## Family FINANCIAL PROTECTION

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Health Insurance Institute, 277 Park Ave., N. Y., N. Y., 10017

**Q. I was hurt in an automobile accident one year ago and have been receiving disability income checks for the past nine months. This has been most helpful since my wife is unable to work because of the baby. The policy will pay me for a period of two years, according to the way I understand it, but if I am still unable to work after this time is there any way in which I can extend these payments or take out another policy that would cover me?**

**A. There is no way you can extend your present coverage to cover this particular disability. When you are well again, you may want to see about revising your program to get a longer disability benefit period. A more immediate answer to your current needs, and one you are perhaps not aware of, is the disability provision under Social Security.**



If your disability is expected to last 12 months, as yours has, and you have been "fully insured" under the Social Security program for five out of the past 10 years of employment before you were disabled, you are entitled to disability benefits after six months under Social Security. This may provide some help in meeting your need to maintain the family standard of living. For the exact amount of these benefits in your particular case, check with your local Social Security office.

## THE GORDON SPOT

The fall issue of *The Pecan Quarterly* was recently received by pecan growers in Texas. This magazine is published by the Texas Pecan Growers Association and goes out to pecan growers all over the nation. This issue contains an article titled "Left the Railroad — For A Pecan Orchard" by B. B. Freeman of Ranger.

Mr. Freeman tells why he gave up a job with the railroad to go into the pecan production business. He explains how he began the business by sending pecans to his friends in Missouri and Kansas. Since 1949 he has shipped pecans to customers in almost every state. Many of Mr. Freeman's customers have been buying pecans from him every year since 1949.

The formula for his success has been — to sell a top quality product and keep the price as low as possible.

The Freeman orchard is now operated by Chester Morris.

About thirty-five people attended the pecan tour September 13. We saw some real good pecan orchards. Mr. C. T. Barton's orchard looks as if it will have an extremely large crop of pecans this year.

The pecan growers association met at noon on the day of the tour. We were very pleased that three towns — Cisco, Eastland and Ranger — invited the association to stage the pecan show in their respective towns. The membership of the association will select the site from among the three towns.

We have received word from Dr. James B. Henderson, Executive Director, Texas Animal Health Commission, Austin, that fever ticks have been found outside the South Texas Quarantine Zone.

He is asking stockmen to send a sample of ticks found on either cattle or horses to a laboratory for identification. It is very important that stockmen in Eastland County do this.

Ticks should be placed in a vial of commercial alcohol and mailed to the State-Federal Laboratory, Third Floor, Western Republic Life Building, Austin, Texas 78701. A piece of paper should be included listing the name of the owner, the mailing address, location of the farm or ranch, and type of animal from which the tick or ticks were removed.

I would like to ask all cattle and horse owners in Eastland County to closely observe their animals for tick infestation and submit to the Austin Laboratory specimens if and when discovered.

If stockmen would like to bring the ticks to my office, I will mail them to the laboratory at Austin.

## 14 AMENDMENTS WILL BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER FIFTH

Campaigns will be shaping up soon on 14 more amendments to the state constitution. All 14 of the proposed changes in the state's basic laws will be voted on at the general election November 5. Some are far-reaching, others routine.

Here are the amendments in the order in which they will appear on the November 5 ballot:

1. Revising provisions for management and administration of the state employee's retirement system and permitting investment in securities other than government bonds.
2. Raising the state's welfare spending ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million.
3. Permitting investment of the Permanent University Fund by UT regents in certain types of securities, within the "prudent man rule."
4. Allowing Dallas County to issue road bonds on vote of property taxpayers.
5. Authorizing a raise in state legislators' salary from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year and extending the per diem expense allowance of legislators (\$12 a day) to 140 days of a regular lawmaking session. (Present limit is 120 days.)
6. Allowing the legislature to exempt from property taxes equipment installed by industrialists to control air or water pollution.
