HOMECOMING SET AUGUST 11 AT DESDEMONA

The August 11 Homecoming at Desdemona will commemorate two historical events — the discovery of oil in the area Sept. 2, 1919, and the establishment of a postoffice in 1882.

Nearly everyone in the small Eastland County town, much larger during its boom days, has a part in the making of the annual event.

L. E. Clark, a regular participant in homecoming activities, will deliver the welcoming address. As tradition dictates, Mrs. Pearl Duncan of De Leon will be master of ceremonies.

Mrs. Williams, familiarly known as Docie, will present white Bibles to the oldest man and woman present. Memorial services will be conducted by Mrs. Murray Foote and Mrs. Theo Barker.

Homecoming officers are Clydell Lewis, president; O. H. Ragland, vice president, and John Koontz, secretary-treasurer.

Desdemona, a settlement before the Civil War, acquired its first church in 1868. First services were held in a log cabin with one door and a hole for a window. The benches were hewn logs and the pulpit was flanked by guns for emergency use in defense against Indians.

The settlement in early days was named Hog Town after nearby Hog Creek. The town, although officially named Desdemona in 1882, has never completely lost the title Hog Town.

Records report that "Desdemona" was suggested by a merchant, R. H. Pierce. Desdemona Wynn was a school teacher here who later taught in Fort Worth, it is believed.

Another story attributes the name to a different origin. Supposedly an investor of the oil boom days, after many days of waiting, saw oil spouting toward the sky and shouted, "Deah's de money."

The prize money and awards are the highest achievements a FFA member can receive and is "a great achievement," stated Mr. E. C. Bramlett, local FFA instructor.

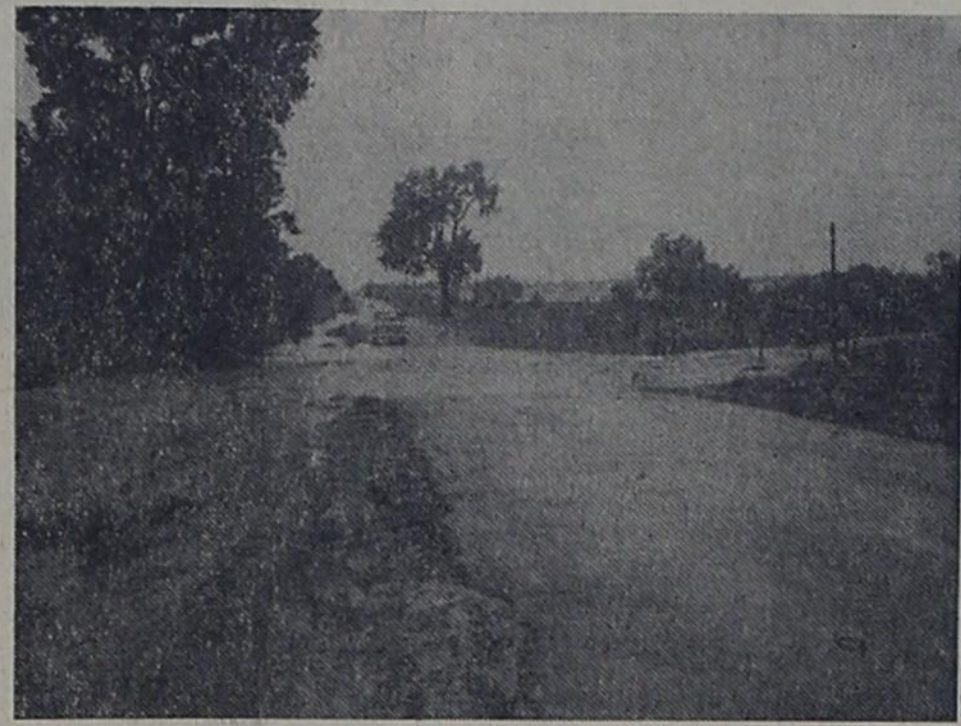
Howard, a freshman at Tarleton State College, is following in his two older brother's footsteps who are engineers and has chosen engineering as his major also.

