Fallout Protection Booklets Available To Local Citizens

Fallout Protection, What to know and do about nuclear attack, a booklet put out by the Department of Defense, Office of Civil Defense, is now available to Gorman citizens.

The purpose of this booklet is to help save lives if a nuclear attack should ever come to America. The foreign and defense policies of your Government make such an attack highly unlikely, and to keep it unlikely is their most important aim. It is this reason that the Defense Department has devoted so large an effort to creating and maintaining our deterrent forces. However, should a nuclear attack ever occur, certain preparations could mean the difference between life and death for you.

This booklet describes the national civil defense program fully and each one of us needs to read and study it.

Arlton Smith, Civil Defense Director for Gorman, has a good supply of these booklets and they can be picked up at his drug store. Also Postmaster Graydon Baze, stated that the Post Office has a supply of the booklets and they can be obtained there.

Medical Assistance Act To Aid Our Senior Citizens

Since January 1, 1962, 1,368 senior citizens of Eastland County are eligible for medical assistance through the Senate Bill No. 79, known as the Medical Assistance Act, which was passed by the State Legislature at the regular session in 1961.

The law, in substance, provides for two types of medical services: nursing home care and in-patient hospital care, for those persons on the Old Age Assistance rolls who can qualify.

The law, which was approved by the people of Texas through a Constitutional Amendment on Nov. 4, 1958, means the State government with the aid through Federal funds, will pay most of the costs for caring for Old Age Assistance recipients in licensed nursing homes. However, a doctor must certify that the recipient should receive care in a nursing home and must make a statement concerning in-patient hospital care before those bills will be paid.

The Texas State Department of Welfare organization will handle the "paper work" involving recipients who are nursing home patients.

The recipients who receive hospitalization will look to the Blue Cross organization to handle the "paper work". Blue Cross will also pay the doctors and the hospitals for their services.

The nursing home recipient should contact the State Welfare Department and the hospital recipient should contact his family doctor.

To qualify for nursing home care, a recipient must be a receiver of Old Age Assistance and must have been examined by and approved by a doctor for such care.

The State Department of Public Welfare will pay the aged person an Old Age Assistance check up to a maximum of \$71 per month, the amount depending upon the financial circumstances of the person involved. Then, if there is an unmet need on the part of the aged person, a vendor payment direct to the nursing home will be paid by the Welfare Dept. The classifications and the amount of money that will be paid include: Minimum, \$120 per month; Moderate, \$141 per month, and intensive (which is virtually the same as hospital care) \$180 per month.

In order for a nursing home to receive Welfare Dept. checks the home must be licensed by the State Health Dept.

It will be necessary for a relative or the recipient to make up a small difference in what the State is allowed to pay and what the nursing home and hospital charge.

Old Age Assistance recipients are advised to contact their family physician in event of illness or injury; or contact their local State and Welfare case worker if nursing care is needed.

The law is effective from January 1, 1962, and extending thru August 31, 1963.

"The operation of the program is to be 100 percent state controlled," John H. Winter, Commissioner of the State Dept. of Public Welfare, said at the time the contract was signed.

Under the terms of the Kerr-Mills Bill the State of Texas will pay about 34 percent of the cost and the Federal government 66 percent of the program.

Will School Consolidation Lower Or RAISE Taxes

On January 22, 1962, a group of citizens met to discuss the proposed school consolidation. Those present deemed this important and felt obligated to organize as a group to present the plan to our citizens as it would affect Gorman.

Attending the meeting were W. G. Kirk, Berenice Jeffs, W. M. Brogdon, Thurman Jay, Bob Browder, E. G. Henderson, Joe Collins, Ed Harrison, Ross Wilson, Tom Dunn, and Dorothy Hatcher. Any person interested in working with this group will be welcomed.

In view of the fact that proponents of consolidation of six school districts in Eastland county are being quoted to the effect that such consolidation will result in great savings to the tax payers of the county, it seems that county tax payers should seek satisfactory answers to the following items which have been omitted from cost analysis presented by the proponents of consolidation:

1. What will be the cost of the proposed construction? The Gorman High School was built in 1952 at a cost of \$110,000 to accommodate approximately 100 students. With the substantial increase in the cost of construction in the last ten years, it is conservatively estimated that the cost of the proposed new high school could be \$600,000, taking into con-

sideration that it would have to accommodate 4 1/2 to 5 times as many students as the present building. In addition to the High School, what would be the cost to construct a building for 406 Jr. High School students? What would be the cost of construction of the gymnasium (and how many gymnasiums would need to be constructed for 862 students)? What would be the cost of a lunch room to accommodate 862 students? What would be the cost of a football stadium adequate for a Class 3A athletic program? What would be the cost of constructing and equipping laboratories, libraries and bus garages? Could this not easily total 1 1/2 to 2 million dollars?

