



WOLVERINES WIN OVER MORAN, TO HOST LONGHORNS TONIGHT

The Carbon Wolverines continued their winning ways on Thursday night with a perfect season through five non-conference games and two district tilts, by overwhelming the Moran team by a score of 46 to 0.

Carbon's first score came in the initial period when Ronnie Hughes broke loose for 35 yards around his right end for the TD. Alvie Allison kicked the extra points.

The second Wolverine tally also came in the first quarter when Hughes got loose again for 25 yards over right end for the tally. Allison again converted the two extra points.

Carbon's first marker in the second stanza came on a 21 yard scamper by Tim Warren around right end. The conversion try failed.

Warren scored again for the Wolverines in the second period on a fine 23 yard jaunt around the weak side right end. Allison ran for the extra point. The first half ended with the score standing at 29 to 0.

In the third quarter Tim Warren capped a Carbon drive by going over the goal from 4 yards out for the marker. The kick for points failed.

Carbon's next touchdown came in the third when Jerry Cook, playing heads-up defense for the Wolverines, intercepted a Moran pass and ran it back 50 yards for a touchdown. Allison ran for the extra point. The third quarter ended with the score reading Carbon 42 and Moran 0.

The final Wolverine score came in the fourth period with Ray Kanady plunging the final 4 yards for the tally. Joe Field ran for

the extra point. This ended the action for the night with the scoreboard reading Carbon 49 and the Moran team 0.

All of the Wolverine players got into the action in the Moran-Carbon game.

The Wolverines now stand 2-0 in the district race with three games left on their schedule.

The first big test on the season for the Wolverines will be played at Carbon tonight, Thursday at 7:30 p. m. when they host the Gordon Longhorns in their third district encounter. The Longhorns have a fine ball club and this should be a very fine ball game to see. Remember, the time is 7:30 p. m. tonight, Thursday.

The final two games for the Wolverines will be at Strawn on November 11 and at Putnam on November 18th.

Sam Powers Re-Elected To Head Zone No. 2 Of Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District



S. S. Powers was unanimously re-elected district supervisor of Zone 2 of the Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District Saturday night, October 9, in an election held at the Desdemona School. The Desdemona community was well represented by a large crowd of farm families residing in Zone 2. Visiting district boosters as well as the other supervisors from Strawn, Palo Pinto, and Mineral Wells were also in attendance. J. M. Cooper, Eastland County Agent, served as moderator, as is customary in supervisor elections. E. E. McAllister and W. L. Garner of the Soil Conservation Service at Eastland brought a conservation program to the group prior to the election. Mr. Keith McDonald's Future Farmers Chapter served refreshments to the crowd.

Mr. Powers has a 1285 acre farm two miles north of Desdemona on Highway 16. Mr. "Sam", as he is best known, has done a tremendous job in conservation within the past few years. He is best known as being the first farmer in this vicinity to plant Coastal Bermuda on a commercial scale. In 1952 he sprigged 12 acres to Coastal Bermuda. He now has 340 acres. From the original planting west of his new home, has come thousands and thousands of pounds of sprigs which were used by farmers in this vicinity to propagate many acres of Coastal.

Mr. Sam's operations also include about 150 acres of cropland which is planted to peanuts. For many years it has been his practice to strip his peanuts with two rows sudan and eight rows peanuts. Immediately after peanut harvest he drills a winter cover crop to further control wind erosion and add organic matter to the soil. This cropping system has proven very effective in that over a period of years his peanut yields have averaged about 40 bushels.

Mr. and Mrs. Powers are truly real conservationists. That they love their land is evident by the fine conservation program they have faithfully applied and maintained over a period of many years. The election of Mr. Sam to serve another five years as the supervisor of this zone is an expression of faith and confidence by their many friends and neighbors.

Needed Community Improvement Projects Sought By Local WSG

Representatives of the Woman's Study Club met recently with the Gorman City Commission to ask the Commission's support in a community-wide improvement program. The club has entered a nation-wide contest with community improvement as the goal.