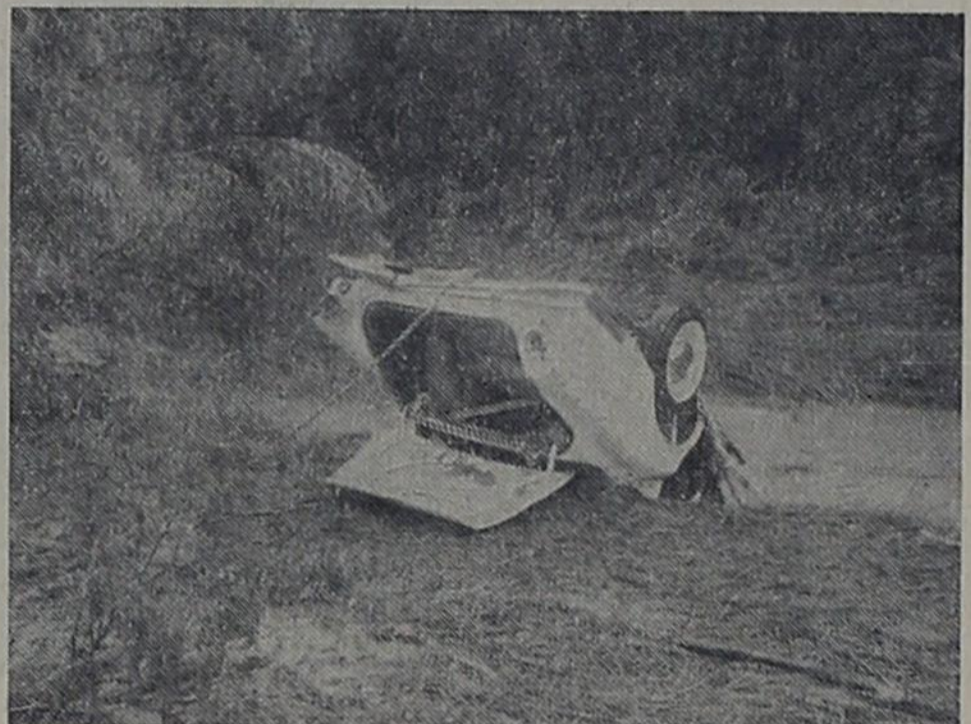

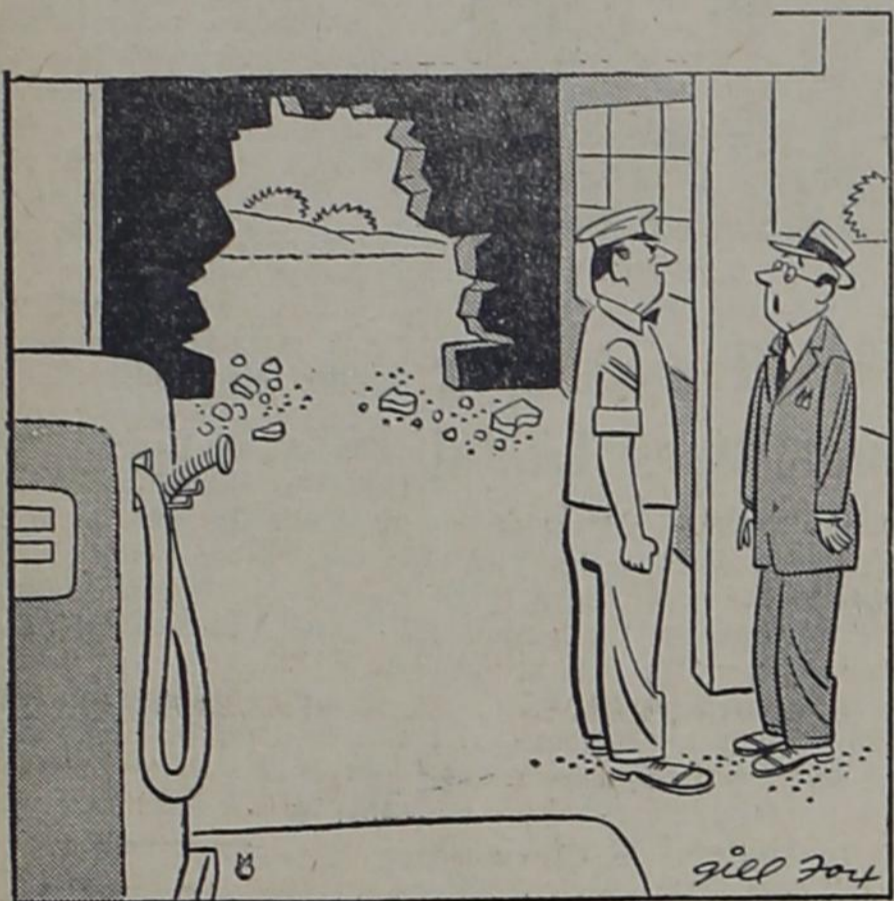
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LINDA MEAZELL