GORMAN'S FIRST CITIZEN OF 1962 BORN JANUARY 19

Martha Ester Pocock, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Pocock, was born January 19 at the Blackwell Hospital. She weighed 5 pounds and 13 ounces.

Martha Ester is the first citizen born in Gorman in 1962 and the first United States citizen of the British born Pocock family of eight.

The family will apply in May for their citizenship to the U. S.

2. What would be the cost of a Tax Evaluation and Equalization of the six districts? The Cisco School District recently paid more than \$10,000 for this service by a professional firm. It is assumed that the Cisco School Board contracted with this particular firm to carry out these functions only after proper determination that the cost and quality of services were more satisfactory as compared to services offered by other firms of this type. The new study as proposed will involve this same type of service in six districts. It seems logical, therefore, to conclude that the cost of employing this type firm would total approximately \$50,000 to \$60,000.

3. Can we compete with other Class 3A High Schools on minimum foundation salaries alone? Most schools the size of the proposed new school pay appreciable bonuses to their superintendents, coaches, assistant coaches, band directors, assistant band directors, and instructors of special classifications. If we are to have a better school with better education and better teachers, we will be forced to pay bonuses to those "good" teachers commensurate with what is being paid in other schools of this type. An average of \$354 per year is currently being paid in the form of bonuses to teachers in Class 3A systems throughout the state.

These are only three of the major cost items which have not been fully dealt with in the proposed operation of the consolidated school. Could there be other hidden costs?

WSC To Mail Out Reminder Letters For Cemetery Fund

Last Thursday evening a large contingent of the Woman's Study Club met in the home of Mrs. G. C. Acrea to work on addressing the annual letter requesting donations of funds for the work carried on in the old cemetery section of Gorman's cemetery. Each year one of the projects of the club is to furnish stationery, printing envelopes (with Gene Bakers help) and the work and postage for sending a letter to everyone whose address is available and who would be concerned, just to remind this one time each year that money to carry on cleaning and if possible, some improvements, is needed.

The City handles the spending of the money that results, usually hiring someone to completely clean the entire area, and quite a large area it is. Sometimes too much spring rain and rapid weed growth makes the cemetery unsightly for a little while, but then as soon as it is possible, the clean-up begins - a result of many people helping by contributions.

Last year a little over \$400 was sent in; not a large amount for such a large area, but because of it, the cemetery was kept pretty nice the whole year. So, this past week about 450 reminders were addressed and mailed. Hopes are high that your response will be even better this year and more work can be done.

