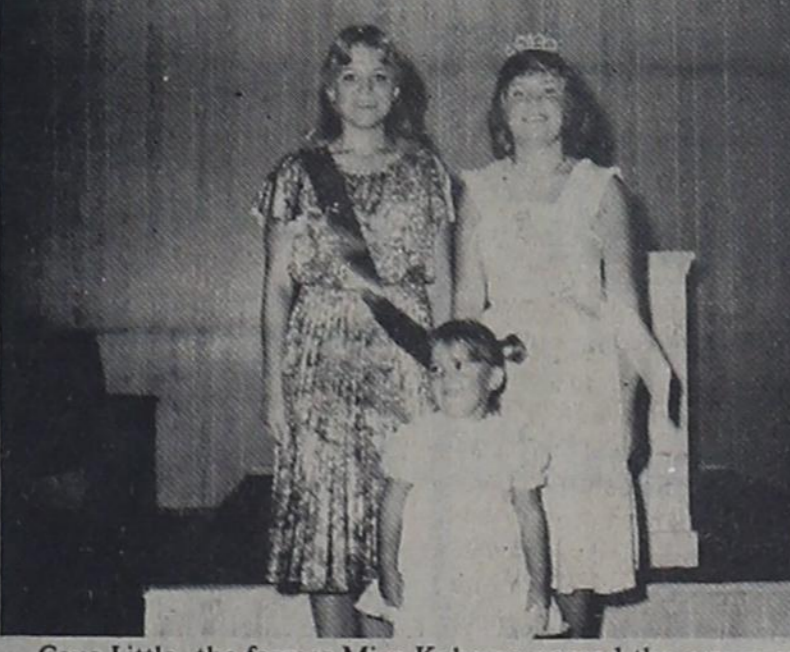
Candi Bryant, Bobby Taylor Wed In Carbon Ceremony



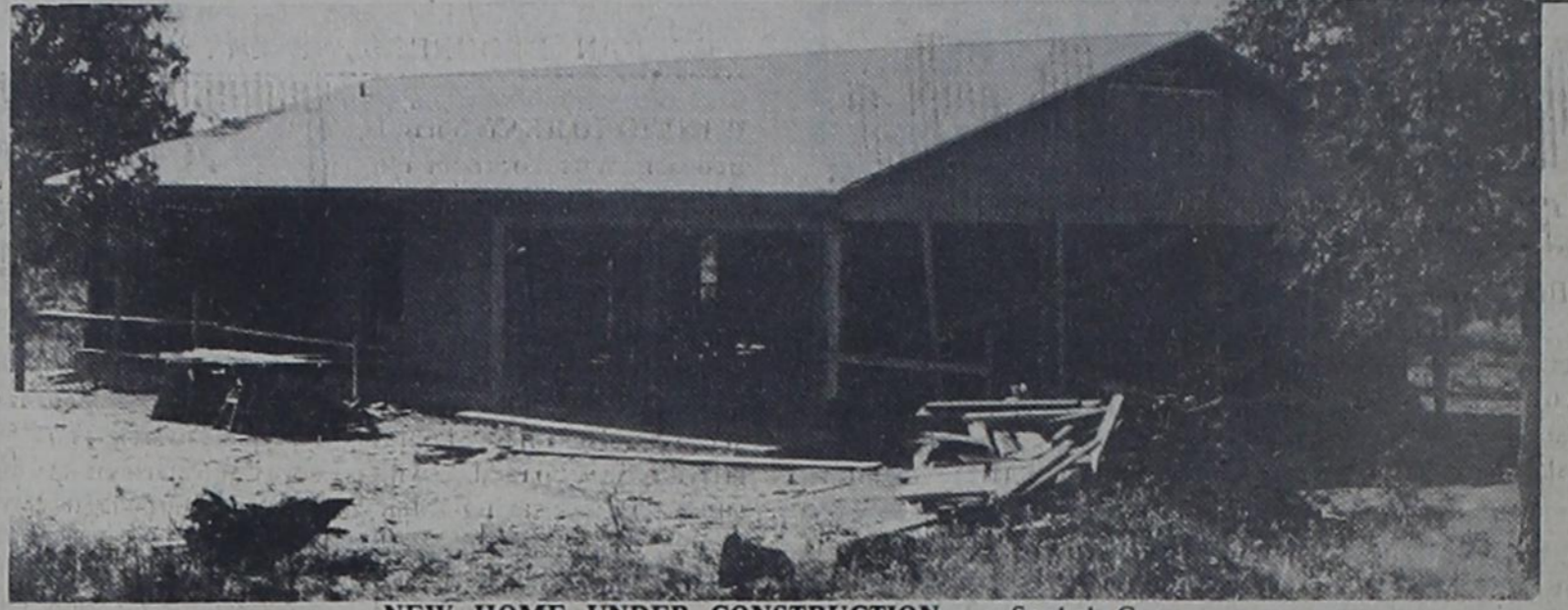

