A business meeting will be held at 10:30 a. m. and a Memorial message will be brought at 11:00 o'clock.

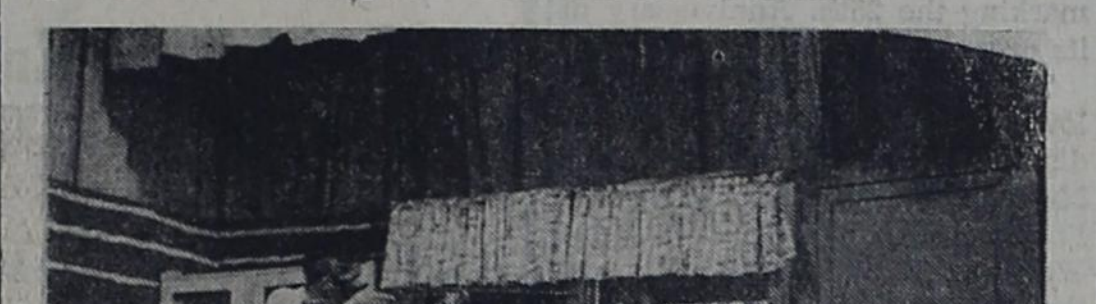
An old fashioned dinner-on-the-ground will be spread at the noon hour.

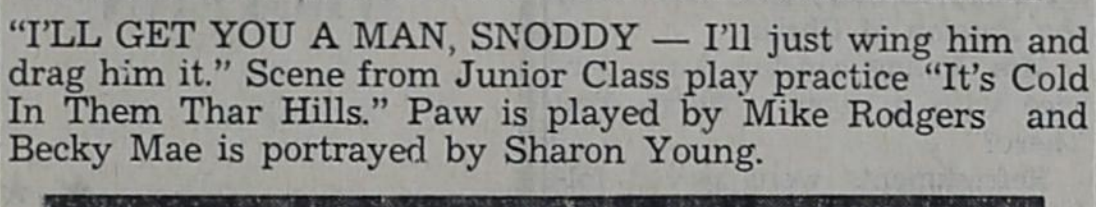
The play will be presented at 12:35 p. m. Thursday for the Grade School students. Admission will be 10c.

Less Than 50 Percent Of Screwworm Funds Contributed To Date

Oscar Schaefer, Cook, chairman of the Eastland County Animal Health Committee, stated today that contributions to the screw-worm eradication fund are lagging.

Less than 50% of the county's \$3100.00 quota has been subscribed to date according to him. After conferring with Glyn Gilliam, Ranger banker and county treasurer for the fund collection drive as to the amount that had been turned in, Schaefer urged all community committees to immediately finish soliciting funds from those in their particular areas and turn them in.

Livestock men not immediately contacted are requested to leave their donations at the bank where they do business.

A total of 10c per head for all cattle and 2c per head for sheep, goats and hogs will more than meet the goal, chairman reported. Owners of pets and deer hunters are also urged to make a small contribution. Deer will annually increase if the screwworms are eliminated.

There are 23 different species of flies that lay eggs in animal wounds. The larvae of the screw-worm, however, does not eat rotting flesh. It burrows toward the healthy flesh where it twists and tears sucking the body fluids and blood. When vital parts of the animal is reached death occurs.

FIFTH MEETING OF EC-65 GROUP SET ON MAY 4TH IN CISCO

The next EC-65 Seminar will be held in Cisco on Tuesday, May 4, according to an announcement by Eastland County civic leaders. This is the fifth in a series of five training meetings being sponsored by county civic organizations in cooperation with the Texas Industrial Commission. EC-65 is the pilot industrial development program which is being conducted by the State Industrial Commission with the aim of training community leaders in the techniques of attracting new industrial payrolls to the county.

This seminar will show the civic workers "where to find industrial prospects." It will include talks on existing industries, home-grown industries, and working with professional industrial development personnel employed by utilities, railroads, and banks. Also Texas manufacturers, and how to organize an effective program of obtaining prospects will be discussed.

