

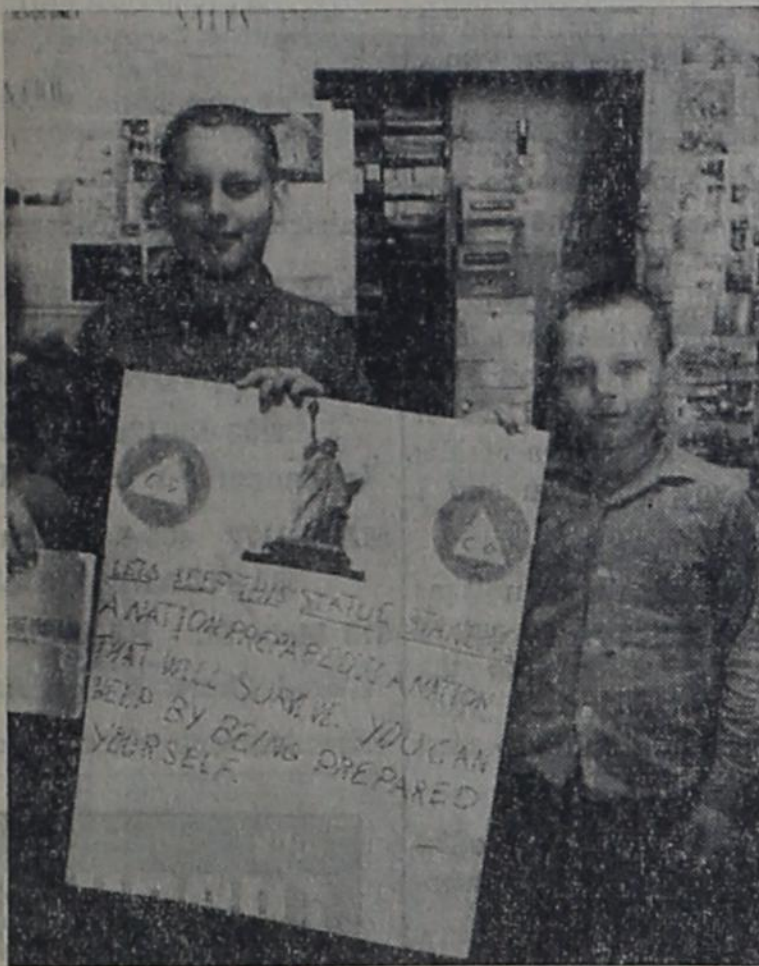

I hope I have built a good bridge.

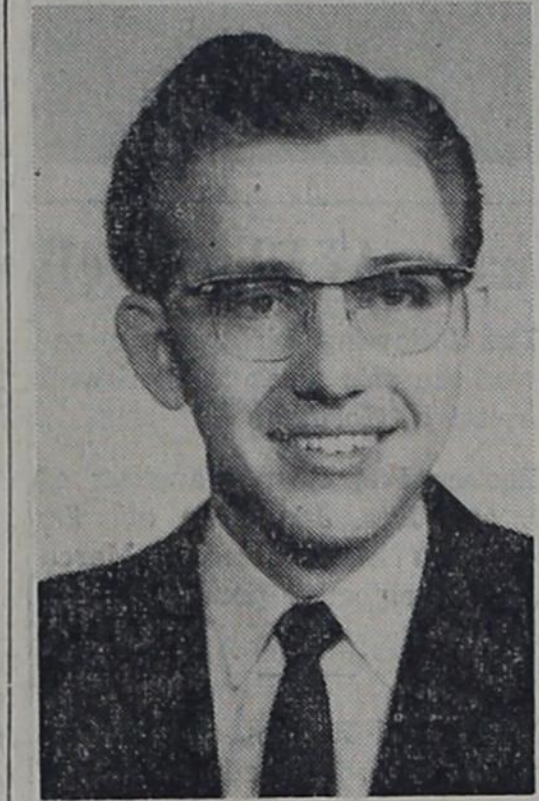
"There is nothing new under the Sun" is an old saying and a true one.

City Commission Rescinds Vote On Truck Storage

The City Commission met on Saturday, March 21 with the following present: Mayor Mears, Commissioners Arlton Smith and E. E. Todd, Water Supt. Buntin, and Secretary Mozelle Rhymes.