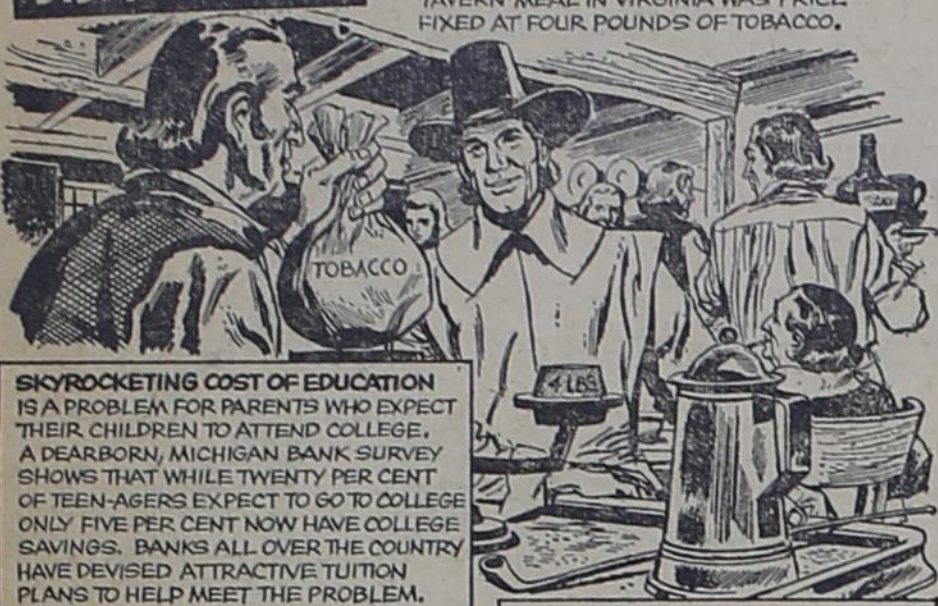

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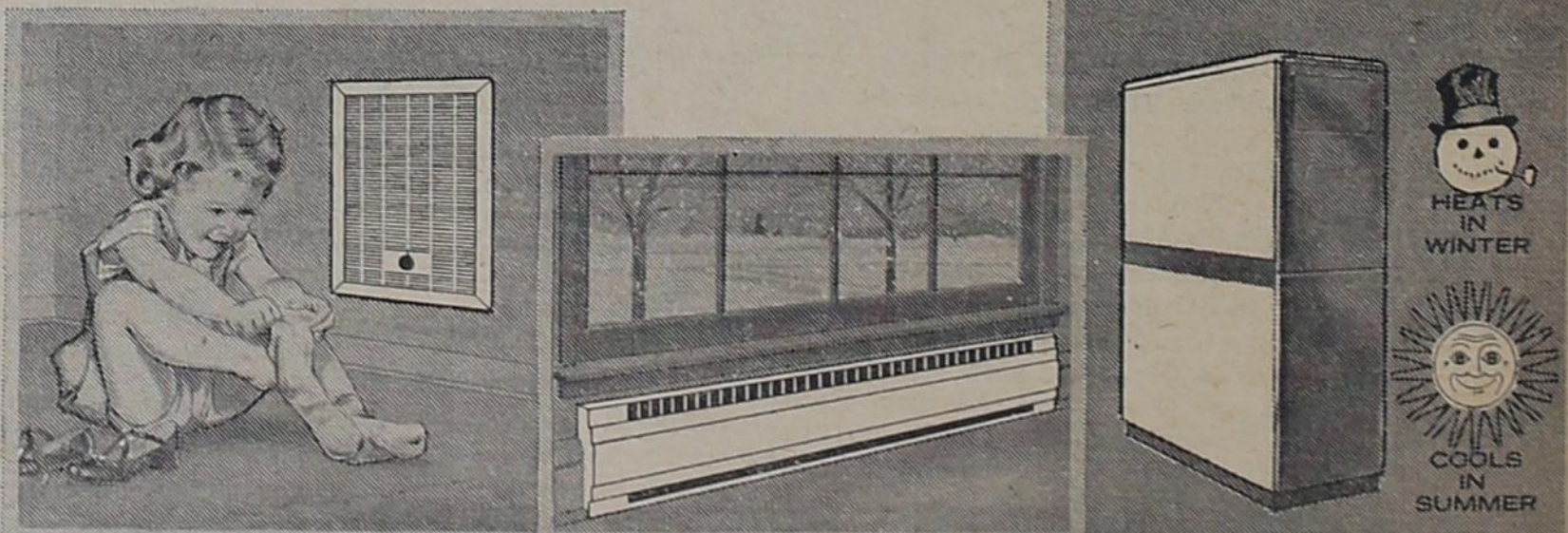
PERSONALITIES IN FORT WORTH RODEO

