My apologies to the Pecan Growers. I planned on attending their meeting at the Brown Jug Monday but in the process of trying to install an air conditioner, I forgot. In-excusable, I'd say.

Pecans are becoming another major crop in Eastland County and we have some very fine orchards in our area.

Pecan growers from Lubbock, Wichita Falls, Brownwood, Sweetwater, Big Spring, and nearby towns were present.

Among the speakers were Bluford Hancock, noted horticulturist from A&M; Tom Denman of Tarleton College and our own County Agent, J. M. Cooper.

Discussions were held on case bearers, types of spray, timing of sprays; also on the use of D-Syston.

After dinner most of the 57 attending the meeting visited Charles Underwood's Orchard.

The following information and recipes are copied from a brochure issued by Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

PEANUTS

Extension Foods & Nutrition Specialists - Tex. A&M University
Pecans have a place in the well-planned diet because of their good flavor, food value and many uses in main dishes, breads, cakes, cookies, desserts, salads and candies.

Nutrition studies show that pecans provide essential vitamins and minerals and are particularly good as energy food. The American Indians who first used pecans for food were aware of their nutritional benefits.

Cabeza de Vaca, one of the early Spanish explorers wrote, "The Indians came to the place of which we had been told, to eat walnuts (as pecans were then known). These are found with a kind of small grain, and this is the substance of the people for 2 months in the year, without any other thing."

Pecans are an excellent source of calcium, phosphorus, protein, quality carbohydrates and vitamins A and B. Calorically speaking, they are neither high nor low in this list of fuel foods.

Two general types of pecans are available—native and paper-shell.

Two and one-half pounds of native pecans in the shell yield a pound of meats (about 4 cups).

Two pounds of paper shell pecans yield 1 pound of meats.

MAIN DISHES

Meat Loaf With Pecan Stuffing
1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/2 cup chopped onions
1 teaspoon salt
1 tbspn. Worcestershire sauce
1 cup white bread crumbs
1/2 cup milk 2 eggs 1-4 cup fat
2 cups whole wheat bread crumbs
1/2 cup chopped celery
1-4 tsp. black pepper
3-4 cup meat stock or water
1/2 cup chopped pecans
Combine beef, green pepper, onion, salt, sauce, white bread crumbs, milk and 1 egg. Mix thoroughly. Place one-half of this mixture in bottom of greased loaf pan. Combine 1 egg, fat, whole wheat breads crumbs celery, black pepper and meat stock or water.

Add chopped pecans and mix thoroughly. Spread on top of meat mixture. Arrange remaining meat mixture on top of pecan stuffing. Bake at 350 d. F. 1 1/2 hrs. and cool slightly before removing from pan. Serve 10.

PECAN STUFFED PEPPERS

6 green peppers
1 1/2 cups cooked rice
1 1/2 cups chopped pecans
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3-4 cup tomato juice
3 tbspn. shortening
2 lbs. ground beef
1 1/2 tbspn. minced onion
3 tbspn. celery - chopped fine
3-4 cup water or 3-4 cup of tomato juice
Boil green peppers, which have been seeded and cored, until just

Mrs. Annie Henderson Retires As Third Grade Teacher In Gorman



It is with regret that we will lose one of our teachers in the Gorman Public Schools. Mrs. Henderson is retiring this year after 41 years of service as a teacher.

Annie S. Henderson was born January 24, 1901 at Spur, Texas. She moved with her family to Portales, New Mexico when she was 2 years old and lived on a stock farm 6 miles from Portales until she finished grade school.

She finished grade school in a one teacher school and took the state examination and received a diploma.

She finished the Portales High School in 1919 and took a course in pedagogy to receive a three years' certificate to teach school. She began teaching that fall as principal of a two teacher school at Center, a small community about twenty miles south of Portales.

After saving the money from the eight months of school at \$80.00 per month, she entered Simmons College (now Hardin-Simmon University). With the money she had saved and with what she could borrow, she stayed in college two years.