Outstanding industrial development professionals from around the state will be on the program.

GORMAN PANTHERS WALK AWAY WITH DISTRICT TRACK HONORS

The Gorman Panthers walked away with the District 14-B track and field meet championship at Ranger Junior College stadium on Friday, April 9th.

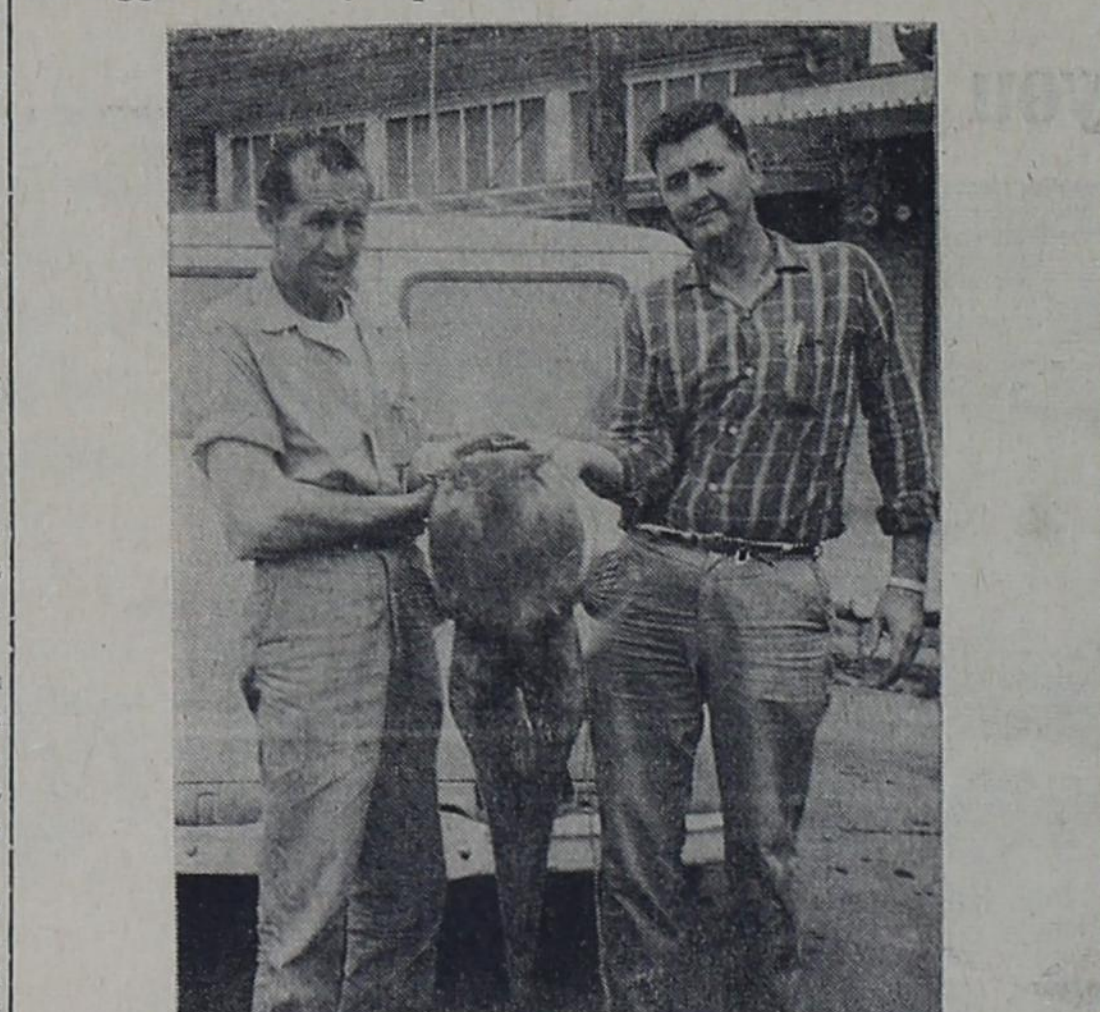

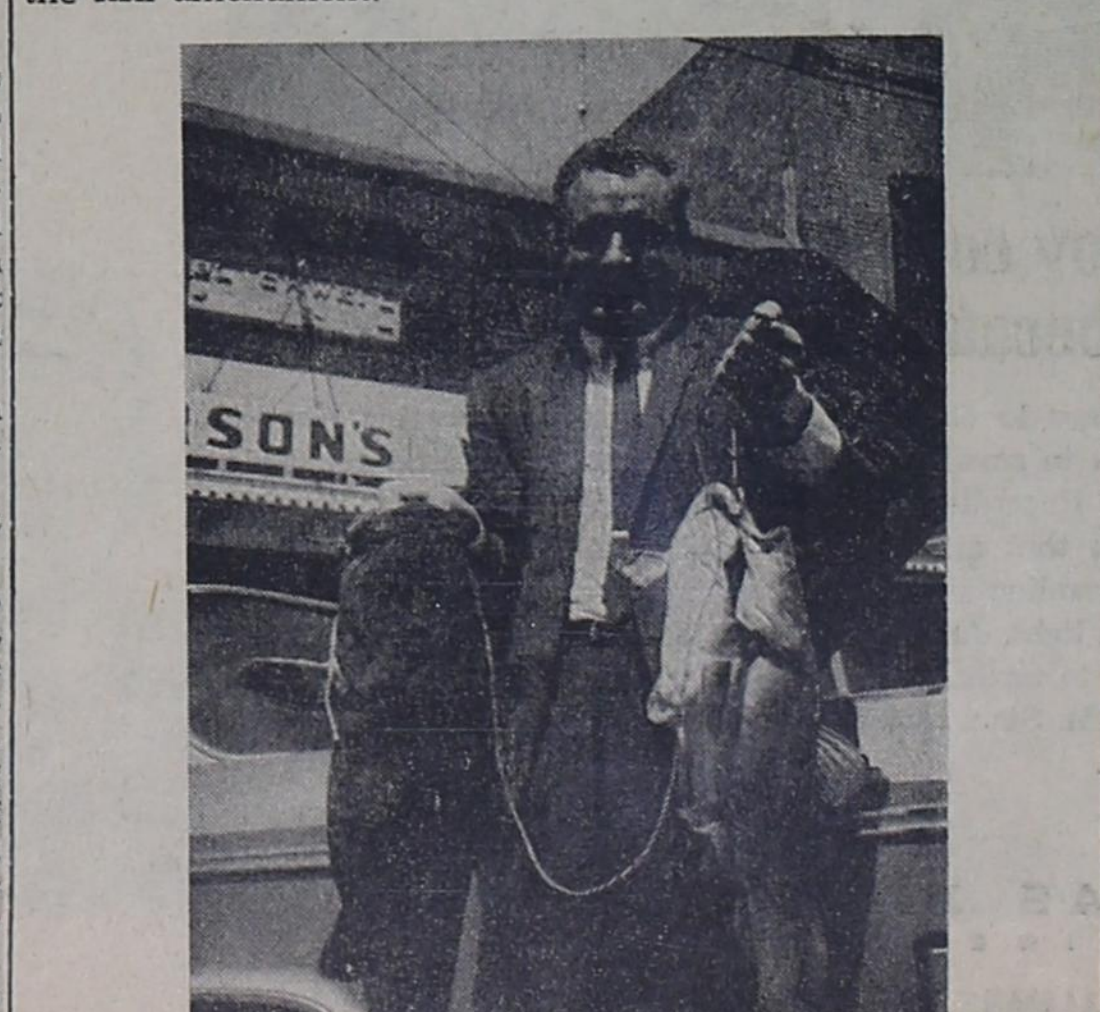

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**As It Looks
From Here**

APPLYING THE LOGIC
OF LAW
THE 18TH CENTURY LAW-

YER AND WRITER BASTIAT,
in his commentaries of about
1850, made no mention of
"rights" under law — human
rights, social rights, employment
rights, civil rights and majority
rights. Obviously he felt that no
such "rights" exist, except those
pertainable to our three God-
given rights of life, liberty and
property (discussed last week).
If, as Bastiat indicates, these
three basic rights are not con-

