



### Statement From Mr. Davis Smith

As I, one of your City Commissioners, I will give my reason for voting against a water raise. As you know a big percent of our population are senior citizens, living on fixed income. Most of them paying house rent, yet they are raised equally with larger business and people with valuable real estate. The records will show, I have been for the improvements made, and am for the necessary ones to be made now, and those in the future.

The letter from Mr. Hawley, the chief engineer for the State Board of Insurance, outlined some improvements, if we would make, we would get an eleven percent cut in our insurance rate. This would call for us to replace the most of our water mains with larger lines. As you know, most of them are in the street. We would have to tear up most of our pavement and start over. This calls for sixteen new fire hydrants and thousands of feet of six and eight water mains, and two hundred thousand of ground storage along with service pumps; in other words we would have to start

from scratch. This would cost an estimated \$200,000. If this comes to a vote, I will vote against this.

As it is now, we have a cheaper fire rate than our neighboring towns with volunteer fire departments. Eastland has a little cheaper rate than we have, but they maintain a paid fire crew, on duty twenty four hours a day. Our fire department is responsible for holding our rate down. Thanks to our Fire Department.

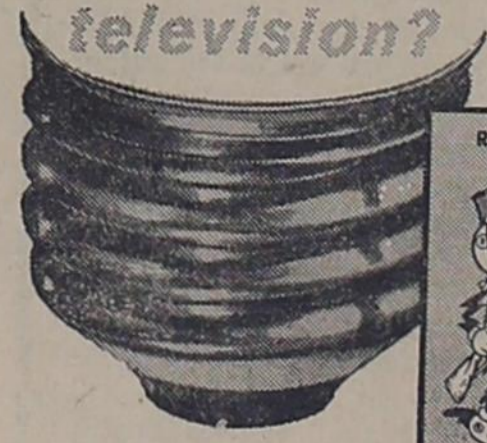

**LEGAL NOTICE**  
**AN ORDINANCE CREATING A MUNICIPAL DEFENSE AND DISASTER RELIEF COMMITTEE AND PROVIDING THE POWERS OF THAT COMMITTEE; CREATING THE OFFICE OF CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR AND PROVIDING THE DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THAT OFFICE; CREATING AN OPERATIONAL ORGANIZATION; GRANTING NECESSARY POWERS TO COPE WITH EMERGENCIES THREATENING LIFE AND PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF GORMAN; AUTHORIZING CO-OPERATIVE AND MUTUAL AID AGREEMENTS FOR RELIEF WORK BETWEEN THIS AND OTHER CITIES OR COUNTIES; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES; PROHIBITING UNAUTHORIZED LIGHTS AND WARNING AND ALL CLEAR SIGNALS AND MAKING VIOLATIONS A MISDEMEANOR PUNISHABLE BY FINE NOT EXCEEDING \$100.00.**

Be it ordained by the City Commissioners of the City of Gorman.

Section 1. There is hereby created the Municipal Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Committee of the City of Gorman which shall consist of the following:

(a) The Mayor of the City of Gorman, who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee.

(b) The Civil Defense Director of the City of Gorman who shall be charged with the preparation of a civil defense plan for the City of Gorman. The Civil Defense Director shall be appointed by and hold his position at the pleasure of the Mayor and the City of Gorman, and the City Commission.

(c) Other representatives not to exceed seven in number to be appointed from civic, business, industry, labor, veterans, profes-

sional or other groups to be selected and appointed by the City Commission.

Section 2. The Civil Defense Director shall have the authority to request the declaration of the existence of an emergency by the City Council or by higher authority. In the event it is deemed necessary to declare the existence of an emergency without delay, the Director may, if the City Council is not in session, do so, but such action shall be subject to confirmation by the City Council at its next meeting.

The duties of the Civil Defense Director shall include the following:

(1) The control and direction of the actual operation or training efforts of the civil defense and disaster relief organization of the City of Gorman.

(2) The maintenance of necessary liaison with other municipal, district, State, County, regional, federal or other civil defense organizations.

(3) The marshaling, after declaration of an emergency as provided for above, of all necessary personnel, equipment or supplies from any department of the City of Gorman to aid in the carrying out of the Civil Defense plan.

(4) The issuance of reasonable rules, regulations or directives which are necessary for the protection of life and property of the City of Gorman, such rules and regulations shall be filed in the office of the City of Gorman and shall receive widespread publicity unless publicity will be of aid and comfort to the enemy.

(5) The authorizing of agreements, after approval of the City Attorney, for the use of private property for air raid shelter and other purposes.

(6) The supervision of and final authorization for the procurement

of all necessary supplies and equipment, with the authorization of the City Commission.