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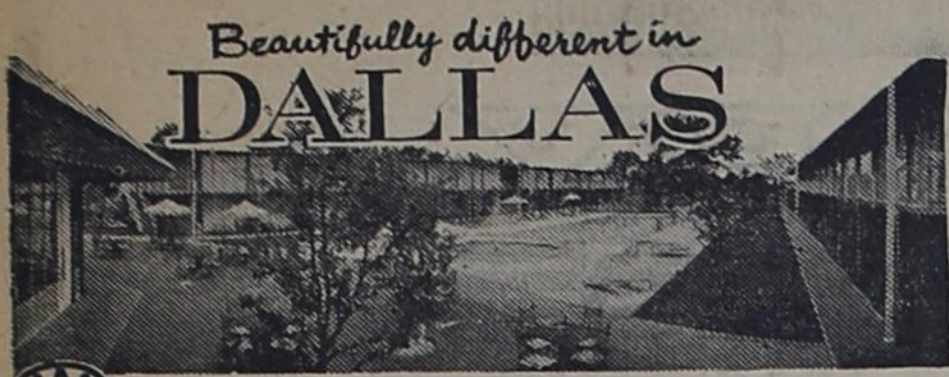
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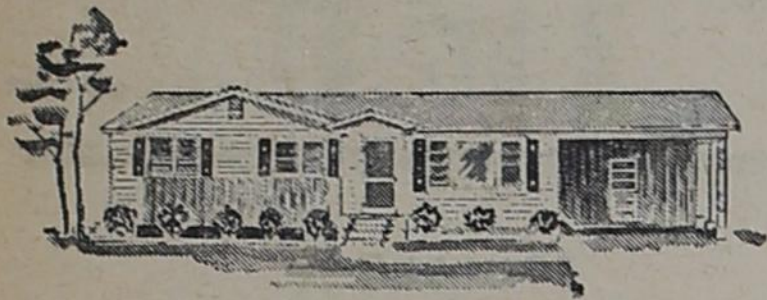

A Chapel For The Children

At the Austin State School more than two thousand retarded children, who have been gathered in from most of the counties in Texas, will now have a beautiful chapel where the most competent of them can gather and worship. The \$100,000 structure, which will be dedicated at four o'clock on Sunday, January 21, represents not one dollar of taxpayers' money, but is the result of contributions - from pennies to thousands of dollars, and from people all over Texas. For the more than forty years that the State has maintained the Austin State School there never has seemed to be enough tax money available to do more than to properly house and feed and clothe the children there. It is a gratifying and heartening thing to know that hundreds of our citizens have given beyond their tax dollars to make possible this appropriately named "Chapel for the Children."