The minutes of the last meeting were read. E. E. Todd moved to strike out the motion to store the trucks purchased from the government. Arlton Smith seconded the motion, and the vote was all aye. The minutes were then approved.

Arlton Smith made a motion to have the car radio repaired and placed in Mr. Curb's car. E. E. Todd seconded the motion and the vote was all aye.

Mayor Mears asked each Commissioner to prepare a detailed report of the completed projects and a scope of the proposed programs for the coming year. Geo. L. Smith Jr. will give a report on the new well, water meters, ground storage tanks and the requirements for a State Approved Water System. Street Commissioner Arlton Smith will make a report on the streets to be paved and graveled in the coming year. E. E. Todd's report will consist of a progress report on the required settlement tanks for the disposal area, killing the willow trees around the sewer drain on Mrs. Williams farm and the improvements made at the dump ground.

Horace Gray of Goldthwaite met with the commission to see about moving a skating rink into town. No action was taken at this time.

Arlton Smith made a motion to pay \$2,000.00 plus interest to April 1st on the bank note. E. E. Todd seconded the motion and the vote was all aye.

After a discussion the Commission agreed to appoint C. E. Goodwin to direct traffic for funerals.

Arlton Smith made a motion to pay the insurance policies due Gorman Insurance Agency. E. E. Todd seconded the motion and the vote was all aye.

There being no further business it was moved and adopted to adjourn.

ELDERLY UNITS CONSTRUCTION APPROVED BY PUBLIC HOUSING

Mr. W. C. Smith, Chairman of Public Government Housing Projects for the City of Gorman, has announced that a ten-unit elderly Housing Project has been approved by the Federal Public Housing Administration, and \$142,603 has been appropriated for the construction of the project.

The units will be one bedroom units constructed on the lots adjoining and owned by the present Gorman Housing Authority with the exception of a 90 ft. lot that has been purchased from Mrs. J. B. Brandon.

Bids for the construction will be let as soon as the title is cleared on the newly purchased lot, and Mr. Smith stated that the project will be completed possibly by August or early September.

Present members of the Gorman Housing Authority, in addition to Mr. Smith, are Dick Jay, Gus Frossard, Erich Arnold, and Ben R. Townley. Mrs. Ruth McKenzie is executive secretary.

G. L. HAMILTON SERVING WITH USN IN TAIWAN

SOUTHWESTERN TAIWAN (FHTNC) — Alva G. L. Hamilton, aviation machinists mate airman, USN, son of Mr. T. L. Hamilton of Gorman, Texas, is participating with Carrier Airborne Early Warning Squadron 11 in a coordinated U. S.-Nationalist Chinese amphibious exercise called "Operation Backpack" being conducted off the coast of Taiwan.

Backpack is an exercise to test the amphibious capabilities and readiness of the forces of the Seventh Fleet and the Nationalist Chinese Navy. The exercise, with over 40,000 men and 140 units participating, will culminate in an amphibious assault on beaches of southern Taiwan, and will demonstrate the effectiveness of the U. S. Seventh Fleet to rapidly move a significant combat force to a troubled area in order to assist an ally.

Prior to the assault, aircraft of the Seventh Fleet will soften beach defenses. In addition, support ships will conduct anti-submarine warfare exercises and the area surrounding the beachhead will be cleared of any obstructions and mines.

"Backpack" is similar to those exercises conducted periodically by units of the Seventh Fleet with SEATO and other allied nations in the Far East to improve their proficiency in coordinated amphibious warfare operations and to

ROBERT WHITT NAMED TO JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP OF AMERICAN HEREFORD ASSN.

Kansas City, Mo., March 20, 1964 - (Special) — Robert Whitt, Gorman, Texas, has been named to junior membership in the American Hereford Association, the world's largest purebred registry organization, with headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri.

Eighty-eight junior Hereford breeders were placed on the Association's official roster during February. The Association maintains active accounts for more than 60,000 breeders of registered Herefords over the nation.

The Hereford Association, during the last fiscal year, recorded 513,076 purebred calves. The year's total recordings were the fifth highest on record and almost twice the combined registrations of other major beef breeds.
