The Boy Scout Movement was founded in America thirty years ago this week. Most of us have watched it grow and gain in influence, with great satisfaction. It is something vital to "The American Way" and through three decades, its service has gained the confidence of all people.

It would be difficult to point to any single quality of the Movement and say with positiveness, "Here is what makes Scouting great." But in our judgment one of its outstanding contributions to the nation, particularly in these times of world travail, is its simple-minded Twelfth Scout Law. It epitomizes all that we as a people stand for, that our forefathers pioneered for when they were fashioning a safe homeland out of a wilderness.

Read its stirring words. They are worth memorizing and more than that, they should be lived by all of us who have the high privilege of being Americans.

Here is the Twelfth Scout Law: A Scout is reverent.

He is reverent toward God. He is faithful in his religious duties, and respects the convictions of others in matters of custom and religion.

All Americans worthy of the name, all who believe in the Declaration of Independence, the Bill of Rights and the Constitution of the United States have an abiding faith in such a principle because it is their very guarantee that so long as it is a living thing they will always be free and independent.

Turkey Eggs From This Section Being Shipped at Brady

The turkey egg marketing season is under way in Brady, with 72,800 eggs already consigned to northern growers by the Brady Cooperative Poultry Association, thru the weekend.

Semi-weekly shipments on Tuesdays and Saturdays, will be throughout the remainder of the marketing season.
Growers received eighteen cents per egg for the first week's shipments. This week the price will be sixteen cents and the price will decline as the season advances.

Growers from Santa Anna, Rockwood, Coleman and Richardson Springs sell turkey eggs through the co-op at Brady. All shipments are handled through Brady.

FIVE COLEMAN RESIDENTS DIE IN TRAIN WRECK

Five members of the Ed Fine family, were killed when their light sedan was struck by a southbound Santa Fe passenger train at Coleman Sunday night.

Those killed, when the locomotive hit their car and carried it 50 to 75 yards were: Ed Fine, 32; Mrs. Ed Fine, 31; Marvene Lane, 16, a daughter of Mrs. Fine, by a former marriage; Phillip Legg, 3; and Janie Legg, 4, also children of Mrs. Fine, by a former marriage. Susie Bell Fine, 3, only survivor of accident, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fine. She suffered a broken leg and other injuries.

Ed Fine was a native of Coleman, having been born Nov. 29, 1907. He had lived in Coleman all his life and was employed by the Anzac Oil corporation as a truck driver and tool dresser. He and Mrs. Fine were married Dec. 30, 1936. They had been visiting his mother, Mrs. J. R. Fine, in Coleman Sunday and were on their way home at the time of the tragedy.

Funeral services for the five victims were held Tuesday at 3:30 p. m. from the J. E. Stevens Co., Chapel with the Rev. Floyd Chaffin, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Coleman officiating. Burial was in the Coleman cemetery.

NEW ROAD FROM SANTA ANNA TO THE BROWN COUNTY LINE PLANNED

Plans are being drawn in the district highway office at Brownwood for a new road from Santa Anna to the Brown County line. Contract on the 10-mile stretch is expected to be let within the next two months.

The plans call for a 22-foot black top asphalt highway to replace the present road, which is worn and needs straightening at two points.

NYA Project Here Offers Girls Varied Economic Program

The course offered to the girls of Coleman County by the NYA project at Santa Anna consists of Education and Life, including art in daily living, home decoration and furnishings, fundamentals of costume, design, grafting of patterns, the becoming style, the right line, the color which suits one best and personality courses.

Foods, problems in cookery, menu planning, problems personal and family standards of living, household economics or household employment and homemaking as a vocation, are covered in the courses, as well as the actual making of garments such as dolls and boys, crocheting, knitting, weaving, embroidering, construction of furniture from scraps of lumber and boxes, upholstering, curain and bed spread making.

In Art Education appreciation and practical problems, for an "Art for all" idea. As Mrs. Moseley, in charge of the project, states, "In a course in 'Art for All' practice is needed in discriminating, selecting, creating. It is not a matter of looking at lantern slides, but of actively working with real objects and of creating.

Process of reproduction, study and demonstration with simple block printing, leading to etchings, aquatints and lithographic crafts, including the use of scrap paper, cloth, bits of thread, strings, etc. for the making of attractive objects out of nothing (fruits, bowls, etc.), also of wood, clay, soap and plaster modeling and carving. Tied and dyed work, Batik, paper making and book making. Painting in temperas, transparent wash and oils.

The group plans to weave the drapes and rugs and do many creative projects for the Old Texas Rangers Home, using Indian and pioneer designs, which are in keeping with the locale. Cattle brands of the old Texas ranches will be used in several ways. Mrs. Moseley is particularly interested in this phase of the project since her father, the late Charles C. Taylor was a Texas Ranger at the age of 16.

Mrs. Moseley is a lecturer and recognized Texas artist as well as an adept in home economic practices. She holds several degrees, her last a Master's degree from Columbia University. She is a member of the American Association of University Women, also. Before coming to Santa Anna to take up the supervision of the Coleman County project, she was supervisor of the Art Education program sponsored by the Brownwood.

Mrs. Moseley urges the citizens of Santa Anna to call and become acquainted with the girls and the lovely things they are making.

Heart o' Texas News Briefs

A \$150,000 dial telephone system will be installed in Brownwood this year, officials of the Southwestern States Telephone company have announced. The dial equipment will be housed in a new, \$10,000 building. Present telephones will be taken out in July, the dial equipment set up in October and the cutover to the new system sometime in January, 1941.

