give the schools of the county the most efficient service and you believe I can do that, I shall most sincerely appreciate your support.

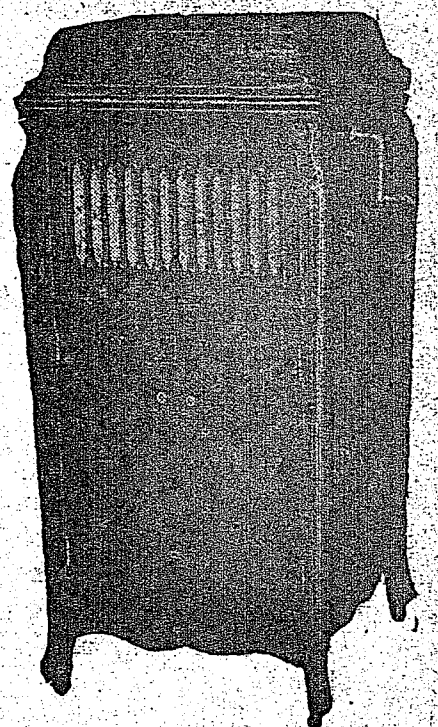

CONGRESS ADJOURNS; RATIFICATION FAILS

MILD RESERVATIONISTS REFUSE TO JOIN DEMOCRATS, THUS BLOCKING COMPROMISE

Washington.—Failing after three attempts to ratify the peace treaty the senate has laid it aside, ended the special session, and went home.

All compromise efforts to bring ratification failed, the three resolutions of ratification all going down by overwhelming majorities. The republican leaders offered a resolution to declare the war with Germany at an end, which was referred to the foreign relations committee.

Two of the three ratification votes were taken on the resolution drafted by the republican majority, containing reservations which President Wilson had told democratic senators in a letter would mean nullification of the treaty. On each of the votes, most of the democratic supporters of the treaty voted against ratification.

Republican Leader Lodge declared the voting constituted a final decision on the peace treaty unless President Wilson circumvented the senate rules by withdrawing it and then submitting it again to the senate.

One effect of the senate's failure to ratify the treaty will be the continuation of various war-time laws and regulations at least until the new session opens. Among these is the war-time prohibition act.

Avenues of speculation leading many ways were opened up when officials and diplomats turned over in their minds the possible results, at home and abroad, that are to follow termination of the special session of congress without senate ratification of the peace treaty.

The thoughts of the treaty's friends in the senate centered on accomplishing some compromise for a ratification in the session beginning Dec. 1, and to that end steps have been taken to ask that President Wilson ascertain from the other powers what reservations they would accept.

