

COUNTY PECAN FIELD DAY SET THURSDAY MAY 24 AT GORMAN

The annual Spring Field Day of The Eastland County Pecan Growers Association has been set for Thursday, May 24 at Gorman, according to Hank Sims, President of the group.

The morning session, at the Fire Hall in Gorman, beginning at 10 a. m., will feature discussions of some characteristics of some of the

new pecan varieties, especially the Apache and the Sioux, plans for attending the Texas Pecan Growers Convention in July, presentation of the county pecan queen, and the carry-over of the 1962 crop and expected price of the 1963 nuts.

Dr. W. M. Brogdon, President of the Businessmen's Club of Gorman, will initiate the program with a word of welcome.

After lunch, the group will visit the Charley Underwood Orchard for a check on the pecan nut casebearer, and a discussion of the hickory shuckworm and pecan weevil, and their control.

Proclamation By The Mayor

WHEREAS, one of the best-known and well-regarded qualities of the State of Texas is its soundly built and carefully maintained highway system; and

WHEREAS, a consistent program of highway construction and modernization has in recent years brought about a reduction of more than 25 percent in the fatality rate on all Federal and State highways in Texas; but

WHEREAS, heavy increases in traffic endanger these advances in highway safety, since the state's population has increased by one-fourth since 1950, the state now has more than five million registered motor vehicles, and the miles traveled by these vehicles now totals 43 billion miles a year; and

WHEREAS, due to this flood of traffic some 22,000 miles of the state's 25,000-mile system of U. S. and State-numbered highways are already obsolete for the loads of traffic they carry;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as the Nation at large observes National Highway Week during the period May 20-26, 1962, that the Texas Highway Department be commended for its achievements in building today's fine highway system in the face of mounting traffic problems; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the citizens of Texas be urged to view with concern the adverse economic effects and the cost in human lives that will result if highway traffic overwhelms the capacity of our roads, and to support a sustained program of highway improvement and modernization to keep Texas growing.

THEREFORE, I, JAMES W. MIEARS, do hereby designate the period May 20-26, 1962, as

HIGHWAY WEEK and urge that special attention be directed to the needs of our highway system.

Doyl Johnson Is Named "Come Back" Farmer In Palo Pinto County For 1962

The Doyl Johnson family on Hwy. 16 a few miles north of Desdemona, on Rt. 3, Gorman, is a noble example of what old fashioned hard work in some twenty odd years of farm life can accomplish. When Doyl and Lucile married in the late thirties Doyl was a hand on the W.P.A. In 1941 from this modest beginning they purchased 95 acres of the home place where they now live. Doyl, Lucile, and little Willie Paul moved to an old tumble down shack on the 95 acres and Doyl started a crop with a team of horses.

After some ten crops later, some good and some bad, we find the Johnsons building a new home up on the main road. They now have two more young sons and are buying the rest of the home place. Since then they have purchased a 143 acre pasture on up the road which is now Hwy. 16. In addition Doyl now owns 100 acres of his fathers old home place where Doyl spent his boyhood.

At present we find Doyl operating the three places and renting peanut land on three other places.

He has a new four row tractor as well as a two row tractor, and a wide assortment of other equipment.

The oldest son, Willie Paul, is now twenty-two years of age, married, and the father of a young daughter. He is a student at Texas Tech, is studying Agricultural Education, and is now doing his practice teaching. No doubt he will make some Texas high school an outstanding voc. ag. teacher next fall. Roy Leon, now twenty years of age, is a sophomore at Tarleton State College. He is an honor student and plans to either become an agricultural teacher or perhaps work for the Soil Conservation Service. The youngest son, Clyde L., is now eighteen years old and is attending school at Austin. He is studying to become an I.B.M. machine operator.

Conservation has played a big role in Johnson's operations. His three places each have basic conservation plans with the Palo Pinto District. They include 270 ac. of cropland and 582 ac. of native range. In addition 120 ac. of peanut land is rented on three other places. A young 21 ac. pecan orchard is one of Doyl's main interests.

The conservation Program used on the cropland includes the faithful planting of a cover crop each year following peanut harvest. Peanut hay is usually returned to the land for soil conditioning, especially if it is weather damaged in the least. Peanuts are always stripped. The usual pattern is four rows grain sorghum and eight rows peanuts. The 52 ac. peanut allotment on the home place made 39 bushels per acre this past year with a test of 76. This compares favorably with the best of peanut yields for this area.

The balance of the cropland which is all on the home place is used largely for grain sorghum and small grain with some corn being grown. The grain sorghum is fed to hogs which is one of the major enterprises in Johnson's operations. The small grain is used primarily for wintering the cattle and goats. Grain sorghum stubble is left standing each spring until after the critical blow period is past on the sandy land. Soil cover in the form of either sorghum stubble, sorghum strips, or winter cover crop for each acre is an essential in Johnson's operations.

