To Concerned Taxpayers

ANSWER TO CONCERNED TAXPAYERS LETTER BY JAMES MIEARS, BOARD CHAIRMAN OF THE FEDERAL HOUSING AUTHORITY

I received the following letter October 24, 1980: James Mears: This letter comes from concerned taxpayers of Gorman. How can a farmer who grossed nearly \$100,000 last year live in the Federal Housing Project? Also, its our understanding that he pays less than \$100 per month rent. Is this in accordance with regulations to live in the Federal Housing Project? Our understanding of his situation may be wrong. If so, maybe you could publish your response for all to understand in the Gorman Progress.

Concerned Taxpayers The Housing Authority Board is very pleased to learn that people are concerned about the Federal Housing Projects. Perhaps you have not been concerned enough in the past as you should have--the regulations we are trying to work under are not new, but have been in effect for many years. The housing Authority is simply enforcing laws that the Federal Government has had on the books for a long time.

As for the reference to a farmer who grossed nearly \$100,000.00 that lives in the Housing Project: The law states that "There are eligible for admission only those applicants whose net family assets do not exceed \$10,000.00, unless such assets, together with the family's income, are not sufficient for it to obtain and maintain adequate accommodations on the private market." It is the responsibility of the Executive Secretary of the Gorman Housing Authority to perform a verification of each family that lives in one of the Federal Housing units each year, if they are under 62 years old, as to their net income, and six other determinations that the family must meet to remain in the unit. Every two years if the occupant is 62 or older.

say people who will pay this much for rent in the Housing Units will be trying to build a new house or buy another home in the near future.

Also as you would expect, in some instances a family will rent a unit when their income is low and due to a wife going to work or other reasons their family income increased. In this case their rent would go up in proportion to their income.

What I am trying to say is, the more a family unit makes the more they will pay in rent. The Executive Secretary will not, however, rent to a family whose combined net income exceeds \$10,000 annually or whose net family assets exceed \$10,000.00.

I will not try to go into all the aspects of eligibility, because it covers 13 pages of legal length paper, single spaced, but any person that would like to read the entire H.U.D. Law is welcome to come by the Gorman Housing Authority Office located in the lobby of the old Gorman Hotel.

I would like to mention again that the Gorman Housing Authority has been granted \$250,000.00 to remodel the Brandon Place Project and the Gorman Hotel Project, with actual work to begin around the middle of 1981. The Board is also asking for future grants that should be coming along as years go by.

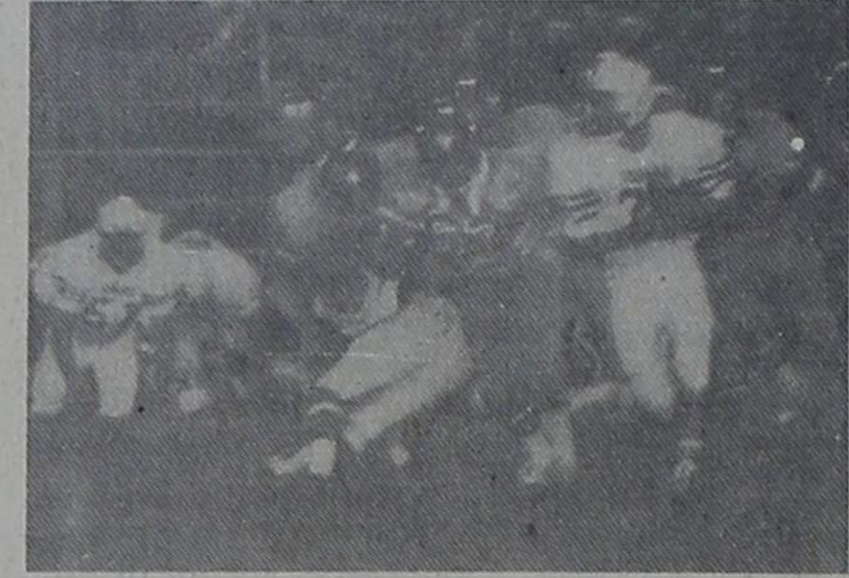

The Gorman Panthers continued their winning ways in District 7-A East on Friday night as they traveled to Rising Star to take on the Wildcats. The weather was rather cold and so were the Panthers for the first quarter. However, they warmed up in the second period and scored 14 points to make the half time score 20 to 6. Then they added another score in the fourth period to insure the victory by the score of 28-6.