The phase of the program which is being encouraged during November is a clean-up, paint-up and repair project with emphasis on business places within the city limits. All owners of business property in the city have recently received a letter explaining the objectives of this program, seeking their cooperation in painting store fronts, repairing sagging awnings and a general clean-up of the premises. Higginbotham Bros. & Company has consented to sell paint in connection with this program on the basis of cost plus 10 percent. City trucks will be made available to haul off trash and debris resulting from the cleaning of business premises.

Owners of vacant lots in the city are also requested to remove all unsightly objects from the lots, cut tall weeds and grass and generally take whatever action may be necessary in making the lots clean and attractive. The City Commission has recently passed an Ordinance in this regard, but it is not to be enforced until next spring.

In line with this program, the City Commission has tentative plans to make some sidewalk and curbing improvements during the winter months.

Other projects which have been completed or are currently in progress include the Proctor Water Project, the sewage purification project, improved street lighting, paving and others.

Pioneer Natural Gas Increases Regular Quarterly Dividend

Turkey: November 13 - December 31. Limit 1 Gobbler or bearded hen.

Quail: December 1 to January 31. Bag limit 12 per day - 36 possession.

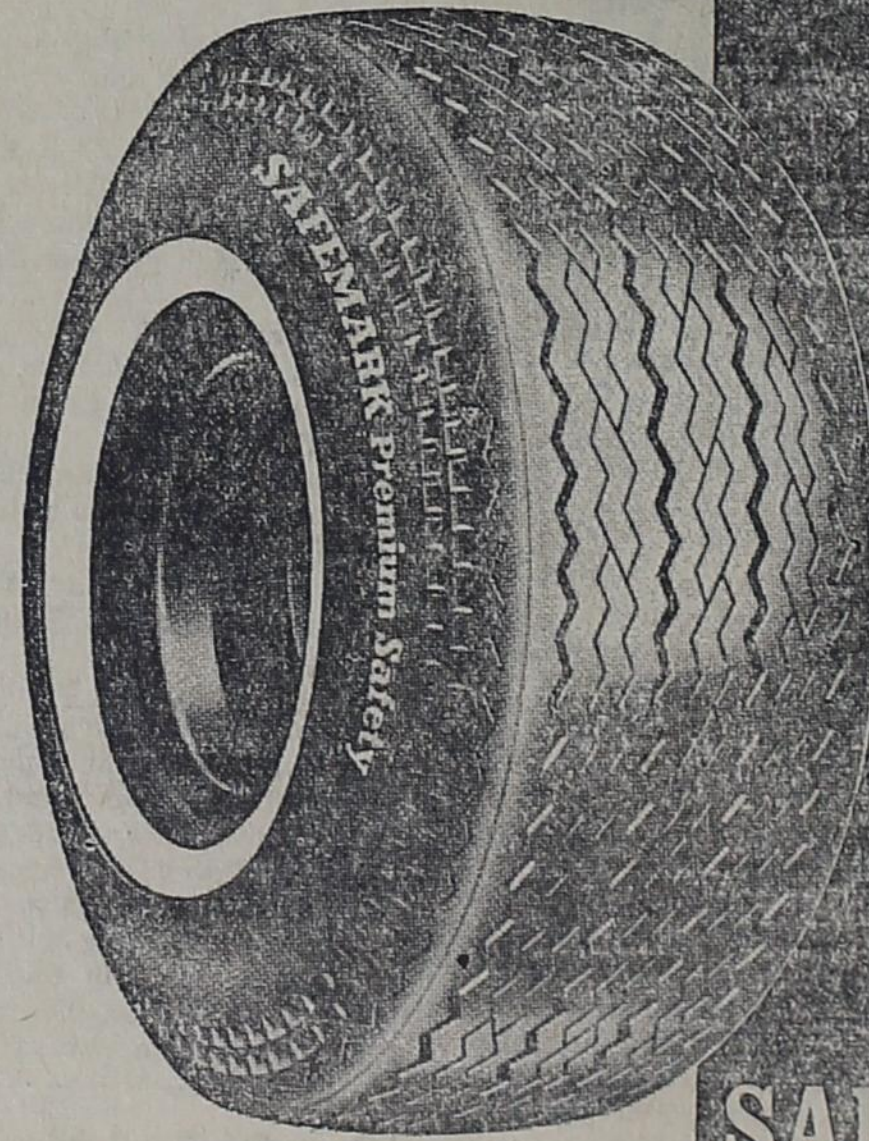

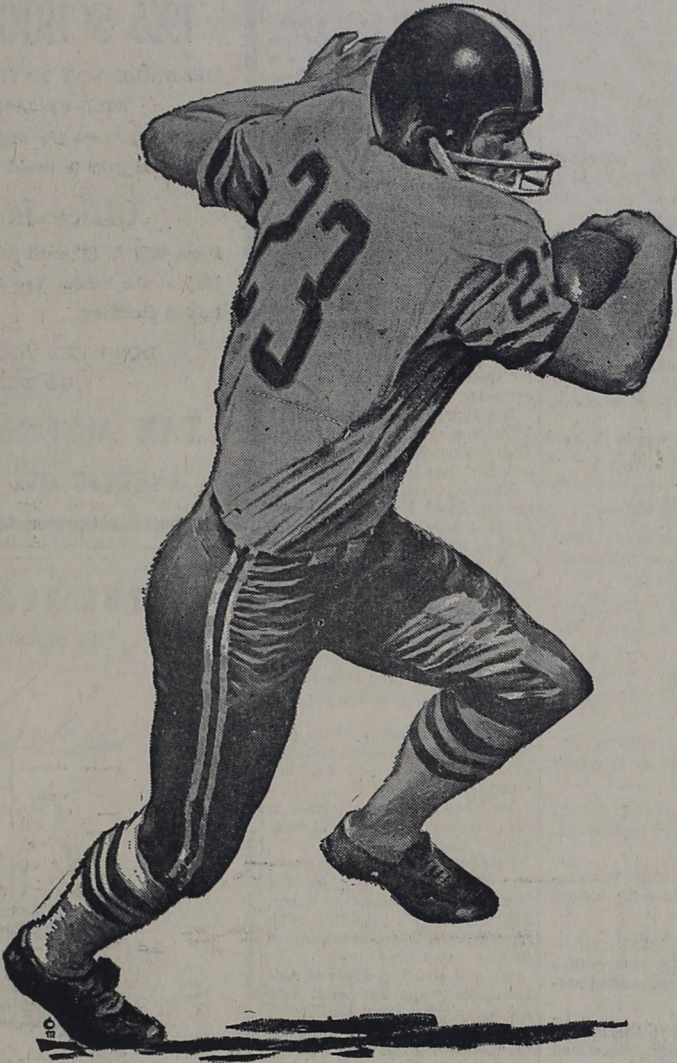

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — CONGRESS HAS FINALLY ADJOURNED after nine months, 22 days and the appropriation of \$119.4 billion.

THERE IS NOW OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO RETURN HOME and look forward to seeing our many friends and constituents between now and the first of the year. The Congress will convene in its Second Session of the 89th on January 10.

LAST MAY THE STATE LEGISLATURE APPROVED a bill re-vamping Congressional Districts. Under most trying circumstances,

the Legislature, under the able leadership of Governor John Connally, Lt. Governor Preston Smith, and Speaker of the House Ben Barnes, enacted into Law a Redistricting Plan. Not everyone in the State could be entirely pleased, but the 17th District retained 12 of its original Counties, to which 12 more were added. From the standpoint of Central West Texas, no better plan could have been devised, and our State leaders are to be highly commended for such excellent treatment.