The next year she went back to Portales and taught in a one-teacher school about 3 miles from the first school she had taught. At the end of this school, in 1923, she was married to John W. Henderson of De Leon, Texas. They had met in college. They taught together in Idalou for two years. They moved back to Abilene to finish college. She received her B. A. in 1926. She taught 4 years in Taylor County and then moved to Fort Worth where she got her M. A. degree in 1932 from Southwestern Theological Seminary. At that time they were giving Special Diplomas in Primary work. She took all this special work that was offered.

After receiving her Master's Degree she taught first and second grades at Duster, south of Gorman, for two years. The next three years she taught at Sipe Springs.

In 1938 she began teaching Social Science in the Gorman Grade School. After two years she taught English in the same grades. The war came along and most of our men went to the service; then she acted as principal of Grade School. When they could replace her she asked for the third grade and has been teaching in this capacity until some years ago it was necessary to have two first grades. After this she returned to the third grade, where she has remained until the present time. She has made plans to retire this year with regret, but can look back with all the joys of having been of service to her community. She would always regard all of these children that she has taught as her own.

She and her husband are members of Kokomo Baptist Church and both are teachers in the Sunday School classes there. Her retirement will call for many of the things she has not had the opportunity in doing in these years that she has devoted most of her time to teaching.

We shall all miss Mrs. Henderson, but wish for her much happiness in her future plans.

PECAN SALADS AND RELISHES

Waldorf Mold

- 1 pkg. lemon-flavored gelatin
- 2 tsp. vinegar
- 2 cups diced unpeeled red apples
- 1 cup diced celery
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- ½ cup mayonnaise

Dissolve gelatin in one cup hot water. Add 1 cup cold water and vinegar. Chill until slightly thick. Combine apples, celery, pecans and mayonnaise; fold into gelatin. Turn into oiled mold and chill until set. Serve on salad greens with additional mayonnaise. Serves 8.

Cranberry Salad

- 2 pkgs. lemon-flavored gelatin
- 4 cups water 1½ cups sugar
- 2 pkgs. lemon-flavored gelatin
- 2 cups fresh cranberries, ground
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 orange, ground rind and all
- 1 cup crushed pineapple

Dissolve gelatin in 2 cups hot water. Add 2 cups cold water and chill. Combine sugar, cranberries, celery, nuts, orange & pineapple. Add to partially congealed or rather thickened gelatin. Pour into mold and chill. Serve on lettuce leaf topped with salad dressing thinned with cream and/or pineapple juice.

Texas Pecan Pie

- 1 cup pecans, halves or chopped.
- 3 eggs ½ cup sugar
- 1 cup light or dark corn syrup
- 1-8 tsp. salt 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1-4 cup melted butter or margarine.

Beat eggs. Add sugar and syrup, then salt and vanilla and last, the melted fat. Place the pecans in the bottom of an unbaked pie crust. Add the filling and bake at 350 degrees F. for 50 to 60 minutes. The tops rise to the top of the filling and form a crusted layer.

CANDIES AND COOKIES

Pecan Brittle

- 3 cups sugar ½ tsp. salt
- 2 cups pecans, chopped
- 2 tbsp butter or margarine

Heat sugar with salt in a heavy frying pan over high heat until sugar begins to lump. Lower heat and stir until sugar melts. Stir in pecans. Add butter. Pour immediately onto greased, cookie sheet, quickly spreading out thin. When cool, break into pieces of desired size.

Pecan-Meringue Chews

- 2 egg whites
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 4 cups pecans, chopped

Beat egg whites until stiff. Fold in brown sugar; add pecans. Drop by spoonfuls onto greased baking sheet and bake at 375 d. F., until golden brown; about 10 to 12 minutes.

