10 Amendments On Ballot In November Second Election

Ten amendments to the Texas Constitution will be put before the voters on Tuesday, November 2, including proposals to increase the governor's term of office to four years and to increase the terms of state representatives to four years.

Three of the ten amendments relate to state education, three to general welfare, and four to administrative proposals.

Listed as Amendment 1 on the ballot — College Building Fund: (An increase in state ad-valorem tax from 5c to 10c on the \$100 valuation. Five schools to be added to those already benefitting from funds obtained through the ad-valorem tax are: Arlington State College, Midwestern University, University of Houston, Pan American College and Angelo State College.)

Amendment 2 — Veterans Land Fund (Would increase Veterans Land Fund by \$200 Million from sale of bonds if passed. If not passed, the Veterans Land Program will cease on December 1, 1965.)

Amendment 3 — Medical Care: (If passed would enable the state to continue its cooperation with the Federal Government in providing assistance and medical care to the aged, needy blind, and permanently disabled.)

Amendment 4 — Four Year Term For Governor and other statewide officials — (If passed would increase to four years the governor's term as well as all other state-wide officials: lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, treasurer, land commissioner, secretary of state, and commissioner of agriculture.)

Amendment 5 — Teacher Retirement Fund.

Amendment 6 — College Student Loan Fund: (The administration of the Texas Teachers Retirement Fund would be clarified by Amendment 5, and Amendment 6 would authorize the sale of as much as \$85 million of general obligation bonds by the state to provide loans to needy college students, which would be repaid with interest.)

Amendment 7 — Hospital Tax Exemption: (Tax exemptions to hospitals which give more than \$1.5 million annually for free hospital and medical care to the indigent, if passed. At this time it applies only to Herman Hospital in Houston.)

Amendment 8 — Automatic Retirement of Judges (at age 75): (Provides for the retirement of state and district and appellate judges at between ages 70 and 75.)

Amendment 9 — Salary Increase for Lieutenant Governor and Speaker: (Permit the Legislature itself to set an annual salary for the speaker and the lieutenant governor, as well as increase per diem allowance to all legislators when in session to \$20 from \$12 per day.)

Amendment 10 — Four Year Term For State Representatives: (Proposes four year terms for members of the State House of Representatives. Members of the House would be divided into two "Classes" so that one-half of the membership would face election every two years, which is the plan now used by the Texas Senate where terms are four years.)

Local LVNA Members To Attend Convention In San Angelo

Mrs. Lucille Broom, L.V.N., and Mrs. Alice Eakin, L.V.N., will be in San Angelo October 28-31 to participate in the 16th Annual Convention of the Licensed Vocational Nurses Association of Texas. Designed as a continuing educational experience, leaders in the fields of nursing, medicine, business, and education will convene to exchange information on the entire range of issues affecting vocational nursing and better patient care. Expected attendance for the four day conference at the Cactus Hotel, numbers over 400 and includes Licensed Vocational Nurses, Professional Nurses, Doctors, Educators, and Student Vocational Nurses.

Keynote speaker is Doctor William H. McCay, Gynecologist, who will speak on the theme of the convention, "The Challenge of Service." Others experts will deal with national health problems such as mental retardation, the aging citizen, mental health, and alcoholism. New developments in the practice of nursing as well as ethics in nursing will be emphasized.

The LVNA of Texas is the oldest and strongest association for vocational nurses in Texas. Founded in 1950, it serves over 3,000 members and is governed by a ten member board of directors. Membership is composed of Licensed Vocational Nurses, and Provisional members who are students enrolled in vocational nursing schools of which there are 147 throughout the State of Texas.

Mrs. Hatcher, native of Gorman, great-granddaughter of the town's first postmaster, Hardy Parker, (Postmaster Edwin Lee having been appointed to Shinoak) and member of the Woman's Study Club, gave a review of "The Biography of a Pioneer Family" of which she is co-author with Miss Ozella Pulley. The story, written in 1955, is the life of Dr. Edward Kimble and his wife, Mary Shelton Kimble, as seen through the eyes of the authors with a bit of research. The narrative flows smoothly and the diction is well chosen.

Truth is related with frankness and humor. Frugality and generosity were both, oddly enough, characteristics of Mary Kimble.

Mrs. George Blackwell, the last of the FAMOUS FOUR, who founded the Blackwell Hospital, displayed her scrapbook as she told the story of "How It All Came To Be."

Dr. George Blackwell and his brother, Dr. Edward Blackwell, with their wives, Nee Frankie and Bess Brogdon, had come to Gorman from Sipe Springs and opened their office but World War I interrupted their careers. And it may have been a fortunate happening, for in military service their hopes were not dimmed.

They returned and were shortly confronted with a host of patients. The oil boom had hit Desdemona and Gorman was in on it. A 12 room two-story hospital was the answer.

