## National Peanut Week Is Scheduled For March 6-16

The week of March 6 to 16, 1968 will be observed as National Peanut Week. Under the leadership of the National Peanut Council the week has come to be the real focal point of peanut merchandising and sales throughout the nation. All the resources of the Peanut Council - grower associations, sheller associations and manufacturers are coordinated with advertising campaigns of individual companies to give peanuts and peanut products the biggest push of the year. Promotional campaigns are sponsored by the Council through major newspapers' food sections, through radio and TV and through major grocery chains.

Grower associations are underwriting a \$25,000 budget and providing the leadership for the promotional sales program through the national grocery chains. This is a relatively new but highly effective council activity during peanut week. Leaders of grower associations with assistance from other industry people and council President DeVoe Willard plan this far reaching phase of the program. In addition, a recent addition includes the Council's utilizing the Plentiful Foods Section of the Consumer and Marketing Service, USDA, in coordinating promotional efforts with the various state departments of agriculture and the industry segments in peanut producing states. Plans have already been made through the leadership of the Council to secure such promotional activities as governors' proclamations of National Peanut

Week in the various peanut producing states and include participation from local industry people, USDA regional personnel and state agriculture department officials.

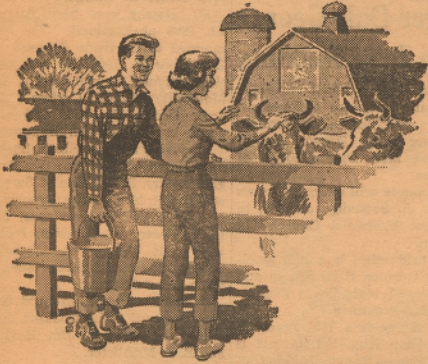

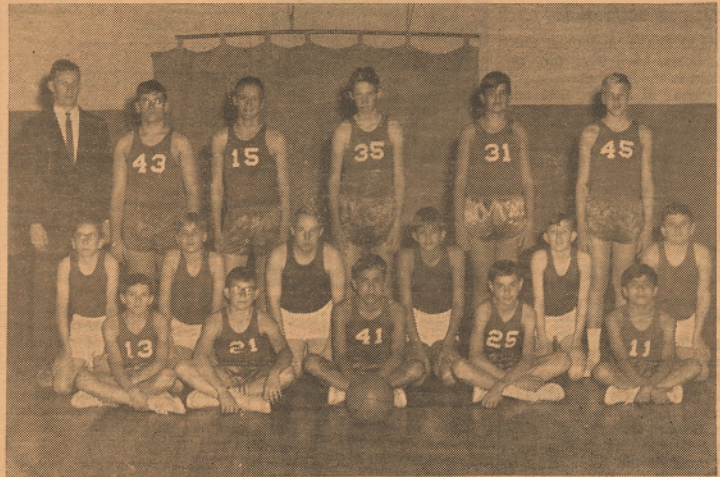

### PEANUT-POTATO CAKES

1 1/2 cups chopped salted peanuts  
2 1/4 cups seasoned mashed potatoes (white or sweet)  
2 T chopped parsley  
1 egg, beaten  
Pepper or 2 or 3 drops tabasco sauce, if desired  
Fat or drippings for frying  
Combine peanuts, potatoes, and parsley and stir in half of the egg and the seasoning. Shape into eight flat cakes. Dip cakes in rest of egg, then in flour or crumbs. Brown in fat. Four servings. For variety - Use finely chopped pimiento, green pepper, celery, or onion in place of parsley.

### PEANUT-STUFFED PEPPERS

4 green peppers  
1 T melted butter or margarine  
1/3 cup uncooked rice  
3 T finely chopped onion  
1/4 cup chopped celery  
1 tsp. salt  
1 cup water  
1 1/3 cups cooked or canned tomatoes  
2/3 cup chopped salted peanuts  
1/4 cup fine dry bread crumbs mixed with  
1 T melter butter or margarine  
Cut out stem ends of the pep-

pers and take out the seeds. Cook peppers 5 minutes in boiling salted water. Combine butter or margarine, rice, onion, celery, and salt in a fry pan. Add water slowly as the mixture begins to cook, and simmer covered 5 to 10 minutes. Add tomatoes and simmer 10 minutes longer or until rice is almost done. Add more liquid if needed. Stir peanuts, stuff peppers with the mixture, and sprinkle with crumbs. Place peppers in a baking pan with enough hot water to keep them from sticking and bake at 350 degrees F (moderate oven) 30 to 40 minutes. Four servings.