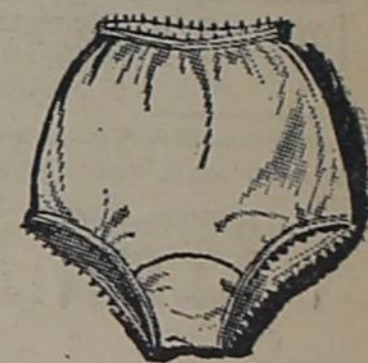

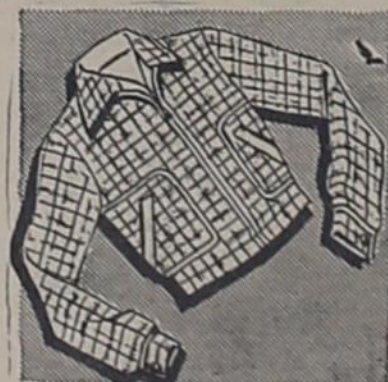

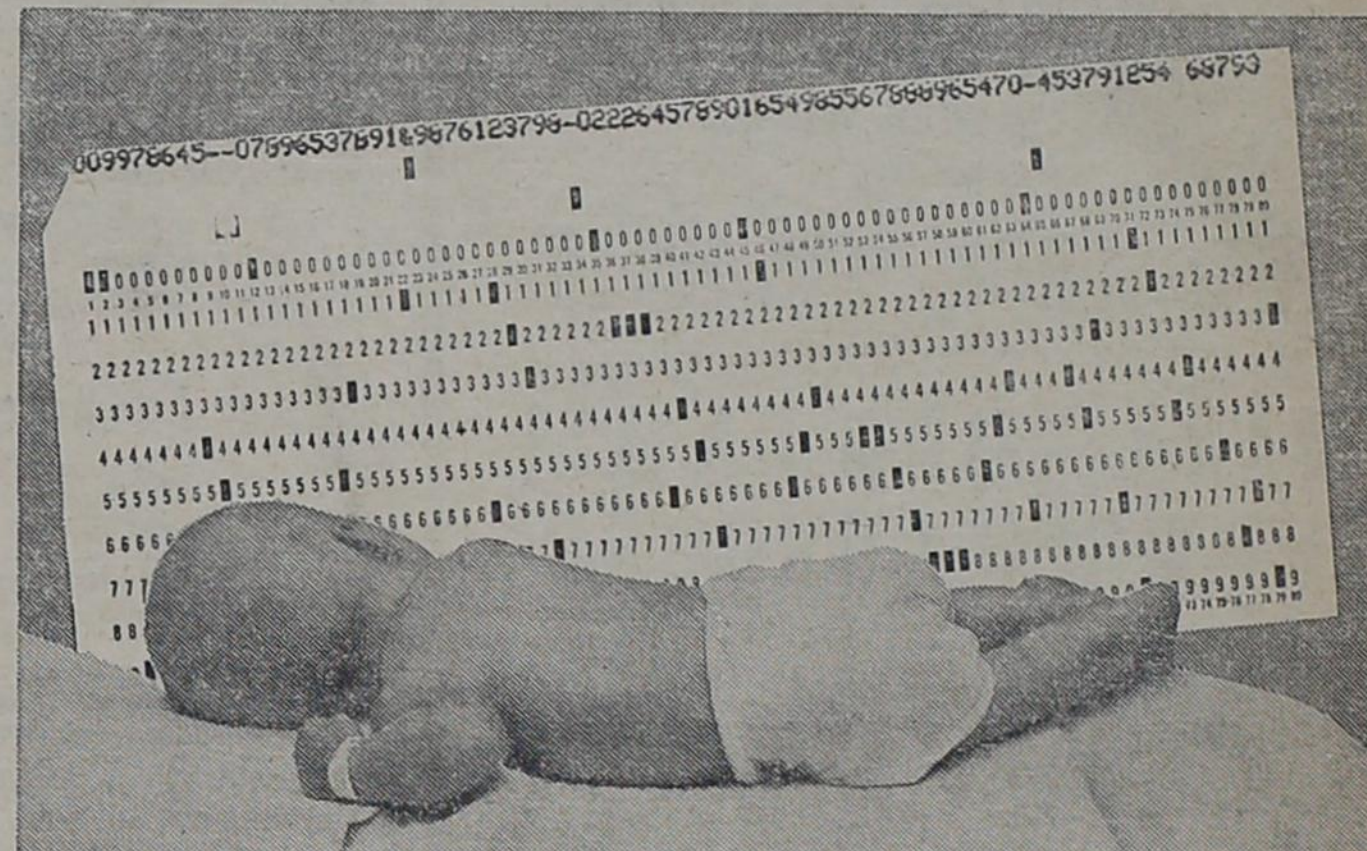

Turn of Card May Reveal Fate Of Young Birth Defects Victim

Johnny X from Tennessee is nine months old. His head is extremely large for the small body. He has water on the brain.

When his mother recently took Johnny to the Birth Defects Study Center at Vanderbilt University School of Medicine, Nashville, Tenn., for specialized treatment of this disease, known medically as hydrocephalus, their first appointment was with a doctor who had a most unusual assistant—an inanimate electronic sorter.

Dr. Robert E. Merrill, assistant director of the Birth Defects Study Center, a research unit financed by The National Foundation-March of Dimes, explained:

"This apparatus is something unique when applied to birth defects. It can be a lifesaver. It's an IBM machine, and its memory is many thousand times more retentive than the proverbial elephant's. In effect, our mechanical robot here is going to interview Johnny and, although I'm Johnny's doctor, I'm really acting only as a sort of glorified office boy to the machine."

Using a device somewhat resembling a typewriter keyboard, Dr. Merrill began punching a rectangular oblong green card, measuring about 7" x 3". Each

perforation represented the mother's answer to one of a long list of questions. Her answers covered such data as Johnny's age and birthdate, mother's age at delivery, illnesses of mother during pregnancy, any stillbirths, any physical defects in husband or wife, Johnny's weight, his age when his head started to enlarge and head circumference. Scores of other vital facts are fed into the machine that never forgets.

When the sorter finishes "interviewing" Johnny, the green card has recorded for all time and in capsule form the infant's past and present life, and his family background.

More significantly, the electronic device also faithfully remembers the case histories of hundreds of other Johnny's whose brain fluid is blocked as it is with this boy.

Dr. Merrill has only to run these cards through the high-speed sorter to compare these life histories with Johnny's. Most important of all, for this youngster and his apprehensive parents, is that the sorter can help the doctor form a reasonably accurate idea of Johnny's immediate future; help him decide on the advisability of surgical insertion of a "shunt" or plastic tube to draw off the excess fluid into the blood stream; and indeed,

assist the physician in predicting the future course of the disease.