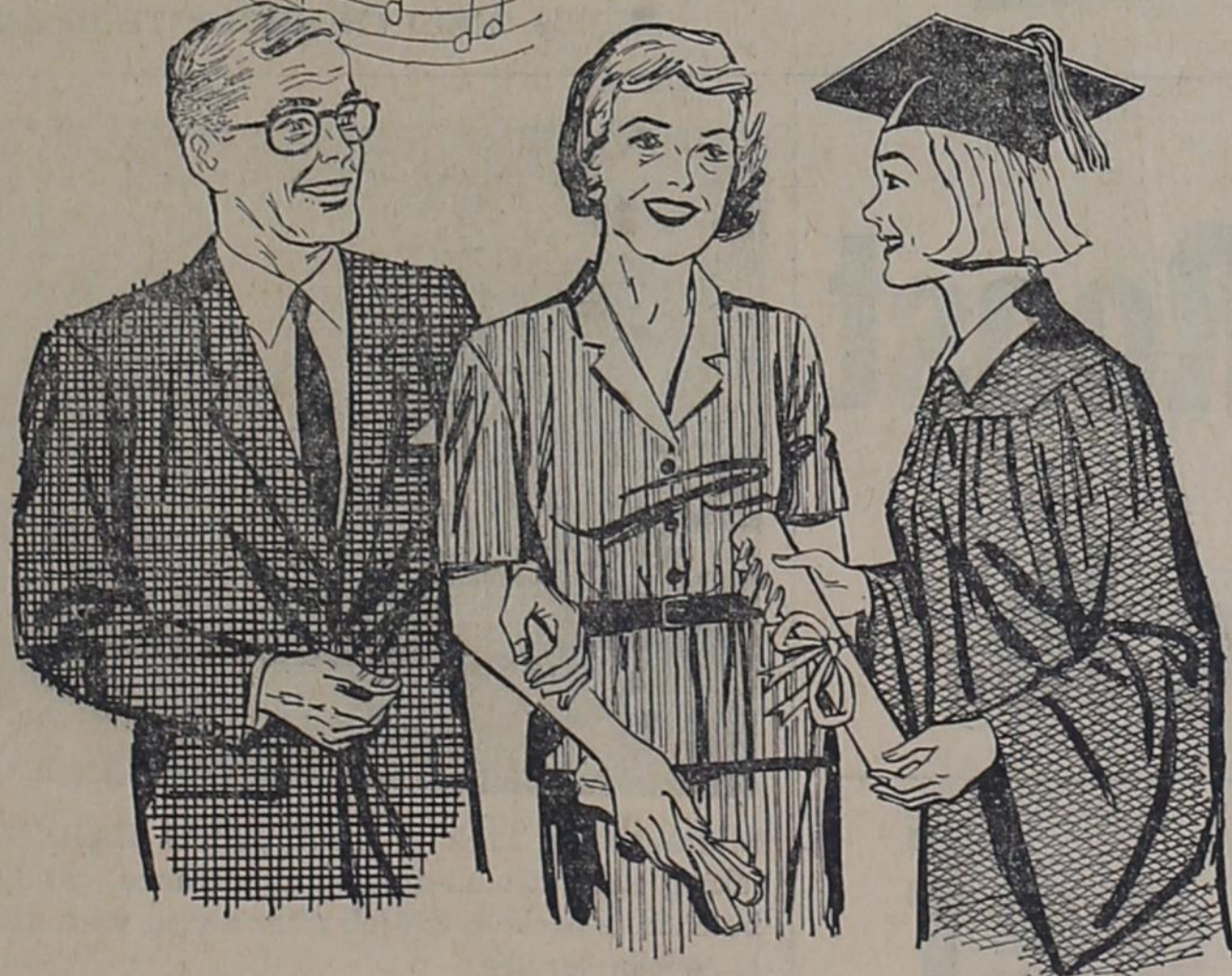

minds rural patrons of the Gorman Post Office to be on the outlook for June Livestock Survey Cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Baze explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are D. R. Clark, Route 1; W. O. Parr, Route 2, and A. O. Clark, Route 3.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Baze concludes.

Enrichment Program To Be Offered During Summer At School

Mr. Charlie Garrett, superintendent of Gorman Schools, announces that an enrichment program in high school grammar will be offered this summer to juniors and seniors. The course will cover all phases of grammar as well as written and oral composition.

He states that with the increased pressure brought on students who are entering college, that he feels that such a program will be of great value.