UNFORTUNATELY, THE REDISTRICTING LAW IS BEING CONTESTED in the Federal Court in Houston. A decision is expected in the very near future. Presumably one of four things could happen. The Court could approve Congressional Districts as now constituted by the last Legislature; they could throw the whole thing out, which would result in either the Governor calling the Legislature back into Session to attempt to enact another plan; the Federal Court could order Redistricting under its direction; or finally, if the Court voided the Law, all candidates for Congress in 1966 would run State-wide.

IN ANY OF THESE EVENTUALITIES a somewhat critical condition will exist, should the Court hold that the lines now drawn do not meet the Federal Constitutional requirement. We will hope, of course, that the Court will deny the petition of those contesting the action of the Legislature.

SHOULD THE LINES NOW DRAWN BE APPROVED, candidates for Congress in 1966 will run in the new Districts, and when elected, will begin representing the new area at the beginning of the 90th Congress in 1967.

AS HERETOFORE CONSTITUTED, THE 17th District, composed of 14 Counties, will lose Parker County on the East and Scurry County on the West. To the 12 remaining Counties will be added 12 more, with Haskell and Throckmorton on the North, Howard and Glascock on the West, Concho, Coleman and Brown on the South, Hamilton, Erath and Palo Pinto on the East.

THE 24 COUNTIES WHICH WILL MAKE UP THE 17th Congressional District, if approved by the Court, will approximate the combined areas of Maryland, Connecticut and Massachusetts, with a population just under 400,000.

IN SPITE OF ITS SIZE AND FAR REACHES, there is a strong community of interest. Every County shares in all or many of its varied resources. It is more than just "big country."

