Texas Secretary of State John L. Hill, who is sponsoring a state-wide voter registration drive, has predicted that this year's registrations will show a very substantial increase over former years. The previous high was in 1964, the last presidential election year, when a total of 2,984,766 registrants were reported by county tax assessor-collectors un-

orce.

The total registration in 1966
was slightly under 2,970,000, influding registrations under the
boll tax system and free regisrations during a supplemental




