As a result, the enforcement was practically vacated. Following this change, all sorts of subterfuges were used in order to avoid the impact of the Law. Commercial enterprises have been used as a conduit to avoid the general Statute. The present Law is somewhat vague as to whose responsibility it is to bring about effective control and to carry out the intent of the Congress.

THEREFORE, H. R. 5751 was passed by the House of Representatives on September 18, 1961. This bill, which actually is an amendment to the Subversive Activities Control Act, places the responsibility for enforcement on the Post Office Department. Prosecutions, of course, are under the Department of Justice.