### DIXIE HAM AND SWEET POTATO CASSEROLE

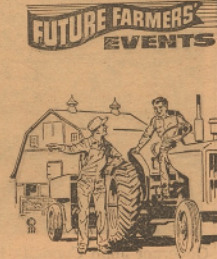
2 1/2 cups mashed sweet potatoes or yams  
1 cup crushed peanut brittle  
1 cup sliced leftover baked ham  
Butter or margarine

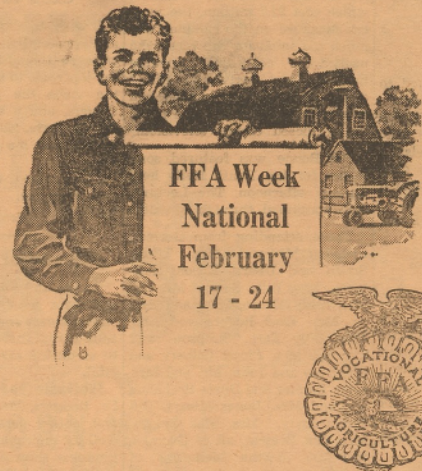

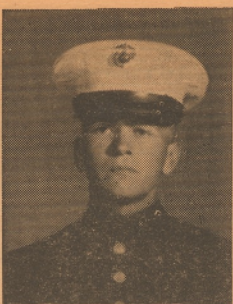

## Peanut Irrigation Continues Growth

Supplemental irrigation of peanuts is continuing to expand in the Southwest. The trend is more accentuated in south and central Texas counties, but from all accounts is on the increase generally over the producing areas of Texas and Oklahoma. The total allotted peanut acreage of about 8,000 acres in New Mexico has been produced under irrigation for a number of years. In Texas at the present time there are some 76,000 acres receiving some amounts of supplemental water. This compares to about 50,000 acres in 1966 and represents an increase of slightly more than 30 percent in a one-year period. Water for irrigation comes almost entirely from earthen wells varying from 300 to 400 feet deep in south Texas to those less than 50 feet in Central Texas. Practically all wells in Eastland and Comanche counties are less than 100 feet deep. In some cases farmers are obtaining irrigation

water from earthen reservoirs. The trend toward this source of supply will probably increase the next few years.

Information gathered from suppliers of seed and from County ASCS offices reveal the following figures regarding peanut acreage under irrigation in 11 Texas Counties:

In Oklahoma the principal irrigated area is Caddo County

where some 29,000 acres of peanuts receive supplemental water. However, some 3,500 acres of peanuts are under irrigation in Bryan County and about the same acreage is irrigated in Hughes County. A few farmers are reported to be producing irrigated peanuts in Love, Pottawatomie, Lincoln and other counties. The states total irrigated peanuts is estimated to be close to 40,000 acres.

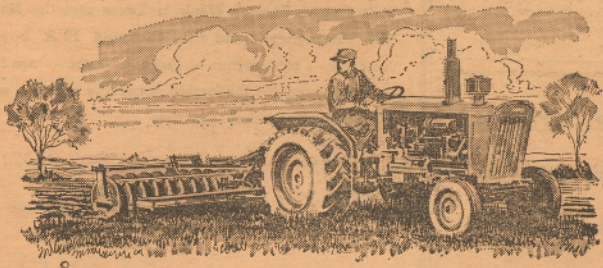

## AN OPEN LETTER TO MY OPPONENTS AND THE VOTERS OF EASTLAND COUNTY

Dear Friends,

It has come to my attention that my residence eligibility as a candidate for District Judge - 91st District Court, is being questioned. I sincerely feel that I am a legally qualified candidate for the 91st District Court of Eastland County. However, because of questions being raised by my opponents I have (about one month ago) contacted my opponent in the race and suggested to him that if he felt he had any reason to contest my qualifications, that I would be willing (at that time, middle of January, 1968) to work out an agreed statement of facts and submit the questions directly to the Supreme Court of Texas. In this way it would be possible for us to get a final decision from the Supreme Court of Texas prior to either of us spending any money in the race.

To date, I know of no efforts by my opponent to contact me in trying to find a fair answer to any questions he may have. And since the time of my suggestions I have made several expenditures in behalf of my candidacy and I have a bill for \$1,260.00 from our County Democratic Executive Committee for Election Filing fees which is due and payable by February 26, 1968.