The course will begin shortly after the close of school and will run for some four to six weeks, for about two hours per day. The time schedule will be worked out by Mrs. Bob Green, who will

teach the course, and those taking the work.

If we can secure someone to do it, we will have the library open from one to two hours one night per week while the course is in progress.

The course will carry NO credit and will have no grade recorded. The work is for enrichment only. The course will be financed from Title I ESEA of 1965. If plans can be worked out, we plan on trying to have a three-week pre-school program for next year's first grade students. Further information will be given on this program at a later date.

All juniors and seniors were given application blanks for this course some 2 weeks ago. At this time we have only five that have signed up. If you are interested in your child taking the enrichment program, have him or her return the blank this week so that final plans can be made for the course.

**State To Boost
Old Age Pensions**

AUSTIN — The State Board of Public Welfare said recently it will boost old age assistance payments and aid to the blind benefits for persons 65 and over by \$3 a month to pay for supplemental medical insurance under Medicare.

The increased grants will begin in June, Medicare goes into effect July 1.

The Board also announced it will sign two contracts with Blue Cross-Blue Shield, effective July 1:

—One, to handle payment of deductible items for welfare recipients over 65 as provided by Medicare. These deductibles include \$40 for hospital services, \$20 for out-patient services and \$50 for physicians' services.

—The other, for administration of medical care programs for recipients of disability assistance and aid to families of dependent children. The contract will include in-patient and out-patient hospital care, payment for doctors' in-hospital care and some out-patient physicians' services.

