Editorial

SMALL TOWNS OFTEN FIND it difficult to make "trade at home" campaigns bring proper results because too many of the merchants themselves cannot be cited for practical such as to be desired programs. Too many of the people of our own trade territory are lured by the government to go to the country seat for their general check and if they see any member of a local merchant's family buying over there they rightly figure that if Santa Anna merchants are going to cut each other's throats they have a right to do their trading there too. And of truth they are right. Of course for those things towns like this can't carry, one has to go outside and in the country is the first step. But remember, for every cent you deprive your home merchant of, your taxes are increased in a certain ratio, for if the merchant doesn't do enough business, to pay his usual high taxes, the others will have to make it up. You are part of the others.

Increasing human misery, poverty, destruction of business and efforts to demonstrate the joys of communism and government ownership of everything, including bodies and souls, seems to have made an impression on the left complacency of most of our public servants in Washington. They'll raise the debt limit to seventy-five billions, create another hundred or so bureaus, put ten or twenty million more on the relief rolls, and then solicit your vote to return them to the swill hotels in Washington.

AMONG THE DIFFERENCES TO be seen between Santa Anna and many other towns is this - and the observation is made as a justified fact, as you will agree. Most firms elsewhere advertise to increase business. Here most firms advertise to get their share of unadvised business when a seasonal demand or release of large sums of money occur. Few advertise to increase their income at these periods or at any other time. The opinion seems to be that at other than the seasonal period no one has money to spend or are not buying. Let them spend it, either in Coleman or Brookwood or in Dallas. Well, it may have money to spend in these places, why not try it at a point at home? Local advertising money is not put to any better use than in these other towns, as before pointed out, health is reported. From what we have seen, the reports are correct and Santa Anna is adding in building up the larger towns in a most commendable way.

THIS PAPER IS NOT CAPABLE of telling the government how to end its depression and solve the Natchez problem, but we believe that if Santa Anna merchants knew how to advertise to attract more business, they could do so. Some of the advertising methods used in the larger towns are being pointed out in this paper. It is not our job to do anything about the facts, and the government appointees who want to keep their jobs to date. Some means of track and experimental in

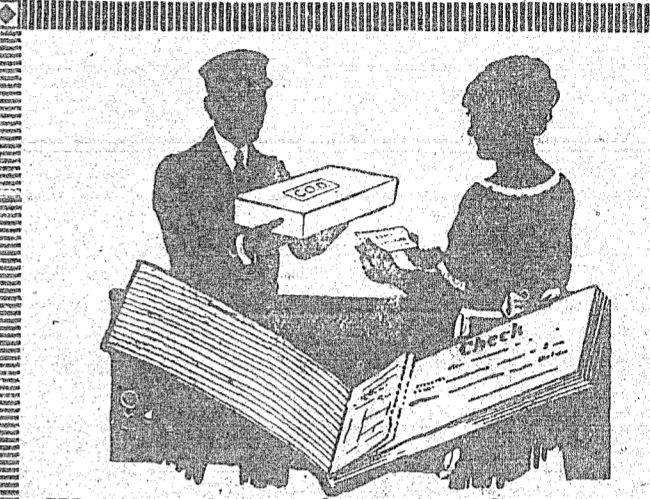

families with it. It will be some time yet before the complete equipment will be moved to Coleman. The firm has been located in Kilgore for the past eight years.

Coleman County's voting power is 88 votes greater this year than it was in 1938; with a total of 4,110 poll tax receipts, not including exemptions, to overs. First 1940 license plates have been sold by County Tax Assessor-Collector H. M. Brown to

Earl Davis, Novice, farmer, and C. E. Kingsbery, stock farmer of near Santa Anna.

Plans for construction of a dam across Pecan Bayou and establishment of a water distribution system in the town of Burkett have been submitted to the WPA for approval. The project calls for a total expenditure of \$66,419 would use 98 men, and would require 10 months to complete.
