Everyone is invited to come out and enjoy some good, clean fun and excitement. There will be a concession stand with cold drinks and candy.

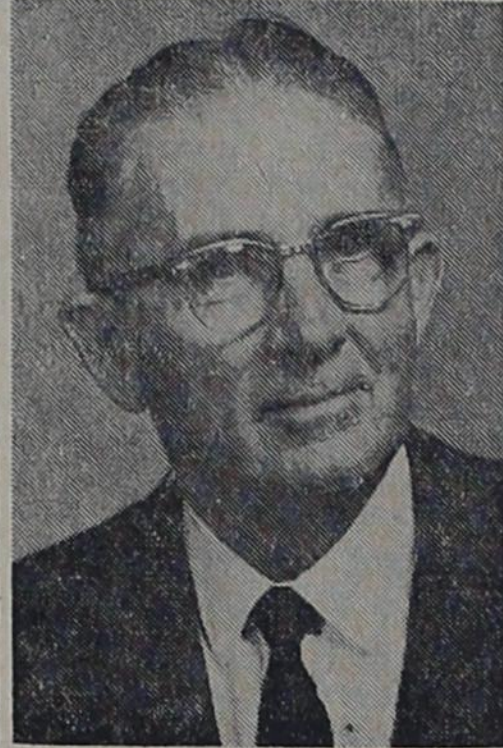

## "Ben-Hur" to Show August 24-27 At The Weeping Oak

"Ben-Hur", which has been making theatrical and literary history for 80 years all around the world, again took the news spotlight today when top film executives signed contracts for the first local showing of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's Academy Award-winning production of the Gen. Lew Wallace classic.

The deal involving this booking sets another record for "Ben-Hur" and will bring the long-anticipated picture to the Weeping Oak for a limited engagement.

Most acclaimed motion picture ever made, the William Wyler presentation of "Ben-Hur" won 11 Academy Awards, including the "Oscar" for best picture of the year. This is the greatest number of awards ever received by a picture in the history of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

"Ben-Hur" also won the British "Oscar," was named Best Film of the Year by the New York Film Critics, Best Produced Film of the Year by the Screen Producers Guild, and has been given a long list of additional awards and citations.

The agreement between M-G-M and the Weeping Oak was signed today.

"Ben-Hur" began making literary history back in 1880, when the book was published and became a world-wide best seller. For years the author had refused to permit any stage version of his novel. Finally, the old theatrical firm of Klaw & Eerlanger induced Wallace to permit use of his book for a play. Wallace was paid 4 2/3 per cent royalty (huge in those days) and the contract was referred to as a million dollar deal. This developed into an under-statement. The word "millions" became attached to anything concerning "Ben-Hur". Late in 1899, "Ben-Hur" opened in New York City. It was a sensation.

With the signing of the Weeping Oak contract, "Ben-Hur" probably will drive his chariot through De Leon to renewed acclaim. It has become known as the most valuable theatrical property in show business history. Never has any single entertainment enterprise excited as much interest as this film. And you can see it on August 24 thru 27 at the Weeping Oak in De Leon.

### E. C. Bramlett To Receive DS Award

Austin, Texas - (Spl) - E. C. Bramlett, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture in the Gorman Public Schools since 1947, received the Distinguished Service Award of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas in Austin, August 9, according to Wilbert H. Meischen of Raymondville, President of the organization.

Bramlett is completing twenty years of service in the vocational agricultural teaching field.

The award was presented at an Awards Breakfast sponsored by the Association. The breakfast is a part of the state-wide conference of Vocational Agriculture Teachers, designed primarily to allow teachers to explore new trends in agriculture and participate in workshops. Education features of the four-day meeting will be under the direction of George Hurt, Director of Agricultural Education, Texas Education Agency. He was assisted by J. A. Marshall, E. C. Weekley, E. L. Tiner and ten Area Supervisors, including J. B. Payne of Stephenville.

Bramlett, a graduate of Texas Technological College with the Bachelor of Science Degree, taught vocational agriculture at Lorenzo and Hico before starting his present work at Gorman. He has made many worthwhile contributions to the school and community during his work as vocational agriculture teacher.

