



# **Homemaking** By Janet Thomas

When the pilgrims arrived on American shores, they found a land well developed with wild game, especially turkey. Because of the bountiful supply, these majestic birds were chosen by the settlers for their first thanksgiving table.

Turkey is still the number one favorite for this special holiday.

Turkey is one of the highest protein, lower calorie meats available. Also, it is always a more economical buy.

- As you get ready for your. Thanksgiving meal, there are several ways to thaw a turkey correctly and safely. This method of thawing will take 2 to 21/2 days for a 12 to . 16 pound turkey.

Another method to thaw the frozen turkey is in cool water. You will want to change the water frequently. For a 12 to 16 pound bird, this will require 6 to 7 hours.

The goal of turkey cookery is to have the meat completely done but still juicy and tender. Set the oven at 325 degree F. for roasting a turkey.

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Members of the National Federation of Independent Business have overwhelmingly approved of propsed legislation which would limit the length of time the federal government can require records to be retained to four

The proposal, sponsored by Congressmen Charles W. Stenholm and Jack Hightower, both Texas Democrats, was included in NFIB's latest Mandate vote on issues and was approved by 90 percent of members responding. Only seven percent opposed the proposal.

Stenholm and Hightower are currently working to obtain additional co-sponsors

"The measure had considerable support during this past session," commented Stenholm, "and with this type of strong backing from NFIB members, we expect to see it move rather quickly

through the channels." The bill would establish a four-year statute of limitations for business on recordkeeping and alleged civil violations of federal rules. regulations or laws. At present, businessmen are required to maintain records indefinitely and are subject to civil penalties without any thin limitations.

"This is one means to cut down the cost of doing business," Stenholm said. "and chip away a little at the inflation rate. The costs of compiling and maintaining unnecessary records are normally passed along to the end user of the product or service involved if that business is to remain solvent."

"NFIB estimated that, aside from tax records, there are more than 1,100 recordkeeping requirements that are imposed on small business each year." he continued. "While our bill