ferable upon the individual by
man-made laws, where else
would they originate? To whom
would they apply and to what
degree? For example, with the
consent of an employer, no man
can be denied the right to work.
Without the consent of an em-
ployer, no man can acquire the
right to work. Hence, the term
"right to work" becomes mean-
ingless under this logic, as do
all these other "rights" above
referred to.

FOLLOWING THIS LINE OF
REASON it seems necessary to
distinguish the difference between
rights, which every individual
possesses (life, liberty and prop-
erty) and privileges, which desir-
ed persons may be granted, or,
qualified persons may acquire
through a mutually acceptable ar-
rangement with other men.

IN A REPUBLIC, ALL ECO-
NOMIC EXCHANGES between
individuals are mutually volun-
tary. If this concept is main-
tained, how can the owner of
property be denied the right to
sell to whomever he chooses, on
whatever terms are agreed on
between the seller and purchas-
er, and for whatever reason he
chooses? The economic facts of
supply and demand are no re-
specter of persons. It works the
same for everyone. Persons who
are unable to conduct exchanges
with proprietors of property,
goods or services, thus generate
a demand to initiate like busi-
nesses for themselves and con-
duct those enterprises for prof-
it. Many do exactly this and
the general economic welfare is
improved. Others seek law to
compel privilege, or they mill
in mobs and demonstrate. For

what? Mostly it is difficult to
know just exactly what, be-
cause of the many motives
seemingly involved.

ASSUME, HOWEVER, IT IS
ENTIRELY A DEMAND for re-
lief under law to assure that pas-
sage of the Declaration of Inde-
pendence, the theme of which is
that "all men are created equal."
If the sentence is kept in the con-
text in which it was written, it
has nothing to do with people as
individuals. Rather, it proclaims
that "governments derive their
just powers from the consent of
the governed. . ." — not from the
"divine right of kings." It told
the British Crown that our fathers
were not born with inseparable
bond and allegiance to any king —
not even the King of England —
and were, in fact, his equals in
that regard.

point on which one may have con-
victions.

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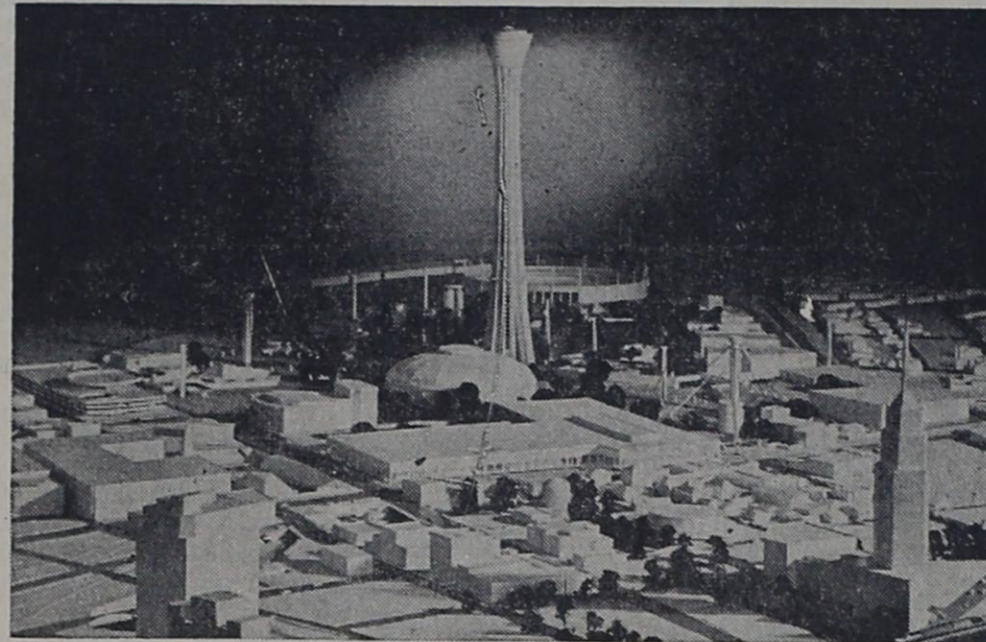