Section 3. Each person serving as a member of the Municipal Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Committee shall prior to assuming their duty or duties, take an oath which shall be substantially as follows:

"I, \_\_\_\_\_, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Texas, against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation of purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties upon which I am about to enter. And I do further swear (or affirm) that I do not advocate, nor am I a member or an affiliate of any political party or organization, group or combination of persons that advocates the overthrow of the Government of the United States or of this State by force or violence; and that during such time as I am a member of the Municipal Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Committee of the City of Gorman I will not advocate nor become a member or an affiliate of any organization, group or combination of persons or of any political party that advocates the overthrow of the Government of the United States or of this State by force or violence."

Section 4. Any unauthorized person who shall operate a siren or other device so as to simulate an air raid or the termination of an air raid of any alert except in case of fire shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance and shall be subject to the penalties imposed by this ordinance.

Section 5. At all times when the orders, rules and regulations made and promulgated pursuant to this ordinance shall be in effect, they shall supersede all existing ordinance, orders, rules and regulations insofar as the latter may be inconsistent therewith.

Section 6. This ordinance shall not be construed so as to conflict with any State or Federal statute or with any Military or Naval order, rule or regulation.

Section 7. This ordinance is an exercise by the City of its governmental functions for the protection of the public peace, health and safety and neither the City of Gorman, the agents and representatives of said City or any individual, receiver, firm, partnership, corporation, association, or trustee, of any of the agents thereof, in good faith carrying out, complying with or attempting to comply with, any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable for any damage sustained to persons or property as the result of said activity. Any person owning or controlling real estate or other premises who voluntarily and without compensation grants to the City of Gorman a license or privilege, or otherwise permits the City to inspect, designate and use the whole or any part or parts of such real estate or premises for the purpose of sheltering persons during an actual, impending or practice enemy attack shall, together with his successors in interest, if any, not be civilly liable for the death of, or injury to any person on or about such real estate or premises under such license, privilege or other permission or for loss of, or damage to, the property of such person.

Section 8. No person shall have the right to expend any public funds of the City in carrying out any civil defense activity authorized by this ordinance without prior approval by the City Commission, nor shall any person have any right to bind the City by contract, agreement or otherwise without prior and specific approval of the City Commission.

Section 9. It shall be unlawful for any person wilfully to obstruct, hinder, or delay any member of the civil defense organization in the enforcement of any rule or regulation issued pursuant to this ordinance, or to do any act forbidden by any rule or regulation issued pursuant to the authority contained in this ordinance. It shall likewise be unlawful for any person to wear, carry or display any emblem, insignia or any other means of identification as a member of the Civil Defense organization of the City of Gorman, unless authority so to do has been granted to such person by the proper officials. Convictions for violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punishable by fine not to exceed \$100.00.

Section 10. If any portion of this ordinance shall, for any reason, be declared invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining provisions hereof.