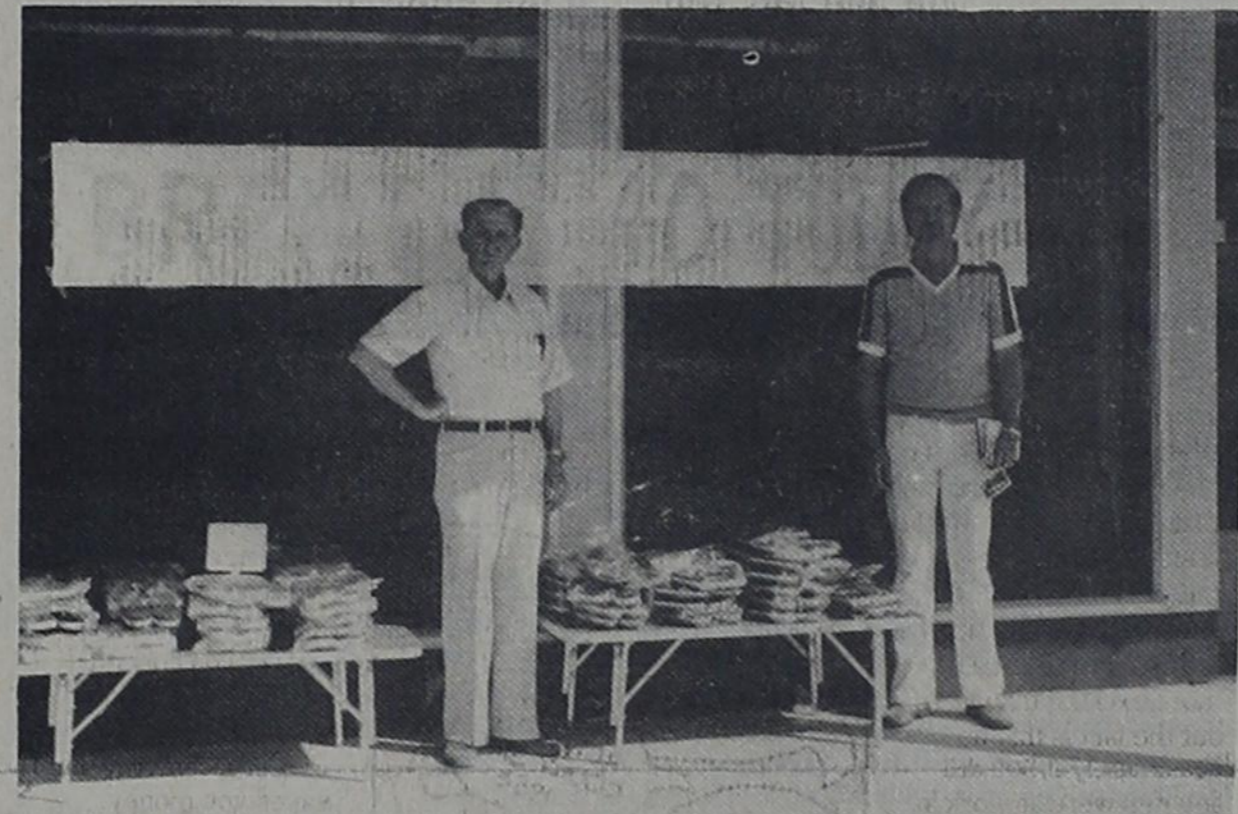
The major peach producing counties are located mostly in the Edwards Plateau and Central Tex. areas;

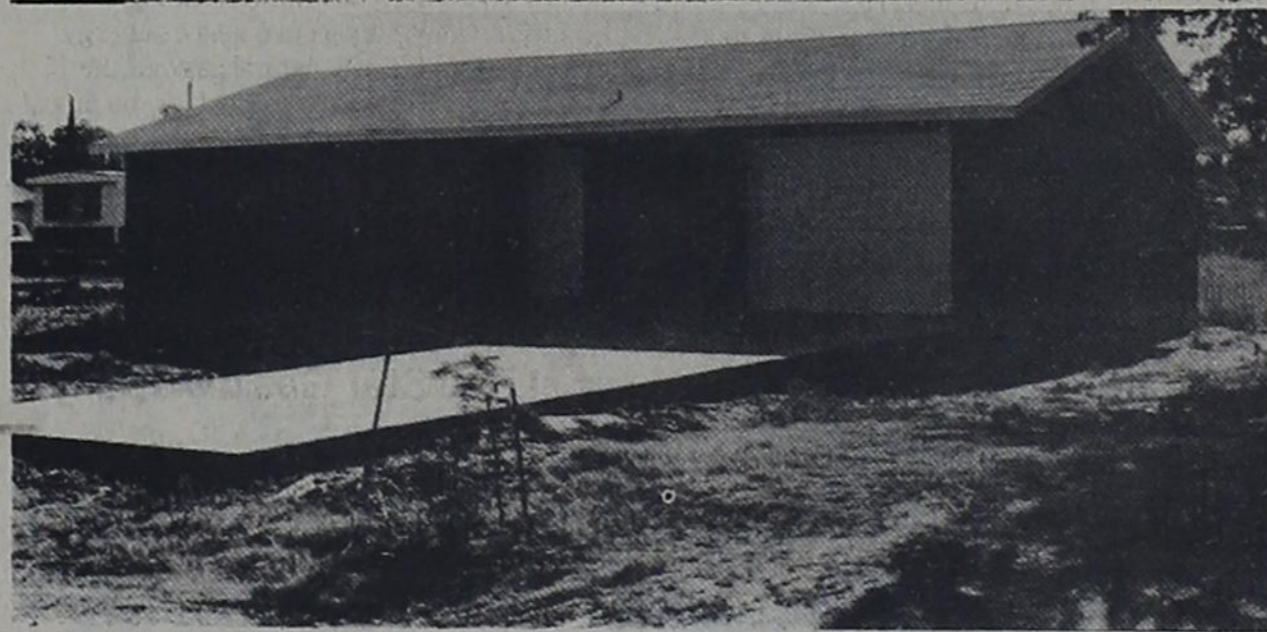

No. 1 Johnny Eaves is located on a 160-acre lease. It spots 330 feet from the north and east lines of Section 6, Block 1, H&TC Survey.