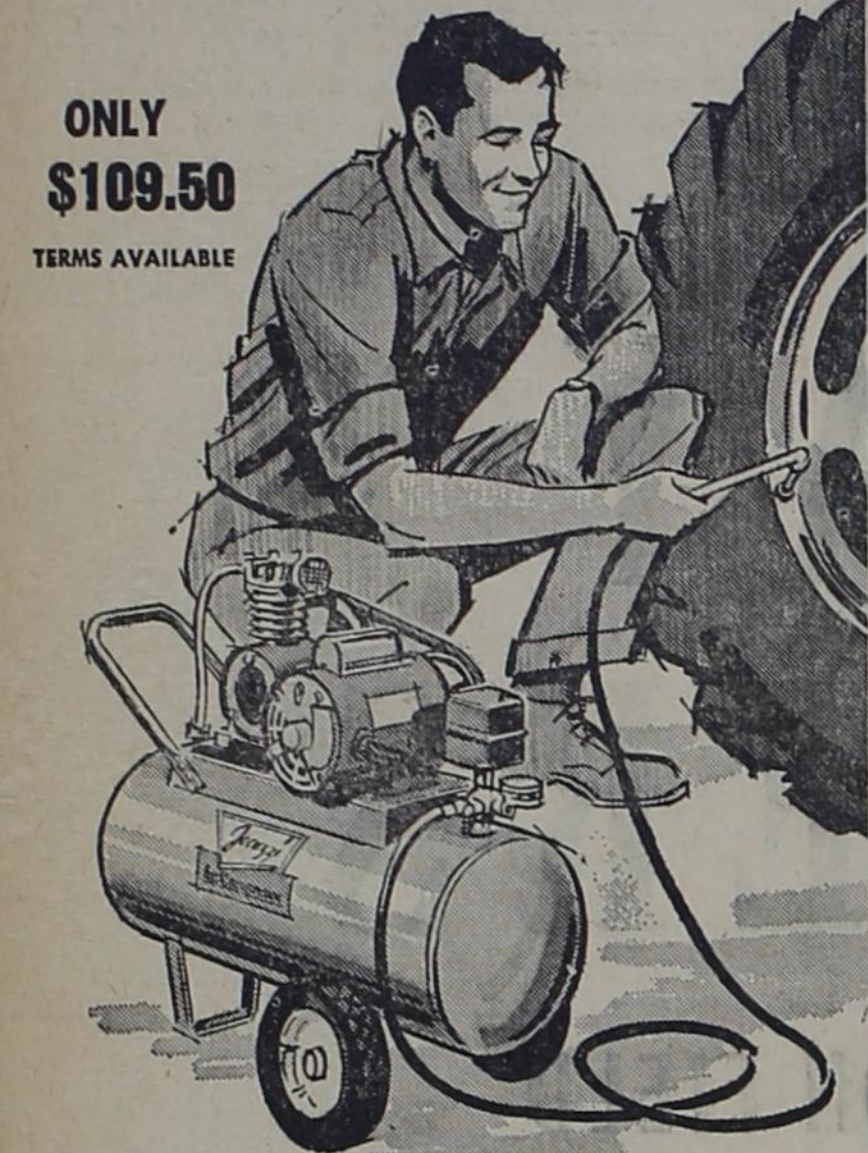

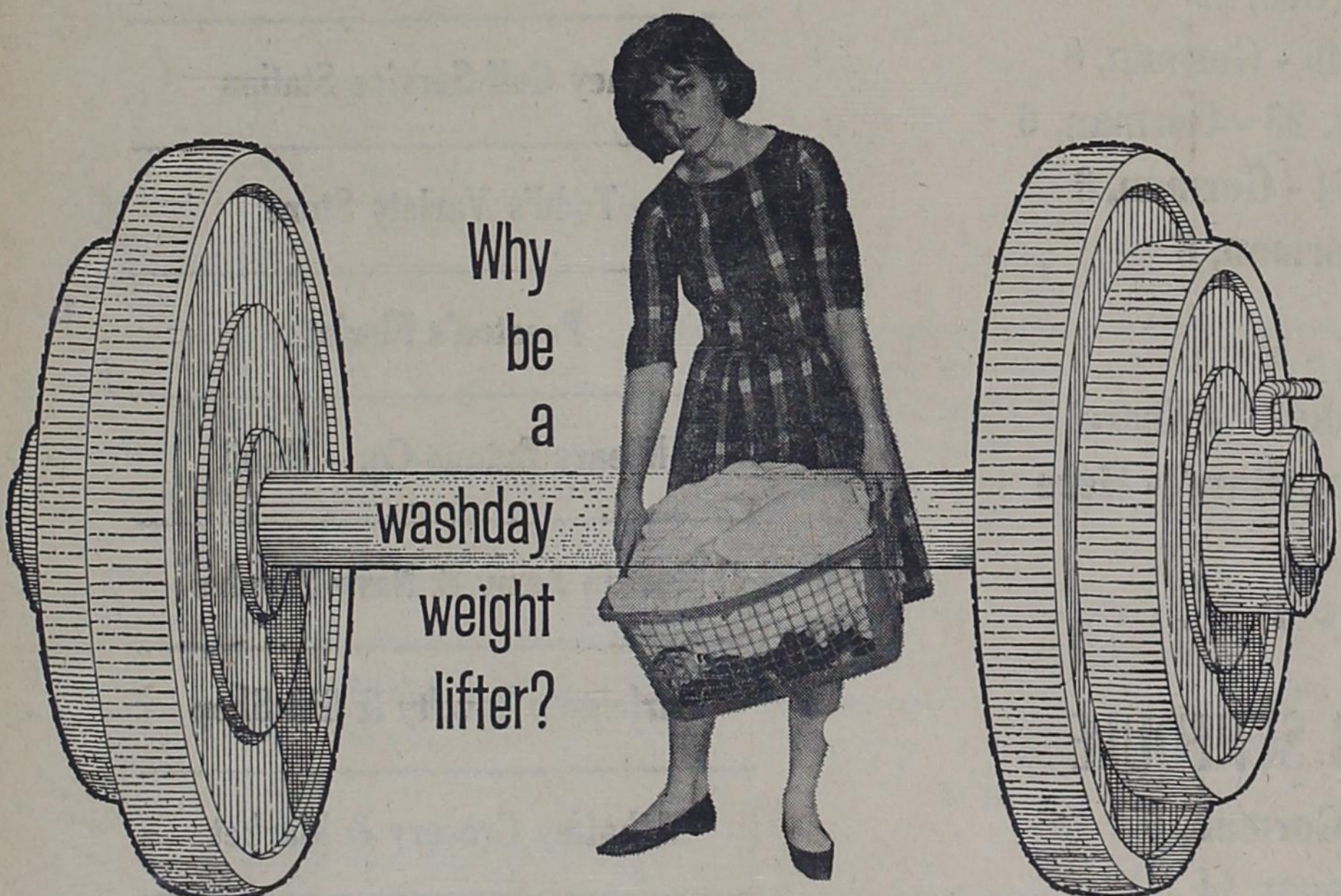

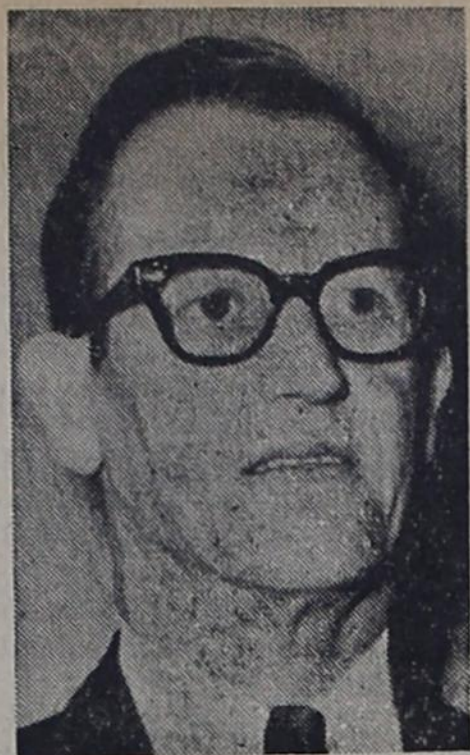

He urges that you give this matter immediate attention.

PEANUT CARDS READY TO BE ISSUED

Mr. Meredith announced that peanut marketing cards are prepared and may be picked up at his office. He will be glad to mail them to you upon your request. BE SURE to return the card when you have completed marketing.

1966 peanut and cotton allotment are in the process of being prepared and will be mailed on or about November 12, 1965, along with information on the referendum to be held on November 23, 1965. You are urged to acquaint yourselves with the issues on this referendum and cast your vote. Wives are eligible to vote also.

Acres diverted under the 1965 wheat and/or feed grain programs may be grazed beginning November 1, 1965. Remember, no crop may be harvested from the designated acres. Farms having excess diverted acreage may still reclaim the acreage for harvest with prior approval and payment of the service charge.

Producers interested in winter cover crop must file requests before beginning the practice. After the practice is approved and work completed, return the signed and completed approval so that prompt payment of cost-share can be made.

Farmers Union Sets Annual Convention In Abilene November 4-6

Farmers from over the state will soon be converging on Abilene for the Sixty-second Annual Convention of the Texas Farmers Union which opens Thursday morning, November 4, at the Windsor Hotel.

The delegates to the state Farmers Union meeting will celebrate the passage of the 1965 Farm Bill which, according to the officials of the organization, "bears the unmistakable stamp of Farmers Union."

County Farm Bureau Tire Sales Program Set Up For Members

The Eastland County Farm Bureau has entered into an agreement with the Texas Agricultural Service Company of Waco, a recently incorporated, wholly-owned subsidiary of the Texas Farm Bureau, to set up a retail tire sales program for its members, according to Jack Cozart, local county FB president.

One of the world's largest manufacturers, General Tire and Rubber Company of Akron, Ohio, is manufacturing tires for TASC under the exclusive brand name "SAFEMARK". Several other state Farm Bureaus are already marketing the "Safemark" tire which is produced at the GT&R Waco plant.