Today, I received word from what I consider reliable sources that my opponents have stated that they plan "to wait and let me get my feet wet" by paying my filing fees, etc. before they plan to contest me, and

Second, that they plan to file their charges in Judge Sparks Court where they feel they can be more assured of a favorable decision.

It is my opinion that any contest in this matter will have to be finally decided by the Supreme Court and that it is not necessary that there be a fact issue since all the necessary facts can be easily determined.

I therefore, challenge my opponent to put his candidacy on the line to rise or fall on this issue:

First, if the Supreme Court determines that I am not qualified, then of course, I will be out of the race; but second, if the Supreme Court agrees that I am qualified, then I would expect Mr. Earl Conner to withdraw from the race.

If my opponent feels that he is so sure of his ground and that he really has a case against me, then I challenge him to accept this proposition. And I can assure him that I (and my lawyers who I have already retained to work with me) will make every effort to get an early answer from the Supreme Court if he feels he needs such.

On the other hand, there is another choice, and I strongly recommend this choice to my opponent.

Let the people of Eastland County decide on the merits - in a fair election. Stop these noises about contesting residence and present an affirmative campaign of what each of us believe we can do for this county as its judge. Let us present ourselves as Gentlemen to the voters and let them decide who they think will make the best Judge for Eastland County. Let the voters decide who they feel they can trust with the responsibilities of this high office to do the job with fairness and justice for the best interest of all the people of this fine county and not to the interest of a select few.

Why would my opponents be afraid of a newcomer, anyway, if they have a qualified candidate who has lived in the county most of his life when the newcomer has only been in the county two and one half years? Is it possible we need new blood in our court house?

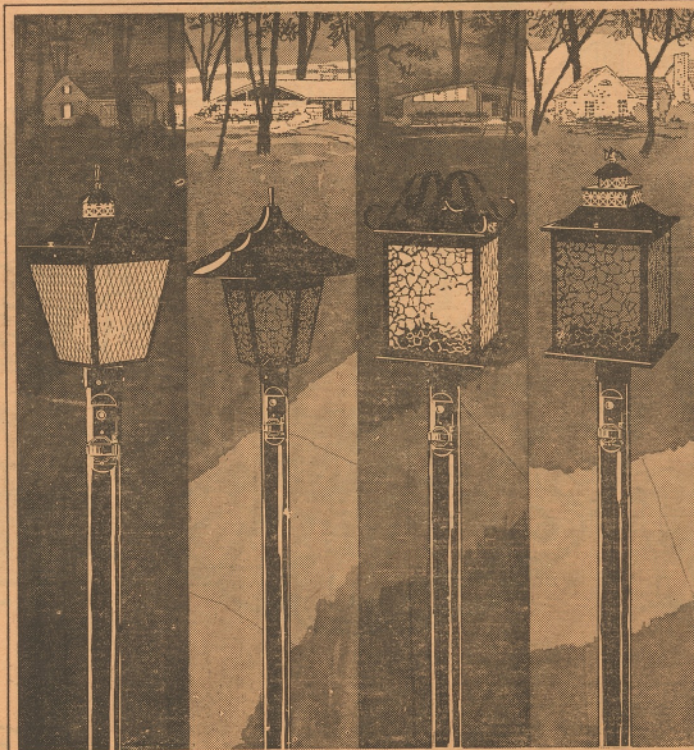

WASHINGTON, D. C. — ON THIS, THE BIRTHDAY OF OUR FIRST PRESIDENT, George Washington, it is natural that we should devote some time to the consideration of the influence which America's greatest hero, soldier and statesman has had upon our Republic.

TO MANY, THE MOST OUTSTANDING WORK THAT WASHINGTON accomplished was his invaluable aid in the formation of the American Constitution which, although only 181 years old, is still the oldest, active, political document existing in the world today. Since 1787, when our Constitution was adopted, civilization has been a world of tumbling thrones, pros-

trated dynasties, overturned constitutions — of new empires, new republics, new and constantly varying conceptions of states — yet in this epoch of upheaval, during the last 181 years, one political entity, and one alone, has remained intact: that is the Constitution of the United States of America.

OUR CONSTITUTION IS NOT SELF-PERPETUATED. If it is to survive, it will be because it has public support—active support; not passive.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES is the final refuge of every right that is enjoyed by any American citizen. So long as it is observed, these rights will be secure. Whenever it falls into disrespect or disrepute, orderly organized government, as we have known it for 181 years, will be at end.

WASHINGTON WAS THE PRESIDENT OF THE Constitutional Assembly which met in Philadelphia in 1787 and which produced the American Consti-

tion. Therefore, Washington can rightly be called the Father of his Country and the founder of its Constitution.

