Ashia provides that all male Si persons between the ages of 21 and 45 years residing in the City of Santa Anna are liable and it is thereby made their duty to work the streets and alleys of said City, not to exceed five days in any one calender year.


This applies to all persons who are not exempt by state law from road service.

Under the law each person is granted, the privilege of paying three dollars (\$3.00) to the city Secretary on or before the first day of April as road tax and said person shall be exempt from road duty for the current year.