Cotton earnings in Runnels county prior to January 16 totaled 13,673 bales from the 1939 crop. This compares with 26,140 bales for the same period the year before.

McCulloch county ranchers were notified last week by the AAA office that work has been started on the 1940 Range Conservation program. All producers who intend to participate in the 1940 program were urged to come to the AAA office and indicate in writing practices they intend to carry out in 1940.

Prior to January 16, McCulloch county producers had gained a total of 7,644 bales of cotton from the 1939 crop, according to a report by Richard R. Faulkner, U. S. statistician for McCulloch county. The figure was compared with 4,274 bales gained to the same date last year.

Reports received at Brown county agricultural offices last week indicated a large percentage of Brown county's winter grain crop was damaged by the freeze, but escaped actual destruction. The reports were not complete and conclusive, but most of the farmers who visited the Brown county Agricultural Conservation association offices, said they thought the heavy snow had saved their grain and winter cover crops from being killed by the freeze.

C. J. Anderson, assistant Brown county agent and agricultural engineer, has resigned his position to accept a job as hydraulic engineer with the Reconstruction Finance corporation at an increase in salary.

Complete program for the annual homecoming and the dedication of the new \$60,000 physical education building at Howard Payne college Saturday, February 17, was announced by Ben M. David, president of the alumni association and T. R. Havins, chairman of the program committee. Dedicatory address will be by Dr. W. R. White, pastor of the First Baptist church in Oklahoma City. The program from 9 to 10 a. m. Saturday will be broadcast by WRAP, Fort Worth. The radio program will include the address of Dr. White and songs by the Howard Payne choir under the direction of Chas. Russell. Closing Saturday's activities will be a basketball game at 7:30 between Howard Payne and Hardin-Simmons U.

Two hundred dollars was the average price put on Brown County's offering of 42 Herefords Tuesday by 30 buyers gathering in Brownwood for the annual registered auction. Eight Brown County breeding firms were represented in the cattle offering, but 26 of the animals were consigned by the firms of Largent and Harkrider and Cox & McEinnis. Other consigners were: John T. Yantis, Bob Fry, Porter J. Davis, Gerald Scott, M. E. Fry and Theron Huggins.

SANTA ANNA LIBRARY ACTIVE

Several educational books and three children's story books were donated to the Santa Anna Public Library by Mrs. J. R. Bannister this week.

Files show an increase of circulation of books from the library the last two weeks when 326 books were circulated in comparison to 236 being circulated the previous two week period.

The story hour each Saturday morning from 10 to 11 a. m. is very popular. It was started five Saturdays ago with three present and the fifth Saturday showed an attendance of fourteen.

WE RECENTLY FOUND OUT A dozen or so people had been receiving The News for several years without paying or expecting to pay for it. We have been able to locate only two or three of them so far, because some of the News subscribers pay and every two to five years and the locating of the deadheads made it necessary to notify every subscriber in town who was over two years in arrears to advise us of the true situation of his subscription. Three answered, one establishing his subscription had been paid during a recent subscription contest and the time not extended, two of them wanted the papers, were unable to pay now, but would do so when they could. These stay on the list. We don't know the true status of those not answering, and the only way to find out is to take the names off the list, and if they are not those who "told Mr. Gregg" several years ago to take their name off the list, we'll hear from them, probably with a big howling out. We are going to get rid of those who don't intend to pay and if those receiving notices don't care to co-operate with us in ditching the dead-beats, it's to be regretted. We do not wish to stop the paper to a single person who wants the paper, and we will more than meet the reader's way who wants the paper but is unable to pay for it. Whatever the situation, talk it over with us; help us and we'll help you. And a list of subscribers who WANT the paper will mean far more to both of us than a list that includes a number who never intend to pay because for several years they've received it for nothing. We are amazed and more than pleased with the fine list of legitimate subscribers we now have. For every one dropped we've added one or two new subscribers. Co-operation has been excellent from most, and we imagine the lack in most of the other cases has been because the subscribers didn't understand the why-forces. Reader interest and co-operation here has been the best we have seen in our almost forty years of newspaper work. We are trying to show that appreciation in practical ways, and cleaning out the subscription list so that only "bonafide" subscribers, whether they paid up or several years in arrears, are left on the list, as but a step in that direction. But we wish we had the entire list paid up, for an unpaid subscription is a dollar lent to the reader—the publisher pays in advance for what he gives you—and on that basis we have quite a good deal of money lent outright now, but it's coming in, slowly, thank you.

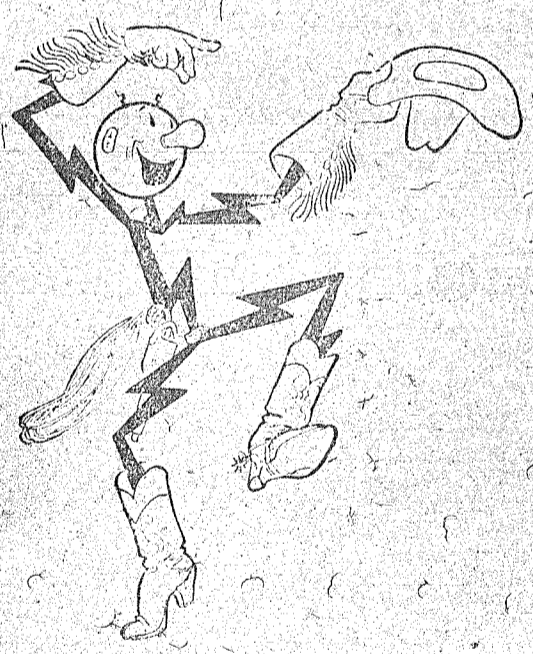