EVERY AMERICAN CITIZEN TODAY SHOULD study his Constitution. That great body of laws can be read in only 30 minutes of time, and yet it contains every right that we have, direct and indirect.

THERE ARE SEVERAL BASIC PRINCIPLES underlying our Constitution:

FIRST. IT ESTABLISHES A REPRESENTATIVE form of government.

SECOND. IT ESTABLISHES A DUAL FORM of government, each citizen living under two forms of government, the national and the state.

THIRD. IT GUARANTEES TO ITS CITIZENS individual liberty, freedom of speech, liberty of the press, right to own property and the right to worship God according to the dictates of conscience.

FOURTH. IT ESTABLISHES AN INDEPENDENT JUDICIARY and created the Supreme Court.

FIFTH. IT PREVENTS THE CONCENTRATION OF POWER IN the hands of one man or a group of men by checks and balances, creating the three departments of government—the legislative, the judicial and the executive—each department independent and yet cooperating with each other to the working of a harmonious government. This provision of our Constitution has been the safeguard of the Nation in the days gone, and the perpetuity of our institutions in the future depends upon the independence of these three functions of government.

SIXTH, AND, FINALLY, IT PLACES IN THE HANDS of the President and the Senate joint power in determining the foreign affairs of our Nation.

IT IS ESPECIALLY IMPORTANT IN THESE DAYS OF UNREST to become students of our great fundamental law. It has been our guiding genius for almost two centuries, from the time when our country consisted of only 3,000,000 people along the Atlantic seaboard. In a topsyturvy world in which sins are being committed in the name of

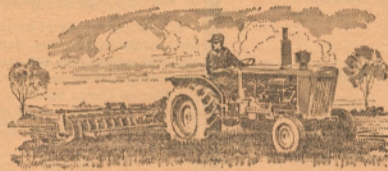

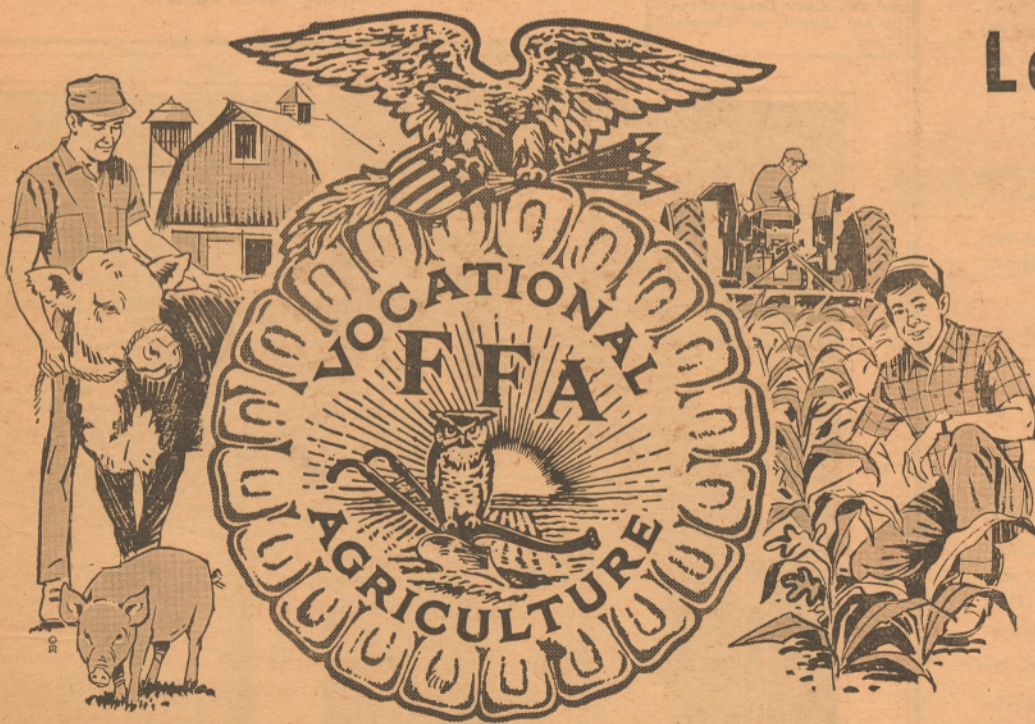

### A Month O' Sandwiches

CHICAGO — In the past five minutes, more than 833,000 sandwiches were consumed here in the United States.

