Know Your School

The Gorman School Board met on Monday evening, August 10 and reviewed the financial situation of the school, along with other matters. After hearing a report of the financial situation for the current year and the prospect for 1970-71, the amended budget for 1969-70 was presented and adopted by due process. The amended budget showed that the district would receive \$10,043 more than was expected when the original budget was presented with expenditures exceeding the original figure by \$9,260. The amended budget showed that there would be a balance in the operation fund of about \$1200.

The balance given above is the first balance that has been shown in the operation fund that exceeds outstanding short term loans or outstanding bills at the end of the year in a number of years. At the close of the year in 1965 there was outstanding bills and loans in excess of \$17,000. Since that time these have been paid and in addition the new building (at a cost of \$30,000) has been built and is paid for at this time. It is well that these things are out of the

way because the cost of operating the school is increasing every year and more money will be needed as years pass. Unlike many neighboring schools, we have been able to present a budget for next year that did not require a tax increase. There is a possibility that some increase may be necessary in 1971-72 or by the following year.

A breakdown in the budgets on income and expenditures is compared here.

I would like to point out that if you will figure percentages on the income you will find that the local district's share of total revenue is less than 1/3 of the total revenue.

You will note that the expenditures increased by \$8,400. This increase has been absorbed in the budget due to the fact that other than earmarked money from interest and sinking fund and from state transportation, there

will be no outstanding indebtedness for 1970-71 school year.

I would like to thank all of the people in Gorman for their cooperation and support that they have given to me and to the School Board during the last five years. As long as people realize that an educational institution is valuable and will cooperate in sharing their part of the load by paying local school taxes, Gorman can continue to maintain a good school system.

Revival Services at First Baptist Slated August 16 thru 23

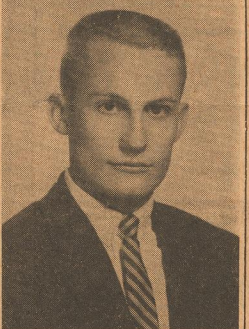
The revival services of the First Baptist Church will begin Sunday morning, August 16 and continue through Sunday, August 23rd.

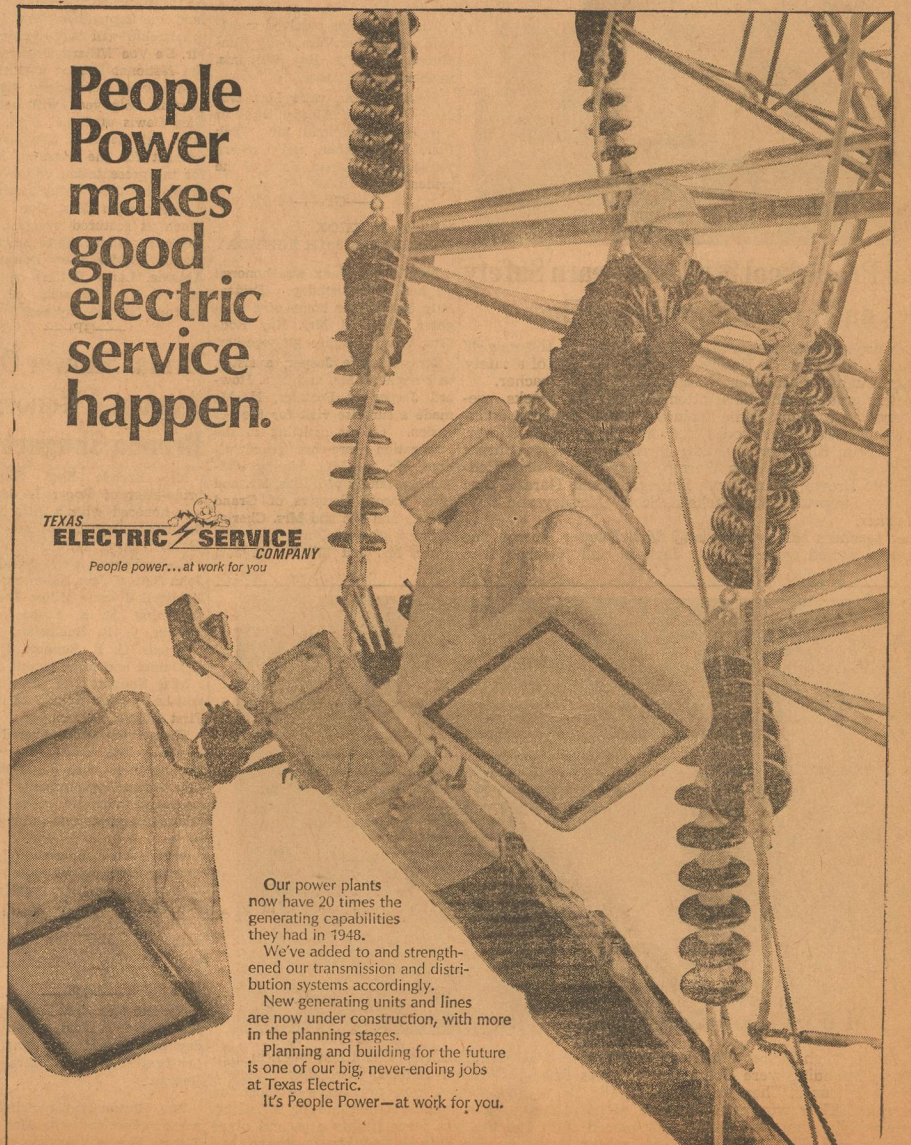

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

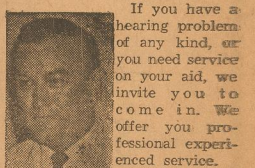