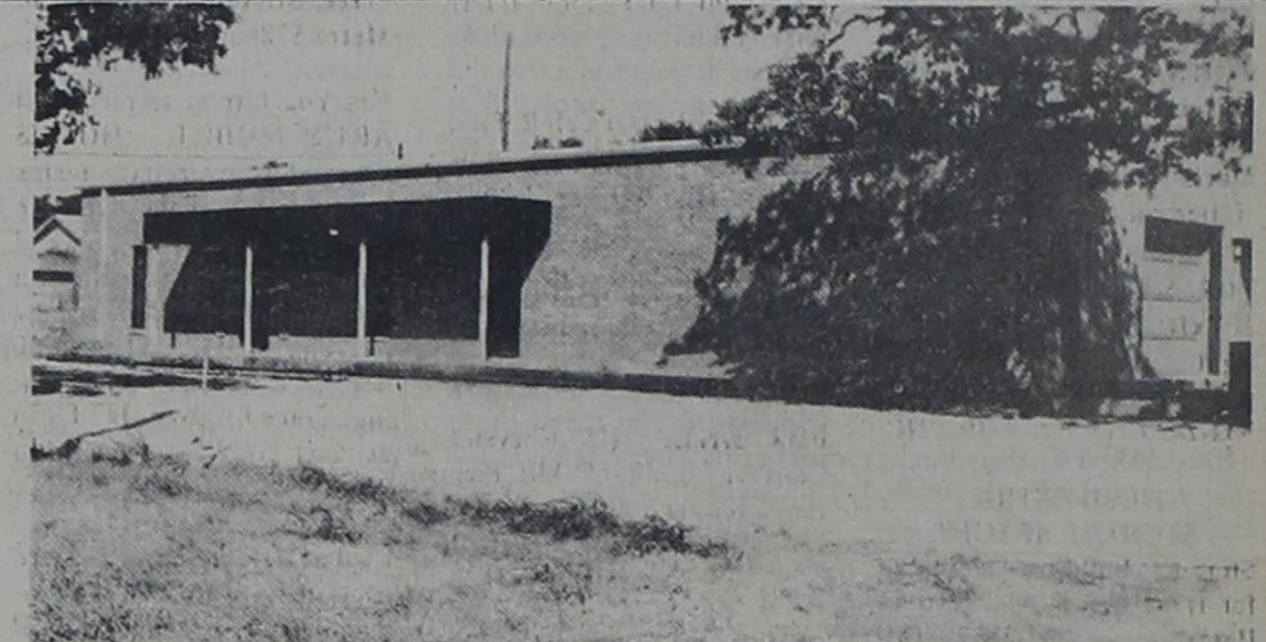

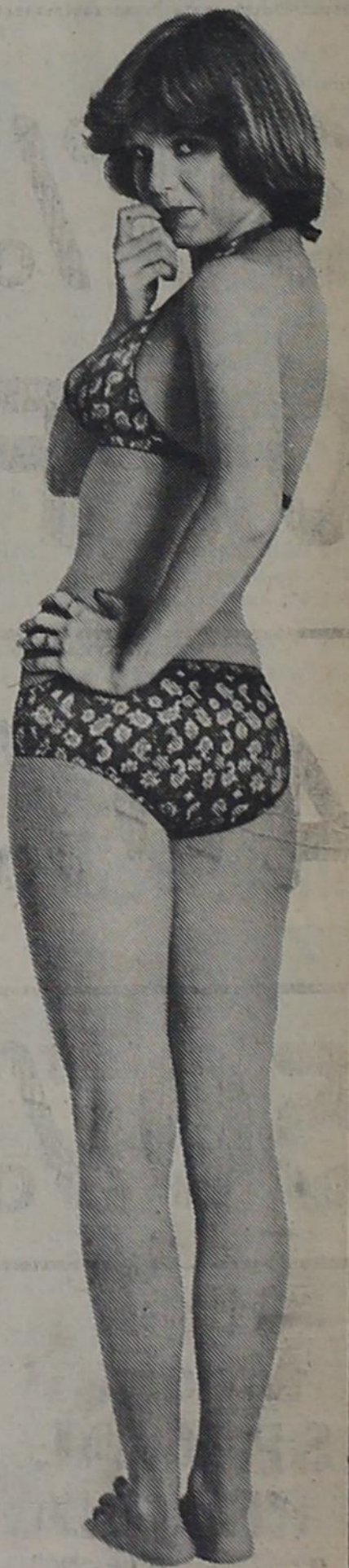