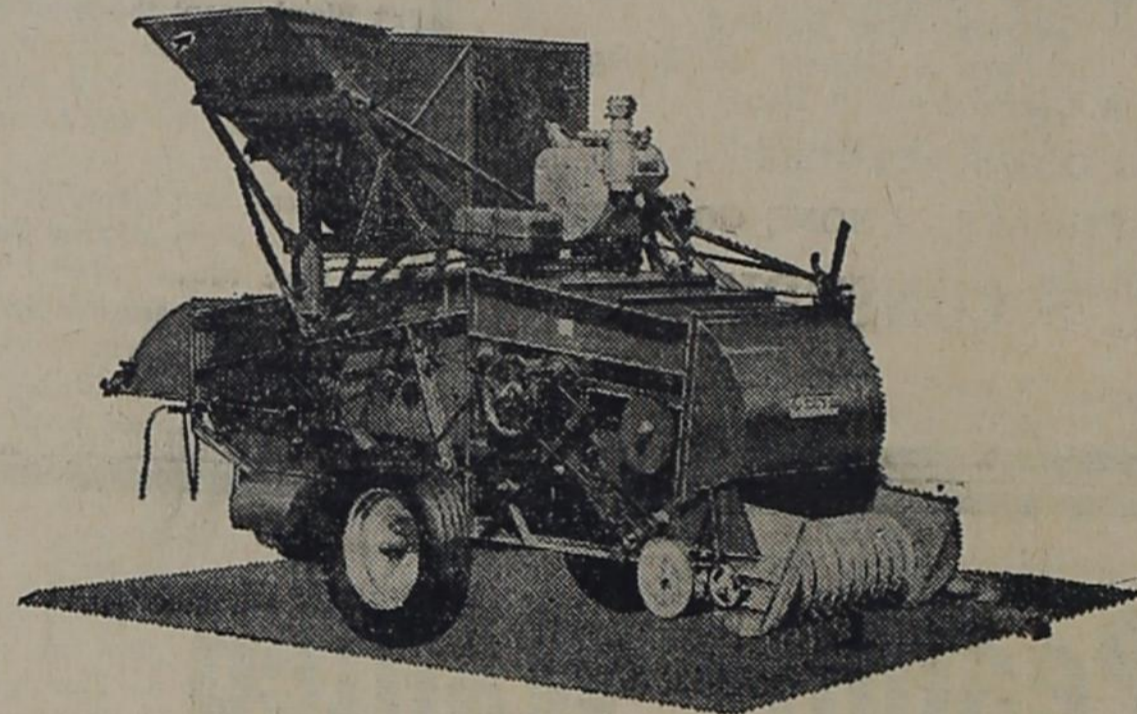

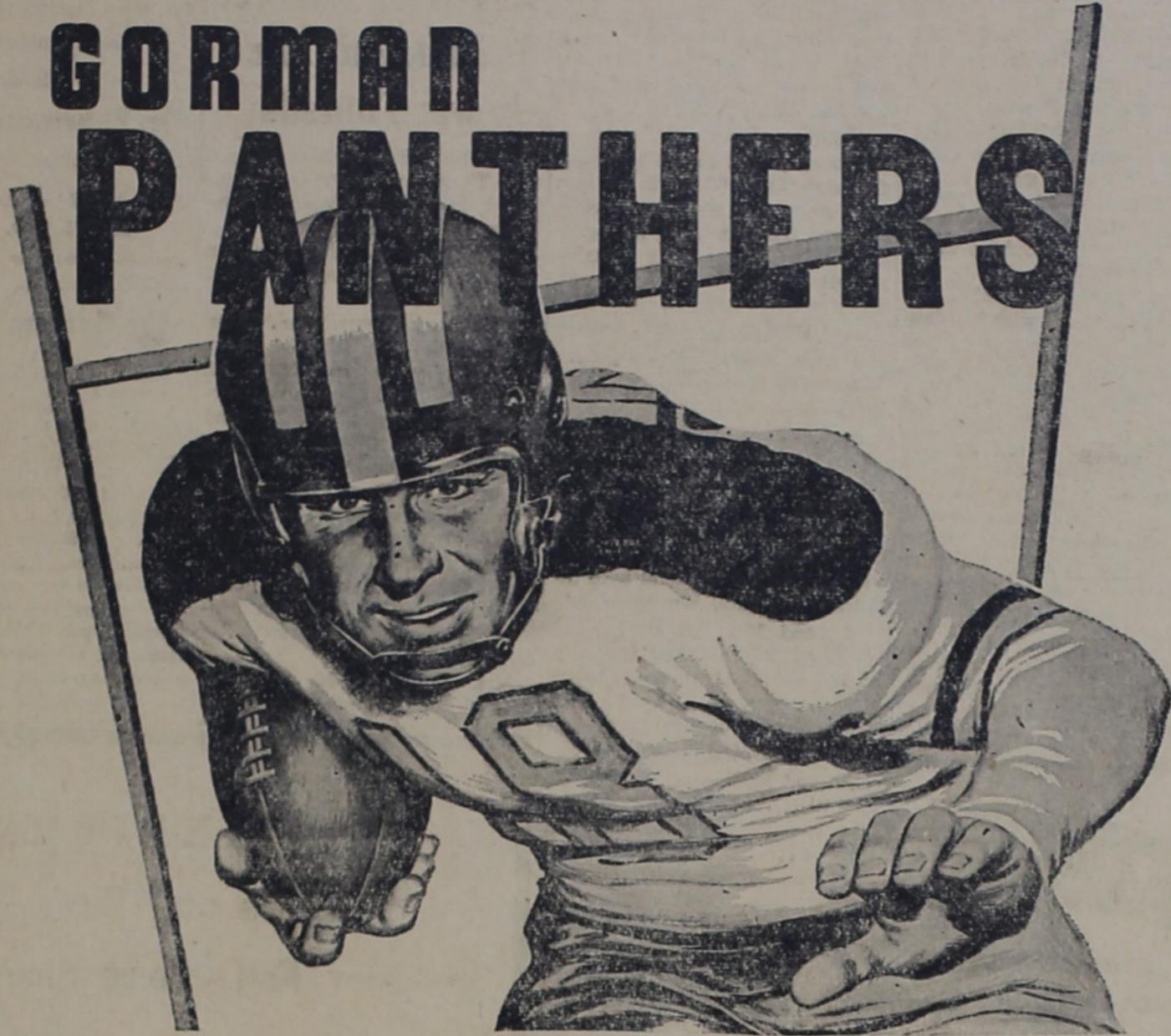