Earthmoving work done by Johnson in the past few years include a 3/4 mile long waterway shaped and established to coastal bermuda grass, about 1 1/2 mile of terracing, and seven farm ponds. The terraces outlet into the large waterway. A few more terraces are still to be built and possibly one or two more ponds. About 75 acres of brushland has been cleared for cultivation.

For the immediate future Johnson is most interested in developing the full potential of his rangeland. The grassland on the home place is mostly deep sand, while the other two places are largely limestone country. Practically all the brush has been pushed on the sandy land and goats are being used for sprout control. Heavy goating followed by rest periods is producing beautiful stands of tall grass most of which is little bluestem. Stocking rates are care-

Johnson's philosophy of life is built around hard work. To this his neighbors will all testify. He always has a kind word and the respect of all in the community. He frequently lends equipment to his neighbors. He takes an active role in the Church of Christ at Desdemona. He works hard in his contacts with others to build and keep a good reputation, and stated that "it takes a long time to build a good reputation, which can be destroyed in a few moments if one becomes careless or is un-thoughtful." Doyl's hobby is coon hunting. On cool crisp nights even after a hard days work he likes nothing better than to go out on a hillside and listen to his hounds. It is upon such people as the Johnson family that our Nation's future in agriculture depends.



The exercise featured a full-scale amphibious assault on Onslow Beach at Camp Lejeune, backed up by airborne troops and close air support from offshore.







County Livestock Assn. Joins Fight To Stop Brucellosis

The Eastland County Livestock Raiser's Association is currently engaged in an all-out campaign which will result in making Eastland county a certified Brucellosis clean area. Forms have been available in various communities of the county for some time on which producers can sign petitioning the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas to take the necessary steps to realize this objective. The urgency of this program cannot be overemphasized.

Mr. D. S. Buchanan, owner and operator of the Eastland Auction Company, has recently been notified officially by the Texas Animal Health Council that all breeding animals that are eight months old and over originating in the so-called "dirty" counties, which include Eastland, Erath, Palo Pinto and Comanche, that will go back to the farms from the auction ring have to be tested for Brucellosis. When this order goes into effect on June 15, it can mean the following inconveniences to the sellers of cattle.

First, it will cost livestock producers several hundred dollars per month in test fees. Secondly, checks for cattle cannot be issued until the results of tests are known. Third, delayed loadings of cattle resulting from delays during testing will cause buyers to stay away from markets in those counties that are "unclean". Fourth, many buyers now hesitate to buy cattle that have to be tested because when they finish their buying, they desire to finish their transactions and go home.

The Livestock Raisers' Association is currently in the process of compiling eligible lists of livestock producers residing in the various communities of the county. As soon as these lists have been completed, the Association will meet and formulate specific plans for petitioning the Livestock Sanitary Commission to carry out their testing program in the county and to follow through with other necessary procedures in making this a clean county.

Livestock producers are urged to cooperate in this program. It is obvious from the above facts that unless our county follows through with this program in the near future, our livestock markets will suffer and livestock producers in the county will suffer financially. All producers of livestock should make sure that they sign a petition which will be made available to them within the next three or four weeks. In the event that a petition is not made available to you, you are asked to contact Mr. J. M. Cooper, County Agricultural Agent, Ross Wilson, Gorman, or your local Vocational Agriculture Teacher who will see that a petition is available for your signature.

Texas livestock auction markets are selling 76.8 percent of all livestock consigned to market in Texas.

Ranger Election For Beer, Wine Set For June 9th

EASTLAND — Eastland County Commissioners Monday set an election in Ranger for June 9 on sale of beer and wine within the city limits.

The date was set following the presentation and certification of a petition containing the names of 318 qualified electors. Since the petition did not specify off-premises or on-premises consumption, it may be sold either way if the election passes, County Clerk Smith said.

District and County Attorney Earl Conner Jr. confirmed that since the type of sale had not been specified, it could be sold for on-premises consumption. He said the cost of the election will be paid by the county.

Acting on the petition were County Judge John Hart and Commissioners J. B. Arther of Eastland, B. M. Bennett of Gorman, Carl Lamb of Cisco, and Buck Collins of Rising Star. Motion setting the election was made by Bennett and seconded by Collins.

The petition was returned to Smith April 27. Petitioners had until May 5.

The election will be held at the Ranger City Hall from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.



Local Mail Carriers Will Distribute Survey Cards

Postmaster Graydon W. Baze reminds rural patrons of the Gorman Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey Cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes. "USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Baze explains. "It's important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings." Carriers assisting with the survey are D. R. Clark, Rt. 1; Roscoe Reeves, Rt. 2; and A. O. Clark, Rt. 3. Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets. "Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Baze concludes.

The oldest livestock auction market in Texas is Community Sale Yard, Edinburg, which has been operating continuously since 1928.

Most of Texas farm income is derived from livestock and livestock products.


