## Area Men Named To Rehab Agency

Sam Kimmell and James McCracken of Cisco and Don Estes of Desdemona have been appointed to the Round-Up Committee for the 1963 Cattleman's Round-Up for Crippled Children, according to a report from C. A. Morris, chairman.

The Round-Up, founded in 1961 by Coke County Rancher Conda Wylie, is one of the main financial sponsors of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene.

Each year since its founding, Texas ranchers have donated livestock to the Round-Up which is sold for all profits going to the Center. It provides over one-third of funds needed by the Center.

The Center serves 724 patients with some 110 patients receiving daily treatments. It is a private, non-profit organization dedicated to the rehabilitation of the handicapped. Most of the patients are victims of polio, strokes, cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis and other neurological or orthopedic disorders.

The Center neither wants nor receives any government support, and the auction last year brought in \$53,890.46, almost half the Center's yearly budget. It gets help from the sale of Easter Seals, but according to Homer H. Scott, chairman of the board, it is the Cattleman's Round-Up that makes it one of the best rehabilitation establishments in the country.

The Round-Up sale, one of the most unique auctions to be found, will be held September 28 at the Abilene Livestock Auction in conjunction with the "Best in the West" stocker-feeder sale.

## Short Wave Use On Increase In County

Use of the short wave citizen's band, 11 meter, 27 mega-cycle, is on the increase. According to Clay McKnight, retired from the U. S. Air Force, some 50 members of the Eastland County Ten-Ten Citizens Band meet regularly to exchange their experiences in receiving and sending.

Any American citizen over 18 years of age may make application to the United States Federal Communications Commission for license to broadcast on the citizens band within 150 mile radius.

Receiving and transmitting sets range in price from \$40 upward to several hundred. When installed the antenna should not exceed 20 feet above a permanent structure.

The sets are being used for business, pleasure and emergency service.

Law enforcement officers, especially highway patrolmen, make use of the short-wave. Carl Bostead of Olden, Inspector of the Department of Public Safety, is vice president of the Eastland County Citizen Band. Roy Smith, owner of a plumbing business in Eastland, is the president.

Local law enforcement officer, Constable E. L. Dennis, recently located within an hour's time a relative, whose whereabouts were unknown, for a family who had lost a son.

Check and Bud Smith, local flyers, use their sets in their automobile business and as a hobby. Mr. Check Smith stated that both he and Mr. Don Pierson of Eastland, also a flyer, have walkie-talkie sets and that their service is always available and free for emergencies.

Another fan, flyer, and farmer, Doyle Lee (Pinky) Jobe, and brother, James Jobe, are reported to have gone commercial.

C. B. broadcasting, while the big 1962 Eastland County grass fire raged, is credited with saving the lives of men who remaining at post were direction bound by clouds of smoke.

The Gorman Fire Department is among the few departments in the County not equipped with a C.B. set. Mr. Gabe Wright, Fire Chief, stated on Monday that the department has voted to add the equipment and that installation will take place within two weeks.