The Panthers hit the scoreboard first with 3:08 left on the clock in the first period. Gorman took the ball on their own 40 and moved the distance in 6 plays featuring a 28 yard pass to Jimmy Johnson. Jimmy got the touchdown on a beautiful 13 yard scamper. The run for points failed and Gorman led 6-0.

It didn't take the Wildcats long to come back though, as they took the ball on their own 29 yard line on the kickoff and in one gigantic play Terry Walker went the entire 71 yards for the score with 2:50 left in the period. The kick for extra point failed and the score was tied.

Then after exchanging the ball on 4 possessions the Panthers took the ball on the Wildcats 49 and moved the distance in 8 plays, featuring a pass to Mark Swanner for 30 yards to set the Big Red up at the Rising Star 4 yard line. Jimmy Johnson got the TD on a one yard run with 3:50 left in the half. The run-for points failed and Gorman led 12 to 6.

The Big Red added another touchdown in the fourth period to up the score to 28 to 6, going 83 yards in 14 plays featuring a beautiful pass from Gressett to Swanner for 43 yards and a 13 yard pass to Steve Spivey before Johnson took it in from 4 yards out with 11:41 left on the clock. A pass to Ted Underwood added the two pointer and the Panthers won the battle 28 to 6 to remain atop the District 7-A East Zone race with Goldthwaite.

Jimmy Johnson had 139 yards on 19 carries to lead the Panthers. David Pettit had another good night running as he had 54 yards on 11 trips. Scotty Mauney had 22 on 11 totes. Jacky Johnson got 19 on 3 carries. Spivey had 8 on 4 trips, Gressett had 4 on 1 keeper and Greg Skiles had 3 on 1 run.

The Panthers travel to Goldthwaite this Friday night for a showdown between the leaders on District 7-A East. The winner of this game will be on top in the race. If Gorman wins this one they will have a cinch for a tie in the district as they would only have one game left with Blanket and the Tigers have been beaten twice. However, the Panthers must win the final two games to take the title outright.

This will be a very tough game for the Panthers as the Eagles are riding high and will really be up for this most important contest.

The Big Red defense really shut down the Wildcats last Friday night as the Wildcats had only 11 yards rushing and 25 in the air for a total of 36 total yards. With the exception of the one long run for the score the Panthers stopped the Cats all night and threw them for losses on numerous occasions.

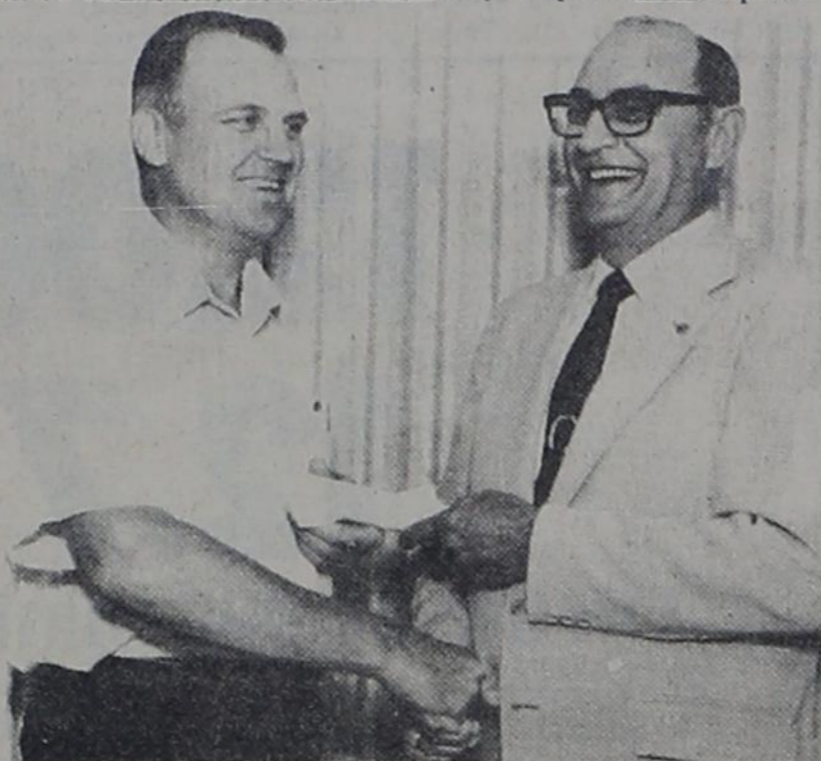