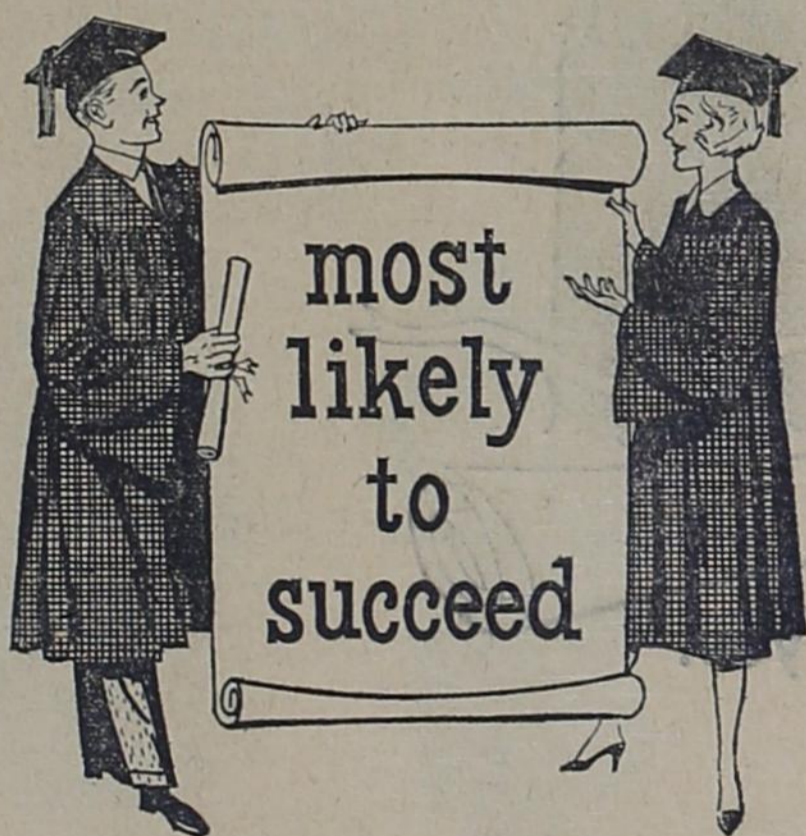

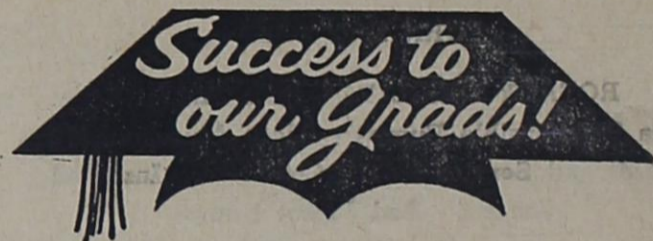

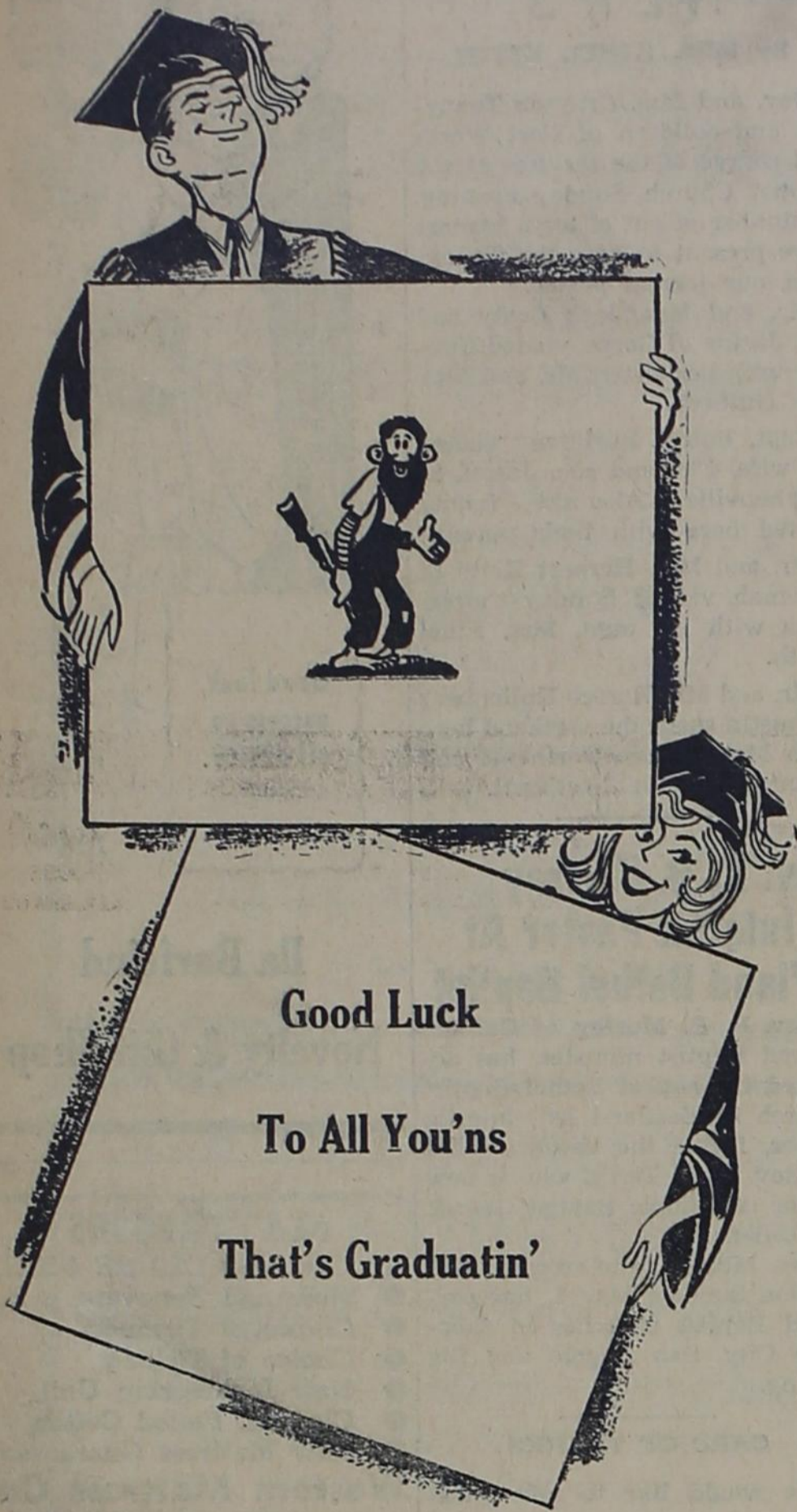
