The Panthers lost their second game of the season on Friday night at Cross Plains in a game that saw them turn the ball over to the Buffaloes five times, twice on pass interceptions and three times via the fumble route. This, coupled with the speed of the Buffaloes spelled doom for the Big Red Gang.

The Panthers played the Class A Buffs on even terms through the first quarter with neither team getting the advantage. However, as the second quarter got underway the Buffaloes moved 68 yards in six plays, featuring runs of 24, 15, and the final 25 yards over the right side for the score by Rodney Renfro, a very fine speedy ball player, with 11 minutes left on the clock in the second quarter. The kick for point failed.

The Buffs again moved 78 yards on their next possession for the second touchdown. The score came on a 10 yard run off the right side with 4:00 left in the second period. This drive featured running sprints of 12, 27 and 15, by the speedy Buffs before Tony Winfrey got the TD. The pass for two point conversion failed.

The Buffs got a break on the ensuing kickoff when they recovered a Panther fumble on the Gorman 25. Winfrey hit off the right side for the final 15 yards for the score with 2:00 minutes left on the clock. A pass for the extra points failed and the Buffs took an 19-0 lead to the locker room.

The second half started with the Panthers coming out with some real fine blocking and ball control by Gorman, moving from their own 40 yard line down inside the Cross Plains five yard line before losing the ball on downs.

The teams played on even terms for the remainder of the game.

With the exception of the second quarter in which the Big Red Gang had a let down allowing the Buffs to score all their points, we feel that the defense showed much improvement over the previous game. And, if you will remember, we stated previously that the Panthers would get better as they gained more experience and confidence. And if the defense keeps improving, the Panthers will do considerably better when they get in their own Class. If we could just work up more consistency on the offense, we would have a much better chance of winning. However, Gorman showed much improvement on the offense also over the opening game.

Leading ground gainer for Gorman was Kelly Henderson who did a fine job of quarter-backing and showed much improvement on running. He had 53 yards on 11 carries. Bimbo Roberts picked up 39 on 15 totes. Kenneth Butler ran for 19 yards on 5 carries, and James Webb, substituting for Bill Baze, who was on the sick list, ran for 15 yards on 5 tries.

Our player of the week has to be no other than Kelly Henderson, who did a fine job, both offensively and defensively in the game. Of course Bimbo Roberts did a great job on the defense, as did several of the players. Also we feel that James Webb did a great job on defense, as did Ricky Fuller, playing in the secondary.

\$120,414 Grant to Aid in Stopping Cattle Diseases

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman Omar Burleson announces approval of a \$120,414 grant by the Economic Development Administration, to help demonstrate methods of eradicating diseases threatening the production of cattle in Texas.

Funds from EDA will go to the State of Texas for a one-year program. State officials have reported cases of screw-worm, tick fever and scabies increased during 1972, resulting in a Federal quarantine on cattle from several Texas counties and threatening the entire cattle production in the State.

Through the Texas State Animal Health Commission and the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation at Mission, Texas, the State plans to pinpoint the extent of the parasites within counties and to demonstrate on-the-spot eradication measures.

The funds will allow the State to hire additional animal health inspectors to conduct the program.

Cattle now in production in Texas have been valued at about \$2 billion. Without treatment, the cases of screwworm and tick fever infestations during the last year would have resulted in a direct loss estimated in excess of \$32 million.

The State of Texas will add \$131,742 in other funds to meet the \$252,156 total cost of the demonstration program.

Officials of EDA have pledged to continue to work with local and State officials to help assure the maximum benefit of this program for residents of Texas.

Farm Trailer Bill

AUSTIN — Legislation to correct problems created by the trailer-brake law was introduced Monday, with State Rep. Joe Hanna co-sponsoring the bill which will exempt certain trailers and correct inadequacies of the bill passed during the last session.

The bill will exempt farm trailers, farm semi-trailers, and fertilizer trailers if those vehicles are operated on the highways only during daylight hours, and not at times when, due to insufficient light or unfavorable atmospheric conditions, persons and vehicles on the highway are not clearly discernible at a distance of one thousand feet ahead.

Farm trailers, farm semi-trailers and fertilizer trailers will also be exempt from certain lighting requirements called for in the first bill.

Rep. Hanna co-sponsored a resolution asking Gov. Preston Smith to open the special session to legislation on the trailer brake law. Gov. Smith announced Monday he would allow this legislation to be introduced, along with three other measures.

Gov. Smith said certain sections of the bill as passed previously created a potential hardship not only for farmers and ranchers, but for persons utilizing trailers for recreational purposes, and urged the Legislature to pass legislation which would correct these inadequacies.

AUSTIN — State Representative Joe Hanna, who is co-chairman of the state interim committee studying extended coverage rates for home owners, said today that two members of the State Insurance Board had assured him they would work with him to bring about some changes in the rating system in Texas.