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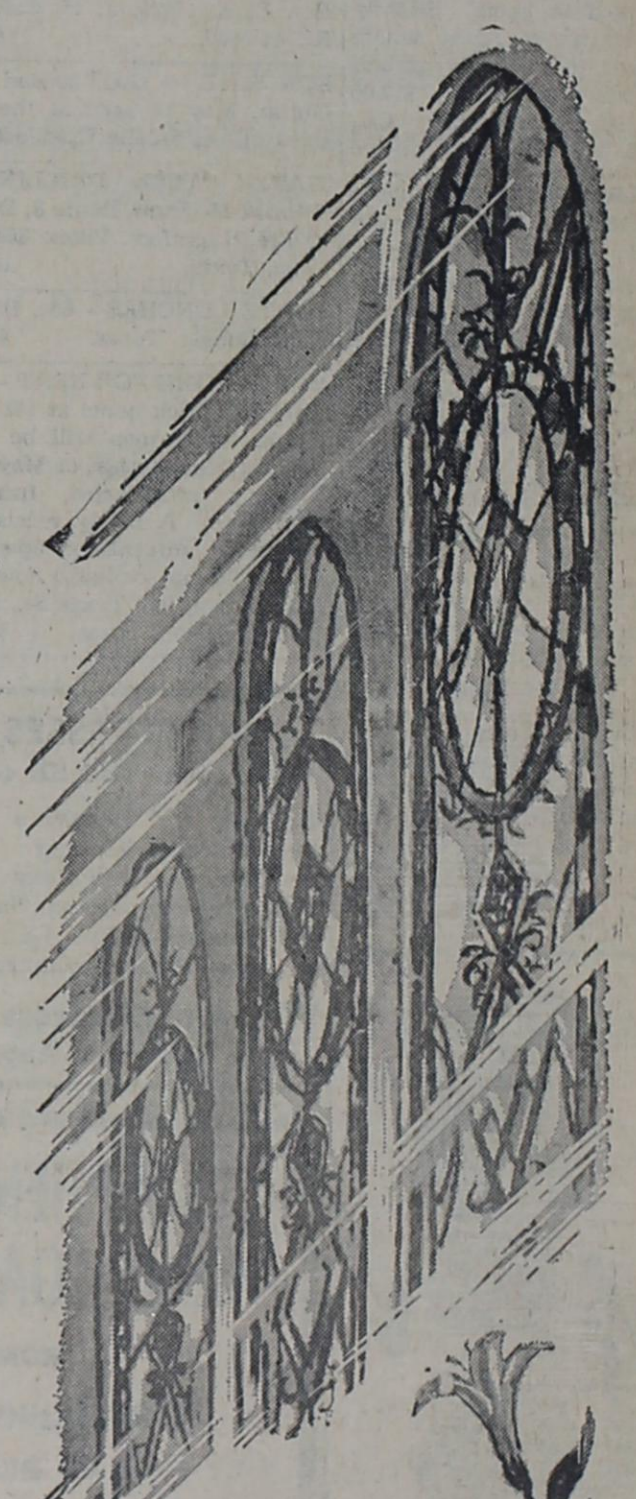

