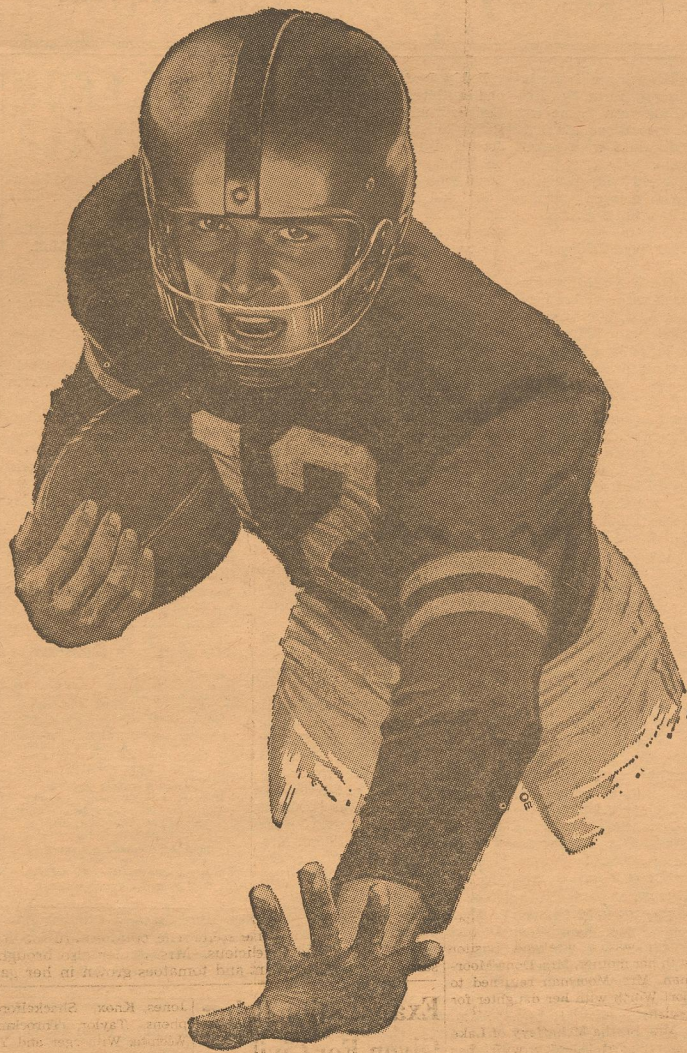

 Should Class B football teams be restricted to Regional games? Would you like to see Class B football have the opportunity to advance to the State Playoffs?

Personally we see no reason why we should be restricted to regional playoffs! Some people say we do not have the personnel, that it would be detrimental to the players' health and physical welfare, and that it would completely disrupt a small school while it would be a severe drain financially to the community and the school.

HOGWASH! If football does this to schools why even play football? You do not have to have 50 to 100 boys to play a ten game schedule, then bi-district and regional. Lots of Class A, AA and AAA teams do not have over 25 to 30 players on the varsity team. Why would one, two or three more play-off games disrupt a school system when it had not already done so for a ten game schedule and two play-off games.

About the severe drain financially. How will extra money coming into the athletic fund be a severe drain? Even if all three of the extra play-off games were played on the road, how would the drain of funds affect the community? Unless it is just another excuse to keep a small town school team from play-offs.

If these are the reasons why a Class B school can't compete in State Play-offs in football, why allow basketball play-offs, too? To go still further, why not limit Class A, AA and AAA schools who do not have 50 to 100 boys playing football.