Mrs. Blackwell related how the doctor's improvised 4-door Ford Ambulance brought a Desdemona accident victim to the hospital. The Leon was out of banks when the ambulance reached the bottom land. Their's was but to "Wait" but good thinking across the quarter of mile stream had arranged for a bed with the patient tied to a wagon with horses that swam across. And not too soon, for the infection had grown to bursting points as shown when the knife was inserted.

Mr. Bennett, local oral historian and native of Gorman, spoke on "Early Times in Gorman," telling of barefoot days at Shinoak, later called Bass Lake, of the town's first buildings. Of the early settlers he remembered; the doctors, a full line who came and went, some by death; of when the first train came; when water from Bass Lake sold for 25 cents a barrel and that was money.

So interested were the group in Mr. Bennett's reminiscing, the discussion became a question and answer period on "Who Did That? When and Where?" And the talk ran on as refreshments began to be served and gifts were presented to Mrs. Hatcher and Mr. Bennett.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE EMPOWERING THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WORKS OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS, TO PLACE AND MAINTAIN TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES, WITH REQUIRED SPECIFICATIONS UPON PUBLIC STREETS AND ALLEYS FOR THE PURPOSE OF REGULATING, WARNING OR GUIDING TRAFFIC, AND REGULATE THE STOPPING, STANDING AND PARKING OF MOTOR VEHICLES UPON PUBLIC STREETS AND ALLEYS OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS, AS HE MAY DEEM NECESSARY, PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Gorman, Texas:

SECTION 1: The Director of Public Works of the City of Gorman, Texas, may place and maintain, or provide for such placing or maintaining such traffic control devices, conforming to the manual and specifications for traffic control devices adopted and approved by Article 6701d, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, upon all public streets and alleys within the City of Gorman, Texas, as he may deem necessary, to regulate, warn or guide traffic.

SECTION 2: No driver of a vehicle shall disobey the instructions of any official traffic control device placed in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, unless at the time otherwise directed by a police officer.

SECTION 3: No person shall without lawful authority attempt to or in fact, alter, deface, injure, knock down, or remove any official traffic control device or any railroad sign or signal or any inscription, shield or insignia thereon, or any other part thereof.

SECTION 4: No person shall place, maintain, or display upon or in view of any public street or alley any unauthorized sign, signal marking or device which purports to be or is imitation of or resembles an official traffic control device or railroad sign or signal or which attempts to direct the movement of traffic or which hides from view or interferes with the effectiveness of any official traffic control device or any railroad sign or signal; and no person shall place or maintain upon any street or alley any traffic sign or signal bearing thereon any commercial

advertising. This shall not be deemed to prohibit the erection upon private property adjacent to public streets or alleys of signs giving useful directional information and of a type cannot be mistaken for official signs.

SECTION 5: Every such prohibitive sign or marking is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and the Director of Public Works of the City of Gorman, Texas, is hereby empowered to remove the same or cause it to be removed without notice.

SECTION 6: The Director of Public Works of the City of Gorman, Texas, may place signs prohibiting or restricting the stopping or parking of vehicles on any public street or alley within the corporate limits of the City of Gorman, Texas, where in the opinion of the Director of Public Works, such stopping, standing or parking is dangerous to those using the public street or alley or where the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles would unduly interfere with the free movement of traffic thereon. Such signs shall be official signs and no person shall stop, stand or park any vehicle in violation of the restriction stated on such sign.

SECTION 7: It is a misdemeanor for any person to violate any provision of this ordinance.

SECTION 8: Every person convicted of a misdemeanor for a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished for by a fine of not less than ONE DOLLAR nor more than TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS.

SECTION 9: The fact that there are at this time signs placed on various public streets and alleys in the City of Gorman, Texas, for the purpose of regulating, warning and guiding traffic and the stopping, starting and parking motor vehicles creates an imperative emergency that the requirement that this ordinance be read and passed on three separate occasions be dispensed with and the reading of this ordinance on three separate days is hereby dispensed with, and same shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as is required by law.

Passed unanimously this 27th day of September, 1965, by the City Commission of the City of Gorman, Texas; all Commissioners being present with the exception of Davis Smith.