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section to be known as Section 1-A which permits the Legislature to delegate certain zoning powers to the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, immediately following Section 1, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

"Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

"The Legislature may enact any laws not inconsistent with this Section which it may deem necessary to permit said counties to implement, enforce and administer the provisions contained herein.

"Should the Legislature enact legisla-
tion in anticipation of the adoption
of this amendment, such legislation
shall not be invalid by reason of its
anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional
Amendment shall be submitted to a
vote of the qualified electors of this
state at an election to be held on the
first Tuesday after the first Monday
in November, 1962, at which election
all ballots shall have printed thereon
the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amend-
ment authorizing the Legislature to
delegate limited zoning powers to
any county bordering on the
Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater
limits thereof."

"AGAINST the Constitutional
Amendment authorizing the Leg-
islature to delegate limited zoning
powers to any county bordering
on the Gulf of Mexico or the
tidewater limits thereof."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall
issue the necessary proclamation for
the election and this amendment shall
be published in the manner and for
the length of time as required by
the Constitution and laws of this
state.

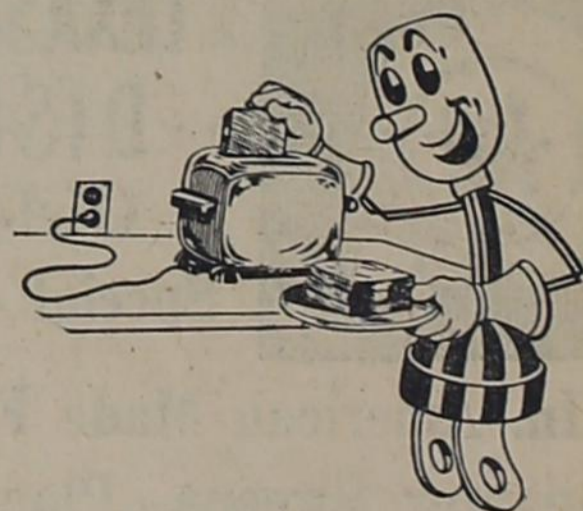

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the proclamation and publication of this proposed amendment by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows:

Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of

the Constitution of Texas, known as the "Bill of Rights" shall not be in any manner, affected, amended, impaired, suspended, repealed or suspended hereby.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable." Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

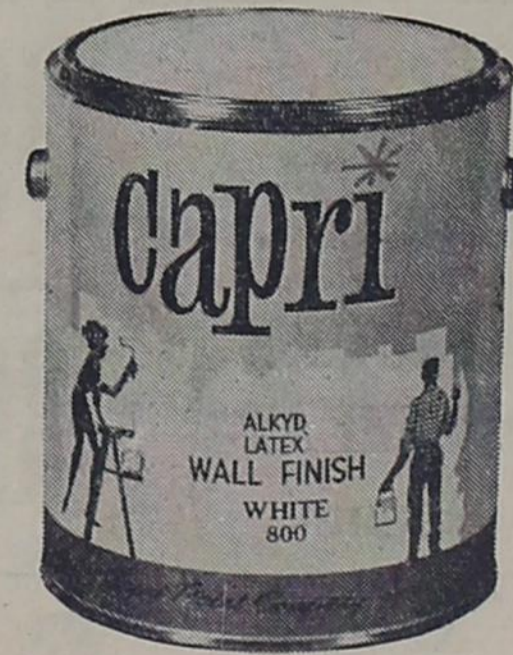

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of

the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions"; and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
