The laboratory is expected to employ three to four persons during the peak of the peanut season, and will include one or two chemists, a combination secretary and receptionist and one or two lab assistants.

The laboratory is expected to accommodate shelled peanut samples from plants at Gorman, De Leon, Dublin, Ranger and Abilene.
