the U.S. in 1979 peach production with 750,000 bushels produced earning \$6,800,000.

1979 harvest of peaches was 10% below the 833,000 bushels produced in 1978. Weather was a major factor in this crop. Late frost, freezing temperatures and high winds damaged many of the trees in North Texas and the High Plains areas. Even so, Texas had a good crop.




