Local School To Conduct Pre-School Classes August 8-17

Superintendent Garrett states that the Gorman Schools will, for the first time, conduct pre-school classes for beginners. The classes will begin on Monday, August 8 at 8:00 a. m. in the first grade room of the elementary building. Classes will last for about two and one-half hours each day from the 8th. until at least through August 17th and possibly through August 19th. Mrs. O. R. Buchanan will be in charge with other personnel assisting her.

The class is open only to students who will start to school this fall and must be six years of age on or before September 1, 1966. We are asking that at least one parent come with the child on the first day in order that we can secure all information needed on the registration cards. The student will need a copy of his birth certificate.

The purpose of the class is to acquaint the students with the school program so that they will be ready to settle down when they enroll on August 29th. There will be no formal lessons as such, but activities will be planned to help the child adjust to school routine. They will be given instructions on how to get on and off the school bus, how to cross the road when unloading, how to find the various facilities of the school, how to go to the lunchroom and how to behave there. They will be acquainted with all parts of the school plant, taught to play and work as a group, and how to settle down and work as an individual while in class.

We feel that these classes will be of great value to the beginning students this year. If it proves successful, as we feel it will, we will possibly have it earlier next year and run it for at least three weeks.

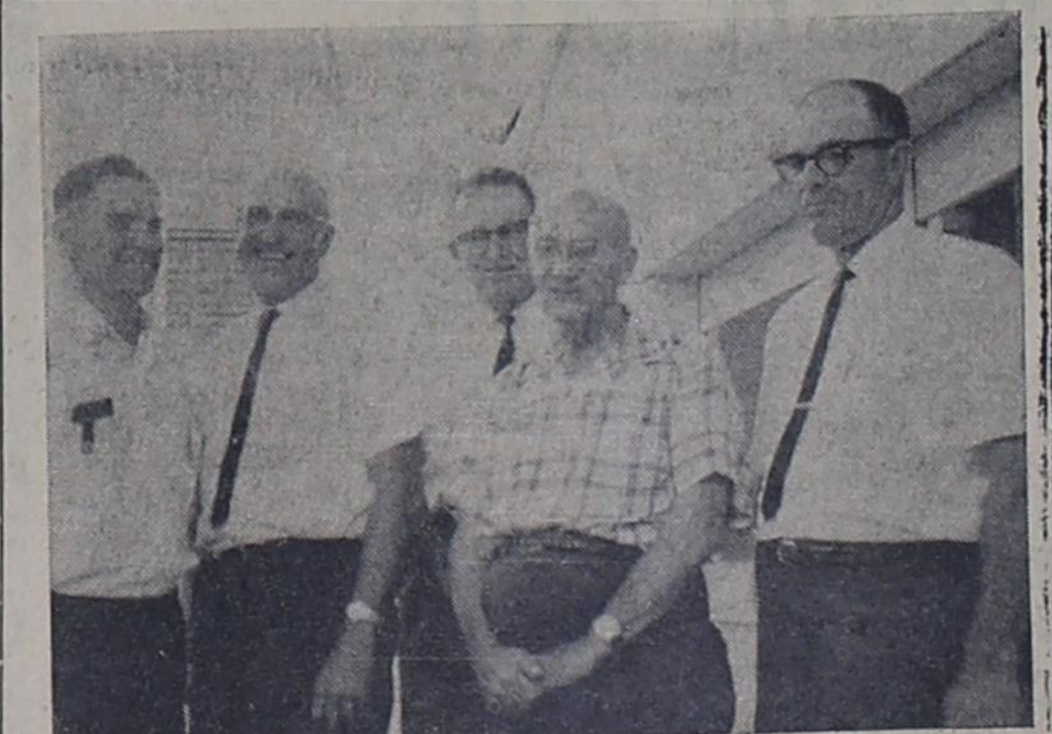

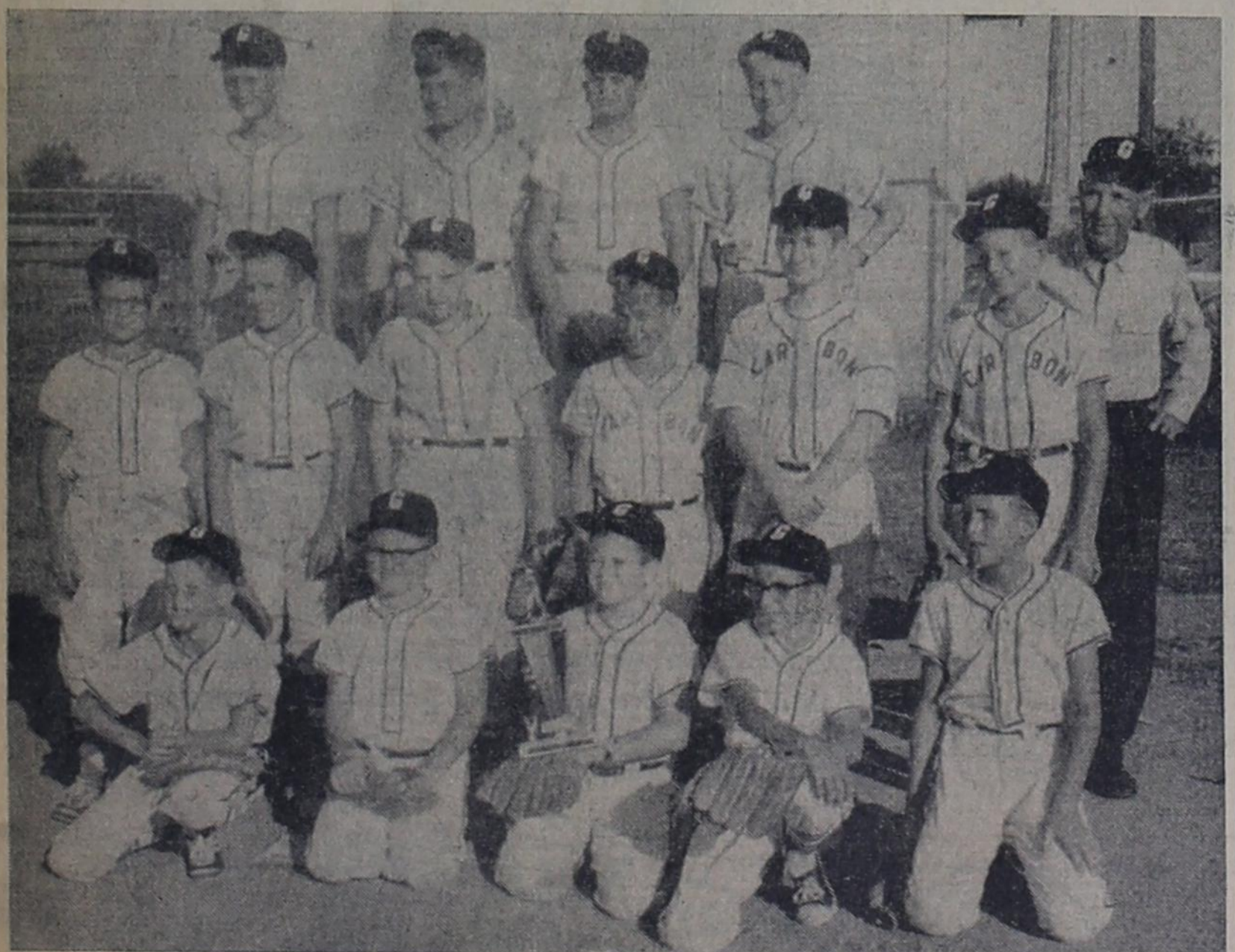

Pioneer Natural Gas Declares Dividend

Amarillo, Texas, Aug. 2, 1966 — The Board of Directors of Pioneer Natural Gas Company, at a meeting today, declared a quarterly dividend of 17c per share on the outstanding common stock, payable September 1, 1966 to stockholders of record on August 19, 1966.

Mr. C. I. Wall, president, stated that the consolidated net income for the first six months of 1966 amounted to \$4,177,652, or 58c per share on 7,173,028 shares outstanding on June 30, 1966. These earnings compare with \$4,364,916 for the first six months of 1965, or 61c per share on the same number of shares outstanding on June 30, 1965.

The second quarter report to the stockholders will be mailed about August 9.

Mrs. Knox was married to Austin Moore Knox November 20, 1898 at the parsonage home of Rev. Noell, a Methodist minister near De Leon. They farmed near De Leon for many years before moving to Carbon in 1912.