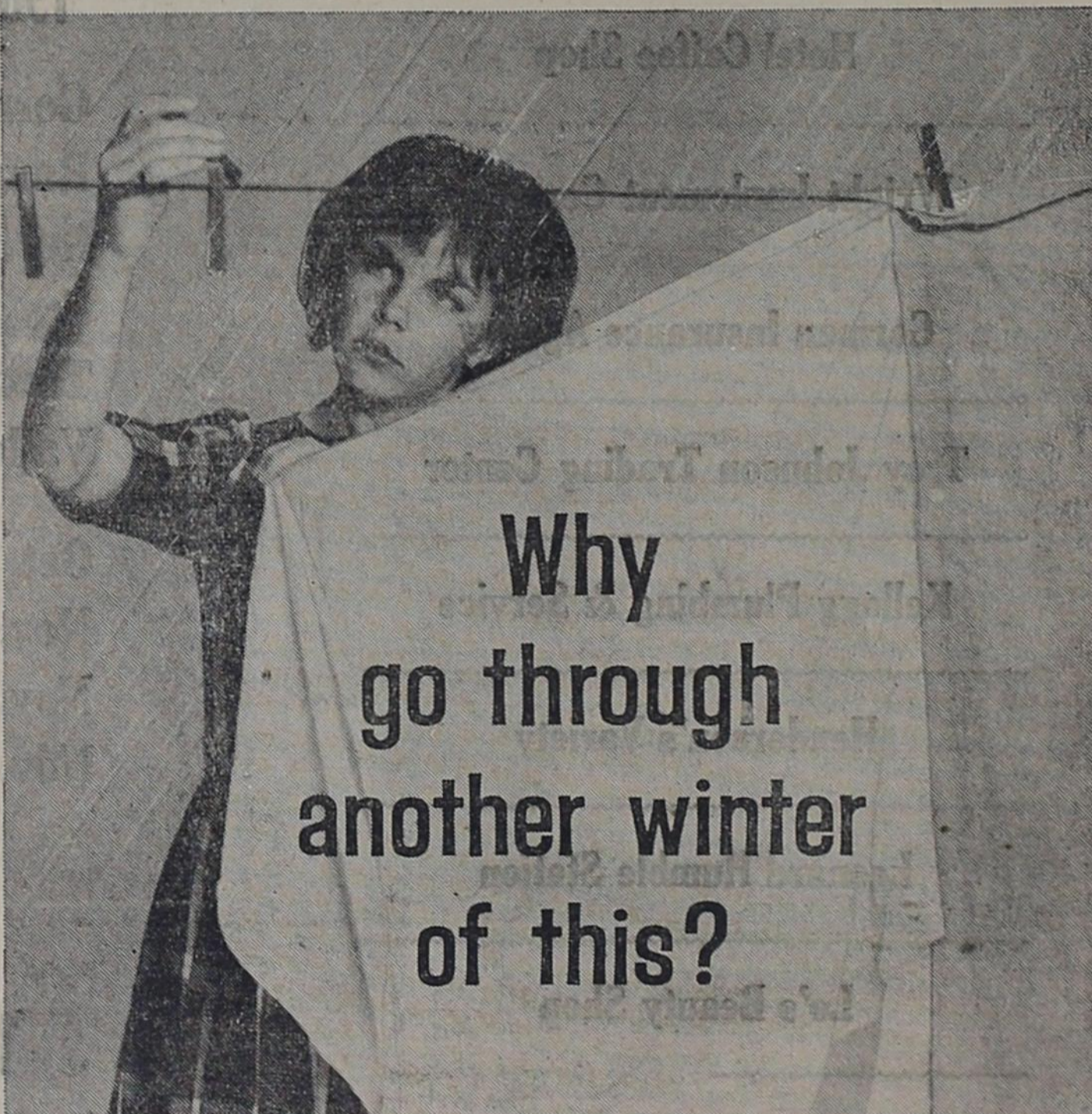

Delay Harvesting If Conditions Favorable

If conditions are right, it will pay producers to leave peanuts in the ground as long as is practical, says Dr. Arthur L. Harrison, plant pathologist at the Plant Diseases Experiment Station, Yoakum.

Dr. Harrison says tests at the Yoakum station indicate that date of harvesting has a definite effect on the grade and yield of peanuts. In a 1961 test, Dr. Harrison said peanuts harvested at 102 days from planting yielded 2,101 pounds per acre. Peanuts harvested at 113 days yielded 2,110 pounds per acre, and those harvested at 127 days yielded 2,807 pounds per acre.

In the same test, the grade, or percent sound mature kernels, (SMK) went from 57 percent at 102 days, to 67 percent at 113 days and finally to 68 percent for

peanuts harvested at the end of 127 days from planting.

The peanuts in this test were treated with PCNB, (terraclor) and a foliage treatment of sulfur and copper oxide. They were also irrigated.

Similar results were obtained from different foliage treatments. In every case, the grades of SMK and the yields increased for each delay of harvest from 102-113-127 days from planting. The highest yields and grades were obtained from the plots receiving foliage fungicide, harvested at 127 days from planting, and where PCNB had been applied to the soil under the crown of the peanut plants.

Dr. Harrison concludes, "As long as the peas are sound and the foliage is good, the longer you leave the peanuts in the ground, the higher the yield will be, and the peanuts will be of a better grade."