For his outstanding work with Future Farmers of the State, the Texas Association of the FFA conferred the Honorary Lone Star Farmer Degree on Bramlett in 1951. The records of the students in the Gorman Vocational Agriculture Department speak for themselves.

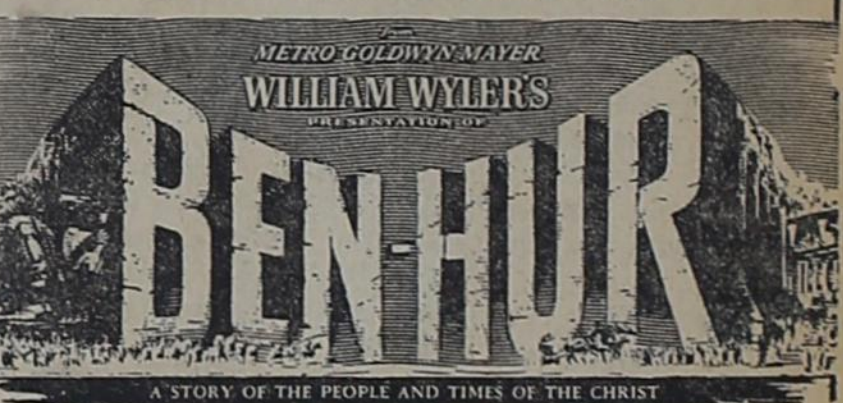

## History Of Hymn Singing; Poll To Decide America's Top Religious Songs

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third in a series of five stories on hymn singing in America, published by the Progress as part of the National Newspaper Hymn Poll. From the days of Martin Luther, through the Methodist revivals of Charles and John Wesley, to the evangelical meetings of Moody and Sankey, hymns have played a vital part in our history — as well as an essential role in religion.

"Hymn singing," according to Rev. Dr. Daniel A. Poling, editor of Christian Herald magazine, "serves as an expression of faith and an uplifting force to unite man, God and family." A study of hymn singing also reveals how closely hymns are tied to history.

The Pilgrims, in their first voyage across the Atlantic, were strengthened spiritually by singing psalms from the Bible.

The first book printed in America was a hymnal — "The Bay Psalm Book."

Luther added strength and popularity to the Protestant Reformation by writing hymns to the tunes of popular German songs. He thus restored religious singing to the people — and composed dozens of hymns himself.

Charles Wesley (who, with his brother, John, founded Methodism) wrote more than 6,000 hymns. Among these was the hymn that even today is sung wherever people worship together, the eternal "Jesus, Lover of My Soul."

America's unique contribution to hymn singing has been twofold.

Negro spirituals are acknowledged almost universally for their profound and deeply-moved piety. Such religious songs as "He's Got the World in His Hands," and "When the Saints Go Marchin' In" are known the world-over.

America's evangelistic movements at the turn of the century, dominated by Phillip Phillips, Ira Sankey and Dwight L. Moody, contributed the gospel song.

But music was an essential part of religious services for thousands of years prior to Protestantism. Jewish people traditionally chant

their religious services in a minor somewhat somber, key.

Moslems call the faithful to daily prayer by a sing-song chant.

Hindus and Buddhists frequently use music, as well as dancing, in their religious ceremonies.

Roman Catholics have sung mass in Latin for centuries.

But religious music never achieved its high degree of integration with religious services until the advent of Protestantism. Indeed, most of the hymns we remember from childhood were composed by some of the most famous reformers and ministers in Protestantism.

Luther wrote "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

Isaac Watts, who released church music from the restraints of Puritan psalm singing, wrote, "Jesus Shall Reign," "Joy to the World," "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross."

Lowell Mason, a Boston church organist during colonial days, wrote the music for such all-time hymn favorites as "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," "Nearer, My God to Thee."

Hymns have been written by monks, ministers, teachers, housewives, noblemen, invalids, officials — people from every denomination and every walk of life. Some hymns emphasize the Christian experience. Others pinpoint the value of worship. Still others
