So much for prophecy. When it comes to facts, it does seem that Russia's latest adventure has served to clarify the European situation. Germany and Russia apparently really are allies and are working close together in questions of policy, even though their troops have not fought side by side. The small nations are definitely line ed up now on the side of the democracies. And Italy has just about severed the Rome-Berlin axis. The Italian press denounced Russia's Finnish invasion. and uniformed fascists held