If you totted up the beef, ham, peanut butter, sausage, hot dog and hamburger sandwiches, to name just a few of the combinations eaten in the last 24 hours, you would come up with better than 200 million sandwiches.

It has been a long time since the Earl of Sandwich first nestled a piece of meat between two slices of bread. The Earl was English, but over the years his discovery has become a staple on the American menu.

Norman Camit, manager of the Peter Pan Peanut Butter Company here, reports that the spotlight on the sandwich glows even brighter with the increasing number of quick, convenient meals being served.

The way the statistics break down, each and every one of us eats 1-1/2 sandwiches per day. We're apparently a generous group, because the remaining two-thirds of the sandwich gets eaten also. An estimated 20 million

workers carry their lunch, and all but a very few include sandwiches, whether they be last night's pot roast or the dainty water cress variety, Camit said.

Approximately 30 per cent of the sandwiches are the meat variety. The most popular sandwich up to the age of nine is peanut butter and jelly, and 39 per cent of the population between the ages of 10 and 17 prefers peanut butter and jelly to all other sandwiches, he reported.

Over a year's time we manage to chomp up 94 billion sandwiches. If placed end to end they'd reach from Hamburg or Frankfurt, Germany to the Sandwich Islands and back 740 times. No matter how you slice it, that takes a lot of crust, Camit concluded.

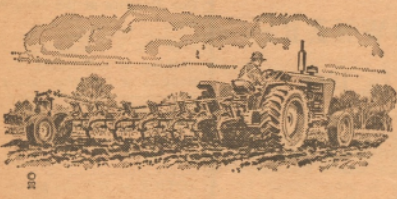

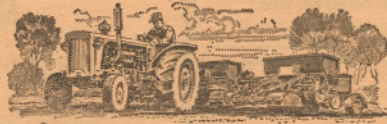

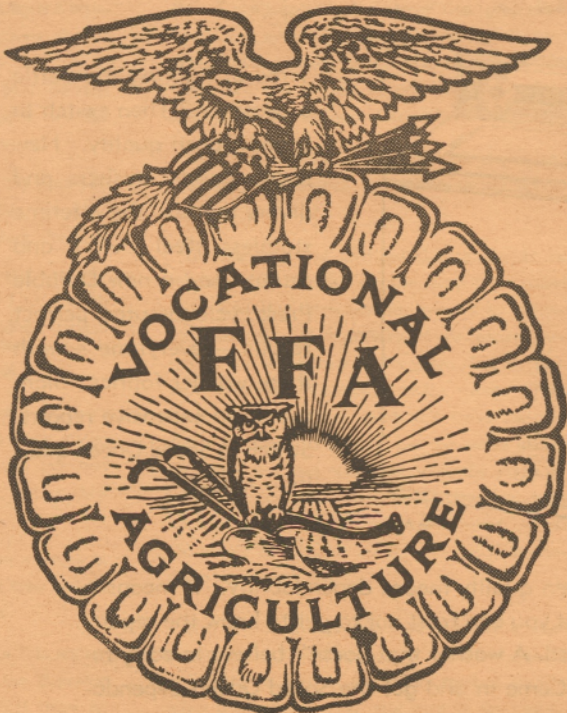

Mr. Pena said that the majority of his staff has been hired locally and will start training March 1 at the pavilion site.

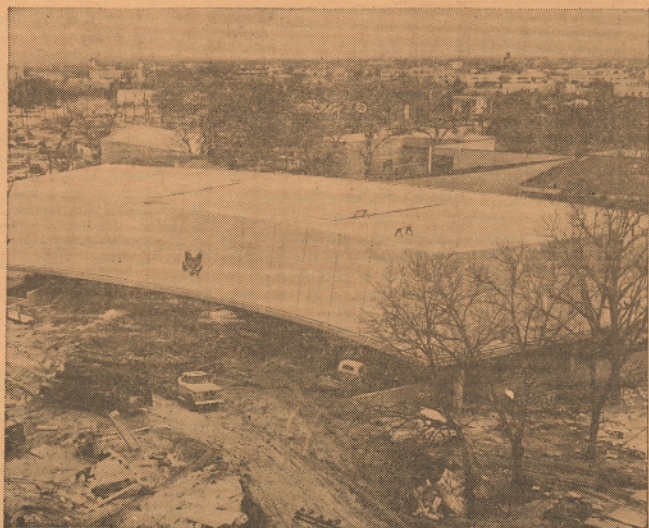
The Humble pavilion at Hemis-
