- 1. Must have the Degree of Chapter Farmer, have been an active member of FFA for at least two years, and have a record of satisfactory participation in the activities of the local chapter.
- 2. Must have satisfactorily completed at least two years of instruction in Vocational Agriculture, have in operation an outstanding supervised farming and/or other agricultural occupational experience program, and be regularly enrolled in a Vocational Agriculture class, or, if out of high school, have satisfactorily completed at least three years of instruction in Vocational Agriculture or all of the Vo Ag offered in the school last attended.
- 3. Be familiar with the provisions of the constitution of the State association and National Organization.
- 4. Demonstrate proficiency in parliamentary procedure.
- 5. Be able to lead a group discussion for forty minutes.
- 6. Must have earned at least \$500 by his own efforts from his supervised farming and/or other agricultural occupational experience program and have it productively invested or deposited in a bank.
- 7. Show outstanding ability as evidenced by his leadership and cooperation in student, chapter, and community activities, and have a satisfactory scholarship record certified by the local school superintendent or principal.
- 8. Must have participated in an outstanding way in activities for community improvement and the development of agriculture.

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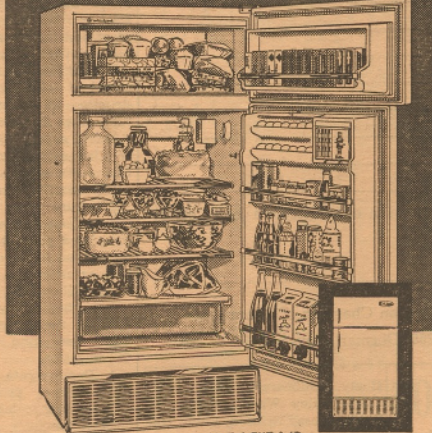

(If in that day there had been television, probably the bees would not have been noticed.) But it was fascinating to learn that when the old queen had expired and her usefulness served, the new queen left the hive, followed by the workers who surrounded her on the Mesquite limb where she chose to light.

AT THIS POINT, THE DRONES, TOO, HAD SERVED their purpose and either died or were killed by the workers. When the new queen was installed on her throne in a new hive, the workers immediately began to gather the materials for new comb and to dress up the new palace with all needed fixtures.

WE LEARNED THAT THE WORKER BEES would sting and were willing to give their life afterwards to protect their queen and her castle. The drones could be caught with the hand without injury. They carried no stinger and did not leave the hive except for a stroll outside for fresh air.

OUR SOCIETY IS SOMETHING LIKE THIS. It has one criterion, namely, that the individual have a willingness to work. Our economic system is not designed for the "drones", for the shiftless and "or the fellow who wants to be lashed in the morning while others are out on the job.

THE GREAT MARVEL OF OUR FREE ENTERPRISE SYSTEM in America is that it virtually guarantees a reasonable annual income to about everyone provided he or she is willing to work. There are, of course, exceptions. In the past we have not done all which should have been done to give opportunity for training more people for better jobs. There are those who, for some misfortune or other, are unable to obtain and hold a decent job but no country in history has been so successful in creating job opportunities as has this Country.

YET THERE ARE SOME PEOPLE WHO WANT TO REDESIGN our system so that it gives the "drones" full equality with the "workers."

WASHINGTON, D. C. —

Economic Progress, produced a 210-page report endorsing a guaranteed minimum annual wage for every American. Should the Commission's report ever be enacted into law, the citizen who chose not to work would get a cash allowance from the Government. The advocates of the guaranteed annual income theory contend that it is everyone's Constitutional right, regardless of the circumstances.

IT IS NOT SURPRISING THAT THE OLD-LINE SOCIALISTS endorse such a plan because they have always been for a redistribution of the wealth. It is surprising, however, to find some prominent businessmen along with many of the intellectuals advocating such a proposal.

GENERALLY, IT IS DOUBTFUL THAT THE SOCIALISTS give any heed or consideration to the cost as a factor in their reasoning. You would think the businessmen, and successful ones at that, would consider the cost and where the money must come from. Estimates of the cost have ranged from \$2 billion to \$20 billion a year. This is the difference between 2 cents and 20 cents — quite a spread in estimates.

IT IS BEING PROVED OVER AND OVER AGAIN that there are those who, knowing they are able to extract money from the taxpayers, choose this method as their livelihood. In the big cities, welfare officials say they spend as much time in trying to get able bodied men on welfare to go to work as they do in trying to help those who are really entitled to help. Imagine that if every chisler realized he never had to work again but only to apply for the guaranteed annual wage, how great the ranks of the "drones" would swell. Imagine, also, the reaction of working men and women who must supply the money to support the "drones". We can well imagine the feelings of people who have to get up early to go to work and others who work all night and who have to find their rest in the daytime.

CERTAINLY THERE ARE MANY WHO HOLD UNPLEASANT JOBS simply because they know that working is the only way to support themselves and their families. Unless these working people felt it morally wrong not to work and felt it an insult not to do their part in society by holding down jobs, they could with considerable justification say, "Why should I work to support the loafers?"

TO SUPPORT THE "DRONES" WOULD BE TO STEAL the rightful earnings of those citizens who use their energies each day to support themselves, their families, their communities and their Country.

WITH INCENTIVE TO WORK DESTROYED, such a scheme would eventually create a class of totally dependent citizens, vulnerable to the unscrupulous and reckless politician who would promise them more and more.

LIKE THE FELLOW SAID, "I am working . . . for a guaranteed annual income and I will sit here until I get it."