## LARGE NUMBER EXPECTED FOR SWPGA ANNUAL GROWERS MEET

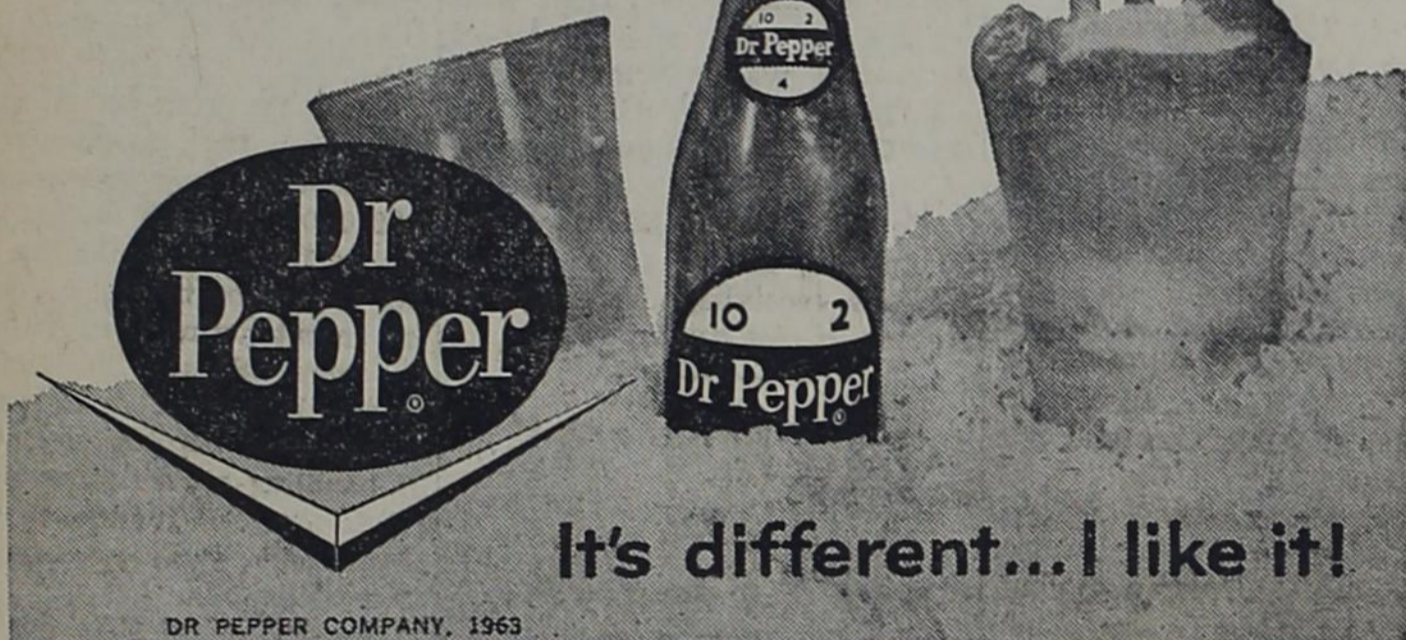

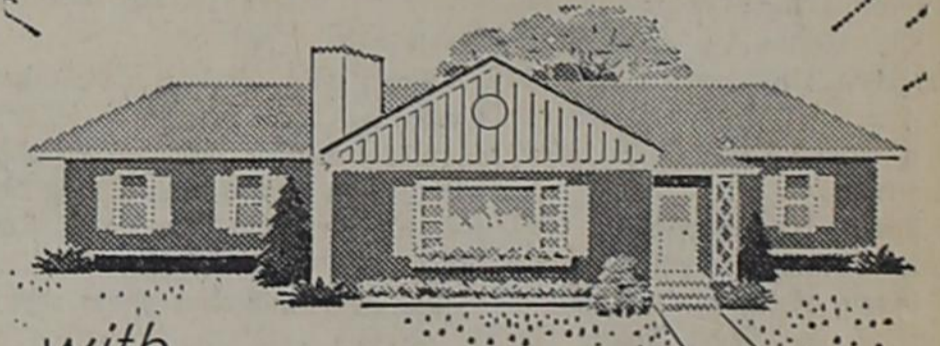

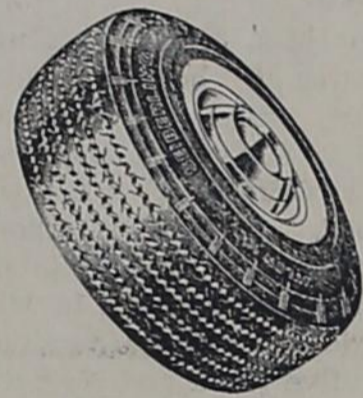

### PROPERTY STOLEN FROM YOUR AUTO MAY NOT BE COVERED BY INSURANCE

"If a camera is stolen from my car will my automobile theft policy cover the loss?" a writer questions.

No, it will not. Only equipment attached to your car — and the car itself — is insured against theft. If your hood ornament or hub caps were stolen you would be paid for the loss. You also would be reimbursed if your car radio were taken but not if your portable radio were stolen — at least you would not under the terms of your family automobile policy.

There are, however, policies that do provide this protection. Personal property floater policies or a "home-owners" package policy would cover you if your belongings were taken from your locked car.

Policies also are available that would provide payment if your belongings were stolen from an unlocked vehicle. These policies are designed to offer the broadest possible insurance protection and not intended to encourage the policyholder to leave his car unlocked.

Where possible, it is a good practice to keep your valuables out of sight — lock them in your trunk or glove compartment. Also, you should always lock your auto and never leave the keys in the ignition, even if you are only going to be away from the car for a moment or two. Across the country cars are stolen at the rate of one every minute and a half and most of them are unlocked.

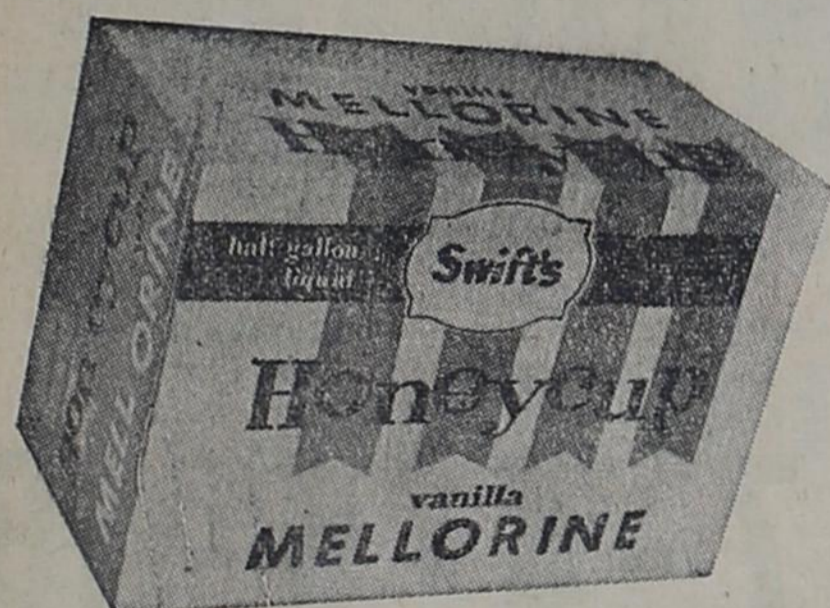
