MORE OIL WELLS FOR COLEMAN COUNTY

We understand that C. E. Roth of Independence, Kansas, who is now drilling on the Over-all tract near Valera, in this county, will start the erection of a rig in the near future. The exact location was not known at this writing. It will be in the western part of the county, we understand.

There has been several California and Wyoming companies, making extensive leases here. It is expected that they will start drilling some time in January. There will be quite a bunch of wells go down after the first of January in our field.

SANTA ANNA GAS PIPED TO SAN ANGELO

A proposition is underway to pipe Santa Anna gas to San Angelo for commercial and home use from wells in our famous gas fields.

It was stated that San Angelo would not be asked to put up a bonus but would be expected to subscribe \$500,000 in first mortgage seven per cent bonds. The total cost of the pipe line to this city and of the distributing system would cost in excess of \$1,000,000, it is estimated. It was brought out at the meeting what the price of gas would likely be. At Brownwood and Santa Anna the rate is fifty cents per 1,000 feet. They took no final action in regard to approving the proposition but deferred the matter until more definite data can be furnished.

BRINKLEY CORPORATION ACQUIRES BRICK PLANT

The Morris brick plant in Coleman which has been inoperative for some time, has been purchased by the Brinkley Brick and Tile Mfg. Co., and will be greatly enlarged as soon as labor can be secured for the work.

The Brinkley Company is capitalized for \$1,000,000. Mr. Frampton is superintendent in charge of construction and operation and is now on the ground. A part of the new factory will include a \$75,000 plant for the manufacture of sewer tile. White brick will also be manufactured from the sand of Santa Anna mountain. Natural gas will be used as fuel in the new factory. —Democrat-Voice.

Cotton Receipts Heavy; Farmers Holding Cotton

Public weigher, J. E. Watkins, announced that he had weighed 9000 bales up to January 1st.

There are now 3400 bales on the yard unsold—being held for better prices. There is about 125 of cotton coming in every day and most of this is being carried home or left at the yard unsold. Some of the farmers are very optimistic, believing the price will go higher as soon as the holidays are over and everybody gets back on the job.

Most of the farmers are out of debt, and have a nice bank account. This speaks good for Coleman county progressive farmers.

Bishop James Wise of the Episcopal diocese of Kansas is the leading advocate of advertising in his church. Bishop Wise has announced emphatically that the press should be a great medium for the message of Christianity and that churches should advertise their services as intelligently and persistently as a merchant advertises his wares. The bishop was a member of the press committee at the triennial general convention of the church in Detroit and since then has been touring the middle West speaking in the interest of the Episcopal church's nation-wide campaign.

To carry out his ideas, Bishop Wise early inaugurated church advertising throughout his diocese, and as a result was able to inform the communicants concerning the progress of the church's nation-wide campaign when it was proposed to launch one big movement to provide men, women and funds for the expansion and extension of all the Episcopal church's activities, especially missions, religious education and social service.

PLAN BIG COMMUNITY HOUSE

A plan for a community house to cost with its equipment nearly \$100,000 in connection with the work of the Western Theological seminary, is one of the chief details of the budget approved for the Chicago diocese in connection with the nation-wide campaign of the Episcopal church. The seminary is known throughout the United States for the number and value of clergymen it sends out annually. The new community house will be of interest, not only to the social workers in the great slum districts of Chicago, but to every community in the country in that it will give the candidates for Holy Orders much practical insight and experience into this phase of the great work for the church for which they are studying.

Over 99 Per Cent Growth.

An interesting sidelight on the nation-wide campaign of the Episcopal church is contained in the budget of the Chicago diocese just completed. In explaining the purposes to which the fund of \$502,475 a year sought there for the next three years, is to be put, it is pointed out that less than 1 per cent of this amount is to be used for debts "and this upon conditions which require a fourfold reciprocity on the part of the beneficiaries."

WHAT THE FUTURE SCHOOL MUST BE

Certainly the future school should be:

1. A Healthatorium—I put this first, as money spent for individual health and public health is the very best investment the state can make. Every pupil should know how to prevent all preventable diseases. Some 50 years ago old Dr. Parker of England said, "When any one dies of typhoid fever some one should be hanged." Some 20 years ago I proposed an amendment to this by putting it "When any one dies of typhoid fever either his doctor or his teacher, one or both should be hanged."

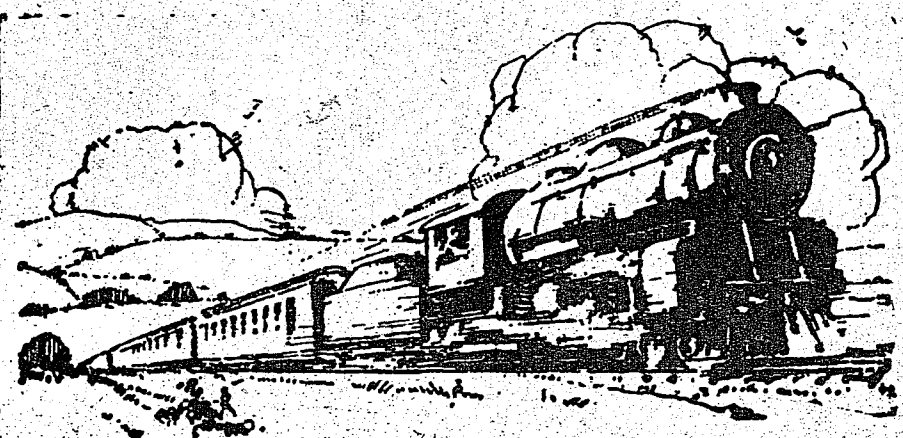
After I have given my child to the state for 15 to 20 years, the state has no right to return him to me with flabby muscles, hollow chest, weak lungs, weak eyes (wearing glasses), using habit-forming drugs (including coffee and tobacco) and with no knowledge of how to protect himself or his community from preventable diseases.