Mrs. Knox, who has been blind from an eye surgery infection since 1940, continues to live alone and takes care of her flowers, her zennias are the envy of the neighborhood. She moved to Gorman when her husband died in 1944. She is a member of the Baptist Church.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:

"Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Section 2. The only purpose of the amendment proposed in this Resolution is to make the aforesaid deletion. The adoption of this amendment shall not be deemed to have the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 5. If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Section, as amended herein and by any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

Leafspot Control

Now is a good time to start looking for peanut leafspot development and getting control equipment in shape. Timing is extremely important for getting maximum results because one must rely on prevention. Allowing the disease to progress too far is an open invitation to substantial yield losses from both leafspot and southern blight. Affected leaves which shed from the plant serve as a food source for development of the southern blight fungus.

Dusting sulfur (325 mesh) or sulfur-copper dust mixtures are suggested for use. Recommended rates vary from 10 to 25 pounds per acre depending on vine size.

Length of intervals between fungicide application will depend on prevailing weather conditions with closer intervals needed when humidity is high or when leaf surfaces are frequently covered with water from rain or sprinkler irrigation. Seven to 14 day intervals are common.

Dusting equipment should be adjusted to obtain the best coverage of both leaf surfaces. This is necessary because sulfur is a protectant type fungicide and prevents development of the fungus in the immediate area where it is present. Good fungicide coverage and proper intervals of application will prevent peanut leafspot losses.

In an effort to gain new information and better perfect leafspot recommendations, we in Extension Plant Pathology have seven replicated demonstrations in different parts of the state. These are designed to answer three basic questions:

(1) What are the economic returns from controlling leafspot in the various production areas?

(2) How much does copper improve fungicide effectiveness when added to sulfur?

(3) Does an electrostatic charge improve effectiveness of fungicides?

This is part of a continuing effort to help peanut growers obtain the highest net returns from peanut production. Results of the above-mentioned demonstrations will be made available to growers before next growing season.

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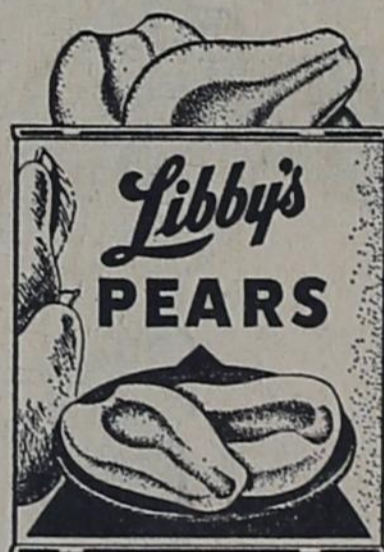
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