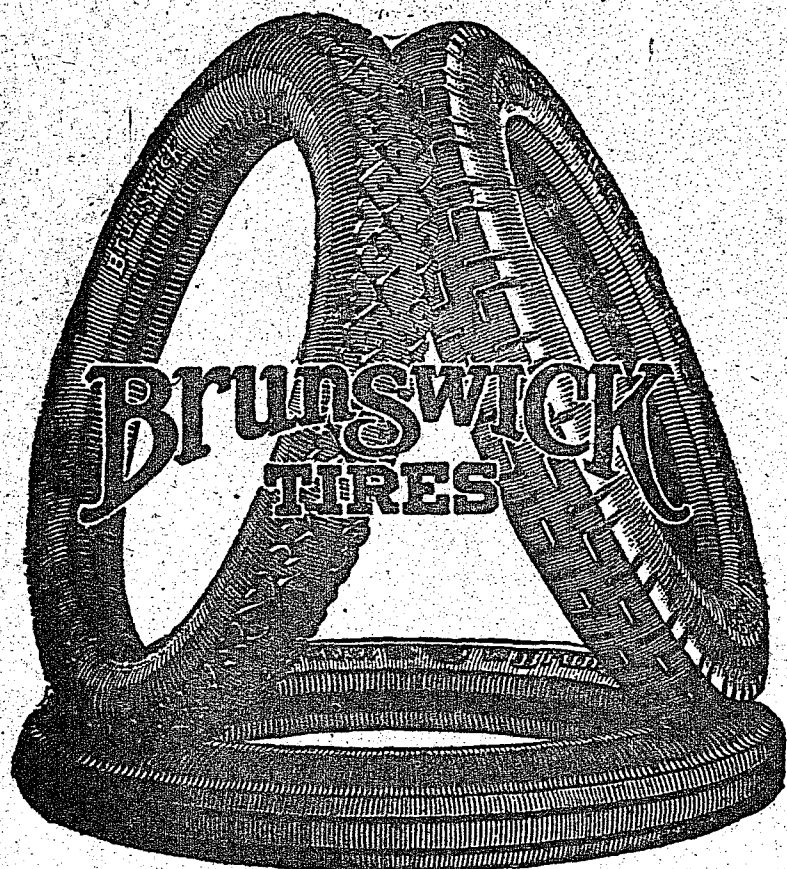

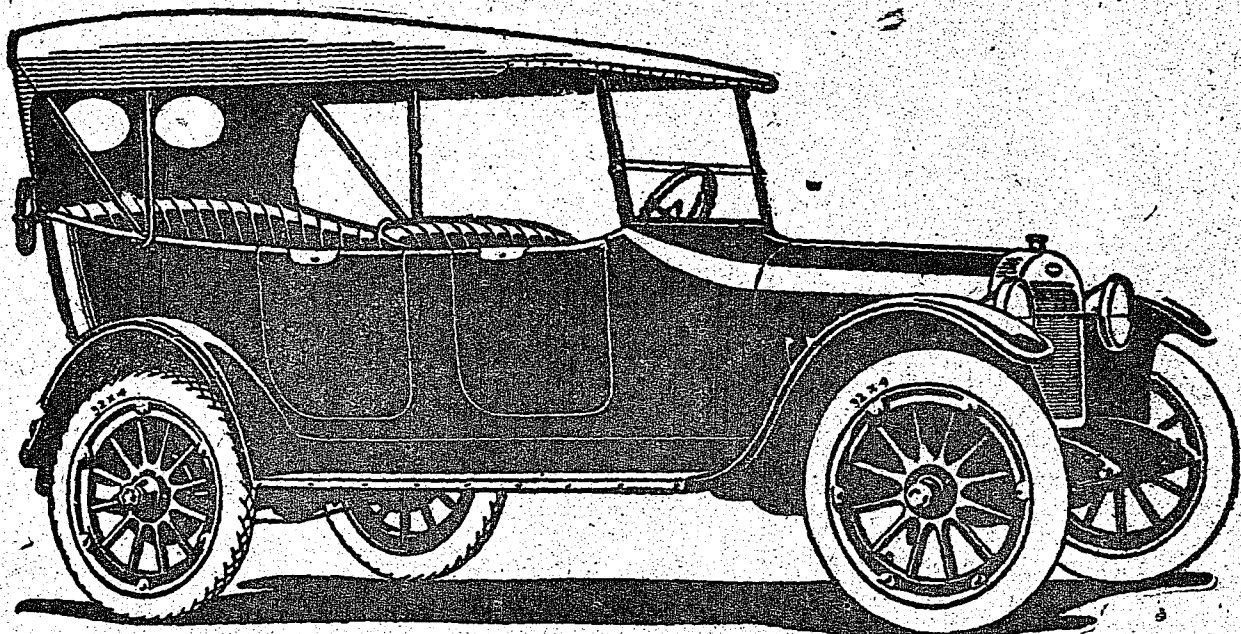

Street Tax Notice

Chapter sixteen of the Civil Ordinance of the city of Santa Anna provides that all male persons between the ages of 21 and 45 years residing in the City of Santa Anna are liable and it is thereby made the duty to work the streets and alleys of said City, not to exceed five days in any one calendar year.

This applies to all persons who are not exempt by state law from road service.

Under the law each person is granted the privilege of paying three dollars (\$3.00) to the city Secretary on or before the first day of April as road tax and said person shall be exempt from road duty for the current year.

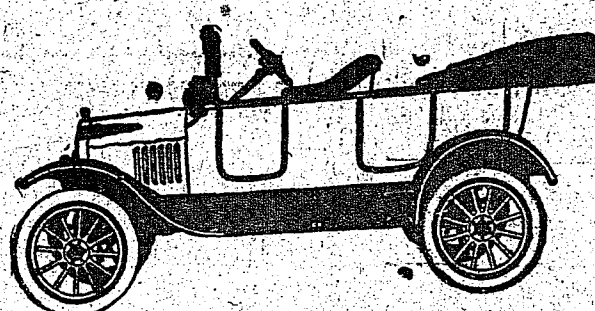