This is done by a study of past performances of other hydrocephalic infants whose medical circumstances closely resemble those of this baby. That data is available almost instantly—"in a minute fraction of the time," as Dr. Merrill says, "required to go through the records by hand."

"This comparative diagnosis 'can save a child's life,' he adds. 'At least one thing we now can have up-to-date to guide us, and guide us instantaneously, is our experience. In five minutes, usually, the sorter can give us information that helps us decide precisely what to do in Johnny's case—and what not to do.'"

Aside from the Birth Defects Study Center at Vanderbilt, The National Foundation-March of Dimes has financed similar centers at Children's Hospital, Columbus, Ohio, and at the University of Oklahoma Medical Center at Oklahoma City.

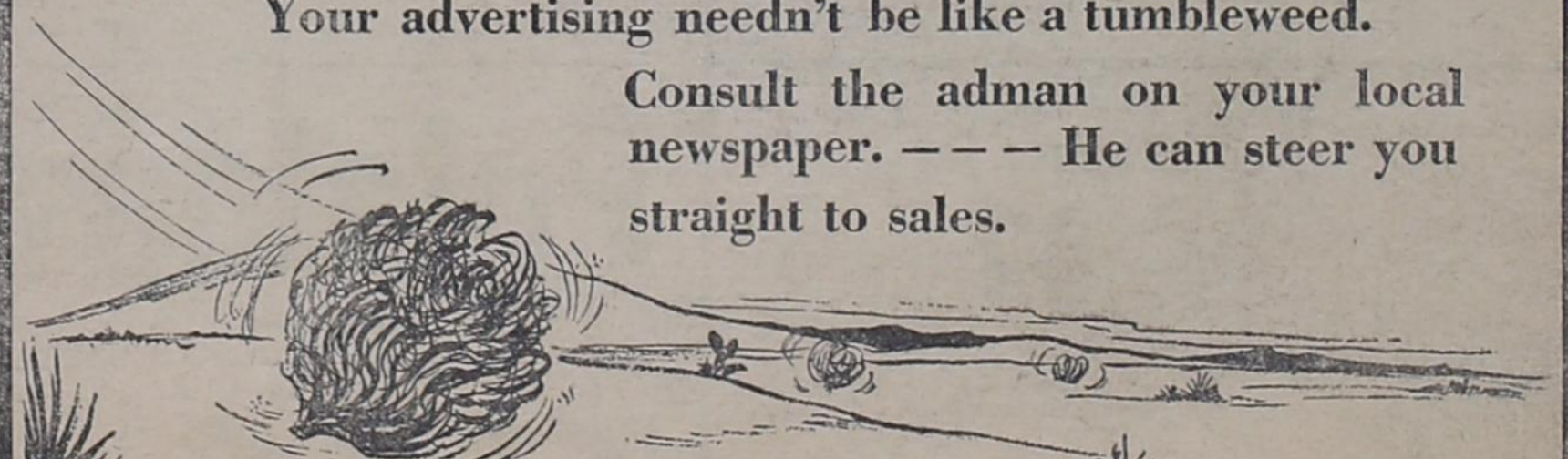
Eventually, when the experiment Dr. Merrill is conducting is completed, the study centers are expected to pool their records of hundreds of victims of significant birth defects for the benefit of all. Tragically, there are about 250,000 such infants born yearly in the United States.

Tumbling Tumbleweed!

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — IN RECENT WEEKS numerous letters have been received calling attention in the strongest terms, to the policy which permits Soviet propaganda to enter the United States free of charge.

MOST LETTERS MENTION this practice in connection with the proposed increase in Postal rates, and certainly the point is well taken.

ON SEPTEMBER 18, 1961, the House of Representatives passed H. R. 5751, the purpose of which was to close the loopholes which permitted Communist propaganda from entering the veins of our society without restriction and without notice or warning of its nature.

THE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE conducted extensive investigations and help hearings on the measure before it was presented. It was found that in the two years prior to these investigations the United States Customs Service processed over 6 million packages of foreign Communist propaganda entering the United States. These packages contained more than 10 million items

of printed matter, exclusive of the millions of first class mailed items not subject to inspection.

