Replying to the press Mr. Malik said within three months the world will know whether President Kennedy can provide that leadership. The world's greatest battles he noted have been won with the general out in front.

2. The two diametrically opposed elements, Internationalism vs. Communism.

3. Uncertainty of the United States policy in new administration and uncertainty in USSR because of unrest in army, relations with Red China and satellites.

4. Restlessness of Red China.

5. Population explosions.

6. Urgent rising of peoples.

Dangers Which Threaten

1. West subverted by integration of Communism.

2. People weakened to unwise compromise.

3. Western Alliances could break up.

4. The will to decide and act could be paralyzed by fear or corruption.

5. Christians could fall away from Christ.

Elements of Hope

1. The infinite goodwill which can come from scientific and industrial development and cooperation.

2. A growing awakening in the West.

3. The Communist pressure will not let up, nor will the rising of peoples let up.

4. The United States is still functioning.

5. The infinite destruction of weapons will help peoples to compromise to serve the cause of Peace.

6. The greatest hope is Jesus Christ and the prayers of the faithful.

What Must Be Done

As an individual: 1. Seek the whole truth. 2. Form groups for discussion. 3. Trust your leaders and express to them your views.

4. Articulate your feeling without fear or shame. 5. Go in child-like faith to Christ and the Church.

As a nation: 1. The Western coalition must not be allowed to breakup. 2. Clarity of U. S. policy is an urgent necessity. 3. America must come to have a greater meaning everywhere. 4. The strongest national defense must be maintained. 5. Deepest National prayer that the Will of God be done on earth.

Dr. Charles Malik, a former United Nations General Assembly President, has been a leader in world affairs since World War II. He has watched the growth of Communism from such strategic positions as Foreign Minister of Lebanon and Ambassador to the United States.

A Christian Arab, he is a native of Lebanon. After graduation from the American University at Beirut, he studied at Harvard. He is presently a member of the University in Beirut, and has taught at both Harvard and Dartmouth.

CANCER DRIVE SET FOR 20-21st.

The American Cancer Society is a voluntary health agency working in close and effective relationship with the National Cancer Institute of the U. S. Public Health Service. It is organized and directed by doctors, scientists and laymen, who are concerned about cancer and want to do something about it. 



Dickie stated that Farmers Union has just welcomed a vigorous young County Unit in Comanche County into its state organization.

It is felt that the good response from Comanche County farmers results to a large measure as appreciation for the role of Farmers Union in helping obtain increased peanut price supports of \$28.76 per ton for 1961. Dickie emphasized the fact that Eastland County farmers interested in learning about Farmers Union philosophy ought to take advantage of the opportunity to attend the De Leon meeting Monday.

Buzz will complete his enlistment in Del Rio and said that he was considering moving to Gorman after he retires.

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
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Hobos Hold Convention Here

Wood Composition Boards
Wood composition boards are a form of wood product made from wood materials of various kinds. They are not a cheap substitute for lumber. Composition boards supplement and expand the general utility of lumber.
The size of a solid piece of lumber is limited by the size of the tree from which it came. To overcome this limitation, numerous pieces of lumber can now be successfully laminated to produce almost any size requirement. Another method of obtaining large sheets or panels of synthetic lumber is through the use of composition boards.
The term composition board is general. It encompasses various kinds of boards usually identified by the size or character of the particles of which it is composed. Specific wood composition boards may be identified as hard-board, flake board, wafer board, particle board, shavings board, and fiber board. For each of these types, there are various trade names to identify a particular manufacturer's product.
Although a large percentage of composition board is made from wood residues, some manufacturers use standing timber for their raw material.
Fabrication consists of reducing wood to the range of particle sizes desired. These particles or fibers are then bonded together using heat, pressure and resins as a binder. The final product can be tailor-made to suit such requirements as weight, thickness, hardness, smoothness and toughness. These boards can be nailed, sawn, drilled and economically handled like expanded pieces of lumber.