All standard sizes in the premium deluxe grade of passenger car tires and first-line premium truck and tractor tires will be offered Eastland County Farm Bureau members, Mr. Cozart said. The cost will be the factory price plus a very nominal distribution charge which will make them available to members "at a very substantial saving", the county FB president declared.

Squiers Farm Store, located at 514 West Main, Eastland, Texas, has been named the authorized Farm Bureau Tire Serving Agent for the county, Mr. Cozart said. Tires can be purchased directly from him by any Farm Bureau member by presenting his current membership card. Members actively engaged in farming or ranching may buy any tires they need for personal vehicles. All members will be limited to passenger car tires.

"This is strictly a service-to-member program instituted to help cut costs of production and thereby increase net income of our members," the county FB leader explained. "Sales will be restricted in order to prevent buying through the program for commercial use by anyone other than farmers or ranchers."

Safemark tires will be guaranteed by TSCO, and serving agent will make necessary adjustments on the basis of the original cost of the tire with no charge for mounting replacement tires, he said.

The Texas Farm Bureau instituted the tire program "to help relieve the cost-price squeeze that has adversely affected net farm income of farmers and ranchers for many years," the president explained. "Farm Bureau's price support and adjustment program have

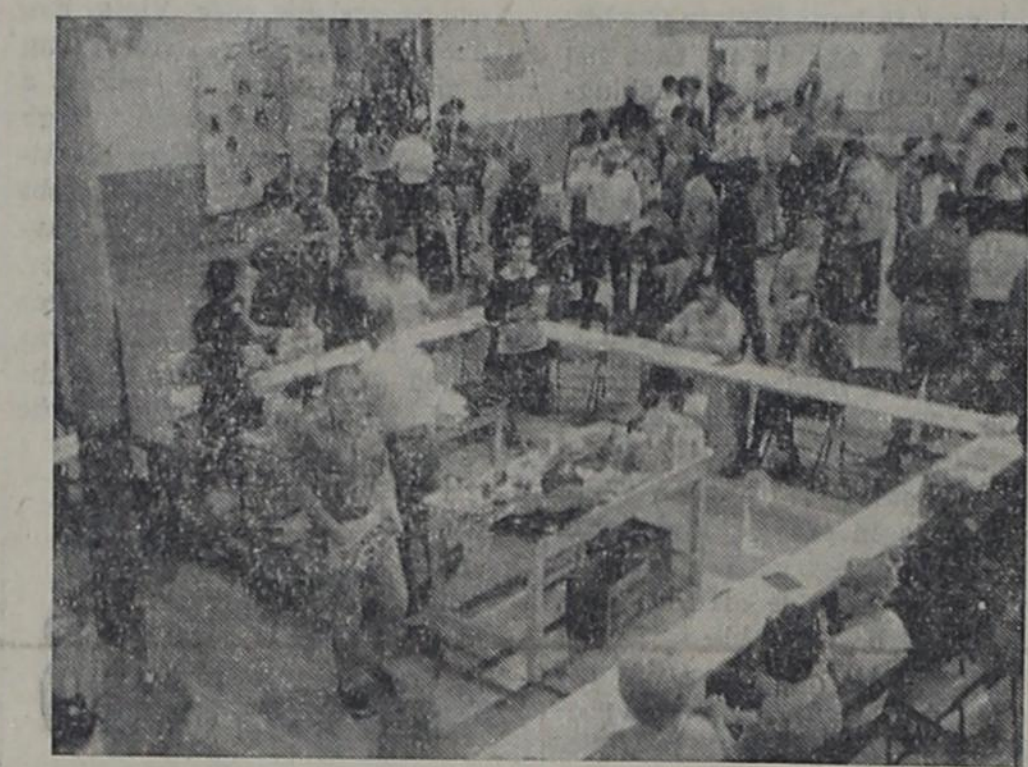