Members of the State Board of Insurance have the authority to make such changes, and Hanna said this was the best indication of the change of attitude and policy evidenced by the Board in regard to

the goals of the committee. Rep. Hanna and his committee have been at work all summer, and are expanding their efforts during the special session now going on in Austin to study insurance reforms.

Hanna holds that this area is discriminated against, and hopes to reduce rates here by moving out of the high rate area, or else spreading the premium load more equitably over the whole state.

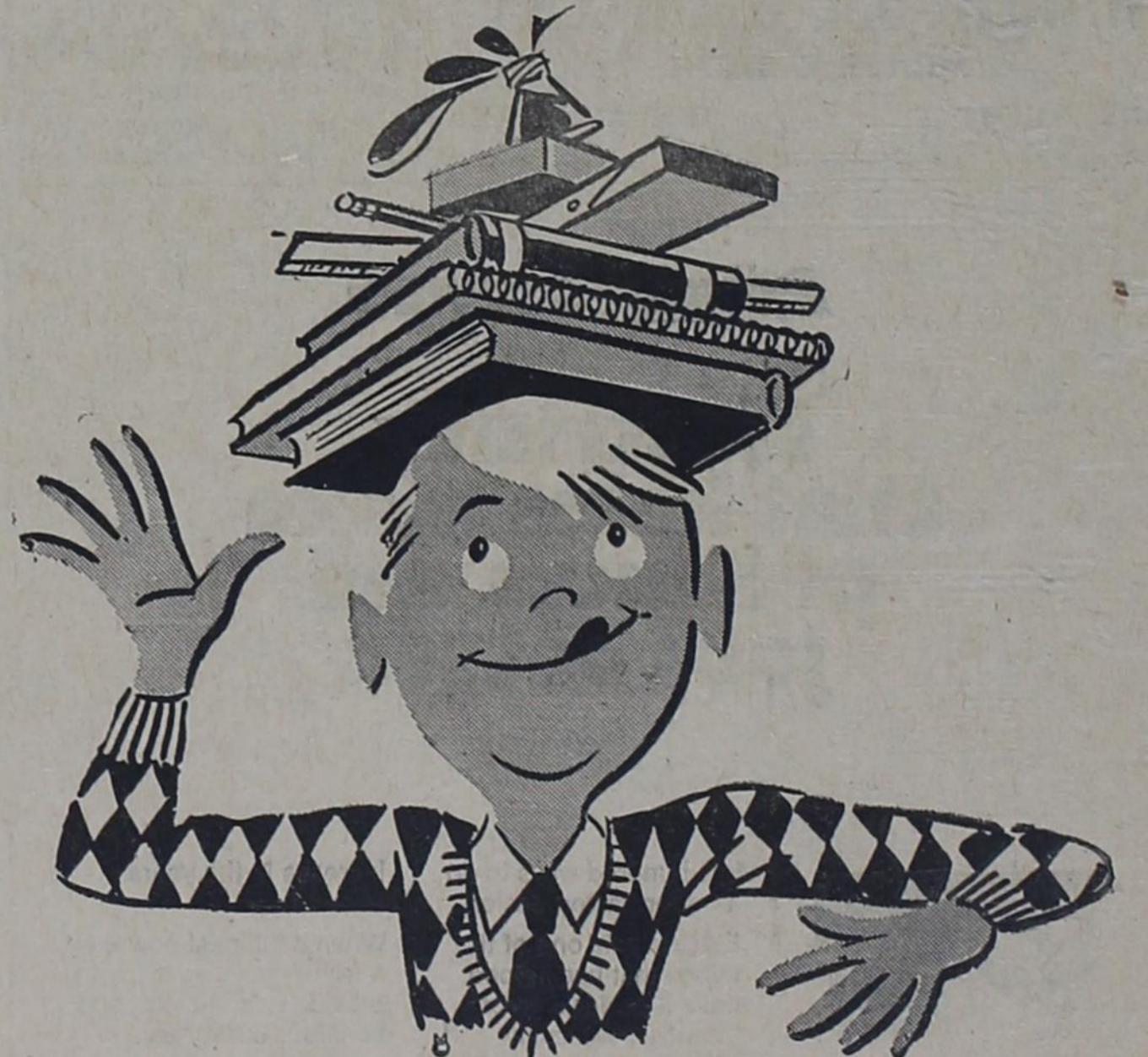

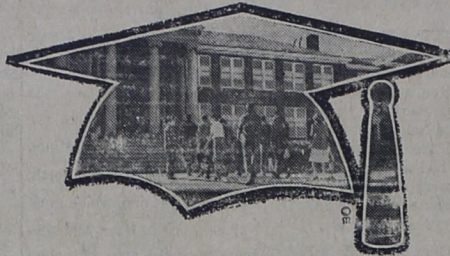