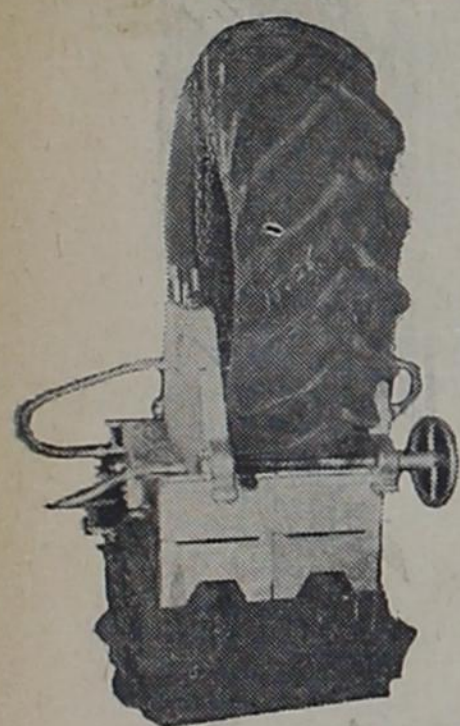

Browsing with Bev

Last week, I introduced you to this series of news articles and told you how to identify fabrics. This week, let's take a look at the natural fabrics.

COTTON

Characteristics: Wide selection of weights and textures. Absorbant, soft, smooth, durable, and strong.

Uses: All kinds of light weight apparel.

Care: Can be laundered or dry cleaned; limited only by finish, dye, and construction of garment. May be machine washed or dried. Avoid risk of mildew. Do not use chlorine bleach on resin treated cotton unless label says safe to do so.

LINEN

Characteristics: Cool, crisp, comfortable in warm weather. Extremely durable and does not lint. Wrinkles easily unless treated to resist wrinkling.

Uses: Women's and children's dresses, blouses, and summer suiting.

Care: May be laundered, wet cleaned, or dry cleaned. Iron at high temperature. Avoid pressing in sharp creases. Avoid risk of mildew.

SILK

Characteristics: Luxurious in appearance and feel. Absorbant, durable, and strong. Natural resistant to wrinkling. Dyes well.

Uses: Light and medium weight clothing; accessories.

Care: Dry cleaning preferred. Careful hand laundry possible with some items. Protect from perspiration. Can be attacked by moths and carpet beetles.

WOOL

Characteristics: Warm, soft, resilient. Resists wrinkling. Medium strength, but durable. Holds creases and shapes well.

Uses: Outerwear; medium wt. clothing.

Care: Dry cleaning preferred. Will shrink and felt in presence of moisture, heat and agitation, as in laundry. Must be protected from moth and carpet beetles. Next week we'll take a look at the man-made fibers.

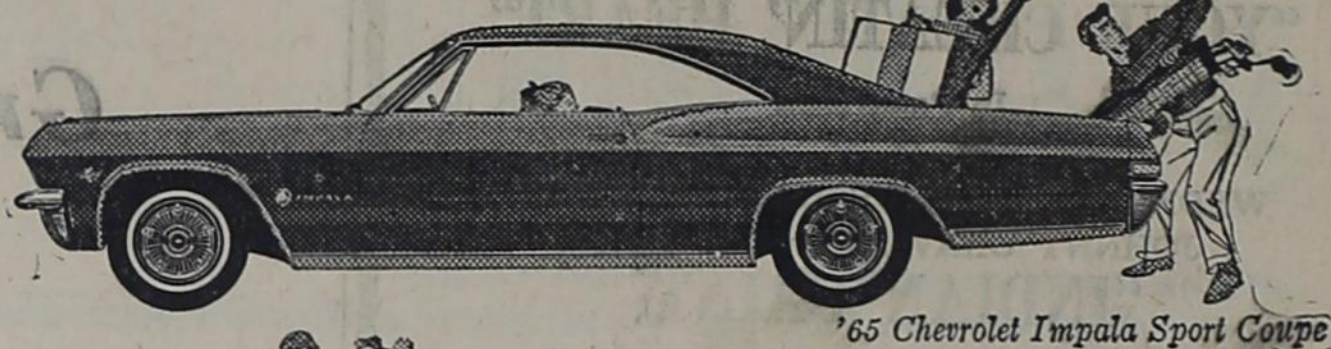
