## Tom Bennett Recalls Beginning of Railroad In The Early Days

The recent purchase of 25 miles of MK&T Railroad track by Melvin Shell brought many memories to our official historian, Tom Bennett, who remembers when the first railroad was laid in Gorman. The following is an account of the early day railroads in this area as Mr. Bennett remembers them.

My life's memory of the Texas Central Railroad, which bore a nickname of Tin Can or T. C., was built out of Waco and was extended to Comanche and Eastland counties in the early 70's, and in the early 80's it was built as far west as Albany. This was as far west as the Texas Central lines extended until the 1900's, when the line was completed to Stamford, and in 1906, the line was completed to Rotan.

I recall the first steel rails were of very light weight steel and as more and more shipping was done, the weight of the rails were increased and a work train would bring a large crew of men to lay the rails while others drove the large spikes. I was only a child but this was the most fascinating work to me that I would spend the whole day watching the men work. It always amazed me how the trains could travel over the river bridges without falling off. I was only four years old and my young mind could not comprehend ingenious engineers fete. Most all the trains were small and consisted of an engine, baggage car and one passenger coach.

This section of the country can attribute it's early growth and development to the railroad. There were very few settlers in this section of the country until the late seventies and early eighties.

The farms were small and were fenced with brush and split rails. The cattle would eat on the track and occasionally one would get killed. I remember one time one of papa's cows was struck by the train engine and killed and it was not long before an agent was out to pay for the loss. There were many similar incidents and it was not long before the railroad company fenced the right of way from Waco to Albany and later on to Rotan. I remember well, the fencing gang and foreman and the workmen. They lived in railroad cars which boarded all the workmen. All the right of way fences have long been removed.

The first oil fuel powered engines used in the United States were the ones on the Katy Railroad line from Houston to Rotan.

Railroad men were always very accommodating to the public. I remember one time before Gorman had a Depot, my father was in De Leon to sell cotton and while there he bought mother a sewing machine and two pairs of bed springs, and the railroad delivered them to Gorman without charges. They stopped the train here and put them off just about where Gorman Peanuts is located, and my father walked approximately a mile to our home to get the wagon to bring them home.

During the drouth of 1893 water was hauled here free of charge. This was the same year that Cisco was hit with a very destructive tornado and the railroad company ran a special train from Waco picking up anyone that wanted to help the people in Cisco clear the debris and wreckage and bury the dead. This was all done free of charge. They also hauled water to Cisco during the drouth of 1886 and 87.

I recall the train loads of buffalo bones shipped from Old Fort Griffin.

Gorman's first depot was built in the early 1890's. It was located in the center of main street, and in 1903 the RR company built three of the prettiest parks and every Sunday the whole population of Gorman could be found at these parks. Gorman has always received a lot of freight by rail and from 1900 to 1920 much cotton and small grain was shipped by rail from Gorman. Farmers and merchants from Sipe Springs used this as their shipping point. I have seen as many

as 3,000 bales of cotton shipped from here in one year. That was a lot of cotton to be raised with a team of mules and a walking plow.

At one time Gorman could boast of three passenger trains and six freight trains making daily stops here. I worked at the gin and on float wagons and knew most all of the railroad men from the first ones on down to the thirties.

As a youth of 12 years or so of age, when it was too wet to work I would stay around the depot to watch the trains switch tracks, and occasionally the cars would run off the track. It was so fascinating to watch the workmen get them on the track as I always knew they would never make it.