THE STUDIES OF THE Un-American Activities Committee at various ports of entry showed that there is a steady increase in the volume of Communist literature entering this Country. As is the case of well prepared propaganda, it was found to be subtle and to present appealing masquerade. In numerous instances, if not in most, this material was directed to the youth of our Country.

THE FOREIGN AGENTS REGISTRATION ACT requires registration with the Attorney General of agents of a foreign power who disseminate political propaganda in the United States. It requires a labeling of the political nature of the material in order that the American public may be on notice regarding it. It is the same concept applicable to the labeling provisions commonly found in the Food and Drug Laws which require the producers of poisonous drugs to label them as such.

THE SUCCESS OR FAILURE of the laws applying to this problem hinges on the law's enforcement. Since it placed the authority of enforcement within the Customs Bureau, someone decided that the Customs people were not sufficiently trained in this particular field to distinguish that which was propaganda and that which was not. As a result, the enforcement was practically vacated. Following this change, all sorts of subterfuges were used in order to avoid the impact of the Law. Commercial enterprises have been used as a conduit to avoid the general Statute. The present Law is somewhat vague as to whose responsibility it is to bring about effective control and to carry out the intent of the Congress.

THEREFORE, H. R. 5751 was passed by the House of Representatives on September 18, 1961. This bill, which actually is an amendment to the Subversive Activities Control Act, places the responsibility for enforcement on the Post Office Department. Prosecutions, of course, are under the Department of Justice.

THIS MEASURE BRINGS WITHIN the coverage of the definition of "foreign principal" an organization which is directed or controlled by any foreign government or foreign political party. It

includes those who have used existing exemptions for certain commercial activities to disseminate propaganda. It eliminates cumbersome requirements pertaining to the form of political propaganda subject to the provisions of the Act. It definitely fixes responsibility for the enforcement of the intent of the Congress.

THIS MEASURE WAS SENT to the United States Senate rather late in the last Session, where it is now pending. It is to be hoped, of course, that the Senate will give early attention to the measure and pass it in order that a serious problem may be met.

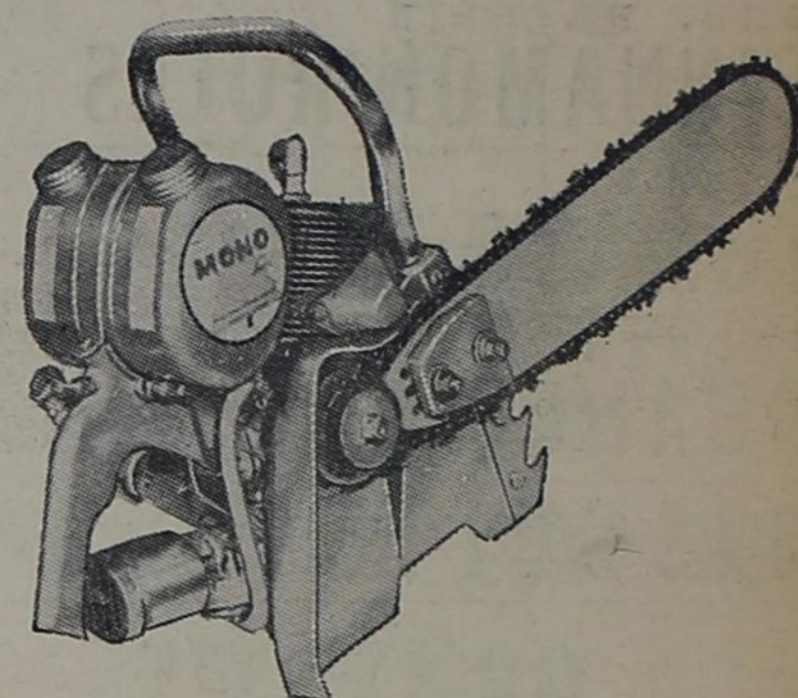

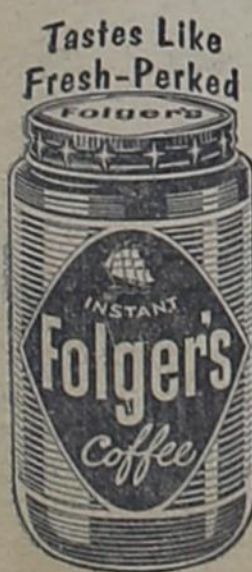