2. A Self-Supporting Industry—I doubt it is wise to support

any child, and especially any boy, in school after he is 17 years old. The school should not only teach him how to live, but how to make a living. In the most widely known industrial school in the United States the students actually "lay up money," and the principal is their banker. An aristocracy and militarism give way to democracy, the coddled school with its lazy, or at best bookloving pupils must give way to the self-supporting colony of workers.

3. A Self-governing Organization.—Instead of reading about civil government and constitutions, the school of the future will have a student-made constitution and laws, and all these laws will be interpreted and enforced by the student body. Every form of government met with in nation, state, and municipality will be practiced in the school, and the pupil will come home a citizen, not a soldier; a worker, not an idler.

4. A Social Center Indeed.—And that social center must have its public baths, its kitchen and its attractive dining room, its picture shows and play places, as

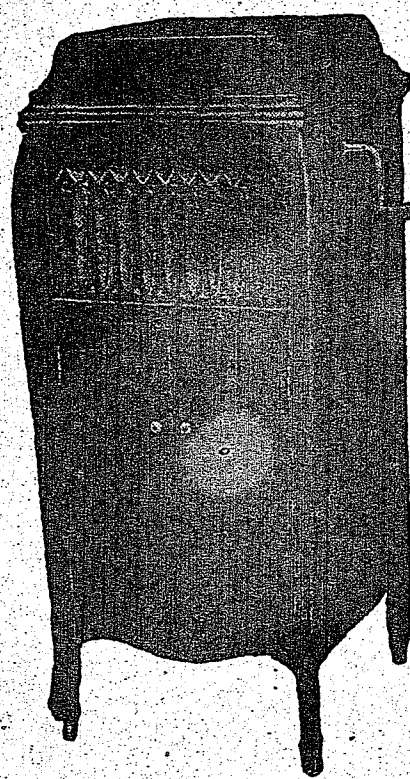

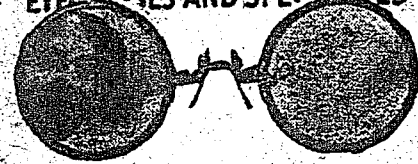

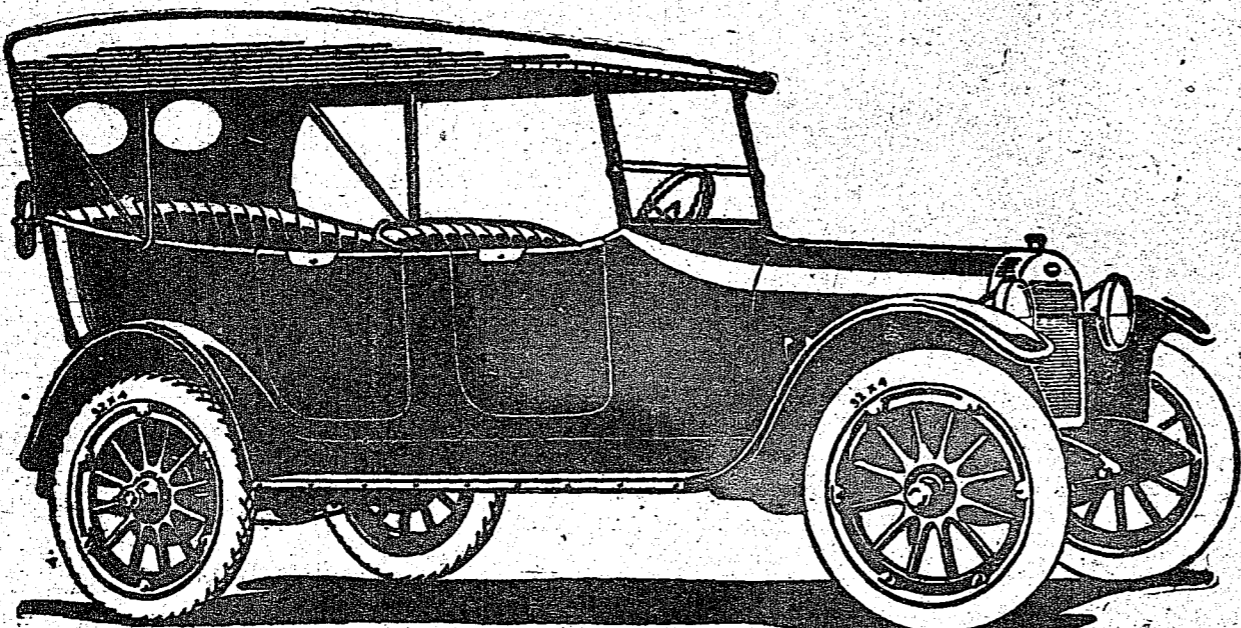