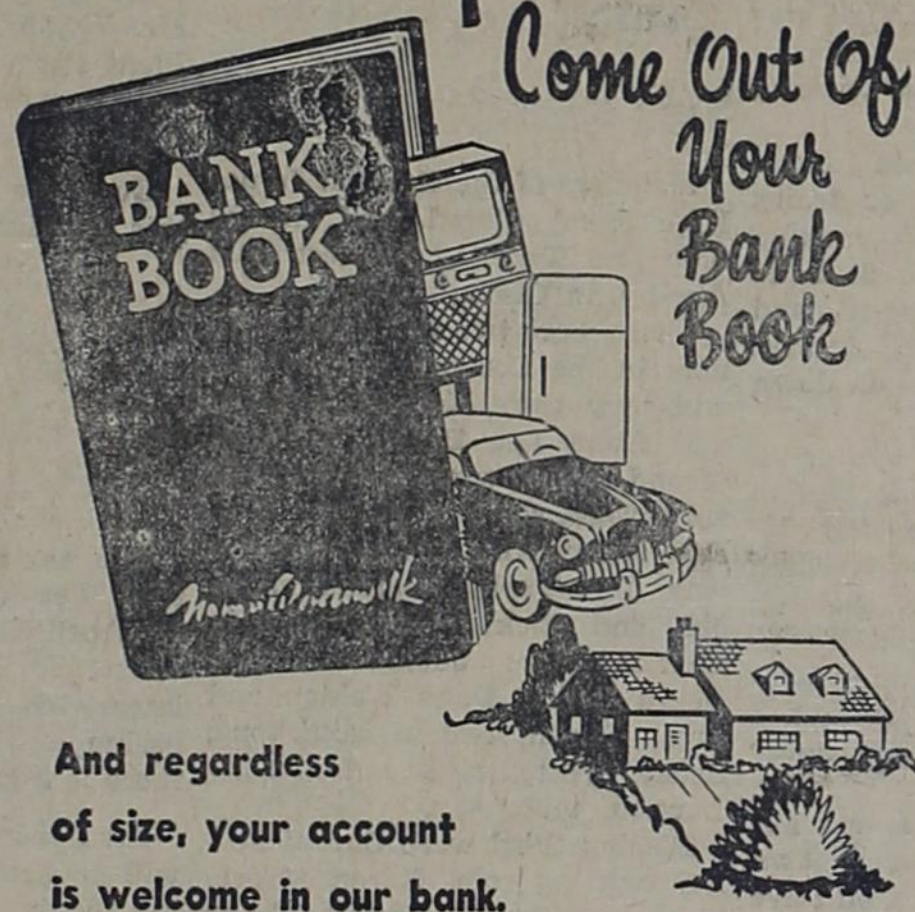

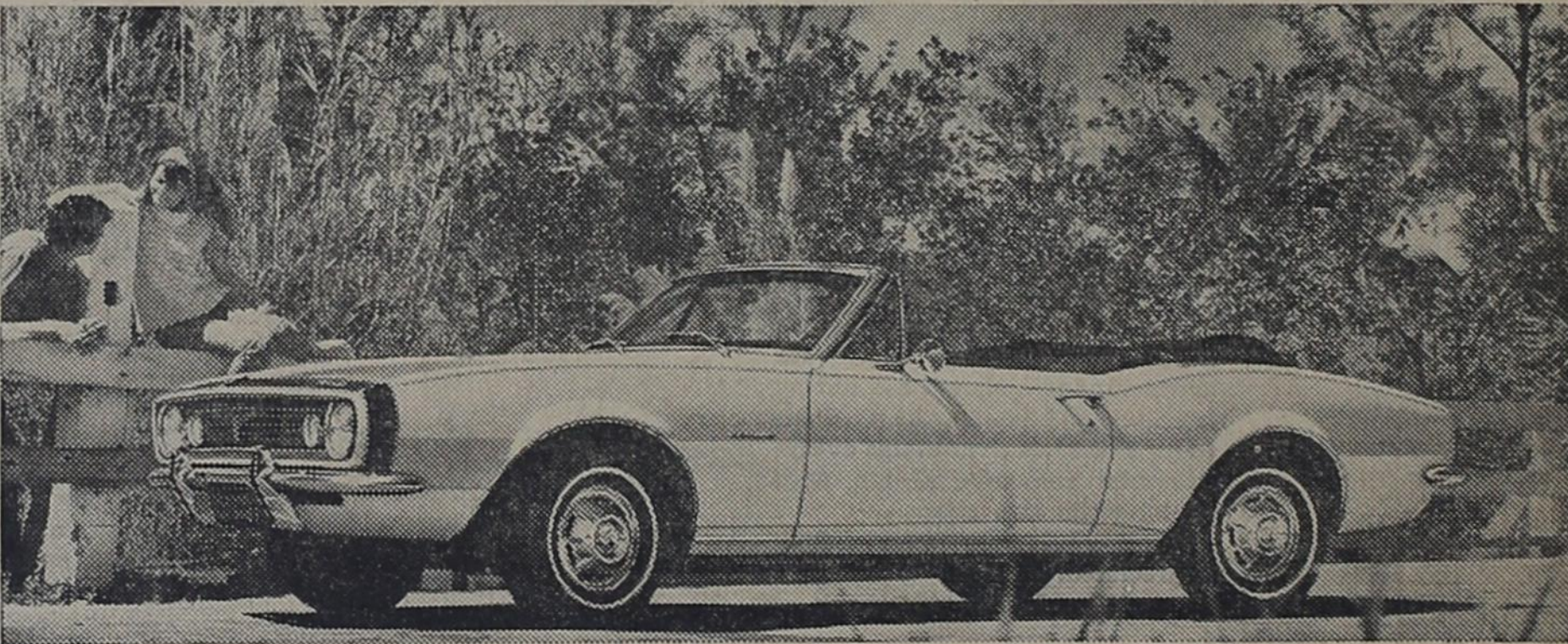

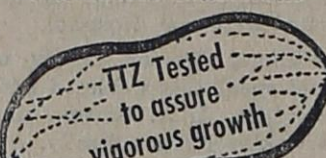
